The Red River Refuge Alliance, the friends group of the Red River National Wildlife Refuge, is hosting an open house at the Red River National Wildlife Refuge Headquarters. There will be an organized bird walk at 8:30 a.m. led by Dennis Forshee or just come and bird on your own. Members of the Refuge Alliance will be on hand throughout the day to answer questions and show you around. The Headquarters Unit bird list is up to almost 170 species. Summer bird specialties include Indigo Bunting, Painted Bunting, and Yellowbreasted Chat. Last summer Bell's Vireo was found on the refuge on two separate occasions. Are they breeding on the refuge in one of the hundreds of Chickasaw

plums? Butterflies and dragonflies abound on the refuge as well, so bring your field guides.

A WOODLAND TALE

I was birding my farm, located in the Stonewall Quad, DeSoto Parish, for the Winter Bird Atlas. The morning was comfortable, with temperatures in the fifties, and only scattered clouds floating around the morning sky. It was February 9th, 2007, and I had already put in enough hours for the quad to qualify. It is convenient to live in your Winter Atlas Quad. I was pishing for birds, and had a **Hermit Thrush** wagging, and acting in that distinctive **Hermit Thrush** standoffish manner, when I noticed a big lump on a limb about 100 yards away. It was hairy and on a long, downward sloping limb about halfway up a big water oak tree. It was a most unusual sort of porcupine-appearing lump. Maybe the fact that I have never yet seen a wild porcupine caused me to think of that poor comparison.

A couple of **Blue Javs** watched silently, but did not approach. After a few minutes of close observation, however, I discerned one raccoon separating from the other one, and she slowly crawled down the limb. Then a Tufted Titmouse appeared and flitted around the second raccoon that had not vet moved from his location, which had been atop the first raccoon. The Tufted Titmouse took several bills full of raccoon fur from the lower back area of the second raccoon during the next few minutes. The raccoon totally ignored the bird, or maybe by then he just didn't care. Perhaps he didn't even feel the gentle removal of his fur. reminded me of the dignity of a yellow cat I used to During nesting season when the Northern **Mockingbird** attacked the cat's tail as we walked together toward the milk barn, the cat never

acknowledged the attack, even though it was often bumped into by the flying bird.

LABird, the LA birding listserv, has recently had tales about brave **Tufted Titmice** plucking fur from cats or long haired dogs. Paul Dickson even saw one taking fur from the back of a raccoon. There was speculation about late January and early February being mating season for Louisiana raccoons. This appears correct, as verified by my woodland tale.

The Birdhouse Network: A Decade of Dedication

-- Citizen scientists keep tabs on the lives of nesting birds

From the Cornell Lab of Ornithology

For 10 years, a network of dedicated birders has made it their mission to help birds by providing nest boxes where birds can raise their families and by recording information for scientists. Together, they've kept a decade of meticulous records about when the birds build their nests, how many eggs they lay, and when the gawky fledglings take their first flights. Combined, they have sent nearly 70,000 nest records to The Birdhouse Network, a citizen-science project of the Cornell Lab of Ornithology. These efforts have helped expand scientific knowledge about bluebirds, Tree Swallows, House Wrens, and other cavity-nesting birds for whom the motto may be rephrased, "Hole Sweet Home."

- Getting Oriented: Using records from participants, scientists have examined factors that affect the success of nesting birds across time and space. They have found, for example, that in northern latitudes, nest boxes facing east or northeast produce more fledglings. The hypothesis is that cavity entrances facing toward the sunrise remain warmer on cold spring mornings, increasing survival rates. In contrast, the orientation of the nest box has no effect in southern latitudes.
- Some Don't Like it Hot: A significantly higher number of eggs fail to hatch in the South than in the North. Researchers are investigating whether prolonged warm temperatures cause some of the eggs to start developing before the female begins incubating, leading to abnormal development. Birds in warmer climates tend to produce more broods perhaps to balance the loss. Scientists will be keeping close tabs on rates of hatching in the face of global climate change.

The Birdhouse Network also invites participants to help in a special study called Personality Profiles. Participants follow an experimental protocol and observe how birds react to harmless novel objects placed near nest boxes. Scientists use the information to learn more about birds, such as why some species fare better in cities or around people. They invite anyone interested in animal behavior to help by joining the study.

People of all ages and skill levels can be part of The Birdhouse Network. "Without the data sent in by participants, we would not be able to track large-scale trends in the reproductive cycles of these birds," says project leader Tina Phillips. "Whether they monitor one box or 100, our participants are so dedicated to the birds, and the data they provide us year after year are incredibly powerful."

Remembering Horace Jeter

Horace Jeter, northwest Louisiana's Dean of bird watching, died on January 7, 2007 at the age of 85. Horace was the north Louisiana go-to guy in bird matters for the entire later half of the 20th century. Founder and long time compiler of the Shreveport Christmas Bird Count, Louisiana's longest running CBC, Horace was famously skeptical. You had better have your sparrows straight before turning in that CBC list. Many who knew him well attended the 1975 Spring LOS meeting where a giant 20 lb. dictionary titled "Horace Jeter's comments on Louisiana Bird Records, vol.1, Loons through Grebes" was presented as a new LOS publication, a funny tongue-in-cheek jab at Louisiana's strictest auditor of birds. Horace, with his brief case bar, was a Louisiana bird fixture in his time and regular at AOU meetings in the period 1950-1975. Though a CPA with an MBA from Harvard, Horace preferred to count birds so he stopped counting money in 1965 and went to full time birding in Louisiana and around the world, until age and declining health slowed his pace. He was a close friend of George Lowery and other LSU ornithologists of his time and an early board member and president of LOS. A Shreveport native, Horace Jeter helped to found the Shreveport Society for Nature Study, now known as the Bird Study Group. He was quoted and pictured in innumerable articles in the

Shreveport Times regarding birds. His publications in national ornithological journals mostly documented rare or newly established nesting birds of this region ranging from Scissor-tailed Flycatcher to Western Meadowlark. His brief stint as a wildlife cinematographer led the SSNS to sponsor numerous nature films locally. His filming in the 1960's included some of the first intimate footage of nesting and foraging American Dippers in the Rocky Mountains.

Most of Horace's time was spent in the field recording birds or at home in his library studying them. Through years of field work, at Lowery's request prior to the publication of LOUISIANA BIRDS, Horace filled some significant gaps in Louisiana bird knowledge. Little was know of birds in north Louisiana in 1950 and even Cameron was to be the location of many of his important sightings. On the Sabine CBC he was given the coveted Hackberry Woods area because of his mastery of inland birds. No western vagrant in cryptic winter plumage would get by his studious eye. The cynic always, Horace complained bitterly that he was driving all that way to count Yellow-rumped Warblers. His detailed accounting of field trips remain in pencil in spiral-bound field journals. When a new book on birds in Louisiana is published, Jeter's data will be prevalent in that work as well. His carefully recorded data survive.

A child of the Great Depression, Horace was frugal, living a modest lifestyle. For the last 40 years he lived in a small house on a simple street and drove the same 1965 mustang. He ate at home unless invited out and packed sandwiches on field trips. He spent money only on basic needs and travel. He used the same 8x35 Bushnell binoculars all that time from Cross Lake to Cameron to the Australian Outback. When he could no longer use them, he gave them to me including the original box that they came in and all the paperwork in it, yellowed but in otherwise mint condition. Several years ago, realizing that he could no longer travel, he donated his estate worth over \$1,000,000 to the Louisiana Nature Conservancy, their largest gift to date. His binoculars and his love for nature survive.

Larry Raymond has two stories that he likes to relate about Horace. "In the late 1970's and early 1980's, Horace and I birded together frequently. At some point he asked me to check the water level in the battery of his orange Mustang. I did and, sure enough, it needed water. From then on, he would ask me to check his battery every few months. On several occasions, I tried to show him how simple it was to check and add water to his battery, but his reply was always the same: 'I don't need to know how. I know you and you know how, so you can do it for me'. Another time, on February 17, 1982, I followed Horace to a cottage on

Toledo Bend, owned by a Mr. Quinn, to see a Bandtailed Pigeon. When we arrived, Dr. Newman was already there and Bruce Crider had his spotting scope zeroed in on the bird. We easily added it to our Louisiana list. Later that afternoon, Horace called me to say that he decided we couldn't count the bird because it could be an escape. My reply: if you don't want to count it, that is fine, but it is already on my list and there it will stay. All I can say is: Horace was Horace until the end. One day I may write a book about all of the eccentric naturalists I have known over the years. Horace Jeter was one of a kind and certainly left a positive lasting impression on my life."

George Lowery trusted Horace with describing the status of the species found in northwest Louisiana for Louisiana Birds. If that doesn't speak clearly enough allow George Lowery to speak through the inscription he placed in Jeter's copy of the first edition of that book. It is written in Lowery's hand in black fountain pen and dated 21 September, 1955: "To Horace H. Jeter-whose contributions to ornithology in general and to our knowledge of the birds of northwestern Louisiana in particular are paramount, and who, above all, is one of the finest guys I have known. George Lowery Jr."

Horace was my birding mentor, helping me begin my life list at age 6 and remaining my close friend and "old professor" through his last week. I spoke with him three days before he died and we talked about going out the following week to check on some empids that Terry Davis found that have remained along Red River. He reminded me that though they could be western species, Least is most likely and that they should be scrutinized and perhaps collected. He went into *Empidonax* detail as if I hadn't heard it before. How many empids has he sorted through but still the excitement in his voice spiked through the cloudy shroud of advanced age. He cared that they be correctly identified and recorded for publication. He was always meticulous, as an accountant is, to record only what he saw, not what he wanted to see or what he expected to see but just what he saw. If he didn't see or hear enough to discern a species, then the bird was recorded to genus no matter how much he wanted it otherwise. Every time I look to identify a bird, Horace Jeter's glare is in my mind, making sure that I don't let excitement extend over science. Jeter was a disciplined observer. His lessons survive.

Though Jeter published in ornithological journals, he never allowed himself to be called an ornithologist. He would remind you that his degree was an MBA. Horace toted his binoculars before the term 'birder' was coined, before birding was cool. Instead, he was proud to take the moniker of "bird watcher". Horace Jeter achieved greatness in his chosen niche. I'm glad our paths crossed

as they did and I treasure the knowledge that he offered me. Many of you never knew him but since you are bird watchers too you will cross his path many times, at the "Secret Place" and "Hackberry Woods", off of San Francisco Bay amongst shearwaters, or on a misty Australian mountainside where Lyrebirds display. You may bird in a precious piece of Louisiana native habitat saved with his gift to TNC. You may read across his path too, in which case it will be marked by the observer's footnote: (HHJ, 19..).

Jeter's Bird Records

The Bird Study Group has received 31 notebooks of Horace Jeter's bird records for addition to the BSG Bird Database. Dating from June of 1950 to almost the present, these data represent about 57 years of birding information, most of which predates the BSG Database beginnings in 1986. Before this we had very little information about early birding in our area.

Jeter's records are amazing and extremely valuable for several reasons often overlooked and unappreciated in today's computer age. He used detailed locality information, usually including latitude and longitude for each locality. Often visiting 7-10 places a day, he never failed to record the exact locality. Another common feature of almost all of his records was some information about the weather including cloud cover, wind, rain, and temperature (usually including the high and low for the He often recorded the time when birds were singing and if it was early in the morning he frequently would note when sunrise occurred that day. More than half of his observations include data in addition to the number of birds seen. For example, if we record 46 species during an outing to a specific place we are accustomed to record 46 species and 46 corresponding numbers of birds for that locality, and that is all. More than half of Horace's 46 records would also include items including: sex, age, molt condition, nest building, feeding, preening, courtship behavior, aggression, and many other kinds of observations. All of this information (as much as four lines or text) is included in the BSG Database.

Another of the great birders in our area is Jim Stewart, now residing in The Woodlands, Texas (near Houston). Jim transferred a small part of his records for the Shreveport area to us about three years ago. Both Jim's and Horace's data represent the earliest bird records in the BSG Database for the northwestern Louisiana area. With the inclusion of these records we have one of the most important bird records databases in the country. The possibilities for research and new

discoveries about the bird life of northwestern Louisiana are much greater with such a vast amount of information.

I am a little over half finished typing in the data and have added over 8,500 records (bringing the BSG database to 191,546 records). My goal is to have this process completed by April 20. As soon as all of Jeter's records have been included in the BSG Database, the notebooks will be transferred to the Museum of Natural Science at LSU Baton Rouge.

Ron Martin noted that he had many Cedar Waxwings outside his office window. He saw one that was very different than the others and thought it could possibly be a Bohemian Waxwing. He did not get a good enough look to make a definite identification. Paul Dickson observed an adult Northern Goshawk near his office on Youree Drive. He was able to get a positive identification, but did not have a camera with him at the time to take a picture.

Rosemary Seidler also reported one at the same location on March 10. Gloria Frantom has had a wintering hummingbird since November 4. She was encouraged to report this bird to Paul Dickson so that it could be banded. Ron Martin saw a **Common Grackle** in his yard with one white feather in the very center of its tail.

Then by looking on the observer list, located after the sightings, you can determine that BB is Bob Birder and on 1/12/99 he was birding C. Bickham Dickson Park.
