FIELD TRIPS

DECEMBER 1998 THROUGH JANUARY 1999

Dec 5 - CADDO LAKE BIRD COUNT: This is a joint effort, similar to a CBC, held in conjunction with NETFO. You are needed to help us count birds on the LA side of the lake. Dec 12 - EAST TEXAS LAKES: Meet at Kelly's Truck Stop (I-20 near Greenwood) at 7:00 a.m. This is a full day trip, focusing on nearby lakes of eastern Texas. **Parasitic Jaeger** has recently been reported at one of these lakes, and more ducks, grebes, gulls, and terns should be present. Bring a picnic or eat lunch at a convenience store in the area. Leader: Cameron Cox. Contact person: Hubert Hervey - 925-9249.

Dec 19 - SHREVEPORT CBC: Birders are needed for this, the longest continuous Christmas Bird Count in the state. Feeder watchers will also be appreciated. Count coordinator: Charles Lyon - 865-2674.

Jan 2 - BCBCBC: The Bossier, Caddo, Bienville Christmas Bird Count usually leads all northern LA in total species counted. It has added importance, in that it is documenting the interesting changes in bird populations influenced by the recent completion of the Red River Waterway. Jan 16 - OWL PROWL: We usually bird the Yearwood Road area for owls. Four species of owls is the rule, with **Short-eared Owl** making a possible fifth species. LOS WINTER MEETING

This year's winter meeting of the Louisiana Ornithological Society will be held in Shreveport, at Louisiana State University in Shreveport (LSUS) on the weekend of January 29-31. Birding field trips will take place Saturday morning, Saturday afternoon, and Sunday morning. We'll cover a multitude of habitats, even including a birding trip on Cross Lake by barge. We may also be able to arrange for a small group to go to Shreveport Regional Airport in search of **Smith's Longspur**. This species has been an uncommon but regular winter visitor to the airport for a number of years.

All field trips will depart from the parking lot of the Museum of Life Sciences on the LSUS campus at 7:30 a.m. and should return by noon. The afternoon trips will leave at 1:00 p.m. and return by 5:00 p.m. Some field trips are scheduled as all day trips and will leave the LSUS campus at 7:30 a.m. and return by 5:00 p.m., with lunch on the road.

Housing will be on your own. A block of 40 rooms has been reserved for the LOS Meeting at the Sheraton Shreveport (1419 E. 70th Street, Shreveport, LA 71105; 1-800-321-4182). Room rates are \$71.00 single and \$81.00 double occupancy; please state your LOS affiliation. The rooms will be held to January 7, 1999. LOS participants must fill ten rooms in order to get the special rate.

The Sheraton Shreveport is located on the southeast end of Shreveport. If you are coming from the south on I-49, Exit on to 70th Street east (Exit 202). Travel east on 70th street for 1.7 miles, The Sheraton will be on your right. If you are coming from I-20, take I-49 south to the 70th Street exit (Exit 202) and go east until you reach the hotel.

Other suggested motels are near the airport on I-20, west of Shreveport. (Ramada Inn, 5116 Monkhouse Dr., 1-800-284-0224 or 318-635-7531; Pelican Inn, 5215 Monkhouse Dr., 318-635-7531; Holiday Inn-Airport Financial Plaza, 5555 Financial Plaza, 318-688-3000) and in Bossier City (Holiday Inn Bossier City, 2015 Old Minden Road, 318-742-9700; Comfort Inn, 1100 Delhi Street, 1-800-228-2400 or 318-221-2400). **NOTE: The gaming industry in Shreveport-Bossier is booming and hotel/motel rooms go quickly. It is suggested that room reservations be made as soon as possible.**

Friday evening's events will take place at Sci-Port, Shreveport's new science discovery center in downtown

Shreveport. Registration will begin at 6:00 p.m. and run till 11:00 p.m. Registration fee is \$7.00 per person (to defray the speakers' expenses and administrative costs). Friday evening's events will include an opportunity to amble through the Red River Gallery at Sci-Port and learn about the natural history and culture of northwest Louisiana. We will also be presenting a program by Mr. Don Simon of Chicot State Park in Arkansas at 8:00 p.m. Taking the role of a boatman on the Mississippi River, Mr. Simon will take John James Audubon and us on a trip down the Mississippi River. The program is illustrated with a slide show of Audubon's original bird paintings.

DIRECTIONS TO SCI-PORT. From the Sheraton Shreveport, go east on 70th Street, which will take you to Clyde Fant Parkway. You will make a right turn off 70th Street, go under the Jimmie Davis Bridge at the Red River and go north on Clyde Fant about 3 miles. The Sci-Port Discovery Center will be on your left when you get to downtown Shreveport. From I-20 near the airport, go east to the Spring Street exit. At the end of the exit ramp, you will need to get in the right hand lane and turn right onto Crockett Street. **NOTE: THIS IS THE MOST DANGEROUS INTERSECTION IN SHREVEPORT. YOU CAN NOT TURN RIGHT ON LAKE STREET. YOU MUST TURN RIGHT ON CROCKETT STREET, ONE BLOCK NORTH.** Go two blocks to Clyde Fant and turn right, Sci-Port will be just ahead on the right. From I-20 westbound, get off at Spring Street and at the end of the exit ramp make a right turn onto Lake Street, go one block to Clyde Fant and turn left into Sci-Port Parking Lot.

Saturday's activities will begin at the Museum of Life Sciences on the LSUS campus.

DIRECTIONS TO LSUS MUSEUM OF LIFE SCIENCES. From Sheraton Shreveport, travel east on 70th Street to Youree Drive and turn right. Go south on Youree Drive to 2nd light (1.3 miles). Make a left turn into the entrance for LSUS and bear right. Take the circular drive to the right and follow the signs and arrows to the museum. From I-20, take I-49 south to Exit 199 (Bert Kouns Industrial Loop) and go east (left at the end of the exit ramp) to LA 1/Youree Drive. Turn right on Youree Drive and go to the 1st light and make a left turn into the entrance for LSUS and bear right. Take the circular drive to the right and follow the signs and arrows to the museum.

The Saturday banquet will start at 6:30 p.m. The price will be \$10.00 per person. There is a choice of three entrees, roast beef, grilled lemon pepper **Red Jungle Fowl**, and meatloaf. Please indicate which entrée you prefer on the registration form. Banquet registration needs to be done by 27th January. There will be limited banquet spaces for those who do not pre-register.

The Saturday night program will include a short talk by Kathryn Trahan on her LOS sponsored trip to Camp Chiricahua in August of 1998. The main speaker will be Dr. John Smallwood who is an expert on the **American Kestrel**. His talk is entitled, "Nest box programs for **American Kestrels**: collaborative research on a widely distributed species." Dr. Smallwood has been studying the endangered Florida subspecies of the **American Kestrel**, which is the same subspecies that breeds in Louisiana. He is a graduate of Miami University in Oxford Ohio (B.A. and M.S.) and Ohio State University (Ph.D.). He is currently an assistant professor in the Department of Biology and Molecular Biology at Montclair State University in Montclair, New Jersey. He is the co-author of the Birds of North American account on the American Kestrel as well as other publications on this species. He is a member of the Board of Directors of the Raptor Research Foundation and the Secretary of the Wilson Ornithological Society.

Please send the enclosed reservation form as soon as possible. Please note that there is an additional charge of \$10.00 per person for the barge trip (to cover barge rental). Note we do not have the field trip to the Regional Airport included on the Registration form. We will have to make special arrangements for that trip, and it may require the drawing of straws by those who would like to participate.

Winter Meeting Field Trips

1. Cross Lake. This is a barge trip, to see ducks, grebes, **Bald Eagles** etc. During the 1992 LOS winter meeting, a **Red-throated Loon** was seen on this trip. Reservations are required, and there will be a fee of \$10.00 per person for trip. The fee will be payable at the beginning of the trip to the trip leader.
2. Yearwood Road. This is an automobile convoy. We'll try to find **Lapland Longspur** (and possibly other longspurs), **Bewick's Wren**, **Western Meadowlark**, **Harris'**, **Fox**, **LeConte's** and **White-crowned Sparrows**. This area is especially good for raptors including many different subspecies and forms of **Red-tailed Hawk**.
3. North Caddo Parish and Caddo Lake. **This is an all day trip with lunch on the road.** This auto convoy will visit a variety of habitats, including hardwood forest, mixed pine-hardwoods, lake edge and open fields. Target birds include: **Hooded Merganser**, **Lapland Longspur**, **Horned Lark**, and **Lark Sparrow**.
4. Walter B. Jacobs Nature Park and Mallard Bay. Automobile convoy will travel to the best spots in

NW Louisiana to see **White-breasted Nuthatch**, **LeConte's Sparrow**, and **Sedge Wren**.

5. Soda Lake WMA. This automobile convoy will search a variety of habitats in one of the best areas in NW Louisiana for finding **Spotted Towhee**. This area is also good for winter sparrows and **Hooded Merganser**.
6. Red River Research Center and Lock & Dam No. 5. Automobile convoy to these two areas may produce **Lapland Longspur**, **Western Meadowlark**, **Lark Sparrow**, **Sora** and **Virginia Rail**, **Marsh Wren** and a variety of ducks.
7. Bodcau Bayou. A Sunday only trip by automobile convoy. This trip will be run if we are able to find **Henslow's Sparrow**. Other possible birds are waterfowl, **Wild Turkey** and **Greater Roadrunner**.
8. **American Kestrel** banding. Friday night's speaker will take a small group (2 vehicles) out on the back roads of Caddo and Bossier Parishes and we will capture and band **American Kestrels**.

NON-BIRDING ACTIVITIES. For those who may want to engage in non-birding activities, the following places are available: Imax theater at Sci-Port; groups of ten or more can get special prices. Louisiana State Exhibit Museum on the grounds of the Louisiana State Fair, Touchstone Natural History Museum, Norton Art Gallery, Barnwell Horticultural Gardens, and the Arboretum at Centenary College. Details on these activities will be available at registration on Friday evening and Saturday morning.

All About Louisiana Birds

The best parts in this small book are the treatises on generalities about birds: feeding, attracting and photographing them. However, there are many books published that provide the same information in greater detail and depth. The preface talks about attracting birds to your backyard and truly that is what the book does best should the reader wish to add this book to his or her library.

The title is a misnomer. Personally I was very excited with the prospect of a new book on Louisiana Birds. That bubble was quickly burst. The only pelican in the book is the one on the book jacket. Although there is a map showing the different "physiographic" areas of the state coastal birds are largely omitted. My co-author says that in her opinion the birds included in this book are those, which Dr. Alsop believes, are found in backyards or may be attracted to backyards in central to north Louisiana. But even so, the choice of birds shown doesn't include some of Louisiana's breeding birds nor does it make it clear that some of the birds are only winter migrants. For example, only four warblers are described, the **Pine Warbler**, **Myrtle Warbler**, **Palm Warbler** and **Yellow-throated Warbler**. Where is the **Prothonotary Warbler** to name a prominent omission? Further in the accompanying descriptive material no mention is made of where the birds are found in Louisiana. The only particular state named in the **Palm Warbler** section is Florida. The only states named in the **Yellow-throated Warbler** habitats are Tennessee and North Carolina.

The photo selection in the book is interesting. There are several pictures showing feeders covered in ice and snow, a situation more likely in the author's state of Tennessee. Kathryn pointed out the photo of the **Boat-tailed Grackle** on page 50 is attributed to the author. The same photo on page 180 is attributed to Ron Austing. **Red Crossbills** are very unusual, but a photo is included, as are **Evening Grosbeaks**. Many of the photos are not well reproduced.

Kathryn also pointed out that Dr. Alsop's wife runs a wildbird-feeding store. This would be in keeping with the book's emphasis on attracting birds. It could also explain the chapter on feeding birds.

In summation, neither my co-author nor I would recommend this book. This book is a poorly put together

pastiche of information that could be entitled **All About** (name your favorite eastern region state) **Birds**.

Editor's note: This book is now in the Bird Study Group library.
