THE PERILS OF "INLAND" PELAGIC BIRDING - THE TALE OF TWO JAEGER

Sing like Elmer Fud to the tune of Farmer in the Dell,

*A chumming we will go,
A chumming we will go,
Hi-ho the derrio a chumming we will go.*

Stop singing like Elmer Fud if you feel like it.

Here a jaeger, there a jaeger, everywhere a jaeger. "Hi boys and girls," this is Mr. Rogers "welcome to my neighborhood. Can you say JAEGER?"

O.K., O.K. I know I'm acting a little silly and immature but I'm just giddy, use delirious if you're too young to know what giddy means, over seeing my first two life birds since I saw a **Black-chinned Hummingbird** in Marianna Tanner's Cameron Parish yard back in the fall of 1996. Here's the tale of seeing my life **Pomarine** and **Long-tailed Jaegers** on Cross Lake Sunday, November 14, 1999.

As this was my FIRST "inland" pelagic birding trip, I really didn't know what to expect. I had heard from pelagic veterans on Louisiana's birding list server, LABIRD, on how to prepare for a "real" pelagic trip, what to bring, what to eat, what drugs to take. Well, because this was an "inland" pelagic trip, apparently a rare event, I couldn't find any advice on the Internet on how to prepare. I figured you would do just the opposite to prepare for "inland" pelagic birding trip than what you would do for a "real" going-out- to-the-ocean pelagic trip.

I decided my wardrobe of the day would be a pair of shorts, a seven-year-old LSU T-shirt, an old sweat soaked, beer smellin', mud stained, never-been-washed hat and flip-flops. I'm glad everyone was saving his or her film for the jaegers. Although I'm fair skinned, I didn't use sunscreen. Though I did wear a hat, only because I'm bald and I got sunburned really badly one time. Boy it hurt to even take a shower. I passed up the usual assortment of drugs like Dramamine and Bonine. Besides, I quit all that stuff after Jimi Hendrix died back in the sixties. A box of crackers wasn't going to do for me, so for my pre-trip meal I stopped by the pizza buffet and got 20 bucks worth of greasy pizza for a fiver. I washed it all down with a pitcher of ice cold beer. I was so full that I felt like one of those blowfish that puff up and can't de-expand. NOW, I was ready to go on my first "inland" pelagic birding trip.

We had to get up by 11:00 a.m. to make it to Charlie's house at 12:45 P.M. for our pre-launch review of immature jaeger species. I usually don't get up this early on Sunday but Charlie promised me it would be worth missing the New Orleans Saints game, besides they never win. I would have rather missed the LSU-Houston game last night. Anyway, Roger and Charlie coached us with the details of separating **Parasitic, Pomarine** and **Long-tailed Jaegers** with picture, slides, and books. Whew, man I thought I was back in college again, talk about intense! I just hope I pass the test and don't have to repeat this torture. Well, it's time to shove off.

After a draining 20-minute ride in a custom sports utility vehicle, I never did get to finish watching "Free Willy" on the VCR, we arrived at our port of entry. The crew was a mixed bag of birders. The man who made the discovery of all Cross Lake jaeger species, Charlie Lyon, served as ship's captain. Roger Breedlove was first mate providing a pair of eagle eyes. Long time birder and steady influence, Rosemary Seilder was along to keep Roger and Charlie from throwing punches if they argued too much over identification details. For public relations purposes, Shreveport Times newspaper reporter Mary Jimenez was kidnapped and forced to shoot pictures and publish a respectable report, whether we saw the jaegers or not. And, of course, me, a life bird deprived bald headed guy on his first "inland" pelagic birding trip and from this day forward just known as the "chum man." The "Great Jaeger

'Inland' Pelagic Birding Trip of November 1999" was about to be underway. I was giddy.

Despite THREE-inch waves, SUNNY skies and temperatures in the 70's, we boarded our open-air 12-passenger cruiser and headed to open waters. At about 20 miles an hour (sorry I don't do knots) it took us at least five minutes to get to the deep brown waters that signaled the unimaginable 12-foot deeps of Cross Lake. Personally, I think we could have gotten there a lot faster if Charlie hadn't slowed down for every one of the 40,000 coots on the lake.

Finally, open water. We laid down a chum line and went to pick up Terry Davis at Barron's Landing. It was Terry's first "inland" pelagic birding trip as well. He must have been really nervous the whole time because I bet he didn't say more than 10 words in four hours. I think that was a new record low for him! We returned to the chum line that had attracted quite a few **Ring-billed Gulls**. Unfortunately, no jaegers, but I had been warned that it might take up to an hour or an hour-and-a-half to find the greatest of "inland" pelagic birding quests - jaegers.

We even tried that "hat chumming" thing that had worked the day before with Charlie and Hubert Hervey, with no luck. Of course when you "hat chum" with a brand new mail-order catalog, waterproof hat you ain't going to attract nothin'. Sorry ladies, but you need a man's old sweat soaked, beer smellin', mud stained, never-been-washed hat that has aged for at least seven years. There aren't too many of these around as they tend to get thrown out with seven-year-old T-shirts.

After 45 minutes, Roger was growing ever more pessimistic about seeing a jaeger when he spotted a **Horned Grebe** and more **Ring-billed Gulls**. Charlie told him to dump the bad karma, "it was bad for 'inland' pelagic birding." Well, Roger must have dumped the bad karma really quick because he jumped to his feet and yelled, "There it is." I raised my binocs searching the open water and sure enough there it was, a **Horned Grebe** and 20,000 coots. "No, not there, THERE," shouted Roger. Yea, there it was - a jaeger sp.

As we tried to guide the boat closer, the bird burst off the water and it flew, and flew, and flew. Not one to lose a chase, Charlie gunned the engine and we were in hot pursuit of the first jaeger of the day. You know I didn't think a boat that size could do a 180-degree turn and not throw everyone overboard. Anyway, we chased, and chased, and chased, until the bird finally settled on the water after burning two tanks of gas in pursuit. After a brief rest, the bird proceeded to fly around us, over us, and along both sides of us, at times coming within 10 feet. We tallied all the field marks to note that this was, according to Charlie and Roger, an immature **Pomarine Jaeger**. What

an adrenaline rush, it was worth every one of the 56 minutes it took since we left port!

Hey, I was happy with my first lifer in three years, but Roger insisted we go after more. Roger has always been the one to go after more, like the time he headed a group to Cameron Parish and ended up in the Rio Grande Valley chasing a **Blue Bunting**. Well, off we go for more gas and in search of another jaeger.

The second jaeger proved quite the challenge. We scanned thousands of **Ruddy Ducks** and coots without success. Not even a gourmet chum of \$16.99 a pound tenderloin blood, smoked herring steaks, anchovies with green peppers and Orville Redenbacher's popcorn could attract this guy/girl (just trying to be politically correct). Personally, I thought the white sauce on the anchovies was a little bland. We headed west again to new waters stopping (as Charlie always does) to check out another raft of coots. Charlie's affection for coots puzzles me.

After 45 minutes, Roger was growing ever more pessimistic about seeing another jaeger when he spotted a **Common Loon** and more **Ring-billed Gulls**. Charlie told him to dump the bad karma, "it was bad for 'inland' pelagic birding." Well, Roger must have dumped the bad karma really quick because he jumped to his feet and yelled, "There it is." I raised my binocs searching the open water and sure enough there it was, a **Common Loon** and 20,000 coots. "No, not there, THERE," shouted Roger. Yea, there it was - a jaeger sp.

The jaeger was sure related to the other jaeger because as soon as we got close that sucker bolted. This jaeger was some powerful flyer, gliding just inches above the water on occasional strong wing beats. During our chase it encountered a **Ring-billed Gull** with some small fish in its mouth. The jaeger was on that gull like a redneck on a ice-cold beer. Boy, can them jaegers fly. It didn't take 30 seconds for the gull to give up his meal. The jaeger settled down in the water to enjoy his reward and allowing us great looks. All the needed field marks were there, according to Charlie and Roger, to tell us that this bird was an immature **Long-tailed Jaeger**.

Wow! My second lifer of the day and our second jaeger of the day! Big Wow! I'm thinking to myself that this "inland" pelagic birding isn't so rough. Not once, even when waves crested at 18 inches on two occasions, did anyone on board chum-up their lunch. I couldn't understand why those south Louisiana folks couldn't keep their lunch down when they went on pelagic trips.

We had achieved one of "inland" pelagic birding greatest quest -- a **Pomarine** and a **Long-tailed Jaeger** on the same day, on the same body of water, in less than three hours. We dropped off Terry, who was still speechless, at

Barron's Landing, got more gas, and headed home into the sunset.

The crescent moon shone above us while Jupiter and Saturn sparkled like diamonds at our backs in the eastern sky. I had just finished my first grueling four-hour "inland" pelagic trip. Boy, I'm exhausted. I think I'll risk the five-minute drive home and pop-the-top on a cold one and celebrate my life jaegers.

We came, we chummed, and we conquered.

By the way, I was just curious, how many jaegers did you guys see on the November 6, LOS pelagic trip with 12-foot seas and everyone chumming?

Note: For those of you that are satirically impaired, this is a parody, a spoof-in-jest, on REAL pelagic birding, especially the brave souls that took the November 6, LOS sponsored trip.

LOGGERHEAD SHRIKES: A REQUEST FOR HELP

Most of the population of endangered "*migrans*" **Loggerhead Shrike** (*Lanius ludovicianus migrans*) was color banded in Ontario, Canada, in summer, 1999. Reports of any banded shrikes on this critically endangered subspecies on the as-yet-unknown wintering grounds are highly desirable. This would make a great add-on project for CBC participants in the eastern U.S., from Pennsylvania south to the Gulf coast and potentially west to New Mexico and Arizona. Each bird has a standard metal band (adults received stainless steel bands,

while nestlings received standard aluminum alloy bands) plus one to two plastic color bands (sealed with acetone). Please note position (upper or lower, left or right leg) and color (red, orange, yellow, light green, light blue, dark blue, mauve, white, dark pink) of bands. Please send information (date, location, and type of habitat) directly to:

WINTER FINCHES

Editor's note: This was originally posted to LABIRD.

We at the Cornell Lab of Ornithology and National Audubon hope that you will help us track which species are irrupting where and when, through our Irruptive Bird Survey. IBS is an expansion of our North American Winter Finch and **Red-breasted Nuthatch** Survey, which many of you may remember from two years back. Thanks to your reports and those of birders across North America, we were able to track the massive invasion of 1997-98. Now, we're looking forward to finding out the extent of this year's irruption. Since LA birders are among the most active in the country, and because LA is a southerly state, we are particularly interested in mapping what is happening in your area.

We invite you to visit the BirdSource web site at <http://www.birdsource.org> to see which species we're tracking - the list differs according to region. Please enter any sightings you have into the database - it only takes a minute. These will be combined with observations all over North America. You'll be able to view findings right at the web site. Results will be regularly updated, so you should check back often. You can also "back enter" previous sightings, which will make the maps of the irruptions that much more complete.

Thanks in advance for your help. We truly appreciate it.

PREDICTIONS - 2000

This is an update on my article printed in the BSG Newsletter nearly two years ago. A lot has happened since January, 1998, in the bird world of northwestern Louisiana. Five of the bird species I predicted have been seen. But the most fascinating additions were those that were totally unexpected and presumably unpredictable, which includes, **Sooty Tern** and **Ringed Kingfisher**. I hope you were able to see all of the new birds and keep on looking for more to add to our database.

1. **RED-NECKED GREBE** - W - Seen at nearby Lake Wright Patman, Texas, on January 30, 1994, by Pat and Hubert Hervey.

2. **REDDISH EGRET** - Sp or Su - Reported at Hagerman NWR on Lake Texoma, March 11-19, 1997, per Field Notes, Vol. 51: No. 4. Expect in Pool 5, Red River.

3. **GLOSSY IBIS** - Su or F - A possible record is pending DNA results. They nest as far west as "The Burn" in Cameron Parish, personal observation. Since we have **White-faced Ibis** in post breeding dispersion, we could expect **Glossy Ibis** also.

4. **EURASIAN WIGEON** - W - Was seen in New Orleans this past winter. I thought I had one near Red River Lock and Dam No. 4 on January 9, 1998, but couldn't call it because of distance and poor light.

5. **BLACK SCOTER** - W - I observed one on Lake O' the Pines in 1996. Seen annually in the gulf off Cameron Parish.

6. **CRESTED CARACARA** -?- Observed near Greenville, TX, seen by LOS observers in Calcasieu Parish and also reported by Roger Breedlove, south of Alexandria, LA.

7. **WHIMBREL** - Sp or F - To quote Lowrey - "must surely pass over the interior of Louisiana during its migration in spring and fall." Called casual inland in Texas by Rappole & Blacklock in "Birds of Texas." We should expect it along the Red River.

8. **MARbled GODWIT** - Added to BSG Northwestern Louisiana Checklist, 21 August, 1999.

9. **PURPLE SANDPIPER** - W or Sp - This species has

been recorded from the rock jetties of Cameron Parish and Galveston, TX. This is a bird of the rocky shorelines of the Atlantic, and when found here, would be expected to be along the large rocks placed out into the Red River by the Corps of Engineers to control the rivers' channel.

10. **RED-NECKED PHALAROPE** - Sp or F - A rare to casual transient across all Texas, per "Birds of Texas", Rappole & Blacklock, observed in southern Louisiana. per Lowrey in "Louisiana Birds." Passes over our area and could stop. A picture might be needed for proof.

11. **RED PHALAROPE** - F or W - Casual fall migrant over east Texas per "Birds of Texas," Rappole & Blacklock, photo by Horace Jeter at Natchitoches Fish Hatchery, present November 29-December 10, 1970, as per Lowrey. Passes over and may stop after rain. Watch the turf farm near Powhatan and similar spots that form fresh water puddles over short grass after a heavy rain.

12 - 14. **JAEGERS: POMARINE, PARASITIC and LONG-TAILED** - We anticipate that two species will be added to our database. They were seen on Cross Lake this fall by Charlie Lyon.

GULLS - Many species are possible. A **Sabine's Gull** was seen by Pat and Hubert Hervey 15 Sep 98 at Lock and Dam 4. These two birds were seen on Red River following Tropical Storm Francis.

15. **COMMON BLACK-HEADED GULL** - F or W - This is the only species that garnered unanimous entry onto a list of birds reflecting the opinions of four prominent Louisiana birders titled "Which Ten Birds Will Be the Next To Be Added To the State List". Seen in January 30, 1994, by Pat and Hubert Hervey, at Lake Wright Patman. I would not be surprised to find this bird on a Cross Lake trip or along Red River.

16. **LITTLE GULL** - F or W - Seen at Lake Wright Patman on January 30, 1994, by Pat and Hubert Hervey. Look for this gull among the many Bonaparte's Gulls present on Cross Lake.

17. **THAYER'S GULL** - F or W - Seen by members of NETFO at Lake O' the Pines, fall of 1997, this bird could present difficult identification proof. Good advice is, be prepared to photograph any of the birds in this list, but especially the jaegers and gulls.

18. **GREATER BLACK-BACKED GULL** - W or Sp - Seen by Pat and Hubert Hervey, March 21, 1993, at Lake O' the Pines. This is a huge bird that is expanding its range.

19. **NORTHERN SAW-WHET OWL** - W - Other owls may be possible, but I chose this as most likely. They are known as "casual in winter" across the northern 2/3rds of

Texas and have been recorded in southern LA, so it had to pass over northern LA to get to that location. These small owls would be very easy to overlook, as they are quite tame and retiring in habits.

HUMMERS – Rufous Hummingbirds have been observed. We need records of **Allen's Hummingbirds**. We now have records of ten species wintering in southern Louisiana and only three on our database. I am including one that I don't really see how we have missed because so many are present elsewhere in the state.

20. **BLACK-CHINNED HUMMINGBIRD** - W - Nests as near as the Edward's Plateau of Texas. I have seen this species in Cameron, Lafayette, Gramercy, and New Orleans. Expect it here.

21. **COUCH'S AND TROPICAL KINGBIRDS** - Sp - Pat and I had one of these birds near Keatchie, DeSoto Parish, LA. on an NAMC, May 11, 1996. There is a slight chance it was a **Tropical Kingbird**, as they are look-a-like species. It would have taken a response to a taped call or song for a positive identification. Charlie Lyon played a tape late that evening, but reported an indefinite response, only indicating probable **Couch's Kingbird**. The obvious lesson here is to be prepared with tapes of certain species such as kingbirds and *Empidonax* flycatchers. You never know what rarity you may find.

22. **ROCK WREN** - F or W - Seen only fleetingly at Lake Millwood by BSG outing on October 18, 1997, and fully identified before and after that date by Charlie Mills. This sighting opens the likelihood of **Rock Wrens** anywhere among the large rocks placed along the entire length of the Red River Waterway. This is a difficult or even dangerous habitat to work for birds, but the addition of a new species should be worth the trouble. If a **Northern Wheatear** can come here, and one did come to my farm not long ago, so can a **Rock Wren**.

BREWSTER'S AND LAWRENCE'S WARBLERS (hybrids) - Sp or F - Since these are not considered TRUE species, I will only mention that both parent species (**Blue-winged** and **Golden-winged Warblers**) pass through this area, so it is only a matter of time before the hybrid forms are seen here too. Read the excellent discussion on these birds in "Warblers" Peterson Field Guide by Jon Dunn and Kimball Garrett. This excellent book is available from our club library, but you need your own copy.

23. **LARK BUNTING** - W - Common in short grass prairie and agricultural fields across Texas except in the eastern woodland. Seen along Lake Ponchartrain by many LOS observers in the winter of 97-98. Status is casual east of Texas. Be prepared to identify a grayish, drab bird with heavy dusky streaking and white or buffy wing patches. Don't expect the plumage to be the easy to identify, black and white colors, of the breeding male.

24. **McCOWN'S LONGSPUR** - W - Some brave, cold loving birder will have the honor of adding this species to our local list before too long. It will probably happen following one of the worst weather spells, with icing and snow, known to the Shreveport area. Search in the Wardview or Missionary Plantation areas as soon as the roads are passable. They winter as near as Allen, TX, about 40 miles north of Dallas.

25. **SHINY COWBIRD** - F, W or Sp - Seen May 3, 1997, near Ft. Worth. This invader could easily be overlooked in the crowds of **Brown-headed Cowbirds** and **Red-winged Blackbirds** of winter. I have October records in Cameron Parish.

26. **BRONZED COWBIRD** - Sp or F - Nests near New Orleans. Actually, they lay their eggs in nests of other birds, primarily **Red-winged Blackbirds**. I have April and October records for Cameron Parish.

Bird species that were added, but were not predicted in 1998 were:

1. **SOOTY TERN** - Who could have foreseen that this pelagic species would have been blown as far north as Lock and Dam No. 4 by Tropical Storm Francis, September 1998.

2. **RINGED KINGFISHER** - Even the most experienced birders I know were extremely skeptical of this record. By now enough "experts" have seen this bird on Cross Lake that it has to be believed. "Seeing is believing," could never have been truer than in this instance. This bird was first seen behind The Cove, 22 November 1999.

3. **COMMON TERN** - I admit to an oversight in not including this bird in my original listing. I believe it was Charlie Lyon who added this bird on 21 Oct 98 from Cross Lake.

4. **TROPICAL PARULA** - Seen 27 and 28 November 1999. Apparently this beautiful male bird took the same NAFTA Pipeline that brought us the **Ringed Kingfisher**. Good going Chuck and Sally Moffett. The bird is on Cross Lake as I write this.

MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING

November 9, 1999, 7:00 p.m.

Museum of Life Sciences at LSUS

Terry Davis made the presentation "Sparrows Up Close in Louisiana" to the club.

Betty Mason said that the previous bank balance reported was \$1184.06. Since that time, the club had income of \$85.00 and expenses of \$200.00. The current bank
