The board discussed the list of permanent residents included in the last newsletter that will no longer be included in the Bird Report each month. It was decided that several of the birds listed will continue to be included due to their rarity at certain seasons or because of their questionable status.

Bill Hall volunteered to serve as an alternate for the bird phone tree when one of the key contacts cannot be reached.

The Saturday, 16 June, field trip to Cross Lake was discussed. A show of hands will be taken at the Tuesday, 12 June, meeting to see if there is any interest in this trip. The election of board members will also be mentioned at Tuesday's regular meeting.

Mac reported that LSUS plans to move a warehouse from the Pennzoil site to the LSUS campus to house the museum.

Mac reported that Shirley Huss has been working hard on the membership list and is keeping the records of the group current.

The board also discussed the financial situation of the Bird Study Group and the need for some money-raising activities.

MINUTES OF LAST MEETING

The regular monthly meeting of the SSNS Bird Study Group was held Tuesday, 10 July 1990, in the Science Lecture Auditorium on the LSUS campus. The meeting was chaired by vice-president Will Smolenski. Will called the meeting to order at 7:04 P.M. He asked any guests or newcomers present to introduce themselves.

Betty Mason gave a treasurer's report for both June and July. She reported a balance of \$873.60 on 8 May. Revenue up to the June meeting was \$349.10, and expenses totaled \$130.00, leaving a balance of \$1,092.70 on 12 June. Since June, our income was \$175.00 and our expenses totaled \$28.00, leaving a balance of \$1,239,70 on this date.

Bennett Johnston thanking them for their efforts to protect wetlands. No objections were raised and Will instructed Larry to proceed with writing the letter.

Betty asked about the invoices for xeroxing the newsletters. Larry stated that he would ask Mac about any money owed for using the xerox machine in the LSUS bookstore and report back to Betty.

Teresa Thrash made available a catalog on recycled materials for members of the group that might be interested.

Velda Neilson reported seeing lots of shorebirds, including black-necked stilts, along the bar pits off I-49 south of the Allen-Powhatan exit, between mile markers 149 and 147.

Larry presented the program on "Creating Wildlife Habitats with Your Garden", emphasizing plants that are attractive to birds and butterflies.

The meeting adjourned at 8:15 P.M.

For example: 15 PD 3; BN 1,5) means that on the fifteenth PD saw 3 birds, BN saw 1 at one locality and 5 at another. For the number of birds observed, a one is used both for one specimen or for numbers not reported by the observer. Two (or more) numbers following an observer are numbers of birds seen at two (or more) different localities. The month is abbreviated only if it is the month preceding the one being reported.

NEXT MONTHLY MEETING:

NEW MEETING ROOM

We will meet in Room 229 in the Science Building on October 9 and November 13. This room is in the Science Building (big building next to the Science Lecture Auditorium (SLA) where we have been meeting), on the second floor. The easiest way in is by the door next to the SLA or by the door on the side facing the Library Building. Go to the

second floor by the elevator located at the east end (next to the Library) or by stairs. Room 229 is in the southeastern corner of the building near the elevator.

This is a smaller room but the acoustics will be much better. We will try this room for two meetings and then decide what to do next. Projection equipment is always available for that room.

BOARD MEMBER TERMS

After this year the board members will serve a three-year term. In order to implement this process with a rotation so we will elect only one-third of the board each year (and therefore insure that we will maintain some continuity) the board this year only were elected to staggered terms of one, two, or three years. Come to the meetings and read the next few Newsletters for the specific dates. The National dates are December 15 through January 2, 1991.

The CBC's started in 1900 with 27 official counts in North America. Last year there were 42,000 different counts! The largest number of species recorded for any North American count last year was 226 at Freeport, Texas.

MINUTES OF BOARD MEETING ***

Vice-president Will Smolenski called the meeting to order at 7:00 P.M. in the Science Lecture Auditorium on the LSUS campus. Board members attending the meeting were Will Smolenski, Mac Hardy, Robert Wommack, Larry Raymond, Shirley Huss, Gloria Frantom, Connie Connors, Jim McCain, Jr., and Bill Hall. Pat Lonnecker was also present at the meeting.

The minutes of the last board meeting and the last regular meeting were approved as recorded in the newsletter.

Larry reported that the treasury remains at \$1,239.70 as reported by Betty Mason at the July meeting.

Will suggested that we shorten the number of regular meetings during the year down to ten. He explained that this is a normal practice for many organizations. After a brief discussion, the board decided to recommend to the full membership this suggestion. The July and August meetings would be skipped.

Will then asked the board to consider electing board members for three year terms. He suggested we begin by electing five board members for three years, five for two years, and the remaining five for one year terms. This way only five board members would be elected each year thereafter, and we would assure continuity on the board. After some discussion, the board agreed to make this recommendation to the full membership.

Will further recommended that we elect board members in April and new officers at the first board meeting following the April meeting. The new board and new officers would not assume leadership of the organization until September. However, earlier elections would assure a smooth transition from one year to the next. The board voted to make this recommendation to the full membership as well.

In other action, the board voted to continue meeting the Thursday before the regular Tuesday night meeting every second month.

Mac reported that the museum building is under construction on campus. He expects to move the museum into the building around the first of October. The museum building is being partitioned to include office space, a laboratory, a collections area, and a public area. Mac anticipates that there will be room for the Bird Study Group gift shop. The museum will have two new phone numbers. Mac suggested that possibly one of the numbers could be dedicated to the bird hotline. He also mentioned that he could use some help from the Bird Study Group moving into the new building. At the very least, the Bird Study Group needs to move the gift shop materials and other odds and ends associated with the group.

The board discussed future outings of the group. It was decided that the next outing will be to Bickham Dickson Park on Saturday, September 22, 1990, to look for shorebirds and hawks. Bill Hall agreed to lead this field trip. Everyone interested in participating should meet at the park at 8:00 A.M.

An October outing was scheduled to the James Bayou Natural Area on Saturday, October 20, 1990. Mac Hardy agreed to lead this outing. We will meet at the museum for 8:00 A.M. and carpool to the site.

A discussion of the phone tree indicated a need to update the names on the tree. It was suggested that a new list be started at the next regular meeting.

Will asked if the plaque for the raptor cage had been purchased. This plaque was approved by the board several meetings ago. Larry reported that he would follow up on the

board's directive and have the plaque made.

Mac suggested that the board address ways to increase membership. Will recommended calling individuals who have let their membership lapse. Mac agreed that this would help, but he also wants to attract new members. He suggested the possibility of having an informational booth at the Red River Revel and/or State Fair for one day. The board decided that it was probably too late to get our own booth this year, but agreed to pursue teaming up with another group that may already have a booth reserved. Mac agreed to contact LSUS concerning their booth, and Larry said he would pursue talking to the Louisiana Department of Wildlife and Fisheries about sharing their booth. suggested that we could also contact the woodcarvers group. If we are successful in teaming up with another group, we will need to recruit people to help man the booth.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 8:15 P.M.

MINUTES OF LAST MEETING

The SSNS Bird Study Group met Tuesday, September 11, 1990, in the Science Lecture Auditorium on the LSUS campus. Vicepresident Will Smolenski called the meeting to order at 7:11 P.M. Guests were asked to introduce themselves.

Will asked if there were any corrections to the minutes as published in the newsletter. There were no corrections.

Betty Mason gave a treasurer's report. The balance on July 10, 1990, was \$1,239.70. Since then we have received \$10.00 in revenues and have had no expenses. Our current balance was reported as \$1,249.70, although several membership renewals were turned in at the meeting. Betty also reported that we have \$163.11 on deposit at the post office to cover mailing expenses.

Will then brought to the attention of the full membership the recommendations made by the board on September 6. As recommended by the board, Larry Raymond moved and Betty seconded the motion to change the number of regular monthly meetings from eleven to ten.

The motion was unanimously approved.

Larry moved and Jim McCain, Jr. seconded a motion that board members be elected for three year terms. As part of the motion, it was recommended that for this year's board elections, five members serve for three years, five members serve for two years, and five members serve for one year. The motion passed unanimously.

Finally, as recommended by the board, Ed Bitowski moved and Betty seconded a motion to have future board elections in April and election of new officers at the first board meeting following the April election. New board members and officers will assume their responsibilities in September. This motion also passed unanimously.

At this time, Larry presented the slate of board members nominated for the 1990-91 year. Nominated for three year terms were Bill Hall, Mac Hardy, Jim McCain, Jr., Velda Neilson, and Rosemary Seidler. Nominated for two year terms were Ed Bitowski, Connie Connors, Charlie Lyon, Dick Rolandt, and Will Smolenski. Nominated for one year terms were Gloria Frantom, Shirley Huss, Betty Mason, Larry Raymond, and Bobbe Wommack. Larry then asked for nominations from the floor. There were none and a motion was made to elect the members nominated by acclamation. This motion passed.

Mac Hardy updated the group on the status of the museum. He reported that the building, which was moved from the Pennzoil site, is is place on the campus. It is now being partitioned inside and finishing work is being done. Mac expects the building to be ready by the first week in October.

Will announced that a September outing is planned to Bickham Dickson Park on Saturday, September 22. Bill Hall will lead the outing and he asked everyone interested to meet at the barn for 8:00 A.M. We will look for shorebirds and hawks, as well as other migrants.

Dr. Richard Speairs invited everyone to attend a meeting of the Arkansas Audubon Society October 26-28 at Lake Chicot State Park in Lake Village, Arkansas.

Larry read a letter from Congressman Jim McCrery responding to a recent letter sent by

the group expressing support for Mr. McCrery's efforts to protect Louisiana wetlands. In his letter, the congressman assured us of his continued efforts to protect wetlands.

Betty read a letter from the Baton Rouge Audubon Society requesting additional money to help defray the cost of the Henshaw Migratory Bird Sanctuary. The Baton Rouge group needs money to repay a \$28,000 loan from The Nature Conservancy that was borrowed in order to complete the purchase. Betty added that it was also time to send our yearly contribution to the Caroline Dorman Nature Preserve. A suggestion was made to wait until the next board meeting or regular meeting to see if the treasury could support these donations this year. There was some discussion as to whether the group's money should be spent within a 100-mile radius of Shreveport. Several members felt that it would be better to spend the group's money locally. A motion was made that any expenditure further than 100 miles from Shreveport needs to be approved at two successive meetings before the money can be spent. Before the motion was seconded, Will stated that the board examines spending closely before approving any funds. He said that the board would carefully consider the requests for money before deciding on the expenditures, and that the board would study the amount that the treasury could fund.

Mac was asked if there would be room to keep and sell birdseed when the new museum opens. He responded that at this time it would not be possible. The board will discuss fundraising ideas at its next meeting.

Will presented the program on "Better Birding." He discussed ways that all of us could improve our powers of observation to help us in identifying birds in the field.

After the program, Velda Neilson encouraged everyone to attend a wildlife art exhibit at the Barnwell Center.

Mac announced that he plans to look for a better room with better acoustics for our future meetings. He also reported that he is investigating the possibility of going in with LSUS and helping to man their booth at the State Fair. He suggested that we could operate the booth for one day.

Will asked those available to sign a sheet if interested in participating in weekly bird outings. These outings would take place on an impromtu basis on weekdays.

Larry asked everyone to sign a new phone tree list. We plan to reorganize the phone tree and get it operating again.

The meeting adjourned at 8:30 P.M.

MINUTES OF BOARD MEETING TO ELECT OFFICERS

A board meeting was held immediately following the regular meeting on 11 September to elect officers. Will Smolenski called the meeting to order at 8:35 P.M. Will was elected President, Charlies Lyon - Vicepresident, Betty Mason - Treasurer, and Larry Raymond - Secretary.

The board also decided to hold future board meetings on the first Tuesday of every second month. Will suggested that we have our next board meeting on October 2 since the board needs to make some important decisions as soon as possible.

AMERICAN SWALLOW-TAILED KITES

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department is seeking information on the status of the American Swallow-tailed Kite in Texas. The study seeks to determine migration patterns and known nesting activity in Texas. Persons who observe this species should notify the study director, Dan B. Boone, Texas Parks and Wildlife Dept., 1342 S. Wheeler, Jasper, Tx 75951.

BANDED SHOREBIRDS

Over 200 Shorebirds were banded as part of a study of the temporal and spatial distribution of shorebirds migrating and breeding at Utah's Great Salt Lake. Killdeer, American Avocets, Black-necked Stilts, Willets, Long-billed Curlews, Wilson's Phalaropes, and Spotted and Least Sandpipers are among the species color banded. They carry a light green band above the left "knee", a dark green flag (a band with a tag on it) above the right "knee", and a combination of 2 to 4 color bands and a FWS metal band below. Colors include dark blue, light green, red, white, orange, and yellow. Anyone observing these birds is asked to contact Suzanne D. Fellows, Utah Coop, Fish and Wildlife Res. Unit, Utah State Univ., Logan, UT 84322-5210 (801-750-2509) and the

Bird Banding Lab, Laurel, MD 20708. Please report species, band combination, date, place, behavior, flock size, etc.

MINUTES OF LAST BOARD MEETING

President Will Smolenski called the meeting to order at 7:10 P.M. on 2 October 1990 in the home of Betty Mason at 837 Huntington Lane. Board members present were Will Smolenski, Charlie Lyon, Betty Mason, Ed Bitowski, Connie Connors, Gloria Frantom, Bill Hall, Mac Hardy, Shirley Huss, Velda Neilson, Dick Rolandt, Rosemary Seidler, and Robbe Wommack.

Rosemary Seidler was asked to record the minutes of the meeting.

The minutes of the last board meeting and the meeting to elect officers were approved.

Betty Mason reported a previous balance of \$1,249.70, expenses of \$22.91, income of \$389.60, giving a current balance of \$1,616.39.

Will announced that the theme for the year is "Better Birding for Everyone." It is hoped that more people will become involved through weekday birding and the bird tree. Dick Rolandt will be in charge of the bird tree with Will as backup. People who are hard to contact will be near the bottom of the tree with retirees near the top. Names were added to the list and others interested may add their names at the general meeting.

Charlie Lyon reported that Jim Ingold will talk on "A Bird in the Hand is Worth Two in the Bush: Travels of a Mist-net Biologist" at the October meeting and will present a more technical program on cranes at a later meeting. Possible topics suggested for programs were optical equipment, terminology, topography, computer management of lists, endangered species, and a name speaker to draw a crowd and attract new members. (Nancy Newfield would return for a talk.) Peter Gant's book on bird topography was recommended for the Bird Study Group library and the gift shop. Bill Hall will serve as backup to Charlie as Program chairman.

Bobbe Wommack, Publicity, talked with Reeves Feild who seems willing to publicize our activities. He requested copies of our newsletter and will be put on the mailing list. Mac Hardy noted that Donna Battenfield, who is a member of the BSG and a reporter at the Shreveport Journal, has been helpful in the past. Bobbe will contact her. Perhaps she could serve as backup to Bobbe for Publicity. It was suggested that Bobbe contact the Public Service channel on TV to announce our regular meetings.

Bill Hall reported that the field trip on October 20 would be to James Bayou. There was some discussion about going to Pat Sewell's in search of wood storks instead. Notifying people of the change would be difficult so we'll go to James Bayou as planned. Future trips might be Loggy Bayou, Pat Sewell's, Cross Lake (winter ducks and eagles), Briarwood (spring), Wallace Lake Dam, Soda Lake, Paul Dickson's (May), Yearwood Road (winter sparrows), High Island (April). The possibility of renting a bus for longer trips was discussed and will be explored. It was suggested that if groups are large we should split into smaller groups and head in opposite directions. Fewer people may result in more birds seen. brief review of birding etiquette should be included in field trip introductions. Tips on birding etiquette should be printed in the Newsletter once a year. Charlie Lyon will serve as backup on Outings.

Shirley Huss will have Connie Connors as backup for membership. Mac Hardy passed out lists of current paid members (125), and a list of those whose names are in the computer but haven't paid in a while. Mac sent letters to those whose membership will expire in 30 days and renewal notices to those (72) who haven't paid for over a year. After two months the computer will be purged of nonpaying people. Complementary members will remain on the list. It was suggested that we get mailing lists of the Sierra Club, Ozark Society, and other groups of potential members. We need to mail out 200 letters each time for bulk mail. One year Mac sent letters to high school biology teachers but got no responses. Ed Bitowski suggested we get business cards printed to pass out to potential members as the ArkLaTex Gem and Mineral Society does. We'll wait on this until we're sure of our new mailing address.

Mac reported that Peggy Curtis expressed an interest in learning PC-Write and working on the newsletter. She may eventually serve as backup to Mac. Will said that he'd like to include a column from the President in the newsletter. Other suggestions were a list of birding hot spots including maps, reviews of articles from birding magazines, stories, cartoons, etc. Mac suggested we send him things to have on file so that he'd have materials at hand when he needed to fill in blank pages.

The hospitality/membership table will be staffed by Betty Mason and Velda Neilson with Rosemary Seidler as backup. Name tags will be provided. Cokes and cookies should be available at some of the meetings.

Mac reported that the BSG could staff the LSUS booth at the State Fair. A one page information sheet will be developed for distribution. It will include meeting dates and some of the possible outings planned as well as membership information. We could have a continuous slide show or show the Audubon video tapes. Mac anticipates five (5) shifts of three (3) hours with at least two people in each time slot. Volunteers will be sought at the general meeting. The tentative date is Saturday, October 27.

A lengthy discussion concerning donations to environmental groups was held. The board members feel that the membership elects us to run the club in the best interest of the membership. We have the authority to make decisions regarding donations. There are strong feelings to support kindred groups as much as we can. It is felt that the board can and should make decisions concerning amounts less than \$100, but that appropriations/donations greater than that amount should be recommended to the general membership for approval. The board approved the purchase of a plaque (not more than \$65) for the hawk recovery cage at Walter Jacobs Park to commemorate those who supported and helped with the project. The board recommends to the membership donations of \$100 to the Caroline Dormon Nature Preserve and \$300 to the Baton Rouge Audubon Society.

Under new business, Will said that he would ask Jim McCain and Larry Raymond to compile a list of birding hotspots complete with maps.

The national dates for the Christmas bird counts are December 15 to January 1. Horace Jeter will be coordinating the Shreveport count, and Paul Dickson will coordinate the Bossier count again this year.

Ed Bitowski suggested several fund raisers: a door raffle (\$0.25 - \$0.50) for small items (door prizes would continue), and a table at meetings with gifts for sale. An auction was also suggested.

The next board meeting was set tentatively for Monday, December 3 at 7:00 P.M. at Will Smolenski's house.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 9:15 P.M. Thanks to Rosemary Seidler for compiling the minutes.

MINUTES OF THE LAST MEETING

The regular monthly meeting of the SSNS Bird Study Group was held Tuesday, 9 October 1990, in Room 229 of the Science Building on the LSUS campus. The meeting was called to order at 7:12 P.M. by President Will Smolenski. Will asked for any guests to introduce themselves. None were present at the meeting.

Will reported that at the last board meeting chairpersons were assigned to the various committees. Charles Lyon, assisted by Bill Hall, will be the program chairman. Shirley Huss, assisted by Connie Connors, will be the membership chairperson. Hardy, assisted by Peggy Curtis, will continue as newsletter editor. Bill Hall, assisted by Charles Lyon, will serve as outings chairman. Dick Rolandt, assisted by Will Smolenski, will serve as chairman of the phone tree. Bobbe Wommack, assisted by Donna Battenfield, will handle publicity, and Velda Neilson and Betty Mason, assisted by Rosemary Seidler, will serve as the hospitality committee. Jim McCain will head a project to develop a list of birding hotspots. Bitowski will be in charge of fundraising. Ed stated that he plans to set up a sales area at future meetings and he asked everyone to bring spending money to the meetings beginning next month.

Larry Raymond showed the members the

plaque that was made to put on the raptor rehabilitation cage built at the Walter Jacobs Nature Park.

Mac reported that the BSG will man an exhibit at the State Fair all day on Sunday, 21 October. An early date was chosen so that we could work the booth another day if October 21 proved to be successful. We will be using the LSUS booth in the Education Building. Members are needed to hand out literature, membership forms, and perhaps operate audiovisual equipment at the booth. A sheet was circulated for members to indicate the times they can work.

A suggestion was made to have bird stickers or some similar item to give away to children to attract attention to the booth. Mac agreed to investigate this possibility. Mac also stated that chairs would be provided. Members agreed to buy their own admission tickets as a donation to the club.

A list of the members interested in short weekday birding trips was available. Members were encouraged to add their names to this list if they want to be called about weekday outings.

As recommended by the board, Betty Mason moved that we donate \$300 to the Baton Rouge Audubon Society this year, and that an annual contribution, to be determined each year on the basis of the status of the treasury, be made to defray costs of the purchase of the Holleyman Sanctuary. The motion was seconded and passed by the membership.

As recommended by the board, Larry moved that a \$100 donation be made to the Caroline Dormon Nature Preserve, and that a donation be made annually with the amount to be determined each year based on the status of the treasury. The motion was seconded and approved by the membership.

Paul Dickson then reported on the status of the Christmas Bird Counts. He stated that he had received a letter from Bruce Crider of the Baton Rouge Audubon Society asking us to consider having a bird-a-thon in conjunction with the Christmas Bird Counts to help pay off the Holleyman Sanctuary debt. Members of the BSG would collect pledges for the number of species seen on the count, usually 95-100 species. The Baton Rouge Audubon Society would then collect the pledges and return 50%

of the money back to our group.

The members felt that the \$300 donation is sufficient for now, but that we will consider having a bird-a-thon to raise money in the spring.

Paul reported that the Shreveport count will probably be the Saturday before Christmas, and that the Bossier count will be on December 29. He will provide more detailed information at the November meeting.

Betty gave the treasurer's report. We had a balance on 11 September of \$1,249.70. Our income this month was \$399.60 (primarily from memberships), and our expenses were \$47.91, leaving us with a balance of \$1,601.39. Betty also reported that we have \$145.47 on deposit at the post office. Our bulk mailing permit fee will have to be paid again in the near future.

Will reminded everyone that many BSG memberships are due to be renewed in September. Dr. Speairs reminded the members of the Arkansas Audubon Society meeting October 26 - 28 at Lake Chicot State Park.

The October 20 field trip to the James Bayou Natural Area will depart from the Whata-Burger on North Market at I-220 at 8:00 A.M.

Mac introduced Dr. James Ingold, a new faculty member at LSUS. Dr. Ingold is a native of the northeast and has been actively involved in research involving the use of birdbanding. Dr. Ingold presented a program on "A Bird in the Hand is Worth Two in the Bush: Travels of a Mist Net Biologist."

Jim provided an interesting and informative talk on various research projects he has participated in that involved the use of birdbanding. He also discussed his findings to date on the release calls and distress calls of birds caught in mist nets.

Larry reminded everyone that Marilyn Kircus, who now lives in Houston, wants to lead a group down to the Texas coast around Christmas for a birding outing. Will suggested that the information be placed in the next newsletter so that those interested can contact Marilyn directly.

The meeting adjourned at 8:45 P.M.

FIRST BROAD-BILLED HUMMINGBIRD IN LA!

A Broad-billed Hummingbird was seen on 2nd and 3rd of November, 1990, in the back yard of Nancy Newfield, 3016 45th Street, Metarie, Louisiana (504, 835-3882). It was an adult male feeding on flowering exotic plants; it was not visiting a hummingbird feeder. This is the first record for Louisiana.


WATCH FOR BANDS!!!





QUILT TICKETS



FIELD TRIPS

Mark your calendars now for these BSG field trips that are scheduled. These are good times to learn more about birding and to sharpen your skills at identifying those species that are seen less frequently.

February 16, 7:30 AM -- Meet in the parking lot by the Museum at LSUS to carpool to Cheneyville to see Sandhill Cranes. also will proceed to Catahoula Wildlife Refuge for shorebirds, etc. (Last year on this trip a Burrowing Owl and Golden Eagle were seen!).

February 23, 8:30 AM -- Meet at the Whataburger on LA hwy 1, north of I-220. We will carpool to the catfish ponds north on LA 1, then proceed to several stops along North Lakeshore Drive, then on the Walter Jacob's Nature Park.

March 16, 8:30 AM -- Meet in the LSUS parking lot near the Museum to carpool to Pat Sewell's farm on Red River. There we will visit sand bars, cypress swamp, woods edge, and old field habitats.

April 6, 8:30 AM -- Meet at the horse barn in Bickham-Dickson park. We will look for shorebirds along the river and possibly find migrating warblers in the woods.

April 27-28 -- The LOS meeting will be in Cameron. This is always an overwhelming outing during spring migration.

May -- The date will be announced later for our annual Big Day of birding at Loggy Bayou Plantation. Details will come later.

NESTING STRUCURES FOR BIRDS -- Ed Bitowski

The bird houses as made for our gift shop have a floor size of 4"x4", sides are 9 high; however, the entrance hole size will

vary to suit the bird to be housed:

- 7/8" to 1" diameter for House Wren
 1 1/4" diameter hole will accommodate Tufted Titmouse, Carolina Chickadee, and other small birds.
- 1 1/2" diameter hole is for a Carolina Wren, Eastern Bluebird, Tree Swallow.

NOTE: A large entrance hole will encourage European Starlings to occupy the premises.

The entrance hole to be 6" above the floor. This is to emulate the old woodpecker nest hole. The bird will fill the entire cavity up to this hole. Place suitable nesting material in the area around your bird

The house should be located 10 to 15 feet above ground level.

To house larger birds the houses will have larger floor area, sides will be higher and hole to be of an appropriate size to take a bigger body.

When birds are finished breeding remove the door and all nesting material. Do not replace door as this will encourage squirrel habitation and or bumble bees, as I experienced.

Failure to attract feathered friends may be attributed to the following faults:

- 1. Entrance hole too small for the birds desired.
 - Boxes put up in dense woods.
- 3. Boxes placed in trees and are made accessible to the birds' enemies.

Houses placed on poles will be more acceptable because they look safer.

Bird houses made of wood are a more natural habitat; however, tin cans, plastic jugs, drain spouts have been used. items will become intensely hot in the sun. A house should be durable, rain proof, cool and readily accessible for cleaning. Do not paint in gaudy bright colors. Dark stain is best, but should age prior to using the house.

The meeting was called to order at 7:05 P.M. by President Will Smolenski. Will had several pictures of the Bald Eagle quilt that he made available to anyone needing them to help sell more raffle tickets.

Will gave the treasurer's report for Betty Mason. The group had income since the last meeting of \$170.00, and expenses of \$103.56, leaving a January balance of \$1,293.04. The post office balance is \$93.30.

Will then asked for additions or corrections to the minutes that were published in the newsletter. There were none and the minutes were accepted as recorded.

Ed Bitowski announced that more raffle tickets for the Bald Eagle quilt are available to sell for our fundraising activity. He also showed the group examples of 20 birdhouses available for \$5.00/house and squirrel guards for sale for \$1.00 each. Will provided a tennis ball free of charge with each squirrel guard purchase to serve as a pivot for the guard.

Larry Raymond reported on the progress of the Birding Hotspots guide that he and Jim McCain are compiling. He asked members to send him checklists of birds seen at the locations he listed and also to provide any comments or suggestions they may have. The locations being considered at this time are Bickham Dickson Park, Bodcau Wildlife Management Area, Catfish ponds (U.S. 71), Clyde Fant Parkway, Ford Park, James Bayou Natural Area, Loggy Bayou Wildlife Management Area, Red River Experiment Station, Richard Fleming Park, Twelve Mile Bayou at La. 173, Wallace Lake Dam, Walter B. Jacobs Memorial Nature Park, Yearwood Road, and the LSUS campus (suggested by Mac Hardy at the meeting).

Shirley Huss reported that she has sent membership reminders. Will asked everyone to think of others who might be interested in our group and give their names and addresses to Shirley.

The upcoming field trips were discussed. Shirley will lead a trip to Yearwood Road on Saturday, January 12. Pariticipants will meet at Bill Hall's house at 313 Wildoak Drive at 8:30 A.M. and carpool from there.

An outing to the Red River Experiment Station is scheduled for Saturday, January 26. Participants will depart from the LSUS parking lot by the museum at 8:00 A.M.

Will reminded members that they can add their names to the phone tree and weekday birding lists if they are interested.

Will noted that 105 species (possibly 106) and 28,724 birds were seen on the Bossier/Caddo/Bienville Christmas Bird Count. Nine teams birded for 77 hours on the count. Paul Dickson had the highest individual species list with 71 species seen. Thirty percent of the birds recorded were Doublecrested cormorants.

Ninety-seven species were seen by fifteen birders on the Shreveport Christmas Bird Count according to Charles Lyon.

Larry informed the group that he has information on a winter Bald Eagle survey between 3 and 17 January if anyone is interested. Please report any eagles seen between these dates to Larry.

Mac reminded everyone of the Loggerhead shrike census and encouraged birders to observe shrikes carefully for the presence of color bands.

Rosemary Seidler reported on the New Orleans and Reserve Christmas Bird Counts which she participated in this year. According to Rosemary, 133 species were seen on the New Orleans count.

Charles Lyon introduced Dr. Michael Monsour who presented the program on "Racing and Breeding Pigeons." Dr. Monsour discussed many aspects of keeping and racing pigeons and showed the group of about 25 members several of his birds.

The meeting adjourned at 8:42 P.M.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Spring is almost here and large numbers of migratory birds will be passing through our area again. Now is the time to get in a lot of BIRDING. Do not pass up the opportunities to sight some unusual or rare birds. Some Purple Martin scouts have already been sighted. The warblers should be coming through in droves with some of these staying for the Summer. Be early, alert,

patient, and rediscover an old or new feathered friend.

In later February I saw two birds on the ground by my feeders. They were all black except for pinkish tips on the wing coverts and a pink line over the eye. They were smaller than Common Grackles, about the size of a Red-winged Blackbird, but I saw no red

shoulder patch. The breast was solid black with no streaking as in the female. I hopefully thought that I had spotted an ususal intruder; but after checking my National Geographic Field Guide my excitement subsided and I realized that my find was an immature male Red-winged Blackbird with no shoulder patch showing yet. Even when we see common birds, variations in color make us stop, think, and use references to make good identifications.

FIELD TRIPS

Mark your calendars now for these BSG field trips that are scheduled. These are good times to learn more about birding and to sharpen your skills at identifying those species that are seen less frequently.

March 16, 8:30 AM -- Meet in the LSUS parking lot near the Museum to carpool to Pat Sewell's farm on Red River. There we will visit sand bars, cypress swamp, woods edge, and old field habitats.

April 6, 8:30 AM -- Meet at the horse barn in Bickham-Dickson park. We will look for shorebirds along the river and possibly find migrating warblers in the woods.

April 27-28 -- The LOS meeting will be in Cameron. This is always an overwhelming outing during spring migration.

OUTINGS

SANDHILL CRANES -- On Saturday, February 16, about 15 eager birders met on the LSUS parking lot and "van-pooled" down to Mr. Phillip Wemple's rice farm near Cheneyville. After a coffee and pie stop at Lea's, we arrived at Mr. Wemple's about 10 AM. Wemple was an eager and gracious host, leading us onto his farm roads and giving detailed directions of "where-to-go-to-seewhat." Happily, the farm roads were all dry and easily passable, and we were given complete liberty to roam the entire 5,000 acre farm in any direction and for as long as we liked. The numerous shallow ponds, wood margins, and great expanses of open fields were wonderful birding grounds. The highlight of the trip was, of course, the magnificent Sandhill Cranes. Great flocks of them were feeding in the fields and flying overhead and our final count approached 300! Their cautious feeding behavior would not allow approach closer than several hundred yards, but the several spotting scopes available within the group helped bring them "up close." The rest of the day, for me, was pure lagniappe. We were treated to large numbers of ducks and geese, shorebirds (more Dowitchers than I ever saw before), winter warblers, hawks, Water Pipits, Great Egrets, and even one White Ibis.

Late in the afternoon the majority of us "folded" and headed for home. There were, however, some real birders among us who headed on over to the "Delta Farms" area of the Catahoula Wildlife Management Area. They had continued good luck, seeing flocks of thousands of geese (including Lesser Canadians, Snows and Blues, and Greater White-fronted Geese) and ducks. They also found Sprague's Pipit and had the rare privilege of seeing and hearing an American Woodcock perform his aerial courtship display. Check the Bird List for the complete listing of all the species we saw.

NORTH SHREVEPORT TRIP -- On the next Saturday mourning, the 23rd, eleven birders met and made their first stop at the catfish ponds on LA 71 north of town. There they were treated to a sighting of Buffleheads and Hooded Mergansers on the same pond, for a good opportunity to compare the two side-by-side. They then moved on up to Walter Jacobs Nature Park for Pine Warblers, Purple Finches, and White-breasted Nuthatches. Next on the 'circuit" was Richard Flemming Park and Mallard Bay where they picked up Red-headed Woodpecker, LeConte's Sparrow, Sedge Wren, and Winter Wren. Then on the way out, the flooded area along the road near the I-220 bridge treated everyone to American Wigeon, Common Goldeneye, Blue-winged Teal, Greenwinged Teal, and the good ol' gorgeous Bald Eagle!

UPCOMING MARCH TRIP -- On the 16th we will be meeting at the LSUS parking lot once again (at 8:30 AM) and will be car-pooling down to Pat Sewell's river farmland. This will be an exploratory trip for me, but Pat has regaled me with mouth-watering tales of the species he has seen there and I have great expectations. With all the varied habitats to be found there we're bound to have a good time "looking around" even if we don't see a We can expect to see and explore shorelines of wooded cypress lakes, open oxbow lakes, woods and woods margins, open fields, old fields, river and sandbar habitats. With our typical spring rains, however, be prepared in case the farm roads are impassable. That would mean bring boots and anticipate a two to three mile round-trip walk. [For those who have to limit their walking there probably will be excellent birding near the cars] It should be good exercise, good company, lots of beautiful habitat, and good birding in a new area. MINUTES of the BOARD MEETING

The Board met on Tuesday, February 5, 1991, at the home of Ed and Shirley Huss. Board members present were Bill Hall, Mac Hardy, Shirley Huss, Charles Lyon, Betty Mason, Jim McCain, Jr., Larry Raymond, Dick Rolandt, Rosemary Seidler, Will Smolenski, and Bobbe Wommack. President Will Smolenski called the meeting to order at 7:08 P.M.

A copy of the February newsletter was distributed to the members present. Will asked for any additions or corrections to the minutes as recorded in the newsletter. There were none and the minutes were approved as printed.

Betty Mason gave the treasurer's report. The balance in the treasury on January 8 was \$1,293.04. We had income of \$30.00 and no expenses leaving a balance of \$1,323.04. Our balance on deposit at the post office is \$93.30.

Bill Hall reported on the upcoming field trips which are listed in the February newsletter. We will meet in the parking lot by the Museum at LSUS on Saturday, 16 February, to carpool to Cheneyville to see Sandhill Cranes. Bill has contacted the appropriate private landowners and received permission to come and see the birds. In addition to the cranes, geese, ducks, and shorebirds should be seen. Bill encouraged those participating to bring food and drink because there may not be a store near the area.

Bill noted that a leader is needed for the February 23 field trip to the catfish ponds, North Lakeshore Drive, and Walter Jacobs Nature Park. Mac Hardy volunteered to lead the group which will meet at 8:30 A.M. at the Whataburger on LA Hwy 1, north of I-220. The other field trips are listed in the February newsletter.

Charles Lyon gave a report on upcoming programs. Jim McCain will present the February program. He will show slides of birds and conduct a "Birding Identification Assessment". Tara McCartney of Monroe will present the March program on "Birds of Costa Rica", and Cecil Kirsting of New Orleans will present "Birds of the Antarctic" in April.

A pair of Inca Doves have been seen in Oil City on 24 March 1991. Mr. Lamar Fruge saw the doves feeding on the ground in his front yard. He saw several mating attempts and has seen both birds on several occassions. Clyde Massey photographed them on the 24th and Larry Raymond and Mac Hardy saw one bird on several occassions on the 25th. This is a good record for the state.

Anyone who sees the birds should fill out a record card so we can thoroughly document their occurrence in this area.

From Shreveport via La. hwy. 1, turn left on Kathy St. (just across the highway from the Pentacostal Church), go about one block to 143 Kathy. The doves feed on the parking area in front of a white house and silver house trailer on the left side of the street. There is a large cedar tree next to the street with a white wind ornament hanging from the tree and a red Snoopy wind ornament

stuck in the ground under the tree. Mr. Fruge (phone 995-7135) welcomes birders.

Mac Hardy noted that the Museum is actually open every weekday from 8:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M., except when he is in class and no one is around to man the facility.

Will reported that the month of April is Earth Month and a number of activities have been scheduled to celebrate the occasion. A Glad Bag-a-Thon will be held from March 31 through April 6. This city wide cleanup and beautification project is sponsored by Glad Trash Bags and Shreveport Green. On April 14, Jean-Michel Cousteau will talk at the Strand Theater. A lecture series is also being held on the LSUS campus. An Barth Day Mall will be held on the LSUS campus in conjunction with the celebration of Earth Day. Will asked if we would be

Will reported that the Louisiana Nature Conservancy will have its annual meeting on April 13 in the Kisatchie National Forest.

Betty read a letter from Bruce Crider of the Baton Rouge Audubon Society concerning several recent memorial gifts in memory of Vera Lee Grubbs. The letter stated that the contributors have been thanked and the gifts have been acknowledged to Mr. Glen Grubbs. Those who sent gifts were Bud and Carol Foster, Edwin and Shirley Huss, and Pat Lonnecker. Bruce also thanked the Bird Study Group for its support of the Henshaw and Holleyma-Sheely Sancturaries in Cameron. If anyone else wishes to make a memorial contribution in the name of Vera Lee Grubbs. Betty can be contacted for the address of the Baton Rouge Audubon Society.

Charlie Lyon introduced Tara McCartney of Monroe who presented the program on the "Birds of Costa Rica". Charlie pointed out that Tara is the new secretary-treasurer of the Louisiana Ornithological Society. According to Charlie, Tara spent several months in Costa Rica and is planning to return.

Tara reported that she spent six months in Costa Rica working as a resident naturalist guiding tourists. As such, she learned a great deal about the flora and fauna of Costa Rica which she shared with the group.



MINUTES of the LAST MEETING

The regular monthly meeting of the SSNS Bird Study Group was held Tuesday, 9 April 1991, in Room 229 of the Science Building on the LSUS campus. The meeting was called to order at 7:11 P.M. by President Will Smolenski. Will asked new members and guests to stand and be recognized.

Will asked for additions or corrections to the minutes in the April newsletter. There being none, the minutes were accepted as recorded.

Betty Mason reported a previous balance in the treasury of \$1,571.06. We had income this month of \$165.00 and expenses of \$200.00 to the post office, leaving an April balance of \$1,536.06.

Will announced that the election for new board members will be held next month. Mac

Hardy is taking nominations and will be calling people and asking them to serve.

The "Big Day" field trip will be held on Saturday, May 11, at Loggy Bayou Plantation. Paul Dickson hopes to provide crawfish from his ponds, but will need to buy them if he does not have any. For example: 15 PD 3; BW 1,5) means that on the fifteenth PD saw 3 birds, BW saw 1 at one locality and 5 at another. For the number of birds observed, a one is used both for one specimen or for numbers not reported by the observer. Two (or more) numbers following an observer are numbers of birds seen at two (or more) different localities. The month is abbreviated only if it is the month preceding the one being reported.





MINUTES of the LAST MEETING

The regular monthly meeting of the SSNS Bird Study Group was held Tuesday, 14 May 1991, in Room 229 of the Science Building on the LSUS campus. The meeting was called to order at 7:06 P.M. by President Will Smolenski. Will recognized visitors and guests at the meeting.

Will asked for additions or corrections to the minutes as published in the May newsletter. There being none, the minutes were accepted as recorded.

Will announced that elections of new board members to serve three-year terms would be held. The five members nominated to fill the five vacancies were Norma Cobb, Hubert Hervey, Jim Ingold, Betty Mason and Caroline Upchurch. Will asked for other nominations from the floor. There were no other nominations. A motion to elect the five nominees was made and passed unanimously.

Will reported income in April of \$126.00, and expenses of \$34.79, leaving a May balance of \$1,627.27. The balance in the post office account is \$214.20.

Bill Hall reported on the Birding "Big Day" at Paul Dickson's Loggy Bayou Plantation. Due to high water and a scarcity of water and shore birds, only seventy-one species were recorded. However, a large group of about 30 to 40 birders enjoyed the outing and the good food. The highlight of the meal was the delicious crawfish provided by Paul. Another highlight was the opportunity to help Jim Ingold net and band birds, including several species of migrants, as well as summer residents.

Shirley Huss reported that the membership is somewhere between 135 to 140 paid members. Mac Hardy reminded everyone to check their newsletter mailing labels to see if it is time to renew memberships. Mac also asked that members let him know what other things they would like in the newsletter.

Bill Hall reminded members of the June 22 field trip to see the cattle egret rookery on Cross Lake. He reported that a Great Blue Heron rookery is on Wallace Lake and might also make an interesting field trip. The members decided to go to Wallace Lake instead of Cross Lake. Participants in this trip will meet at the McDonald's on Linwood and Bert Kouns at 7:30 A.M. Hubert Hervey will lead this outing.

The June 1 field trip to the Kisatchie National Forest will be led by Charlie Lyon. See the May newsletter for details of this field trip.

Velda Neilson gave a report on the LOS meeting in Cameron. The LOS group total was 212 species seen. Velda's group, led by Hubert Hervey, recorded 163 species.

Hubert gave a report on birds seen at Clear Lake east of Mansfield. A Peregrine Falcon and possible nesting Black-crowned Night Herons have been seen on the lake.

Larry Raymond reported that the Caddo Parish Commission passed an ordinance protecting native song and insectivorous birds. The ordinance will go into effect around June 1.

Several door prizes were awarded to members in attendance. Winners included both Mr. and Mrs. Ashley, Caroline Upchurch, and Hubert Hervey.

Will introduced Dr. Jim Ingold who presented the program on the "Evolutionary History of Cranes." Jim discussed protein electrophoresis, DNA hybridization studies, and other aspects of his college research on crane evolution.

The meeting adjourned at 8:16 P.M.

WHAT'S NEW IN ORNITHOLOGY?

I had the opportunity to attend a joint meeting of the Wilson and Cooper Ornithological Societies in Oklahoma City 14-19 May. Here I present some of the information gleaned from the presentations.

William Baltosser from the University of Arkansas - Little Rock presented information on the Black-chinned Hummingbird (Archilochus alexandri). He has found that there are two populations that differ in size. The smaller southern population is found mainly in Mexico while the larger birds are found in the rest of the species range in the United States. The smaller birds are the same size as Rubythroated Hummingbirds and can be mistaken for them, especially the females and immature males. It is interesting to note that the small race is the one that shows up in Louisiana! Baltosser was able to tell the small Black-chinned and Ruby-throated Hummingbirds apart by the shape of the outermost primary. Keep on the look out this fall for small Black-chinned Hummingbirds.

Holly Edwards of the University of Oklahoma presented evidence that birds can be magnetized. The site for this magetization is in the head and neck. How the magnetic material is laid down in the tissues and its specific location is not known. Daytime migrants such as the Chimmney Swift and the Cliff Swallow have lesser amounts that do birds such as the Bobwhite and House Sparrow.

Kevin Winkler of the University of Minnesota and his collaborators examined the behavior of wintering Wood Thrushes in Veracruz, Mexico. There are two classes of migrants: sedentary ones who maintain a winter territory and wanderers. The wanderers are usually fatter but have a higher mortality due to predation. They suggest that winter territories in the Wood Thrush is an anti-predator behavior and not a method to maintian a reliable food supply.

Kimberly Smith of the University of Arkansas and R. Craig Hensley of Dodge Nature Center in St Paul, Mn created a new breeding population of Eastern Bluebirds in Arkansas by starting a bluebird trail. They monitored the sex ratio of the mutiple broods and found

that latter broods had a higher ratio of females to males. Is this a way to increase the size of the population? How do birds determine the sex of their offspring?

Colleen St. Clair and Timothy Lamey presented information on breeding biology of the crested penguins (Eudyptes). This group of penguins lay two eggs. However the second egg may be up to 50% larger than the first. Although the first egg is incubated before the second egg is laid, the second egg always hatches first and this nestling is always bigger and usually more successful. Why the disparity in egg size? Why does the second egg hatch first? No one knows at this time!

Charles Amlaner of the University of Arkansas presented the most interesting paper. It has been know that in sleeping marine mammals, only part of the brain shows sleep waves and the other part shows brain waves typical of the aroused state, this is called unihemispheric sleep. This may permit these animals to sleep during long distance migrations let still swim and breathe. Something similar had been described in some It had been noted that while sleeping, birds will open one eye for a short time, close it and then open the other eye. Amlaner surgically implanted electrodes into the brains of three species of birds. He found that when the right eye is open the left side of the brain is showing the brain waves of an alert brain while the right side of the brain is showing sleep waves. When the right eye is closed and the left eye was opened, the brain changed the type of waves is was producing. Therefore he has shown that birds can sleep with only "half a brain." Do birds sleep while flying on long distance migrations? Maybe!!!
