## HUMMINGBIRD STAYS FOR RARE WINTER

### BIRD ONLY KNOWN HUMMER TO STAY IN NORTH LOUISIANA

It may have been the seven bird feeders, or the red bows on the top of Terry Davis' house, or perhaps it was a combination of both that led a rufous hummingbird to his house in November. But what kept the little male bird -- whose relatives were probably in Mexico -- in Bossier City is somewhat of a mystery.

The intrigue prompted Lafayette resident Dave Patton, a federally registered hummingbird banner [sic], to make the four-hour drive to Bossier before dawn on Feb. 29 to attempt to band the rufous.

"It just doesn't happen that often in North Louisiana," Patton said. "Most of the winter hummers are in South Louisiana. Finding a feeder probably kept him here more than anything else."

There are many South Louisiana residents who are passionate about their hummers, keeping diligent records of sightings and informing each other through a hummingbird list service. Tom Sylvest of Cameron Parish reported that during the past winter 383 hummers made Louisiana their home. But only Davis' rufous stayed in North Louisiana, surviving even our brief ice storm.

"I watched his feeder real close to make sure it didn't freeze but he stayed pretty active chasing bigger birds during the cold snap," Davis said.

Banding -- placing a tiny serial number on a band around one leg -- is done with many species of birds to help scientists study bird habits and migration patterns. The Rufous -- measuring 3 inches from beak to tail -- also received a yellow dot (made with fabric paint) on the top of his head for easier identification.

"Hummers are known to return to the same wintering sight [sic] so this will help us document his return," Patton said. Banding can also indicate the birds flight elsewhere. One hummer Patton banded in Lafayette was recaptured in Knoxville, Tenn.

All hummers are found in North and South America. Nancy Newfield, Louisiana's hummer expert, said there are only about 14 breeding and 11 other species of hummingbirds found in North America, while South America has more than 320 species. Louisiana has 11 recorded species.

The banding of the Bossier rufous was a surprisingly easy task. But Patton warns not to try it unless you are a trained and registered bander. The rufous hummer weighed little more than a nickel and mishandling could be fatal.

A trap, tiny instruments, nimble fingers and a gentle touch are used to measure, weigh and make a cursory inspection

of feathers and his condition. The Rufous' subdued green Patton that the male bird was not yet one year old. By summer, the bird's throat will be a bright burnt orange.

To release the immature Rufous, it was placed on the flat part of the palm of a hand. The bird sat on the hand until a very gentle puff of air was blown on it. Within seconds the hummer disappeared into the yard.

There is always the chance that a hummer will leave after a banding, but Davis is continually surprised to find that his young "yellow-dotted" rufous is still around -- and beginning to mature.

"He's beginning to turn bright orange around his throat," said the proud birder.

The red bows Davis put on the corners of his roof are to attract hummers from a birds view. But it's not the craziest adornment that hummer lovers use.

"There are some birders in South Louisiana that have painted their house or rooftops red," Davis said. Although his house is currently on plan to stay white, Davis is stocking up on sweet olive and plenty of blooming nectar-filled flowers to keep his hummer happy and hopefully attract more.

#### ATTRACTING HUMMERS IN THE SUMMER

Bossier City resident Terry Davis offers a few recommendations for attracting hummingbirds.

Sweet Olive (*Osmanthus fragrans*) provides great cover and shelter, Anise Sage, Brazilian Blue Sage (*Salvia guaranitica*), Mexican Brush Sage (*Salvia leucantha*), Mexican Cigar (*Cuphea ignea*), Lantana and Wild Red Morning glory (*Ipomoea Coccinea*) vine is a hummer favorite.

For year-around bird and hummer care keep plenty of evergreen cover in your yard.

Change sugar mixture (3:1 ratio) at least every four days to prevent bacterial growth.

Keep a water source available like a mister or dripper to provide bird bath water.

Position heat lamps to keep feeders from freezing in the winter.

## MIGRATION OVER THE GULF PROJECT

Data from the Migration Over the Gulf Project (MOGP) can be accessed over the Internet at <http://www.geocities.com/gulfmigrants/>. This data is in the form of an Excel spreadsheet. The spreadsheet shows all the species (and species groups) that have been recorded during the past several seasons of monitoring bird migration from oil platforms in the Gulf of Mexico. But more importantly, it shows the first-sighting date this spring for each species recorded so far on the nine platforms (6 off of the Louisiana coast, 3 off of the Texas coast). Not only can you see which species have been recorded on each platform, you can see when they were first noted. Perhaps this will be interesting to compare when you find them in your area.
