A Swift Night Out

September 11 – 13, 2009

If you've never participated in *A Swift Night Out*, the national count for Chimney and Vaux's Swifts, make it a point to do so this September. Simply find a Chimney Swift roost in your area, get there about thirty minutes before sunset with some of your rowdiest birding buddies, and start counting. If you've never counted roosting Chimney Swifts before, it's a thrill at this time of year when they will be roosting in the hundreds in many spots. The count is sponsored by the Driftwood Wildlife Association out of Houston, and they will take gladly accept your best estimate if you are unable to make an exact count. THE BIG SIT! AT THE RED RIVER NWR

This will be ninth straight year that BSG sitters will sit the Big Sit. The Big Sit will be held at the

Red River National Wildlife Refuge, where it will be the opening event to kickoff National Wildlife Refuge Week. Sitters count birds observed or heard from within a 17-foot diameter circle. The Big Sit officially begins at midnight and ends 24 hours later; BSG sitters have always been in the field by 6:30 a.m., manning the circle continuously until at least 7:30 p.m. Any Sitters wishing to man the circle before 6:30 a.m. will need to contact Nancy Menasco so we can make arrangements to let you in the gate. Sitters may come and go at will. Signs along the refuge road will lead you to the circle. Parking will be available near the circle.

Founded by the New Haven, Connecticut, Bird Club and now hosted by Bird Watcher's Digest magazine, the Big Sit is an annual, international, noncompetitive birding event. It is sponsored nationally by Swarovski Optik, Alpen Optics, and Wild Bird Centers. 2009 will mark the 15th Annual Big Sit. From its beginnings as a strictly North American affair, the Big Sit has grown to include teams all over the world. Swarovski Optik donates \$500 to the team who gets the "Golden Bird." A bird species is selected by random drawing from all bird species sighted. All teams listing that species are entered in the random drawing for the Golden Bird. The winning circle then chooses a non-profit environmental-based organization to be the recipient of the \$500.

Directions to the refuge: From the intersection of US 71 (Barksdale Boulevard) and Jimmie Davis Highway (LA 511) in Bossier City, go south about one-half mile on US 71 and turn right (west) on Sunflower Road. Proceed to the end of the road to the refuge entrance. The refuge manager is Pat Stinson. The refuge phone number is 742-1219.

What to bring: binoculars, scope, field guides, chair, hat, mosquito repellent, sunscreen, drinks, breakfast, lunch, supper, snacks.

LEAST TERNS DECLINE

The summer of 2009 was difficult for Least Terns attempting to nest on the Red River in Louisiana and Arkansas. The high waters of spring persisted into most of June, the prime nesting month. In June terns nested on only one location in the 150 mile reach of Red River that I surveyed this year. That one location was Palmer Lake Revetment, located in Arkansas just north of the Louisiana state line at Mile Marker 278. I was completely surprised to find 11 baby Least Terns at this location on July 2. This was the only location where there was any sand available in June for nesting birds and 34 adult terns found it. All other nesting attempts were in the month of July. This means fewer terns tried to nest and those that did laid fewer eggs, on average one less per nest. The result of this situation is that 2009 was a year where tern numbers declined.

In July I did four trips in Arkansas covering 75 miles of free and fast flowing waters. This area passes through Garland from Fulton, Arkansas south to the state line. I counted 318 adult Least Terns, 43 fledged birds, 15 babies, and 46 nests containing 80 eggs. This is not bad for a single month effort likely averaging more than a bird raised per mile of river. It also suggests an addition of several hundred more terns raised between Fulton, Arkansas and Lake Texoma.

In July I made six trips in Louisiana covering 75 miles about half of which is free flowing waters north of the I-220 Bridge, and half of which is Pool 5 lake waters. About 100 Least Terns attempted 30 nests, laying 69 eggs, but fledging only four known young. A rise in the river level measured at Shreveport's Pool 5 wiped out the nesting attempts at three locations. There were attempts to nest at three new locations in Pool 5, all of which failed. These were at the enlarged sandy area visible from the I-220 Bridge, and two locations near Clark's Marina (Young's Point at MM 207.6 and Clark's Island at MM 203.4). So it is easy to interpret the

data and see that the Pool stages of the Red River are a black hole for the endangered Interior Least Tern.

Pat Stinson, manager of the Red River National Wildlife Reserve, has shown a pro-active interest in managing nesting sites for Least Terns, putting up signs at nesting locations, and proposing management procedures that would benefit Least Terns, through habitat creation and improvement. Please encourage Pat in this matter.

Southeast Arizona's Second Spring – Pleasant and Productive Birding in July

Even if you haven't ever visited Southeast Arizona, any birder with more than 200 birds on his North American life list has surely heard about the wonderful birding opportunities there, especially for Mexican birds. Place names like Portal, Ramsey Canyon, Fort Huachuca, Madera Canyon, California Gulch, Patagonia, Lake Wilcox, Mount Lemon, etc. are synonymous with exotic birds like Elegant Trogon, Magnificent, Berylline, White-eared, Blue-throated and Lucifer Hummingbirds, Painted and Red-faced Warbler, Five-striped and Rufous-winged Sparrows, Spotted Owl, and on and on.

Birding tours target Southeast Arizona in December-January, April-May, and July-August. The most popular tours, by far are those in April-May as many Mexican specialty birds move across the border into Arizona for nesting plus western migrants pass through the area. I made that trip in 2004 and picked up over 70 life North American birds. The so-called Second Spring in July-August is almost as popular time to bird in the area. This permits folks to pick up birds missed in earlier trips in April-May, especially hummingbirds and odd Mexican vagrants. My 18-29 July 2009 tour with Bird Treks added nine North American life birds plus close to 100 year birds.

July-August birding tours to Southeast Arizona are called Second Spring because it is a period of significant monsoon-like rainfall. All wildlife and plants respond positively to the milder temperatures

and availability of water. This is when many birds nest again so it is a "second spring."

I arrived in Tucson on 17 July, a day ahead of the tour starting date, just in case there were problems with air connections. This gave me a chance to bird around the airport late in the afternoon and the next morning. The area is high desert with mesquite and cactus dominating the landscape.

The next morning, I walked through a vacant field near long term parking at the airport and darned if I didn't flush Common Poorwill and Lesser Nighthawk. The Lesser Nighthawk was my first lifer of the trip and the only one that I saw well. The Common Poorwill was the first I had seen as it was "heard only" on my 2004 tour. Other interesting birds included Cactus Wren, Western Kingbird, Verdin, and Hooded Oriole. House Finches outnumbered House Sparrows by 2-3 to 1 in the area.

I met Bob Schutsky, Bird Trek owner and our guide, around 11 AM. Our other seven participants arrived on time and we were able to head south for Madera Canyon by 1 PM. We stayed at the Santa Rita Lodge in the Santa Rita Mountains. The lodge was a birder's delight with seed, suet, and sugar water feeders everywhere. It was quite a treat to see Acorn Woodpeckers, Lesser Goldfinches, Mexican Jays, Bridled Titmice, Wild Turkeys, and Broad-billed Hummingbirds up close and personal. We later went up the road about half a mile with Flame-colored Tanager being our target. We ignored Sulphur-bellied Flycatchers that were calling nearby to catch a glimpse and of the tanager that we heard well but had trouble finding in the dense canopy vegetation. Yes, I did see the tanager but had the bird back in 2004 at the same site. But, the flycatchers had not arrived then so it was great to find lifer number two for the trip.

My lifers included Montezuma Quail, Lesser Nighthawk, White-eared Hummingbird, Berylline Hummingbird, Sulphur-bellied Flycatcher, Sinaloa Wren, Crissal Thrasher (heard only), Varied Bunting, and Five-striped Sparrow. Our biggest miss was Brown-backed Solitaire at Ramsey Canyon. Our participants added anywhere from a dozen to fifty or so life birds on the tour. My total

list for the trip was 161 as I missed 5 of the 165 birds recorded.

We moved up and down in altitude from desert to alpine areas but never over the tree line – basically 4000-8000 feet. We went through biomes that would otherwise require going 1500 or so miles north. The best day in terms of seeing biomes was our last full day on 28 July when we took the 22 mile trip from Tucson up Mount Lemon. The various stops along the way had excellent informational signage to explain the different biomes. And, did I mention that we had Mountain Chickadee, Western Chickadee, Pygmy Nuthatch, Western Bluebird, Grace's Warbler, and Red-faced Warbler on that trip?

We spent 3 days birding around Madera Canyon from up in the mountains to down in Green Valley. Our trip to California Gulch was just not as bumpy as my 2004 ride and just didn't seem as potentially dangerous. The road actually seemed improved. We parked around 3:30 PM on the 19th of July and worked our way down into the gulch. Almost as soon as we got to the bottom, Bob "heard something" and played a Five-striped Sparrow song. Up popped one and then another. We had wonderful views of the birds. Earlier in the day as we drove to Green Valley to eat breakfast, we stopped and quickly found Rufous-winged Sparrows, another specialty that many birders seek.

On the morning of the 19th of July we heard an Elegant Trogon calling along the creek in Madera Canyon. After breakfast we birded in the area of Florida Gulch/Florida Work Camp area hoping for Black-capped Gnatcatcher but had to settle for Black-tailed Gnatcatcher. We had good views of Varied Bunting, a bird I missed in 2004. "Florida" is pronounced "FLOR REE DAH" in Arizona.

Before we assembled to start birding on the 20th of July, I walked up the road to the area where we had previously found the Flame-colored Tanager by myself and not only heard but had a brief but definitive view of a trogon flying in the tree tops. This was not especially meaningful to me as I had watched trogons for some minutes in 2004.

We left the Santa Rita Mountains on the 20th of July and traveled to the Patagonia area. We stopped at the Patagonia Rest-Stop for lunch. We found Thick-billed Flycatcher but struck out on White-

breasted Swifts and Rose-breasted Becards. Bob Schutsky was one of the birders who helped to establish the "Patagonia Rest-Stop Phenomenon" – the appearance of a very rare bird where birders congregate. That rare bird seen by Bob and several associates many years earlier was a Yellow Grosbeak!

That afternoon, we picked up several hummingbirds at Patton's place in Patagonia including Violet-crowned Hummingbird plus a fledgling Gray Hawk in a nest nearby. We learned that the Sinaloa Wren had an easily observed nest just off the main highway in the TNC Soinita Creek Preserve but that the nearby Yellow-breasted Chats were imitating its song! We got to the nest site just after sunrise the next morning but several other eager birders beat us there. We heard the bird singing several times and were able to view it foraging on a tree in heavy brush and going in and out of its nest. All of us would have liked a better view and returned the next morning with roughly the same results. But it was surely a very rare lifer for all of us.

One of my target birds was Montezuma Quail. We heard them calling in proper habitat and flushed a quail in California Gulch that might have been one. However, we did manage a pair that most of us including me saw while driving down the mountain at Fort Huachuca after finding Buff-breasted Flycatcher and Hepatic Tanager. We had a monumental hike up Sheelite Canyon trying for the Mexican Spotted Owl but struck out. The Sheelite Canyon hike is one that no one forgets and resulted in my life Spotted Owl in 2004. Ironically, we went to a Bread and Breakfast about 15 miles away later in the day and Bob ran into Sheri Williamson of hummingbird fame who had just encountered a Spotted Owl about 20 minutes away on an easy trail. That's where we got plenty of pictures of a very docile owl that was being badgered by a Painted Redstart!

We went to the TNC reserve at Ramsey Canyon on the 24th of July. Our targets were Berylline Hummingbird and the Brown-backed Solitaire. The solitaire was a North American first this summer and birders from all over were after it. Well, wouldn't you know, we left the hummingbird feeding station about 5 minutes before the

hummingbird showed up. And, the solitaire showed up about 3 hours after we left for another site. But, at least we were rewarded with Berylline Hummingbird in a heavy rain that soaked most of us despite the cover over the viewing station.

Our trip to Portal included a stop at the Sierra Vista Sewage Plant where we had wonderful views of Yellow-headed Blackbirds in the marsh/treatment ponds. We didn't pick up many birds on the way to Portal but did manage Chihuahuan Raven. Our main target in the Portal area were Scaled Quail, Short-tailed Hawk, Western Screech-Owl, Band-tailed Pigeon, Elegant Trogon, Mexican Chickadee, Juniper Titmouse, Pygmy Nuthatch, Bendire's and Crissal Thrasher, Painted Redstart, Black-throated Gray and Red-faced Warbler, Black-chinned Sparrow and Yellow-eyed Junco. Well, we struck out on the trogon, titmouse and sparrow but thoroughly enjoyed the birds, scenery, especially the Portal mountain pass, and the experience of moving from hot desert to pleasant temperatures at higher elevations. Two participants really wanted to find Black-throated Gray Warbler. We managed wonderful views of several of these classy warblers in a mixed flock of feeding songbirds in the pines. But, yep, a party of birders we passed lower in the valley had just had great views of a trogon when we reached them on our way back down the valley!

Our return trip to Tucson took us through Wilcox, Arizona which is located in a major, flat desert playa. The city's water is treated in a large multiple pond lagoon system. The final lagoon is algae and food rich and an excellent site for waterbirds. We had Western and Baird's Sandpipers, American Avocets including fledglings whose bills hadn't fully developed, Long-billed Curlews, Black-necked Stilts, many Wilson's Phalaropes, Mallards, Ruddy Ducks, American Coots, and an Eared Grebe. There were many Horned Larks around the lagoon.

Our last full day of the tour was spent on Mount Lemon as mentioned previously. There was a small fishing pond in one of the parks and I found it especially entertaining to watch young children catching crawfish using the bacon on the string trick. I didn't see anyone catch a fish and the

children didn't seem to know that you could actually eat crawfish!

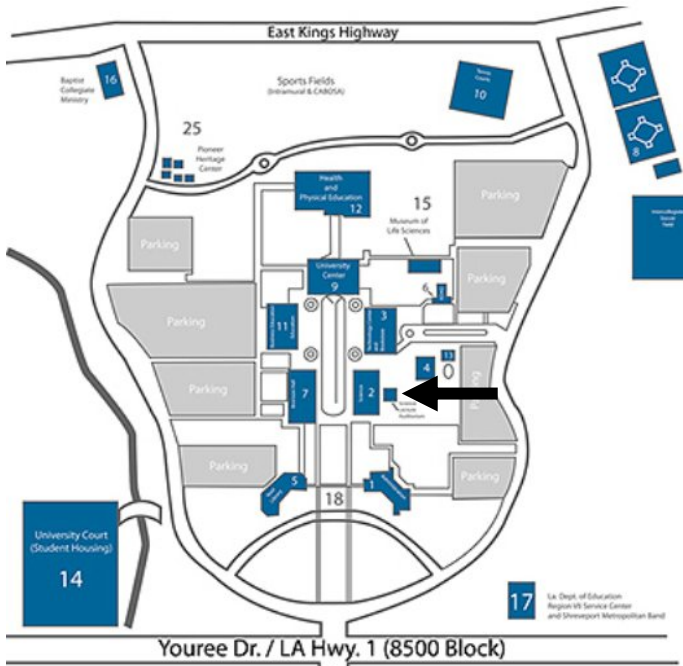

BIRD REPORT – compiled August 26, 2009

Use the bird report to see what other birders have been seeing and where to go find the bird you want to see. Observers are abbreviated by the first and last initials. Dates and localities of observations are summarized under the observer's initials. Sightings are arranged by species. Following each species is a line of data in the following format: date, initials of the observer, number of birds observed, initials of another observer, number of birds they observed, etc. For the number of birds observed, a 1 is used for both 1 bird and for numbers not reported by the observer. For example: 01/12/99 BB 2 means that on January 12, 1999, BB saw two birds. Then by looking on the observer list, located after the sightings, you can determine that BB is Bob Birder and on 1/12/99 he was birding C. Bickham Dickson Park.

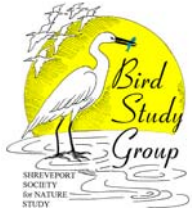

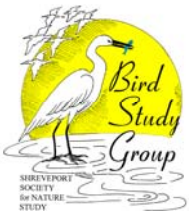

This will be ninth straight year that BSG sitters will sit the Big Sit. The Big Sit will be held at the Red River National Wildlife Refuge, where it will be the opening event to kickoff National Wildlife Refuge Week. Sitters count birds observed or heard from within a 17-foot diameter circle. The Big Sit officially begins at midnight and ends 24 hours later; BSG sitters have always been in the field by 6:30 a.m., manning the circle continuously until at least 7:30 p.m. Any Sitters wishing to man the circle before 6:30 a.m. will need to contact Nancy Menasco so we can make arrangements to let you in the gate. Sitters may come and go at will. Signs along the refuge road will lead you to the circle. Parking will be available near the circle.

Founded by the New Haven, Connecticut, Bird Club and now hosted by Bird Watcher's Digest magazine, the Big Sit is an annual, international, noncompetitive

birding event. It is sponsored nationally by Swarovski Optik, Alpen Optics, and Wild Bird Centers. 2009 will mark the 15th Annual Big Sit. From its beginnings as a strictly North American affair, the Big Sit has grown to include teams all over the world. Swarovski Optik donates \$500 to the team who gets the "Golden Bird." A bird species is selected by random drawing from all bird species sighted. All teams listing that species are entered in the random drawing for the Golden Bird. The winning circle then chooses a non-profit environmental-based organization to be the recipient of the \$500.

The Yellow Rail is a bird of marshes and wetlands; because of its secretive nature, it is much sought after by birders. A rope drag is often used to cause the rails to fly up where they can be seen. Conditions in the moist soil impoundments at Bayou Pierre may prevent us actually dragging a rope but we will do our best to give participants a look at these elusive birds. Other species of birds that might be found in the moist soil impoundments and adjacent refuge area in November include Northern Harrier, Marsh and Sedge Wrens, LeConte's Sparrow, and wading birds and waterfowl.

Directions to the Bayou Pierre Unit: The Bayou Pierre unit of the refuge is open to the public. From the blinking caution light at the intersection of LA 1 and LA 509 in Red River Parish, go south on LA 1 for 1.6 miles. Turn left (east) on Grand Bayou Loop/PR 401 and proceed one mile. Birding 2.0

Thanks for those who attended my *Birding 2.0* presentation at the regular BSG meeting in September. Shortly before that meeting, I proposed to the board the creation of a new position for the BSG, a “Technology Czar.” Well, guess who got stuck with that? So, rather than complain about more work to do, I’ll just warn you now that my being in charge of field trips AND technology just doubles the chances of screwing something up. And the chances were good already.

Anyway, this will be the first installment of new addition to your usually stunning BSG newsletter. The idea of this corner of the newsletter is to present, explain, and de-mystify a different technological birding advancement each month. In so doing, I will also attempt to write each article so poorly that one of you will feel compelled to take over the job.

So, for my first installment of *Birding 2.0*, I’d like to feature the eBird Google Gadget. What is the eBird Google Gadget you ask? Well, if you download it (which takes all of about 2 seconds by the way), you will see on your home page a list of all the rare birds reported on eBird for the state of Louisiana as they are reported. If the bird is entered into eBird, it shows up on your computer screen.

Here’s what you do:

1. Go to www.google.com and click “iGoogle” at the top right of the web page. At the next page, close the “make your own home page” box by clicking the “x” in the top right corner of the box. This is the iGoogle page. Set it as your home page now. (There are various other gadgets to personalize your iGoogle home page with; “Date/Time” and “Weather” are standard. To delete any gadget boxes you don’t want, click the down arrow at the top right of the box and select “Delete this gadget.”)

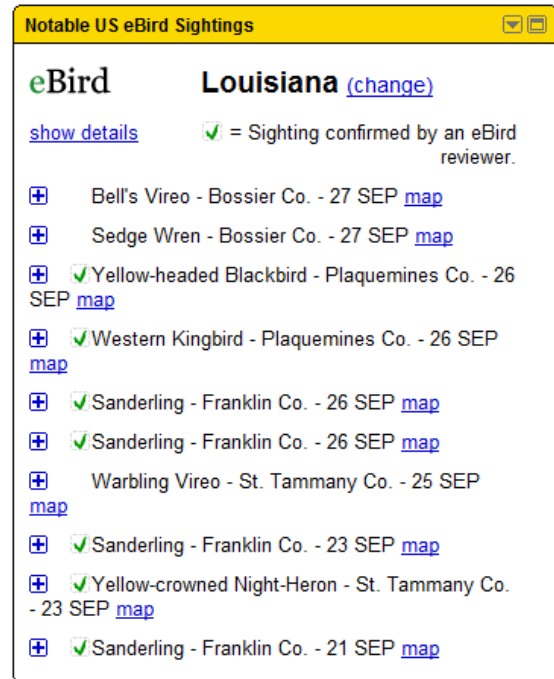
2. Go to www.ebird.com and scroll until you see “eBird Resources” on your right. Select “eBird Notable Birds Gadget.”

3. You’ll then be taken to a 2007 eBird update article about the gadget. Read the page for a full explanation of what it does (or don’t and just trust me), and click on “Get the eBird Rare Bird Gadget.”

4. When you come to the new page, click the “Add to iGoogle” bar, and the gadget will install on your iGoogle home page automatically.

5. Once the gadget is installed, select Louisiana from the list of states. You can also select any other state if you wish.

Here’s what the gadget looks like:



The green checks indicate that the report has been reviewed and confirmed by our region’s eBird reviewer (for us, that’d be Van Remsen, and nearly every bird gets a check within about 48 hours). If you’re interested in the exact location of the bird, click “map,” and it will take you to the eBird map of the location as it was listed by the eBird user who entered the data.

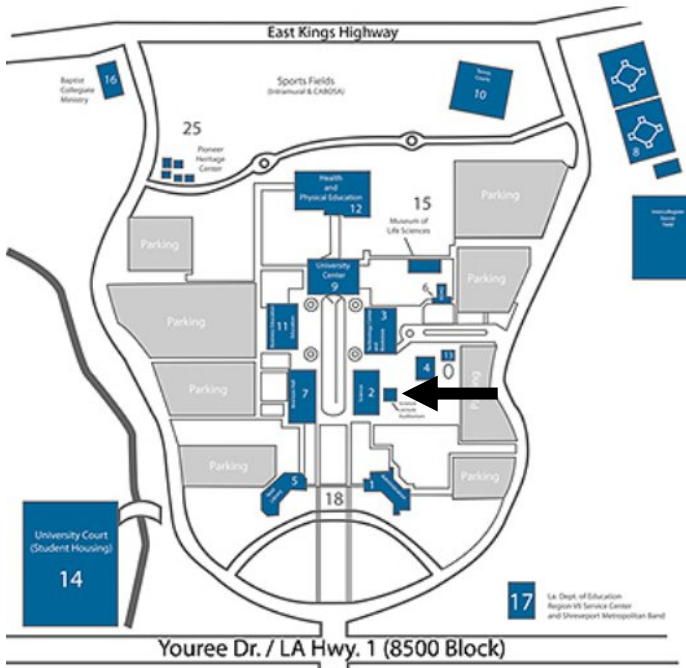

BIRD REPORT – compiled October 1, 2009

Use the bird report to see what other birders have been seeing and where to go find the bird you want to see. Observers are abbreviated by the first and last initials. Dates and localities of observations are summarized under the observer’s initials. Sightings are arranged by species. Following each species is a line of data in the following format: date, initials of the observer, number of birds observed, initials of another observer, number of birds they observed, etc. For the number of birds observed, a 1 is used for both 1 bird and for numbers not reported by the observer. For example: 01/12/99 BB 2 means that on January 12, 1999, BB saw two birds. Then by looking on the observer list, located after the sightings, you can determine that BB is Bob Birder and on 1/12/99 he was birding C. Bickham Dickson Park.

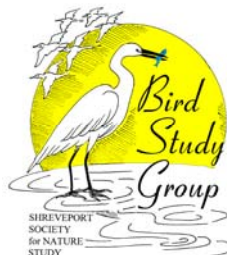
Bird Records Note

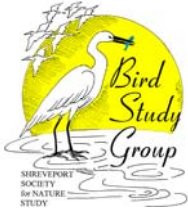

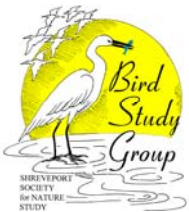

The Yellow Rail is a bird of marshes and wetlands; because of its secretive nature, it is much sought after by birders. A rope drag is often used to cause the rails to fly up where they can be seen. Conditions in the moist soil impoundments at Bayou Pierre may prevent us actually dragging a rope but we will do our best to give participants a look at these elusive birds. Other species of birds that might be found in the moist soil impoundments and adjacent refuge area in November include Northern Harrier, Marsh and Sedge Wrens, LeConte's Sparrow, and wading birds and waterfowl.

This will be similar to rope drags done at places like Anahuac, and it will be the BSG's first Yellow Rail drag at the refuge. Members of John Dillon's

Minden High School Nature Club will attend to help us with the strenuous work of dragging the rope so that most of the BSG members can watch from a short distance for flushing rails or other birds. If you have any waders or rubber boots that you would be willing to bring for John's students, they would be most appreciative. If so, please call John at 318-243-2284 or email at jdillon@websterpsb.org. For any BSG members who are interested in helping with the drag, please expect to get very dirty and very tired. The payoff is that you may have rails flush at your feet.

Directions to the Bayou Pierre Unit: from the blinking caution light at the intersection of LA 1 and LA 509 in Red River Parish, go south on LA 1 for 1.6 miles. Turn left (east) on Grand Bayou Loop/PR 401 and proceed one mile. There will be a white house on your left. Go past the house driveway and turn in at the gate nearest the barn to enter the refuge. The Bayou Pierre unit of the refuge is open to the public.

A note on Christmas Bird Counts. While participation in CBC's is high for the BSG, we have many members who do not participate, often because they are still learning how to identify species, how to find good habitats, or other aspects of birding that more experienced birders take for granted. So, if you are new to birding or to the BSG, we encourage you to ask questions about the CBC's. There's no better way to become a better birder than by spending time in the field with experienced birders.

If you are interested in going on a CBC for the first time, ask one of the board members or any other active member what to do. You'll also need to contact the CBC compiler as soon as possible to let him or her know that you're interested. The compiler should probably be able to pair you with an experienced local birder who can teach you a lot. Or, if you live within the count area, you can simply phone in species and numbers you had in your yard that day. But be sure to contact the compiler well in advance so that you know what you are supposed to do.

Hawk Watch Reports

Friday, the day before the annual hawk count at Hervey's Farm, I told several people that conditions were shaping up for a good count Saturday, September 26, 2009. It had been rainy most of the week, conditions cleared up Friday late afternoon, but no hawks moved here, and Saturday was predicted partly cloudy with no rain. When I predict, I like to be right, hence this report.

We had hawks here, and they had them at Smith Point, where Galveston Bay's east shore meets the Gulf of Mexico, in Texas. John Arvin reports a "Gee Whiz" day of hawk watching with: Osprey 5, Mississippi Kite 248, White-tailed Kite 1, Northern Harrier 5, Sharp-shinned Hawk 131, Cooper's Hawk 64, Red-shouldered Hawk 1, Broad-winged Hawk 18,810, Swainson's Hawk 4, Red-tailed Hawk 1 (Albino), Bald Eagle 1, Kestrel 6, Merlin 6, Peregrin Falcon 5, with a total of 19,284 raptors.

We beat them with: 4 Red-shouldered Hawks and 2 Red-tailed Hawks. So there TEXAS. They slightly beat us in some species too but we had: Turkey Vulture 21, Black Vulture 89, Broad-winged Hawk 24 (one a visible black phase), Sharp-

shinned Hawk 2, Cooper's Hawk 1, and American Kestrel 2. Other mentionable birds were Anhinga 8, Chimney Swift 14, American Crow 59 and Cattle Egret 48. Our total of raptors was 273.

While they were suffering eating boiled eggs and stale peanut butter sandwiches, we were dining royally on grilled burger fixed by Jerry Bertrand, and lots of good side dishes furnished by attendees. If you couldn't be there (Smith Point), it was OK being here!

Birding 2.0

Because we'll soon be getting into the season for the Winter Bird Atlas, this month's tech article will focus on an iPhone/iPod Touch application called Topo Maps. Now, I know not all of you have an iPhone or an iPod Touch, but I also know that many of you are thinking of getting one or the other. Besides, all the cool kids are doing it. Nevertheless, I also know many of you may not speak techy lingo, either, so I'll try to explain all this as best I can in hopes that you'll run out and buy one of these fancy gadgets.

First, if you find the following article of interest, and you'd like to do more reading about the Topo Maps application, you can read all about it by going to <http://topomapsapp.com>.

Alright, so what is the Topo Maps application? Well, I assume most of you know about USGS quad maps. Those are the ones we use for the Winter and Summer Bird Atlases. The Topo Maps app literally puts all of the USGS quad maps into your hand. It contains every quad map for the continental United States, Puerto Rico, the U.S. Virgin Islands, and, recently added, Alaska, Hawaii, and Canada. Total, it contains nearly 70,000 quad maps for your use. But there's a catch, of course. It costs \$6.99. Okay, there's actually no catch. If you do the math, each map on the application costs about 1/1000th of a cent. And that cost is a one-time cost for the application. There are no additional costs for downloading any of the maps.

Okay, so you might think, "So what? I can print out the maps I need for free by finding them online. Why do I need this?" Glad you asked. The Topo Maps app is more than just a map database because

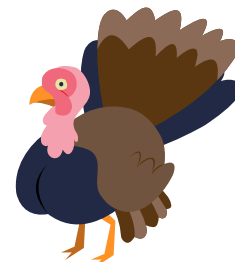
all of its USGS quad maps are interactive with you, the user. First of all, you can zoom in on any map down to the tiniest detail. If you've ever printed USGS maps, you know that the quality isn't too good for reading details such as contour lines or coordinates.

You can also find your current location on the map with the touch of one button. That was useful with me during the Summer Bird Atlas because I sometimes am not sure if I'm still in a particular quad or if I've entered another quad. But Topo Maps uses satellites to track your location, so you'll never accidentally go out of your quad boundaries. Or if you do want to use an adjacent map, swipe your finger across the screen, and, as long as you have the map in that direction download, the adjacent map will appear.

Topo Maps also shows distances across any quad map, no matter if you're zoomed in or not. If you want to access this feature, touch one button, and your entire map is measured in tenths of miles.

Like all Apple iPhone applications, Topo Maps is frequently updated for free. Recent updates include the ability to simulate shading on maps of hilly or mountainous terrain by selecting which direction sunlight is coming from. And users can now use a searchable database for all the National Parks, National Wildlife Refuges, Wilderness Areas, State Parks, and most other protected public lands. This doesn't give you a separate map of the park that you probably already have anyway; it gives you all the USGS quad maps that cover a given park. And those will usually be much more detailed than your standard park map.

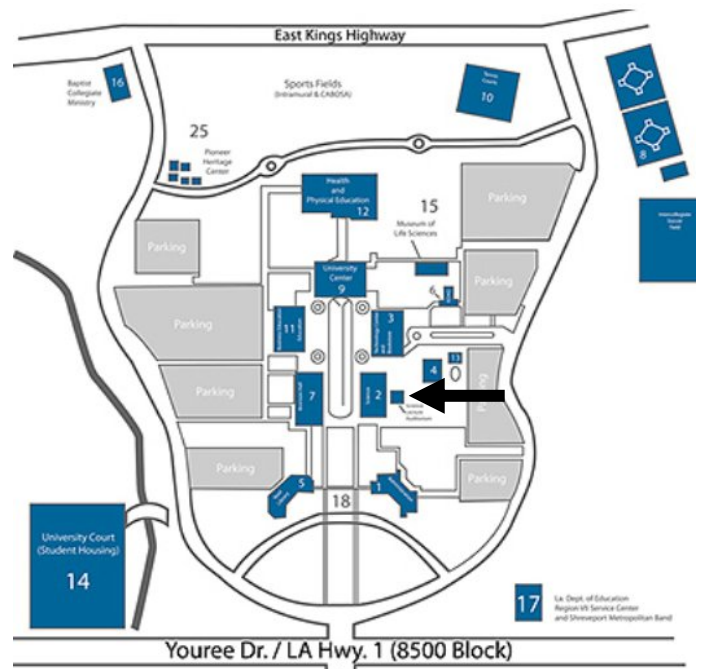


Minutes of the Board Meeting October 6, 2009

BIRD REPORT – compiled November 2, 2009

Use the bird report to see what other birders have been seeing and where to go find the bird you want to see. Observers are abbreviated by the first and last initials. Dates and localities of observations are summarized under the observer's initials. Sightings are arranged by species. Following each species is a line of data in the following format: date, initials of the observer, number of birds observed, initials of another observer, number of birds they observed, etc. For the number of birds observed, a 1 is used for both 1 bird and for numbers not reported by the observer. For example: 01/12/99 BB 2 means that on January 12, 1999, BB saw two birds. Then by looking on the observer list, located after the sightings, you can determine that BB is Bob Birder and on 1/12/99 he was birding C. Bickham Dickson Park.

Report bird records for the newsletter to Mac Hardy by the 25th of each month. All bird records reported here are observations of the observers and are therefore the responsibility of the observer.

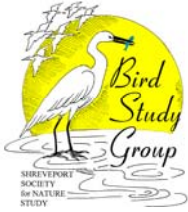

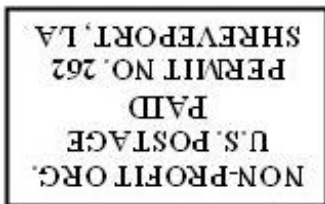

Presented by: Dr. Cran Lucas

Birds employ numerous mechanisms for producing coloration. Pigments such as carotenoids and melanins can produce a variety of colored feathers. Structural colors are produced by changing the microstructure of the feather. How these diverse colors are produced and utilized by birds will be reviewed.

Dr. Cran Lucas is a Professor of Biological Sciences at LSU in Shreveport where he has taught biology for 32 year. He is currently working on research, with Dr. James Ingold, which is devoted to the chemical basis of coloration in birds.

BIRDING 2.0

Well, I finally blew the \$30 I knew I'd eventually blow and got the Sibley app for my iPhone. A few months back, I wrote about it for the column and vowed that, when I inevitably got the app, I'd write another column about it. So, I'm making good on my promise.

Before I go any further, I know some of you don't have an iPhone or an iPod Touch, but I also know a lot of you are planning to get one of them. If you get an iPod Touch from BirdJam (now the only choice from BirdJam as they no longer sell the Nano), you can also add the Sibley app.

So, what's the app? Well, in a nutshell, take *The Sibley Guide to Birds*, add anywhere from 2 to 10 vocalizations for every species that vocalizes, and add a few more illustrations of various plumages, etc., and you've got the Sibley app. It also has a couple other features that birders may or may not find useful. For one, you can identify the state you're in, and the app will filter out birds that shouldn't be in that state. It also gives you the ability to keep a digital list of all the birds you see for a given location. To make it easy for you, here's the breakdown on the advantages and disadvantages:

Advantages:

1. Accuracy of illustrations. It's impossible to find any field guide that will always be reliable, but Sibley's illustrations are considered by many to be the best.

2. Field marks. I always thought Sibley's field guide was second to the Kaufmann guide in making it easy for birders to note the distinguishing field marks of each species. Kaufmann has arrows (as does Peterson) pointing to the field marks in addition to written commentary on the marks. The Sibley app bulked up on these little arrows. Nearly every illustration has them.

3. The recordings. The recordings are great. They're as good, if not better, than the Stokes recordings. For one, they're quite comprehensive. Many songbirds have 9 or 10 separate recordings listed. Plus, you can select the recording you want. The disadvantage to using iPods is that you have to fast forward or rewind to the part of the recording you want. That's not so with the Sibley app. Each song, call, chip, flight note, (yes, it has lots of flight notes!), is labeled; you just pick the one you want.

4. Bird friendly recordings. Another plus with the way the recordings are integrated is that the app will only play one vocalization and then stop. Many birders using other methods of playback let the vocalizations go on interminably. That can be very upsetting to many birds and can often drive them away.

5. Index options. Birders using the Sibley app can search alphabetically or taxonomically.

6. User friendly. The app contains lots of introductory material explaining how to use the app properly. It also contains all the text from the introduction of *The Sibley Guide to Birds*, including his drawings explaining bird topography.

7. Comprehensive. It covers 810 species known to occur in North America.

8. Range maps. Range maps are included for every species.

9. Compare feature. This is truly helpful. You can easily bring up images of similar-looking species (Couch's and Tropical Kingbirds, for example) and compare them. This feature also allows users to compare vocalizations and range maps.

10. Compact. Simply put, you can leave the paper field guide in the car.

11. "Smart Search" feature. This feature is mainly for new or intermediate birders. It's basically a search filter. You check off features such as coloration, size, and body type, and the app tells you all the possible species that match your input. I've tried it some just to test it out, and I've been impressed. It's pretty comprehensive. For example, searching "yellow" and "sparrow-size" gives you species like Blackpoll Warbler and Blackburnian Warbler, species that have yellow coloration for certain plumages or a certain sex.

Disadvantages:

1. Start-up time. This Sibley app isn't perfect, and one thing that continues to irk me is that, due to its huge size (522 MB; the vast majority of the 200,000 apps are fewer than 10 MB), it's very slow to open. It takes about 12 seconds on my 8 gig iPhone 3G. That may be due in part to all the other apps I've got on the phone, though.

2. The list feature. The list feature has LOTS of issues. First of all, it's only a life list. It's not meant to be used as a trip list feature. This is very annoying because the app already eliminates the need for carrying the field guide with you; the ability for it to be used as your notebook would be just as good. Furthermore, it's easy to add a bird to your list, but you can only delete one bird at a time. I assume that the first major update of the app (all apps are updated free of charge) will include the ability to delete an entire list, but I don't

know for certain. Until then, because the list is only a life list, you can't delete the entire list.

3. No zoom. Some birding apps allow you to zoom in on the illustration. The Sibley app has no such feature. It doesn't bother me, but I imagine it could be troublesome to birders with poor eyesight.

So, if you've already got an iPhone or iPod Touch or are planning to get one, consider the Sibley app. The *Sibley Guide to Birds* (the book, not the app) is \$35. The app is \$30 and contains more illustrations, field marks, search features, and tons of vocalizations. If you get it, let me know how you like it!

Texas Birding Trip, May 16-21, 2010

The purpose of this trip was to visit the Lost Maples Natural Area to search for two rare birds, the Black-capped Vireo and the Golden-cheeked Warbler. Judy, my wife, and I stayed at the Inn at Lost Maples, about 4 miles west of Van Der Pool, Texas, on Texas Highway 353. Lost Maples Natural Area is located about 3 miles north of Van Der Pool. We birded primarily at the Inn at Lost Maples, Heart of Texas Birding Trail Site 059, and Lost Maples Natural Area, Heart of Texas Birding Trail Site 061. We also visited Garner State Park near Leakey, a Heart of Texas Birding Trail site as well, for several hours on 18 May. We recorded birds seen in Texas in our travels.

Texas Hill Country is an area of modest rainfall dominated by oak, mesquite and juniper covered, steep rocky hills with elevations of 2000-4000 feet. Spring rainfall promotes awe provoking wildflower landscapes. The area we visited was dominated by the Rio Frio and Sanibel River both with cypress trees, some huge, along the riparian areas, especially at lower elevations. Lost Maples Natural Area is home to many rare saw-tooth maples that create a wonderland of autumn color every fall.

The Black-capped Vireo and Golden-cheeked Warbler are two rare birds that are much sought after in Texas Hill Country. Lost Maples Natural Area is one of the main destinations for birders seeking these two species.

We found the two rare songbirds on Wednesday 19 May. There are two major trails at Lost Maples Natural Area about 4-5 miles in length. The names, East Trail and West Trail, show their locations. Both start at about 1800 feet and climb to the hill tops on the northern side of the area at 2200 feet. They meet at a series of ponds about half way to the top of the hills. Black-capped Vireo had been reported along the hill top on the East Trail and Golden-cheeked Warbler had been reported

along the ponds. We took the east side of East Trail and soon found that the note on the map stating "steep" meant what it said. We knew that the western side of the trail from the top was very steep but the eastern side was almost as steep. We literally climbed through the clouds with poor visibility.

I heard an odd bird call near the top of the trail so we stopped and alternately pished and imitated bird calls we were hearing – no CD players or ipods! We kept seeing birds moving in nearby brush but simply could not get good views. Then, after about 15 minutes, a bird came in over my wife's shoulder, about 15 feet away and landed in a bush. There was no need for binoculars. It WAS a male Golden-cheeked Warbler.

We then climbed to the top of the "hill" and shortly heard two birds singing very jumbled songs in junipers. The mist was very heavy and I was able to walk right up to the junipers where one bird was flitting back and forth. I was able to focus on it several times and knew, the first time I got it in view, that it was a male Black-capped Vireo.

We were very pleased with our accommodations at Inn at Lost Maples and the birding there was good. A pair of Vermilion Flycatchers entertained us every day on the fence across the road. Several Black-headed Grosbeaks provided definitive but poor looks in the oaks around our cabin. Black-crested Titmice called throughout the day and came readily to the feeder behind our cabin for great views. It was nice to be staying at a place with no television and no cell phone access. I was impressed to hear Common Poorwills serenading us in early evening and being able to watch both fireflies and stars in the clear, black nights without extraneous lights.

16 May 2010 – Burkeville, TX to San Marcos, TX via Jasper, Woodville, Livingstone, Huntsville, Madisonville, Bryan, Caldwell, and Bastrop.

17 May 2010 – San Marcos, TX to Van Der Pool, TX [Inn at Lost Maples, Texas Highway 353, 4 miles due west of Van Der Pool on Lower Sabinal River] via New Braunsfel, Boerne, and Kerrville.

18 May 2010 – Visits to Lost Maples Natural Area and Garner State Park including Van Der Pool, Utopia, and Leakey.

19 May 2010 – Visit to Lost Maples Natural Area as well as Van Der Pool, Medina, and Bandera.

20 May 2010 – Van Der Pool, TX to San Marcos, TX via Medina, Bandera, Boerne, New Braunsfel, and Luling.

21 May 2010 – San Marcos, TX to Burkeville, TX via Bastrop, Caldwell, Bryan, Madisonville, Huntsville, Livingstone, Woodville, and Jasper.

Use the bird report to see what other birders have been seeing and where to go find the bird you want to see. Observers are abbreviated by the first and last initials. Dates and localities of observations are summarized under the observer's initials. Sightings are arranged by species. Following each species is a line of data in the following format: date, initials of the observer, number of birds observed, initials of another observer, number of birds they observed, etc. For the number of birds observed, a 1 is used for both 1 bird and for numbers not reported by the observer. For example: 01/12/99 BB 2 means that on January 12, 1999, BB saw two birds. Then by looking on the observer list, located after the sightings, you can determine that BB is Bob Birder and on 1/12/99 he was birding C. Bickham Dickson Park.

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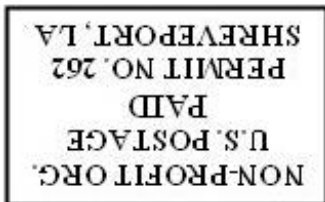
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
