FREEMAN & CUSTIS RED RIVER EXPEDITION OF 1806 SYMPOSIUM

Wednesday, June 14, through Saturday, June 17, 2006

The Louisiana State University in Shreveport Museum of Life Sciences and Noel Memorial Library are sponsoring a bicentennial celebration of the "forgotten" expedition. Commissioned by President Thomas Jefferson to explore the Red River to its headwaters, at that time thought to rise in the mountains near Santa Fe, New Mexico, Thomas Freeman, a civil engineer, and Peter Custis, a botanist, "traversed unexplored land between Natchitoches and southern Arkansas, including the Great Raft, riverside prairies, cedar forests, and cane brakes" before being turned back by the Spanish. Ivory-billed Woodpeckers, Swallow-tailed Kites, Carolina Parakeets, American bison, and prairie gentians are only a few of the species noted in the

expedition logs. Considered a failure and an embarrassment by Jefferson, the expedition nevertheless "had lasting cultural, environmental, and ecological ramifications for the region as well as immediate political consequences."

As stated on the website, "the symposium...will celebrate "The Grand Excursion" of Freeman and Custis by re-examining the middle Red River region then and now. Historians, natural scientists, archaeologists, cultural anthropologists, and Caddo tribal elders, will gather to share their knowledge, observations, and insights. Dr. Dan Flores, leading expert on the Red River expedition, will deliver the keynote address for a program of outstanding presentations." On Saturday, there will be an all-day trip on the Red River in a luxury barge provided by the Vicksburg District of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers

Symposium presentations are free and open to the public; however, there is a fee for lunch on Thursday and Friday and for the Saturday barge trip. To download a symposium brochure with complete details and a registration form, visit the website at www.lsus.edu/library/archives/events/freeman.htm.

NABA BUTTERFLY COUNT

This is the sixth annual North American Butterfly Association (NABA) count for Shreveport. Butterfly counts are very similar to bird counts. The 15-mile diameter count circle for the Shreveport count is centered on the intersection of Norris Ferry Road and Overton Brooks Road. This area includes much of southeastern Shreveport, Wallace Lake, Keithville, and a small portion of Bossier Parish. If you live within the circle, you may participate by counting butterflies in your yard or you may count in a designated portion of the circle. Contact Jeff for forms and instructions. The dates for the 2006 count have not been posted; the above dates are tentative based on prior years.

This annual count began in 1999 and is sponsored by the Lower Mississippi Valley Joint Venture Shorebird Monitoring Program. The objective of the Joint Venture is to ensure that adequate habitat for migrating shorebirds is provided on managed public lands as a safety net during years when habitat conditions outside of public lands are poor. The count is designed to provide two types of data: “Reliable estimates of shorebird numbers across the entire region at intervals in migration” and “estimates of turnover rates (how long are birds staying at a particular site).” To this end, you are asked to count during fall migration on designated weekends in August and September. You may count wherever you like for as long as you like. Enter your observations directly into the database at www.lmvjv.org/shorebird. Visit the website to learn more about the program and to register. Remember to report your observations to the BSG database as well.

NAMC REPORT, 2006

Twenty-two Bird Study Group Members enjoyed sunny skies and warm weather during the North American Migration Count held on May 13, 2006. Even though this is the latest date possible for this count, which presumes it is counting migrants, we still were able to total 153 species, and 10,411 individual birds. We are primarily counting resident and nesting birds here by the middle of May. The record is 171 species in 2004, but it still was a very good effort. As usual, migrating warblers were hard to come by, only 3 species were certain migrants, **Nashville** and **Yellow Warblers**, and **American Redstart**. The Louisiana program needs rejuvenation, as only 24 participants counted 154 species in the entire state.

The top ten species list: **Cattle Egret**- 2,139, **Cliff Swallow**- 846, **White Ibis**- 594, **Great Egret** 428, **Red-winged Black-bird**- 428, **Dickcissel**- 356, **Northern Mockingbird** 308, **Northern Cardinal** 257, **Eastern Kingbird**- 244, and **Cedar Waxwing**- 221. This list varies from year to year, but the big surprise was supplied by Paul Dickson with 578 of the **White Ibis** coming from a wetland area he has developed in Red River Parish. **White Ibis** specialize in catching crawfish. Notice the eclectic mix of insectivores, seedeaters, a fruit eating species, and water birds. I think that speaks well for the environmental diversity of Northwestern Louisiana.

Terry Davis and Charlie Lyon, **Swainson's Thrush** (34) Terry and Charlie (high number), **Tree Swallow** (3) nesting at Mibermel Plantation in Natchitoches Parish – Hubert Hervey, **Great-tailed Grackle** (5) nesting at Mibermel in Natchitoches Parish – Hubert Hervey, **Grasshopper Sparrow** (2) on nesting ground in Bossier Parish - Gloria and Sylvia Frantom, and **Grasshopper Sparrow** (2) in Caddo Parish - Jim Ingold.

It is very apparent that having at least one boat on the Red River is essential for having a good count, note all of Jerry and Nancy's birds. Also, it is important for us to keep records regarding birds in Stoner Woods, because of the danger of future development by the city of Shreveport. And of course I like to report birds from the entire area. We covered Bossier, Caddo, Claiborne, DeSoto, Natchitoches and Red River Parishes this year. You know we seldom have reports from Bienville or Webster Parishes. Does anyone live there that can tell one bird from another? I would even be willing to spread out into Sabine, Winn, Lincoln, Grant, or Jackson Parishes, if it would not be intruding on another organizations' territory.

Colorado and Western Kansas Birding in Late April 2006

Imagine leaving your warm motel room at 4:30 a.m. completely surrounded by a dark landscape brightened by a dusting of white snow. Continue in a van filled with avid birders traveling across a rolling prairie through occasional snow flurries. After 15 minutes the van leaves the paved road and continues down a snow-covered gravel road to an intersection where the driver turns around, travels a 100 yards or so, and then stops. Everything is dark but a number of yucca plants can be seen 20-30 yards from the van silhouetted against the snowy plain. Then, the plants begin to move. As the landscape brightens with dawn, tens of male **Greater Sage Grouse** become plain, some no more than 10 yards from the van. The birds postured, spread their tails, inflated their throat pouches, and otherwise put on a fantastic show.

This was my introduction to the grouse, ptarmigan, and prairie-chickens of North America's high plains and mountains. All told, my trip that began on April 23, 2006 in Denver and ended there on April 29, 2006 took me to western Colorado to an altitude of about 12,000 feet and the plains western Kansas near a wind farm with dozens of huge power-generating wind mills. The trip list was not especially impressive in terms of the numbers of birds encountered, around 145, but included the 13 target birds, and for me, 15 additional "lifers" to

bring my North American ABA life list safely past 500 at 517. So, I don't have to worry how many birds are "taken back" by ABA.

Our guide was Mike Flieg who owns Ornifolks (ornifolks@sbcglobal.net) and operates out of St. Louis, Missouri. Mike is in his mid-60s and retired a few years ago after working as a zoo curator. Mike's world life list is well over 5,000 and he was a member of a team that holds the big month record for Columbia – over 1,000 birds. I found an advertisement for Mike's Colorado/Kansas tours in the American Birding Association's newsletter "Winging It". The price seemed right at \$1085 for a week long trip that included transportation and lodging but "dutch treat" on the food. [Note that more widely known birding tours generate the same birds with more "creature" comfort but at twice the cost of our tour. So, wonderful birding on a "shoe string" is available if you look for it.]

Here is our itinerary with a few notes:

Day 1 – Sunday – Denver to Pawnee National Grassland, 85 miles, night in Ft. Collins, CO. Our target birds were **Mountain Plover** and **McCown's** and **Chestnut-collared longspurs**. If you've never been to the "high plains", it's really something to see the extensive vistas of very short grass and prickly pear cactus. We left Denver in shirt sleeves but encountered very strong winds as a front passed. The van "rocked". Any bird that we flushed was carried many yards downwind from us. Mike knew right where to find the longspurs and field guide images and paintings don't do them justice. Mike also knew where the **Mountain Plovers** were "supposed to be" based on finding decent numbers of them on his two previous tours in April. It was quite an experience walking across the rolling plains with fine dust pelting us and swirling around and sometimes into our eyes and "striking out". There was one site where Mike had seen the birds around a prairie dog town but there was a team of biologist working there – studying **Burrowing Owls** – and Mike felt that the birds would have been spooked. Well, we drove and walked a lot and returned to the prairie dog site about 6 p.m. We covered almost half a mile when a pair of plovers was spotted. We really worked for those "lifers".

Day 2 – Monday – Ft. Collins to Walden, 125 miles, through Cache la Poudre River Valley (Cameron Pass), night in Walden. Target birds were dippers and the rosy finches. We drove through snow showers and made several stops along the streams in the mountains. We were treated to two separate **American Dippers** that made a wonderful display completely submerging and walking on the stream bottoms. A bonus for me was a pair of **Townsend's Solitaires**. We stopped at a state

nature center and were immediately greeted by a mixed flock of rosy-finches including one **Black Rosy-Finch**, several **Gray-crowned Rosy-Finches**, and a number **Brown-capped Rosy-Finches**. We were fortunate because Mike's two previous tours had missed the finches altogether. The finches come down to the nature center only when it is snowing in the higher elevations which it had been the day before and that morning. **Cassin's Finch**, **Mountain Chickadee**, and **Pine Grosbeak** were all welcome lifers for me. We also went to lakes and marshes around Walden and saw many waterbirds including **Cinnamon Teal**, **Western Grebe** (lifer), **Eared Grebes** in breeding plumage, and a **Golden Eagle**.

Day 3 – Tuesday – Early morning for **Greater Sage Grouse** lek, then on to Steamboat Springs, 85 miles, with afternoon search for **Blue Grouse**. The lek experience is described above. [Note that Mike used the term “lek” but pointed out that other terms are used to describe “display/breeding” areas for the various grouse and prairie-chickens we saw.] We found our **Blue Grouse** at the top of a very tall hill that looked a lot like a mountain to someone from Louisiana. He responded well to a tape and provided wonderful viewing and photographic opportunities to all of us. Good birds along the way included **Evening Grosbeak** and **Baird's Sparrow**.

Day 4 – Wednesday – Early morning for **Sharp-tailed Grouse** lek then proceed to Gunnison through Loveland Pass to search for **White-tailed Ptarmigan** at 12,200 ft altitude. Night in Gunnison for a total trip of 173 miles. The **Sharp-tailed Grouse** performed admirably for their audience of enthusiastic birders. We covered a great deal of territory, mostly up and down but stopped at one reservoir - Windy Gap - where there was a number of **Barrow's Goldeneye** and one shy **Clark's Grebe** generating two more lifers for me. I also picked up a **Clark's Nutcracker** along the way. We had a close up encounter with a **Golden Eagle** that flared away from our van at eye level at a distance of about 30 feet. We had two encounters with **Ferruginous Hawks** – close up and high in the sky. I am not comfortable at extreme heights and was not excited about clambering around on steep slopes in snow fields looking for the ptarmigans. We did not get very close to the birds but saw a pair plainly with a scope. To say that the birds took our “breaths away” is both literal and figurative. If you've never been that high before, you will find even short walks to be fatiguing!

Day 5 – Thursday – Morning near Gunnison for **Gunnison Sage Grouse** with a long drive to Elkhart, Kansas for **Lesser Prairie-Chicken**. Night in Elkhart for

a total trip of 365 miles! I might mention that we left our motels at about 4:45 a.m. every morning to get to leks before the birds started displaying. That makes for long days regardless of the miles traveled. **Gunnison Sage Grouse** has only recently been elevated to species level and is listed as an endangered species. We viewed the birds on a lek at a site specifically designed to prevent disturbance of the birds. We were about 150 yards from the birds and could only view them with scopes. The rule was simple. No one could leave the viewing area until the last bird left the lek. Fortunately, the last two hold outs flew out around 7:25 a.m. The docent in the viewing blind said that he once had to stay in the blind from around 5:30 until 11:30 a.m. earlier this year! We had a really long trip when we left Gunnison but it was worth it. I was able to add **Juniper Titmouse** and **Lark Bunting** to my life list along the way. I thought we were too early for the bunting, Colorado's state bird, but we found a small flock near Elkhart at Cimarron National Grasslands. We saw a number of **Lesser Prairie-Chickens** late in the afternoon when we set up a photographic blind that had to be in place before the birds formed their lek the next morning. An impressive site in western Kansas was a long line of wind turbines stretching across the horizon.

Day 6 – Friday – Early morning **Lesser Prairie-Chicken** lek, then a trip to Wray, Colorado for a total trip of 255 miles. We did get some decent views of the **Lesser Prairie-Chickens** but a front blowing through the area discouraged the birds from making much of a display. In fact, the intense wind and bright lightening flashes before dawn were quite impressive. Managed another lifer, **Cassin's Sparrow** while watching several prairie-chickens “fight the wind” to keep from being blown backwards. We arrived at Wray early enough to set up a photographic blind and flushed a number of **Greater Prairie-Chickens**.

Day 7 – Saturday – Early morning **Greater Prairie-Chicken** lek, then a mad dash back to Denver to make travel connections home, 166 miles. The **Greater Prairie Chickens** were here, there, and everywhere in the irrigated alfalfa field where they strutted, fussed, sparred, and otherwise put on a display as impressive as that made by the **Greater Sage Grouse** on Tuesday. We really did not have time to “bird” much on the way back to Denver but all of us were pretty much ready to take a rest after a wonderful birding adventure. The trip list approached 150 birds. More could have been found near Elkhart, had a steady rain and high winds not prevented us from birding a known “migrant trap”. But we saw plenty of birds and many were “high quality” birds.

Birding by Canoe

On Saturday, May 20, thirteen paddlers met in the Wal-Mart parking lot at Bert Kouns and Youree Drive to carpool down LA 1 to Bishop Point Recreation Area, located on the Red River at Lock and Dam No. 5, for a combination paddling and bird watching day trip. Participating were Jack Land and Marian Howard in Jack's tandem, Sandy Roerig in her new kayak, Byron Carr in his pirogue, Maurice and Henri Loridans in Maurice's tandem, Toni Spitale in her kayak, Mark Wilson of the Shreveport Bird Study Group and myself in Steve and Grace Eyer's tandem, Anne Gibson and Denise Bonck, president of the Red River Refuge Alliance, in Sandy's tandem, and John and Cathy Joyce in their tandem.

Bishop Point is on an old oxbow lake that is now a backwater of the Red River. We started out in a pretty

stiff crosswind and had to cross two stretches of open water to get to the sandbars that were our destination. These two stretches were the most difficult part of the trip; at the sandbars, we would be much more sheltered from the wind. As we rounded an island we had to pass, we spotted two flocks of **American White Pelicans**. I pointed them out as our objective and the wind was pushing us directly towards one of the flocks.

As we approached within a couple of hundred yards, the pelicans lifted off headed directly over us. Nancy Menasco and I ply these waters as often as we get the chance and the pelicans usually let us get much closer so I was quite surprised. Maurice and I supposed that they are used to my jonboat and are not used to a group of canoes and kayaks heading toward them. Also, because of the strong southerly winds, the pelicans had to take off into the wind. Had we approached from another direction, we would not have blocked their escape route, so I suspect that they would have let us get

closer. They are very majestic birds in flight and were a presence all day, drawing many comments from us as to how impressive they looked as they soared over the river in their search for food.

Just after the first flock of pelicans took off, we were still in rough waves and Byron Carr discovered the pirogue he was in that he was considering for duck hunting was not going to work for that purpose. The wind-driven waves had been slowly filling his boat and as the little pirogue sank lower, it took on even more water with every wave. The boat sank in the shallow waters; Byron stood up in the mud and muck, picked up the pirogue, and dumped the water out. As others collected his paddle and lunch, I offered to switch places with him and boarded the pirogue along with a bit of water. Toni sponged the water out for me and I paddled for more protected waters, leading the group closer to the second flock of pelicans. This flock did let us get a little closer than the first group had as we rounded a dike in the river to go north to the next sandbar.

By this time, we were in calmer waters and had identified several birds: **Tree Swallow**, **Black Tern**, **Anhinga** (one of whose common names is Snake Bird), **Turkey Vulture**, **Black Vulture**, **Common Grackle**, and lots of **Red-winged Blackbirds** nesting in the reeds and making plenty of noise; a **Baltimore Oriole** flew over.

Sandy led the way as we decided to try to paddle through the middle of this overgrown sandbar but soon retreated, saying there was a huge snake on a log. When queried more about the size of the snake, she held up her hands to describe a medium-sized snake. Toni decided that this was the place to stop and fish. Some of us wanted to identify the snake so we regrouped and tried again. We encountered no snakes but too many logs to pass, so we went back to try again. Leaving Toni fishing, we scared up a **Canvasback** duck in search of another passage through this sandbar. Finding one, we discovered a nice opening in the middle of it where we saw almost every species of heron and egret common to our area, including **Great Egret**, **Great Blue Heron**, **Snowy Egret**, **Little Blue Heron**, and **Tri-colored Heron**. Marian had started a decoy collection and added a nice Green-winged Teal decoy here. As we came out on the other side of the sandbar, we saw a few **Blue-winged Teal**, several more **Black Terns**, and a **Black-necked Stilt**. A **Green Heron** flew over, and we found a **Least Sandpiper** feeding on a log.

Upon our return to where we had left Toni, she related how she had hooked a huge fish and before she could reel it in, a pelican came and took her fish and her lure. She said she had to cut her line to keep the pelican from taking all of it too. Perhaps the pelican thought

that Toni was taking his fish and he came to take it back. I didn't really know whether to believe Toni or not because we were only one sandbar away and had not heard any commotion. If that had happened to any of the fisherwomen I know, you would have heard them in Shreveport.

I wanted to return to Bishop Point a different way, reasoning that we could stay close to the sandbars but on the river channel side and the wakes from the powerboats would not be as bad as the waves on the windward side. After listening to Toni's story, we did pass on the windward side of one sandbar, but I stayed on the channel side of the next two and some of the others followed me. Some went a more direct route, crossing a longer stretch of open water, but when they got to the island, they were on the leeward side of it. They did have to pick their way through a pretty large stumpy/loggy area near the island but they didn't have to paddle as far as my group did. Toni sponged out the pirogue again to keep me from swamping. On the way back, we saw a **Least Tern** flying around with more **Black Terns**, more **Tree Swallows**, and a small flock of **Cattle Egrets** flying over.

When we got back to Bishop Point, we loaded the boats and gear and sat down at the picnic tables under the pavilion to eat whatever snacks and lunches we had brought. As we ate, two **Eastern Kingbirds** chased one another around and a **Great Egret** landed on a nearby log to fish. More herons, egrets, and pelicans flew around in the distance.

As we were driving out on the gravel road that leads from Bishop Point toward the lock and dam, a little bird that was mostly yellow flew across the road right in front of us; I later looked it up and identified it as a **Prothonotary Warbler**. Cathy and John saw what we think was an **Eastern Meadowlark**. On an electrical wire we saw a **Scissor-tailed Flycatcher**. Anne wanted to have a look at the lock and dam and there we saw **Killdeer**, **Northern Mockingbirds**, **Rock Pigeons**, more herons and egrets, and a **Northern Rough-winged Swallow**. **Purple Martins** were flying and feeding above the **Purple Martin** houses next to the control house at the lock.

On the way back north on LA 1, a **Black Vulture** loomed up from the road in front of Anne's vehicle. We got a good look at its underside. The **Black Vulture's** two-toned area at the wingtips and its very short tail are the two main features that differentiate it from the **Turkey Vulture**.

Everyone expressed to me that they all had a good time and even people who didn't go thanked me for arranging the outing. I enjoyed leading this trip and would be willing to lead a similar trip in the future or in

other words, let's do it again sometime. I would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone who loaned us canoes and equipment or gave me advice and all those participating. You all helped make this outing a success.

MINUTES OF THE MAY BOARD MEETING

May 2, 2006

Museum of Life Sciences at LSUS

Board members participating in the meeting were Jeff Trahan, Jean Trahan, Mac Hardy, Silviera Hunt, Hubert Hervey, Amanda Crnkovic, Susan Martin, Ron Martin, Nan Franks Nancy Menasco, and Jerry Bertrand.

Treasurer's Report – Jean Trahan reported that for the month ending April 30, 2006, the club had \$2,466.44 in the bank. In addition, we had \$198.50 and \$544.08 in prepaid expenses at the post office and LSUS printing, respectively. Mac Hardy reported that he got a phone call from a man in Bossier Parish who said that he has two **Black-bellied Whistling Ducks** who are acting as if they are planning to nest at his house. Jane Mollett said that during the last two weeks a **Summer Tanager** and two **Rose-breasted Grosbeaks** have visited her yard. Nancy Menasco spotted a **Greater Roadrunner** on LA-1 north of Shreveport and just south of KSLA Road. Hubert Hervey reported nine Baltimore Orioles in his yard last weekend. He said that the orioles have taught other species to eat the oranges he puts out and that he has **Baltimore Orioles, House Finch, and Ruby-throated Hummingbirds** using his sugar water feeders. John McBride said that there is a **Northern Parula** nest at the end of West Lakeshore Drive.

MINUTES OF THE JUNE BOARD MEETING

June 6, 2006

Museum of Life Sciences at LSUS

Board members participating in the meeting were Jean Trahan, Mac Hardy, Michele Andrews, Hubert Hervey, Jeff Trahan, Jim Ingold, Amanda Crnkovic, Nancy Menasco, Jerry Bertrand, and Lily Poole. Note that since the President and the Vice President were not present, Jean Trahan presided over the meeting.

Election of Officers – The following board members were elected as officers of the club for the next year: Ron Martin (President), Susan Martin (Vice President), Jeff Trahan (Secretary), Jean Trahan (Treasurer).

Treasurer’s Report – Jean Trahan reported that for the month ending May 31, 2006, the club had \$2,626.44 in

the bank. In addition, we had \$115.44 and \$544.08 in prepaid expenses at the post office and LSUS printing, respectively. The fund balance is \$3,286.36.

NAMC – Hubert Hervey reported that only two parishes outside of northwestern Louisiana participated in the North American Migration Count (NAMC). Those counts were done in Grant and Rapides Parishes. Twenty-two participants in northwestern Louisiana counted 153 species while 24 participants counted 154 species statewide

Field Trips – Nancy Menasco said that there are three field trips planned for the summer. The NABA butterfly count will take place July 9, the Freeman and Custis Symposium on the LSUS campus will meet June 14-17. She said that a Red River Boat trip is planned for the end of August, but a date has not yet been set.

Newsletter – Nancy Menasco was charged with finding out how much it would cost for a commercial establishment to print the newsletter. While doing work for another organization, she learned that Insty-Prints would do 230 newsletters for about \$200.00. For example: 01/12/99 BB 2 means that on January 12, 1999, BB saw two birds. Then by looking on the observer list, located after the sightings, you can determine that BB is Bob Birder and on 1/12/99 he was birding C. Bickham Dickson Park.
