NABA BUTTERFLY COUNT

This is the seventh annual North American Butterfly Association (NABA) count for Shreveport. Butterfly counts are very similar to bird counts. The 15-mile diameter count circle for the Shreveport count is centered on the intersection of Norris Ferry Road and Overton Brooks Road. This area includes much of southeastern Shreveport, Wallace Lake, Keithville, and a small portion of Bossier Parish. If you live within the circle, you may participate by counting butterflies in

Claiborne Parish Field Trip by John Dillon

On May 19, the Bird Study Group sponsored a field trip to Claiborne Parish hosted by M.E. Lewis and led by John Dillon. Those present for the trip were Linda Adrion, Jerry Bertrand, Sarah Hancock, Jay Huner, Silviera Hunt, Jim Ingold, Martha Lennard, Nora McClure, Nancy Menasco, and Rosemary Seidler. Also present were M.E.'s two Yorkshire Terriers, Tobey and Wheeler, honorary mascots of Claiborne Parish birding.

The total for Saturday was 76 species, and the morning was spent on Old Colquitt Road, just northeast of Homer. For members who have never birded this area, it is a 10-mile road which begins from Highway 520 out of Homer, crosses the riparian habitat of Beaver Creek, cuts through the West Caney District of Kisatchie and dips into Middle Fork Bayou bottom before reaching the village of Colquitt. The area offers fairly diverse habitat, producing anything from Yellow-crowned Night Heron to Greater Roadrunner.

Beginning at the southern end of Old Colquitt Road at about 8:15, we quickly picked up good numbers of **Prairie Warbler**, **Yellow-breasted Chat**, **Orchard Oriole**, and **Indigo Bunting** as well as several lingering **Cedar Waxwings**. Present in smaller numbers were **Common Yellowthroat**, **Blue Grosbeak**, **Gray**

Catbird and others, including a flyover Yellow-crowned Night Heron and Great Egret.

A mile farther at Beaver Creek, we immediately heard Red-eyed Vireo and American Redstart. Beaver Creek is a reliable place to find American Redstart, and we heard at least 4 singing in the treetops. Nesting neotropical migrants such as Hooded Warbler and White-eyed Vireo were present but already very quite. Soon, birding picked up a bit, and we were able to find Yellow-billed Cuckoo, Eastern Wood-Pewee, Redshouldered Hawk, Ruby-throated Hummingbird, Pileated Woodpecker and an Anhinga soaring overhead.

Making brief stops in Kisatchie before reaching Middle Fork Bayou, we added **Summer Tanager** and **Black Vulture** to the day's list and picked up more **Hooded Warblers**, **Red-eyed Vireos** and Chats.

Just before Middle Fork Bayou bottom, there is a trail to the right of the road that leads downhill into a ravine with dense foliage. After a heavy rain this area is very good for warblers, having produced **Swainson's Warbler** and **Worm-eating Warbler** on the previous two weekends. The caveat is that you may feel like you're starring in a commercial for Deep Woods Off. Of course, any dedicated Louisiana birder should already be accustomed to losing a pint or two of blood on the weekends; so, no big deal, right?

No Swainson's or Worm-eating this time, but we did get Black and White Warbler, Pine Warbler, Kentucky Warbler, and Louisiana Waterthrush. Those of us who made the scramble down the hill to the ravine can attest to the latter two birds. The waterthrush responded to a taped Swainson's Warbler call. Responded may be a bit of an understatement, though; some of us thought that he had convinced himself that he had heard the call of the last female Louisiana Waterthrush on the planet. He was a pleasure to see and hear, singing his long social call for us several times.

We ended our northward trek on Old Colquitt Road at Middle Fork Bayou bottom, host to some very large Basket Oaks and Bald Cypress. It is also host to **Northern Parula** and **Yellow-throated Warbler**, both of which made appearances almost immediately. John Dillon had **White-breasted Nuthatch** here the previous weekend, but they had obviously decided to abscond with the **Swainson's** and **Worm-eating Warblers** this morning.

Making our way back to town, Linda, Silviera, and John were in the lead car and had the luck of seeing a **Greater Roadrunner** live up to his name. The rest of the caravan stopped but had no luck. Linda spotted an **American Kestrel**, though, while the rest of us were hoping the roadrunner might pop out of hiding. Jay

Huner, who needed the species as a year bird, came back to the same location in the afternoon and was pleased to find the bird there. No coyotes were reported in the area, however.

Next, we had lunch at M.E.'s house on Lake Claiborne. Everyone (everyone, that is, except Tobey and Wheeler, who were not offered a crumb) was treated to true Southern hospitality, eating delicious chickensalad sandwiches and fig preserve cake on the back porch while hummingbirds buzzed around us and **Redheaded Woodpeckers** flashed across our views of the lake. On a stroll to the edge of the water, Jay found a **Spotted Sandpiper** bobbing his tail on the seawall. And on the previous night, those staying at M.E.'s guest house were treated to a singing **Chuck-wills-widow**.

We ended the day with a trip to the LSU Hill Farm and Experiment Station off Highway 79. There, we had great looks at **Dickcissel**, **Lark Sparrow**, **Eastern Kingbird**, **Mississippi Kite**, and a **Common Nighthawk** who was on the prowl a few hours early. A pair of **House Finch** brought our total to 76, but Nancy and Jerry stopped by Miles Road the next morning and picked up **Painted Bunting** and **Northern Bobwhite**.

If you've never birded Claiborne Parish, or if you've got a yen to bird alongside Yorkshire Terriers, we hope you'll come by and see us. Just wait till summer's over, though, like maybe November.

Evaluation of Migratory and Resident Bird Populations in the Mouton Cove Area, Vermilion Parish, Louisiana Post-Hurricane Rita Saltwater Surge

From September 2002 through April 2005, we surveyed the birds in the agricultural wetlands, pastures, and riparian forests in the Mouton Cove area of Vermilion Parish, Louisiana several times a month. The study area was more or less circular and had a diameter of about 5 miles. We generated a seasonal bird checklist at the end of 2004 and a report on the birds of the Palmetto Island State Park site at the end of June 2006. In all, some 240 bird species were recorded and 72 species either nested or were probable nesters at or near the study area.

This work was supported by grants to J. V. Huner as Director of the University of Louisiana at Lafayette Crawfish Research Center. Funding agencies were the Louisiana Crawfish Promotion and Research Board and the Coypu Foundation (2002 into 2004) and the Louisiana Office of Culture, Recreation, and Tourism (2004 into 2005).

The study area includes three numbered sites on the coastal birding trail developed by the State of Louisiana - "The Nation's Wetland Coastal Birding Trail".

In early October 2005, Hurricane Rita generated a storm surge that inundated the study area south and in some places north of Louisiana Highway 82 with full strength sea water. Significant damage was done to vegetation. Crawfish and rice fields that were flooded with salt water could not be used for their intended crops. In areas spared from the surge, crawfish fields that would have been filled in the fall of 2005 could not be filled because farmers depend on surface waters that were too saline to pump into ponds for the freshwater crawfish. The problem was exacerbated because the area suffered a drought into the winter of 2005-06 so rainfall was not available to fill ponds unaffected by the surge or flush ponds from which salt waters had been drained in October or November.

Musumeche made several visits to the study area during the period November 2005-March 2006. Huner visited the area in spring 2006. The avian fauna was dramatically reduced in terms of numbers of species and numbers of individuals per species compared to baseline data developed from September 2002 – June 2005.

In 2006, we submitted a proposal to the Coypu Foundation for a one year follow up survey of the study area. We did so because the area provided important habitat for a number of birds prior to Hurricane Rita; it was an important component of the state's coastal birding trail; and the short term impacts of Hurricane Rita on the area should be documented.

The Coypu Foundation Board of Directors agreed to fund the study, administered through the Louisiana Wildlife Federation and we began our survey work in January of this year (2007). Our surveys will continue through December of this year.

Resident, wintering, and neotropical nesting bird numbers and diversity were reduced in the 12 month period immediately following Hurricane Rita. Wintering waterbirds were clearly impacted immediately following the hurricane because much of the ag wetland habitat was dry for lack of rain water to fill fallow fields. There was also a lack of surface freshwater to fill fields for crawfish production and flush salt in areas impacted by the salt water surge that reached LA 82. The area experienced a severe drought in the fall and winter of 2005-06 and salt water lingered for a long time in the normally freshwater canals used for irrigation.

So far, however, we have found good numbers and diversity (197 species as compared to the earlier survey total 240 species) during the first five and a half months of our survey. Many of the fields that were dry during the fall-winter-spring of 2005-06 were flooded in the fall

of 2006. Farmers flooded the fields to leach accumulated salt from the substrate and/or to produce crops of crawfish. Crawfish production was generally poor for the 2006-07 season but the full complement of waterbirds, especially waterfowl, associated with the area in our past survey work was well represented. We were especially impressed with the continued presence of large numbers of scaup, joined by unexpected Redheads, in the shallow 6-10" deep fields. We were pleased to find expected species and numbers of shorebirds present during spring migration. A complete report on the results of our survey work will be published in the Louisiana Wildlife Federation Magazine by mid-2008.

Changes to the Checklist of Birds by Mac Hardy

There have been a few changes to the bird fauna of northwestern Louisiana based on the most recent AOU Supplement (Forty-seventh Supplement to the American Ornithologists' Union Check-List of North American Birds, Auk 123(3):926-936, July, 2006). These changes are reflected in our Field Checklist (dated May 25, 2007).

This one is sure to keep you up at night. The sequence of some sandpipers has changed (you will have to scan an inch or so of the checklist to find your bird). The new sequence is **Spotted Sandpiper**, **Solitary Sandpiper**, **Greater Yellowlegs**, **Willet**, **Lesser Yellowlegs**. Yeah, you read it correctly.

Here we go again. The sequence of terns has changed. The new sequence is: **Sooty, Least, Caspian, Black, Common,** and **Forester's**. For both of these groups, the group stays in the same place in the checklist.

Now, for the really significant change. Delete **Ringed Turtle-Dove** from our bird fauna.

The Field Checklist has been revised and is now available.

NORTH AMERICAN MIGRATION COUNT REPORT 2007

Each year it is fun to tinker around with the bird count numbers, and see if any conclusions can be seen. This years' count was very similar to last years count in many ways, so I'd like to just compare these two years,

2007 and 2006. We put twenty people in the field this year, compared to 23 last year. We were able to get coverage on the Red River both years. Any year without a boat on the river, is a low count year. I want to thank all of the participants, you did a good job. We had 153 species counted in 2007, and that is exactly the same as 2006. That is a very good high count but it will take a monumental effort, and weather favorable to near fall-out conditions, to surpass the 168 species counted in 1998.

We counted 14,527 individual birds this year compared to 10,411 last year. We put in 89 hours, compared to 73 hours last year. Maybe that is why the individual bird count is up this year. The ranking of the species by total birds counted is usually so similar year by year that the changes are easy to detect. (See the chart below)

The increase in **Cattle Egret** and **American White Pelican** is due to the fact that I included the DeSoto Parish portion of Toledo Bend Lake in my route for 2007. I found a nesting heronry, of mostly Cattle Egrets west from Jolly Roger Camp, and the pelicans were located at Circle Drive. I did not go to those areas in 2006. Indeed, many of the 4,116 birds counted in 2007 over the 2006 total were associated with rookeries. The other most notable change was in **Cedar Waxwing**, where a tremendous population existed in Claiborne Parish (525). The most notable loss was in **White Ibis**. I think that in 2006 Paul Dickson was managing his place in Red River Parish just right for a buildup of **White Ibis**. If so, that is the explanation.

This is called a "migration count". So I want to report to you the number of true migrants counted. This list just includes birds that I am almost certain don't nest here and don't remain through the summer as nonnesting birds. Of the 153 species in both 2007 and 2006, only 24 were true migrants this year, and 26 in 2006.

The similarities and differences year by year are interesting.

2007 True Migrants List: Willet 1, Pectoral Sandpiper 18, Caspian Tern 1, Alder Flycatcher 1, Willow Flycatcher 2, Philadelphia Vireo 1, Marsh Wren 1, Ruby-crowned Kinglet 2, Gray-cheeked Thrush 1, Swainson's Thrush 2, Cedar Waxwing 628, Bluewinged Warbler 1, Tennessee Warbler 7, Yellow Warbler 8, Magnolia Warbler 3, Bay-breasted Warbler 1, Blackpoll Warbler 1, American Redstart 10, Wilson's Warbler 1, Savannah Sparrow 10, White-throated Sparrow 1, Rose-breasted Grosbeak 4, Bobolink 1, American Goldfinch 1. 24 species totaling 79 individual birds, not counting the Cedar Waxwings. 0.54% of total birds.

2006 True Migrant List: Black-bellied Plover 2, **Upland** Sandpiper 3, Hudsonian Godwit Semipalmated Sandpiper 5, White-rumped Sandpiper 5, Pectoral Sandpiper 15, Stilt Sandpiper 16, Buff-breasted Sandpiper 1, Wilson's Phalarope 19, Caspian Tern 4, Common Tern 6, Black Tern 22, Yellow-bellied Flycatcher 1, Alder Flycatcher 2, Willow Flycatcher 1, Bank Swallow 2, Gray-cheeked Thrush 3, Swainson's Thrush 34, Cedar Waxwing 221, Nashville Warbler 1, Yellow Warbler 2, American Redstart 1, Scarlet Tanager 3, Savannah Sparrow 2, White-throated Sparrow 1, Rose-breasted Grosbeak 5. Not counting the Cedar Waxwings this is, 26 species totaling 161 individual birds. 1.5% of total birds.

One final observation is that apparently some species of birds can count. Apparently **Cedar Waxwings** excel in arithmetic. How else can one account for the fact that they are so often counted in multiples of 25?

Minutes of the Regular Meeting April 10, 2007, 7:00 p.m., **Museum of Life Sciences at LSUS**

Program – There were two presentations. First, Mac Hardy reviewed a few of Horace Jeter's bird records to show the detail Horace kept with each record. Next, Beth Leuck from Centenary College discussed bird mating systems.

Announcements – Ron Martin announced that Jerry Bertrand would be the club's new webmaster and that Jim Ingold would be the new newsletter editor. Mac Hardy is chair of the nominating committee and said that he is looking for new board members.

Programs – Susan Martin said that Richard Gibbons would speak at the next meeting. The topic would be the statewide winter bird atlas. The June meeting will be a plant sale. Members are urged to donate plants for the sale

Field Trips – Nancy Menasco reviewed the following upcoming field trips: a) Scavenger hunt on April 21. b) The Red River National Wildlife Refuge Headquarters will be open May 3 so that the public can visit. It is not yet open to the public. c) The North American Migration Count is May 12. d) Claiborne Parish birding. John Dillon will be the trip leader.

Membership – Mac Hardy showed a membership list containing all names of members who paid dues during this century. It will be made available to the membership.

Bird Talk - Jim Ingold reported a Eurasian Collared Dove nest in his front yard and also reports about eight or nine collared doves in his yard. Jim Ingold and Terry Davis reported about 200 American Golden Plovers and seven American Kestrels at the sod farm on Sentell Road. Vicki LeFevers said that the Wood Ducks at the Kings Highway playground approach very closely. She said that this could be a very good photo opportunity for photographers. Nancy Menasco and Paul Miliotis spotted an American Bittern at the Bayou Pierre Unit of the Red River Wildlife Refuge. Linda Adrion saw an Eared Grebe in breeding plumage on Cat Island Road in West Feliciana Parish. Hubert Hervey reported nesting Eastern Phoebes at his house. Also, he has a neighbor who has a Bald Eagle eating fish heads at the neighbor's house. Hubert said that is the closest he has come to having an eagle on his farm.

For example: 01/12/99 BB 2 means that on January 12, 1999, BB saw two birds. Then by looking on the observer list, located after the sightings, you can determine that BB is Bob Birder and on 1/12/99 he was birding C. Bickham Dickson Park.


