A River Bottom Diary

Part 9

It is humid, summer air that hangs in the predawn as the pickup rolls down the farm road. It comes in the window like waves softly lapping at a shore. Gravel pops under the braking tires and after a final groan the pickup is still. It is a bit too dark to work yet and my morning coffee is still too hot to drink. In the ditch, the tangle of summer vines is a dark mass blended with the towering wall of giant ragweed. The trumpet flowers are only faintly visible in growing gray light. Across the pasture a young great horned owl gives his rasping screech from the far line of pecan trees to the east. His night of wreaking havoc amongst the young animals of the season is over. His call first tears the silence and then is softly swallowed by it. Stillness owns this fleeting moment at the end of night.

The trumpet vine flowers begin to show red as the first long rays yield warm, dim color to the birthing dawn. The jagged palmate leaves of the ragweed are silhouetted as a rosy glow begins to spread across the eastern sky. The pecan trees that hold the owl cut a black ragged edge in the growing horizon. Overhead the darkness is now fleeing to the west as the flow of light strengthens and routs the stars. A single killdeer calls. The defeated night retreats to the western horizon to await in hiding for its next reign to come. I sip at the coffee, its vapor drifts downward.

All is still. Gradually more birds add their song to the morning chorus: cardinals, buntings, a kingbird. The overhead call of a dowitcher floats down with the swift migrant, as it streaks by to light on the now visible edge of the marsh. The owl floats over the pasture heading west in silence. He seeks a refuge from the sun, as did

the night. He will hide in the cypress brake until his time returns lest the kingbird should wreak havoc with him.

Stillness still reigns. The dawn is hazy and serene. The heavy summer air is visible now as a soft, wet blanket that hangs over the pasture, fading the once sharp edges of the far treeline into a milky haze. Its weight once felt, is now seen in its surrender. Unable to hold itself up it has relinquished to the grass a dew and transformed a thousand hidden webs into a morning wonder. Each strand is now a sparkling string of diamonds that catch the erratic rays. The webs now exposed display their marvelous symmetry. Briefly taking leave the spiders' violent trap becomes nature's art and heralds the rise of the sun.

The eastern sky is engulfed in a storm tide of glowing color as the sun finally arrives; a blood red orb, lethargic but steady in its rise. It seems to float momentarily in the haze, then pull itself above the treeline with a heaving effort to finally take its full round form and at once the day is come. My coffee is drinkable now.

A flock of western sandpipers follows the dowitcher to the mud flat. One is giving a rare call "curleep" and the more common piping trill "breep-breep-breep." The surface of the marsh is now a mirror to the sunrise.

Summer mornings like this are pleasant but brief. The birds are active now and the farm's deer and horses all eagerly graze. I too should get busy during this coolest moment of the day but my coffee is still half a cup yet. A trio of doves darts across the road and with three measured, braking motions of their soft wings; they deftly alight. They pick gravel from the road in preparation of the day's grain.

The sun is warming now and the day is wide open. I take the last of the lukewarm coffee in a gulp. The crickets and katydids begin their chorus. They hum like rural electric lines. A red-headed woodpecker's rattle announces its arrival at a favorite tall fence post. A flock of red wing blackbirds in somber molt swirls over the recently harvested cornfield. I am reminded that much the same sight at planting time gave me concern. At harvest, skips in the rows betrayed these raids. Now young blackbirds, the progeny

of those seed corn raiders take the spilled surplus of the recent harvest. I would rather see it go to the doves but there is no concern now, only fascination at this little circle of events.

The sun has made it to twice the treeline's edge and the coolness of the morning is gone. It is hot and the birds seem to quiet a bit. The rhythmic duet of a carolina wren and a red bellied woodpecker are all that breaks the steady drone of the insects. The dew is gone now; time to cut hay.

The tractor begins its passes through the hayfield, cutting neat swaths in the waving grass. Flocks of cattle egrets now pour from their roost in the flooded willows along the river to the northeast. Spotting the tractor activity they drop from the sky like falling leaves. On deeply cupped wings they hone in, excited by the harvest laid before them.

Cattle egrets are indeed the farmer's friend. The arrangement is mutual. The tractor and pastures made a place at the table for the cattle The egret cleans the field of the egret. grasshoppers that would take the next crop of hay. Most farmers would admit to one more reason to call the egret a friend. They are amusing companions as back and forth the tractor goes. Unafraid of the roaring machine they follow, darting under the wheels looping over the cutter and around the hood, seeking the latest prize to land before their hungry beaks. They are fascinating to watch, actively feeding, so close. Grasshoppers are the mainstay. As the stands of grass become more fragmented, hispid cotton rats begin to appear. Terrified, they dash for another refuge but meet a stiletto instead. The little egrets take all but the largest in a single gulp. Always there is a contest for a rat. Usually it must pass through several beaks before a successful claim is laid. Occasionally the cutter doles out a prize more equitably, in pieces which are shared by all. Soon two coyotes appear to join the feast. Though shy of a human form they show no fear of the tractor with its enclosed cab and come quite near it. The dog is almost hairless this time of year. The smaller bitch looks somewhat better but both are a motley sight. They gobble up grasshoppers with relish but soon become preoccupied with searching out rats. All the preoccupied with searching out rats. while the egrets keep a wary eye.

The males are still resplendent in their breeding

dress. Bold rusty crowns and plumes trim their cloak of white. Their legs have lost the brick red of June but their bills are still a pastel blend of peach, pink, and rose. Much of this color will soon fade as young birds now fill the flock signaling the breeding season's end. They bob, duck and hop about like the cascades of a stream gamboling around the tractor all the while. Some leave now; hunger satisfied they head for the marsh to drink, meanwhile more arrive. Behind one flock are two young white ibis. They forget their prior destination, probably the marsh, and get caught up in the frenzy in the hay field. Imitating the egrets they cup their wings and drop into the hay field only to look clumsy and out of place. In their life of weeks they have not yet learned completely what it is to be an ibis. Immature white ibis usually flock together without adults, thus nothing has told them that they should not try to feed like cattle egrets. They awkwardly stab about, their scimitar bills fumbling amongst the grasshoppers. They seem to capture a few but are ill suited to the task. After a short time the lesson is learned; egrets they are not. Together they leave for the marsh where nature has intended for them to probe. Mowing completed, I stop the tractor and step out of the cab. The coyotes freeze in terror. A man has emerged from the benevolent tractor! They both spin, kicking hay behind them they bolt with all their speed to the nearest tall grass, into which they plunge headlong.. They no doubt counted this as a near brush with death. The egrets first move off a bit and then scatter over the newly cut field.

The doves are leaving the cornfield now and nearby a fledged one sits on the top strand of the fence. Next to it sits a young blackbird. redwing is mouse gray all over, much like a cowbird save for a rough patch of black that gives it away as a young male. The dove teeters on the fence strand constantly. It has not yet mastered this skill of perching upon a wire or perhaps there are still muscles to be developed. The strapping dove looks as if it will fall any minute. Each breeze brings on a teeter back and a correction forth, head bobbing up and down. I'm glad it has the cornfield; it needs the energy. Both birds are naive and tame. They allow me to stop beside them in the truck not six feet away. I enjoy the rare chance to view them so closely. The doves' feathers are penciled with neat scallops. cloak is its first plumage which it will soon lose, likewise I presume, it will gain its balance.

It is mid-day. As I head in for respite from the searing heat an Olive-sided Flycatcher hawks insects from a dead oak limb. The thought of this migrant's cool northern conifer forest just abandoned gives a bit of relief itself. I wonder why it left there, to come here now to sit in the mid-day sun. Mad dogs, Englishmen, and Olive-sided flycatchers? Nature can be quite a puzzle.

After a break I return to the farm to find it under the full crush of the summer sun. A slight breeze makes the heat bearable but it is unrelenting this time of year. Every warmblooded thing has sought shade or water. Pausing at my morning coffee spot I am reminded of the bounty that all this sunlight provides. The fence row tangle, only a dark mass this morning is as beautiful as any garden in its diversity. The old barbed strands have protected the woody species. Only grass grows where the mower can reach, but here in this neglected spot, nature is allowed to freely paint. Possum grapes wrap the strands and follow up a sugar berry sapling. Trumpet vines radiate out from their bushy bases with sprays of orange red trumpet shaped flowers, thick walled and loaded with nectar. Hummingbirds buzz about enjoying the sweet juice and pollinating the flower at once. A female darts in and out, tail bobbing up and down, but stiffened while in a Darting about in the characteristically hyperactive way she checks a dozen flowers in a moment then alights on a tiny leafless twig at the top of the fence row. The twig sways slightly. The fence row is hers for the moment. She no doubt finds plenty of insects there as well. A dozen species of vines and shrubs grow here and thrive in the summer heat. Their diversity and vigor provide a good habitat for those that live amongst the tangle.

The kingbird stakes a larger claim. The fierce little warrior is now feeding on some newly plowed ground, catching insects on the exposed clods. He flies to perch in a low tree. His ownership extends as far as his mood dictates. Unafraid he will harass the most deadly of predators merely for spite. He is no larger than the starlings feeding amongst the corn stubble nearby, but his spirit has no equal in the avian world. It is so strong as to banish the great horned owl to the shadows.

A crow swoops into the cornfield, intent on an easy afternoon meal. He fails to hear the battle

cry of the kingbird. The rattling call signals the attack as the kingbird lifts off the limb and seeks his target. There will be no easy meal for the crow. Streaking down upon his newly chosen enemy which barely has time to arise, the kingbird draws first blood. Flying low and fast as a crow can fly it tries to shake this demon. The crow banks left then right, swooping, vainly spinning to grasp and stab at its tormentor which it could kill with a single twist of its ebony vise, if only it could touch him. Empty space is all the crow's beak finds, but not the kingbird. Repeatedly his dives yield black feathers. The crow must give ground. Only by leaving the field can he escape this tiny terror. The kingbird returns to his perch triumphant.

In the dust of the road a coon has stopped during the night. Some treasure was found in the fence row. The tracks show where she sat. Smaller tracks to the side census her spring success. Coon tracks are fewer in mid-summer; the raccoon is less active this time of year. Just as they do in mid-winter, coons sleep more in summer and only feed sufficiently to take care of a lazy day's needs.

The afternoon heat has awakened the grasshoppers. The pasture is peppered with their dry rattlings as they advertise to one another in a timeless dance. Usually secretive and quick to leap away from approaching threats the male grasshopper now leaves his deep grass refuge and with wings popping a staccato song, hovers above the open ground in an undulating display. Suspended in the open he has thrown caution to the wind. Females below have noticed; so too has the kingbird. Mindful only of his own rattling wings he fails to see the coming danger until the hooked beak cuts short his moment of glory. The kingbird returns to his perch, triumphant again.

Mockingbirds seem unaffected by the afternoon heat. Several are perched on a fence strand. One is newly fledged with a ruffled appearance and body parts that don't seem to fit. An adult sails to the ground and begins flaring its white flagged wings. As it does so it watches the ground intently for insects that are flushed by the ploy. Rough-winged and barn swallows dip over the water of the "swimming hole," a small deep pond. A barn swallow passes by carrying a small white fecal sac. Young are still in the nest. As the afternoon slips by little else moves; the heat

stifles activity.

As the sun begins to slip to the western horizon it becomes deep amber then orange. The late afternoon haze is as a pool in which it slowly sinks. Sunset is still to come, yet the sun is being swallowed, not by the earth but by the thick belt of summer haze in which it must be immersed before it can truly set. With little fanfare it finally reaches the horizon, dull and tired but resplendent yet, it emblazens the entire breadth of the evening sky. As the sun finally disappears from sight the haze seems to ignite and illuminate as one mass save for fiery shafts which pierce its consistency like shards of splintered glass.

As the light fades, the day birds sing their last. The kingbird draws deeper into the osage orange bringing his body close to its sharp thorns. Within its thick canopy he will lay vulnerable to the darkness. As colors fade to gray a bat dances in the sky, then a nighthawk. Slowly stars fade in. The young great horned owl leaves the cypress brake and floats across the pasture. He alights on a tall post, his gaze intense, awake. The night is his. His rough shrieking call tears the silence of the twilight and then is softly swallowed by it. On wings of unmatched strength he lifts off the post and swiftly glides low across the pasture cloaked in silence. He passes the osage orange, searching intently for a flicker of motion from his evenings' first meal.

On to Southeastern Arizona

We drove to southeastern Arizona by May 15th this year. The Mexican birds that come there in summer sounded intriguing to John and I especially since they were different species generally from those we had enjoyed seeing along the Rio Grande in Texas. We had made reservations for a week in Sierra Vista, the central town to most of the hot spots, and two days reservations at the Southwestern Research Station of the American Museum of Natural History in the Chiricahua Mountains at Portal, Arizona.

It turned out to be a great trip with fabulous species to be seen. Instead of the Green Jay we

now became familiar with the Gray-breasted Jav. Instead of the Black-crested Titmouse. there were many Bridled Titmice. Rather than Audubon's and Altamira Orioles there were Hooded, Scott's, and Bullock's Orioles. Couche's Kingbird of Texas wasn't there, but the very similar Tropical and Cassin's Kingbirds were present. My favorite, the Great Kiskadee of Texas seemed to have changed to the Sulfurbellied Flycatcher. There wasn't even one Woodpecker, Golden-fronted but **Gila**, Strickland's, and Acorn Woodpeckers were common as well as Northern (red-shafted) Flickers. There were many more Vermillion Flycatchers there than at the Rio Grande.

Early the first morning we went to Mile High/Ramsey Canyon Preserve. The large willows, sycamores, and cottonwood trees were plentiful along the stream. Later we discovered that there were nice stands of willows and cottonwoods along most of the streams, creeks, and a river at other locations.

We spent some time at the humming-bird feeders at Mile High to observe the six species that were present that day. As we walked up the canyon someone pointed out a female Elegant Trogon as our next bird. Some other specials there were Red-faced Warblers, Olive Warblers, Painted Redstarts, Hepatic and Western Tanagers, and Black-headed Grosbeaks. Even a Wild Turkey wandered along the stream bed.

The next day we visited another Nature Conservancy Sanctuary, the Patagonia-Sonoita Creek Sanctuary. We sat on fallen trees along the creek and identified the many flycatchers by the field guide or with help from other birders. There were Brown-crested, Dusky-capped, Buffbreasted, Western, Vermillion, and Sulfurbellied Flycatchers as well as Say's Phoebes, Black Phoebes, Cassin's Kingbirds and Greater and Western Wood-Pewees. The Cactus and Rock Wrens were there and warblers such as Wilson's, Yellow, Virginia's, and Lucy's were seen. I had not seen a Lesser Goldfinch or a Gray Hawk before either. The next day we were on our way to Madera Canyon when we decided to go by the Patagonia Picnic Table Roadside Park. Supposedly the Rose-throated Becard is seen most often there but we didn't see it even

nesting. No one else saw one that morning. Thick-billed Kingbirds were nesting nearby though and John spotted two nests with busy Phainopeplas feeding their young above the picnic table area. Someone pointed out a Zonetailed Hawk and a Common Black Hawk. I watched two Canyon Wrens go into a hole in the rock wall.

Finally we started over the gravel road through a box canyon to Madera Canyon. This was not too difficult, but when we arrived we were not in the mood to walk the high trail in search of Elegant Trogons. We did enjoy the feeders at Santa Rita Lodge in the area. I saw my first Yellow-eyed Junco.

Other good birding spots around Sierra Vista are the canyons in the Huachuca Mountains and the banks along the San Pedro River. The Bureau of Land Management controls the San Pedro Riparian Conservation Area which extends north from the Mexican border for 40 miles. Along this river we saw Brown and Green-tailed Towhees. Familiar Yellow Warblers and Summer Tanagers were nesting there and we saw Bewick's Wrens, Bushtits, Warbling Vireos and Song Sparrows. What fun to share with other birders from across the country! We stayed in a cabin at Southwestern Research Station next to Canadian birders who shared information with us.

Near this lovely location everyone seemed to be walking up South Fork trail on Cave Creek in search of the **Elegant Trogon**. No one that I met had seen one that day. We didn't either but I did see a coati and some birds that had become common to us. Birding was better down the creek the next morning. We both saw the beautiful male **Elegant Trogon** at close range. John saw a pair of them and a male flew toward me and then perched in a tree where I could see him well. That was our last day in Southeastern Arizona and I want to go back.

BIRDING HOTSPOT No. 8 CROSS LAKE

This 8,575-acre lake is excellent for grebes, herons, egrets, ducks, gulls, terns and many other waterbirds. The high quality drinking water of Shreveport comes from Cross Lake, thus any pollution is unlikely. A permit to operate a boat is required and may be obtained from the Cross Lake Patrol which is located off South Lakeshore Drive. A municipal pier and public boat launch are nearby. For best results, birding by boat is recommended.

Cross Lake is mostly open water except on the west end, yet it is difficult to bird from shore because of a shortage of access areas. Most of the lake can be scoped by going to the following places. South side: 1) Progressive Men's Club (or bar near it) on Dilg League Drive, 2) Smith's Cross Lake Inn and Restaurant, 3) Willow Ridge Drive turnaround, 4) Municipal Pier, 5) Public Boat Launch, 6) Ford Park and boardwalk, 7) Barrons Landing (ask permission!) 8) Refuge Area north side: 9) The dam, 10) North Lakeshore Drive (both bridges and Mallard Bay), 11) Squirrel Point (both sides excellent), 12) Pine Island, 13) West Lakeshore Drive, and 13) Fleming Park finger.

Shreveport Bird Study Group has one or two barge trips each year on Cross Lake. This popular trip is one of the best ways to see the complete birdlife show of winter. We usually see Horned Grebe, Red-breasted Merganser, Canvasback, Common Loon, White Pelican, and Bald Eagle. Birds sometimes seen include Red-throated Loon, Eared Grebe, Western Grebe, Franklins Gull, Osprey, Brown Pelican, Greater Scaup, Redhead and Goldeneye. Measured by hundreds or thousands are Ring-billed Gulls, Ruddy Duck, and Double-crested Cormorants. Spring and Fall birding can be worthwhile and may yield unexpected results including shorebirds and raptors. Summer is generally routine but sandpipers may return from breeding grounds as early as mid-July.

- 1) **PROGRESSIVE MEN'S CLUB AREA**. -- Reach this site by traveling east on S. Lakeshore into Shreveport, turn left on Dilg League Drive. As the road bends hard right, a wooden building currently used as a bar is on the left. Drive to the rear and scope from the pier. This overlooks the only major mudflat on the lake and during migration, shorebirds may be numerous. The secluded cove is also a safe haven for nearly all the other birds that frequent the lake and are mentioned elsewhere. This is a must stop. The actual Progressive Men's Club building is only a short distance farther and some of the lake can also be seen from there.
- 2) SMITH'S CROSS LAKE INN & RESTAURANT. -- Drive past the building to parking area overlooking the lake. Good for Bufflehead and sometime eagles in the trees across the bay. Many other possibilities too.
- 3) BUZZARD ISLAND & WILLOW RIDGE DRIVE. -- Visible from the Willow Ridge Drive turnaround overlook the springtime rookery in the tree tops is spectacular. Large numbers of Great Blue Herons and Great Egrets nest here. Time spent behind a scope here may produce other secrets.

AROUND CROSS LAKE - SOUTH SIDE


6) FORD PARK. -- Ford Park is a large city-owned park on South Lakeshore Drive. The trees are mostly mature Loblolly Pine with bird life such as Pine Warblers and Brown-

headed Nuthatch common. Cypress trees line the lake shore with Prothonotary Warblers resting in woodpecker-made cavities. A boardwalk over a marshy area is worthwhile with waterlife study, coots, Pied-billed Grebe, Bufflehead, Ring-necked Duck, and Lesser Scaup. A small sandy beach sometimes attracts shorebirds/sandpipers. We have records for 170 species seen on Cross Lake or in the areas described in this account adjoining Cross Lake. More unusual birds include Tri-colored Heron, Surf Scoter, Merlin, Common Moorhen, Willet, Black-billed Cuckoo, Cliff Swallow, House, Winter and Bewicks Wren, White-breasted Nuthatch, Rusty Blackbird, Warbling Vireo and Blackpoll Warbler.

- 8) SOUTH LAKESHORE DRIVE REFUGE PAST BARRONS LANDING. -- This area is almost impossible to see into because of increasing vegetative growth. It is a favorite owling locale with Barred, Screech, and Great Horned Owls usual. Cross Lake also has had Barn Owls raise in Duck Blinds and the North shore was the winter abode of a Snowy Owl and a Long-eared Owl. Folks that is six Owl species, and we should probably do more owling around the lake. The refuge is a good Hooded Merganser area with Wood Ducks being common year round.
- 9) AROUND THE LAKE NORTH SIDE BELOW THE DAM & I-220 POOL. --Sometimes water rises below the dam and ducks settle here to avoid hunting pressure. Goldeneye, Redhead, Wigeon and teal may be seen. Cattails at the infamous I-220 bridge catastrophic spill collection basin have yielded Marsh Wren (rare here) and sandpipers in the concreted area. Be careful and watch for traffic here and anywhere around the lake. It is illegal to stop on any bridge. You may also set up a scope on either end of the dam and you may walk along the dam up to the spillway.
- 10) MALLARD BAY. -- This undeveloped subdivision is our winter sparrow mainstay. We hope it never develops. LeContes' Sparrow, Fox Sparrow, Sedge Wren and other grassland species mix with Pileated Woodpecker, towhees, and Hermit Thrush from the surrounding woodlands. I bet Henslow Sparrow could be turned up here too. Be sure to bird the nearby bridges on North Lakeshore Drive.
- 11) **SQUIRREL POINT.** -- An excellent view of most of the lake may be obtained by scoping from vacant lots both east and west. Warblers may abound. Neighbors may be curious. The automatic gate is a worry. As of 1995 we can still get in. Please buy a lot and give us continuing access! This is a favorite spot.
- 12) **PINE ISLAND**. -- Possible to bird landbirds and those waterbirds that favor shallow areas with cypress trees, moss, waterlilies and button willows.

AROUND CROSS LAKE - WEST

13) RICHARD FLEMING PARK. -- This small park on West Lakeshore Drive offers one unique feature of interest to birders. A finger of land on the south side of a bayou extends into the west end of Cross Lake. The vegetation here appeals to a variety of migrants and could well be considered a migrant trap. Osprey, Bald Eagles and Puddle ducks can be seen from the end if you are lucky. West Lakeshore Drive continuing past the park and ending in the lake is worth taking time to bird. It is the site of a Connecticut Warbler sighting pending review by the Louisiana Rare Bird Committee.



Extralimital Dates: $L_{\text{by Mac Hardy}}$ Wood Stork

This is the fifth in a series of reports on extralimital dates for migratory birds in our area. It is based exclusively on the Bird Study Group Bird Report data base. The intent of this series is to alert birders of the approximate arrival and departure dates of migrants (based on our data base) and of times during the year in need of better documentation. In some cases, permanent residents (PE) are included if annual data is incomplete. At least six dates (if available) are given for each species. For summer residents (SU) the first three dates are the earliest arrival dates in the spring and the last three dates are the latest departure dates in the fall. For winter residents (WI), the first three dates are the latest departure dates in the spring and the last three are the earliest arrival dates in the fall. The last column gives months for which additional data is needed. For non-resident migrants the first line (SP) contains the earliest three arrival and latest three departure dates for the spring and the second line (FA) gives the earliest arrival and latest departure dates for the fall migration. In some cases fewer than three dates are available for a given category. Accidentals (AC) contain only one or two records.

A River Bottom Diary

September Passage

Part 10

by Paul Dickson

A familiar call drifts with the first cool north wind under the fall September moon. It is a wavering, flute-like series of notes, musical and mysterious. It is a call familiar to me as it is to the Canadian farmer and the Argentine gaucho. For this place it is a song of September and of April, the song of a traveler, the call of the upland plover. The notes give me a start and I look up from my work with excitement to see the small speck in the blue sky. It moves from north to south, never pausing only announcing its passage and accenting the cool winds of fall. The excitement which the upland plover brings is not so much about the somber brown bird itself, but about the change of seasons and the aura of mystery that surrounds something so wild.

Current North American ornithology properly calls Bartramia longicauda by the common name of upland sandpiper, a change from the older upland plover. This correctly places the sleek, long legged bird with the sandpipers with whom it is most closely related. In its South American winter pastures it is called batitú, for its call. Upland plover is more poetic to my ear. The syllables roll off the tongue much as does the

graceful bird cloaked in basic brown, long in neck and wing. It stands tall in its preferred short grass pastures, and is swift and at home in the sky. It is handsome and completely unique in appearance. Unlike any other sandpiper, it carries itself with an aristocratic air and leaves the observer with the distinct impression that this is a special creation indeed. Perhaps its purpose on earth is to portray more than its existence alone.

As the bird disappears to the south another calls; migration is at hand. The second continues on its journey as well. Will they stop on the farm? Apparently not. Will they stop on this continent? Perhaps not. The pampas beckon. As they fade from my view the essence of Wild is revealed. How can we truly believe ourselves masters of the earth if we cannot by our own strength wing across the continent in a day, across the globe in a fortnight; and all with the grace of the wind in the great quiet of the blue sky such that a mellow call can startle the landlocked below. In such context our freedom seems an illusion and our power confined but that we could lift off at will and drift across the face of the With such grace the upland plover's somber plumes seem fitting, for what use are bright colors when one is so free.

Extralimital Dates: Ducks and Geese

This is the sixth in a series of reports on extralimital dates for migratory birds in our area. It is based exclusively on the Bird Study Group Bird Report data base. The intent of this series is to alert birders of the approximate arrival and departure dates of migrants (based on our data base) and of times during the year in need of better documentation. In some cases, permanent residents (PE) are included if annual data is incomplete. At least six dates (if available) are given for each species. For summer residents (SU) the first three dates are the earliest arrival dates in the spring and the last three dates are the latest departure dates in the fall. For winter residents (WI), the first three dates are the latest departure dates in the spring and the last three are the earliest arrival dates in the fall. The last column gives months for which additional data is needed. For non-resident migrants the first line (SP) contains the earliest three arrival and latest three departure dates for the spring and the second line (FA) gives the earliest arrival and latest departure dates for the fall migration. In some cases fewer than three dates are available for a given category. Accidentals (AC) contain only one or two records.

North Louisiana Rail Sightings

Birding via a rice combine is a relatively new method. It has been used for a number of years now in South Louisiana, but we have never tried it before in northern Louisiana. This is the best accepted method for finding Yellow Rails and to have a chance for seeing a Black Rail.

I have been birding the borrow pits along Interstate 49 at the Allen exit in Natchitoches Parish for a number of years, and the farmers there have been most cordial. This year I contacted Casey Messenger, who farms the area, and he gave me permission to ride a rice combine. His combine operator, Tony Leone, was exceptionally helpful and, without his assistance, none of the following sightings would be possible.

I called Roger Breedlove and he and I went out for a couple of hours on October 1, to ride the rice combine. In a short period of time and only covering a few acres, we uncovered 43 Soras, 17 Virginia Rails, and 8 Yellow Rails. This is the first Yellow Rail record for northern Louisiana and beats the previous early date for the state by 5 days.

I then went out again on October 2, with Jeff Trahan and Rosemary Seidler accompanying me. That day, we had 136 Soras, 10 Virginia Rails, and 1 King Rail. We did not see Yellow Rails. I, therefore, came out again October 7, and this time, Roger Breedlove came along, as did Horace Jeter. This proved to be an incredible day. We noted 115 Soras, 4 Virginia Rails, 3 King Rails, and 5 Yellow Rails. We then had 2 sightings of a Black Rail, and our only uncertainty was whether or not this was one or two individuals. This is the first record for Black Rail in northern Louisiana. It beats the earliest date in which the species has

been seen in Louisiana by about 1 month.

I then went out again on October 8, and brought Horace Jeter and Hubert Hervey along. On this occasion, we went through wetter fields and found 60 Soras, 44 Virginia Rails, and 2 King Rails. There were no Yellow Rails or Black Rails on this date. Roger Breedlove came that afternoon, brought Kermit Cummings along, and they found 76 Soras, 8 Virginia Rails, and 1 King Rail. They did not find a Yellow Rail or a Black Rail. I then came back on October 11, for a few hours with Bill Wood. On this occasion we found 49 Soras, 15 Virginia Rails, 1 King Rail, 1 Yellow Rail, and 1 brief sighting of what was possibly a Black Rail.

Our total number of sightings per species for all days was an incredible 479 Soras, 98 Virginia Rails, 8 King Rails, 14 Yellow Rails, and 1 or 2 Black Rails (Table 1). With these sightings, we have added two new species to the northern Louisiana avifauna. We have also altered statistics for the number of individuals of these species, as well as early dates of occurrence. I believe that birding by rice combine now has added a new dimension to birding in northern Louisiana.

A River Bottom Diary

Part 10

The snow white berries of the rough-leaved dogwood are abundant in October. bottomland tree is common along the bayous and wooded margins of the farm. The berries seem to disappear rapidly though, a testimonial to their The poison ivy berries are going, too. The table has been prepared and the guests are arriving. On October 20th two newly arrived Yellow-rumped Warblers feed actively on the now dried drupes. Ragweed has produced its crop of seeds by the expected arrival time of the Whitecrowned Sparrows. This year they were a few days late, at least to me, by the calendar. The first to arrive on the farm is a brightly marked adult on October 20th. That would be the 29th day after the equinox and the 26th day of the first fall moon. Such natural time keeping means more when nature is concerned than calendar dates alone. Migrant birds sometimes appear on, but never in front of calendars. Their cues are instead much the same as those that turn the leaves gold. They are complex cues. Some never vary, like the moon and day length, and others do, mainly the cold fronts of fall. Though variable from year to year the fronts do pass with a reasonable regularity that keeps the promise of autumn. It is a promise of cool north winds and crisp fall days with golden, quaking leaves. It is a promise of a new generation of old friends at the feeder and in the hedgerow. It is a promise of change.

Most people see fall through the turning of the trees. Indeed it is a favorite event for any of us in temperate climates. In the hills the harbinger is the blackgum. No leaf is more red, no tree more beautiful to my eye. The blackgum turns first when the other trees are still green and the ragweed is in bloom. It gives promise. In the river bottom the cottonwood is fine, in later fall its gold is always uniform, its leaves never linger but turn gold and then fall at once. It gives confirmation. I enjoy the trees as much as anyone but it is the birds that excite me with the message that fall has truly come.

The sight of a migrating osprey is a more immediate presager, promising colder weather and usually rain within hours. The osprey rides the front, at its head or in the turmoil of the trough itself he floats silhouetted most often against a leaden sky, angular, powerful, in control of his travels. On October 23rd one is cutting through a strong southerly wind. He has no need of tail wind, but his passing foretells that the cold front and north winds are only hours behind. Perhaps the low pressure ahead of the front makes the fishing better for the osprey as it does for the angler.

The song of the first White-crowned Sparrow confirms that fall is here and the weather is fine. The White-crowned Sparrow follows the front as do so many small birds. A dry front on the 19th left a north wind in its wake. The clear blue skies that next morning revealed that the night had been a busy one. With the sparrows were Rubycrowned Kinglets, a Winter Wren, and a Palm Warbler. Gone were the buntings and the Blue Grosbeaks. A few swallows of three species darted by and were gone, hurrying to catch their brethren; these were the last of the vanquished summer. With the passing of the Osprey and the storm clouds behind him will be many more sparrows and other birds of the coming winter. Unlike the leaves whose splendor soon fades, the winter birds brighten bleak days until change comes again.

I once read in a farm journal that despite our

strides in technology and our tremendous advancements in medicine, we still owe our existence to six inches of topsoil and the fact that it rains. I add to that, that we owe our joy this time of year not to a new television season or the unveiling of '96 model cars, but to dogwood berries, golden leaves, cool north winds, and a few ounces of feathers that liven our feeders, our fence rows, and the shorter days ahead.

The 131 species range from the tiny Black Rail (10 cm) to the massive, flightless Takahe (63 cm) of New Zealand.

HAWK WATCH REPORT

Some came early, some came late, and all saw birds on October 7, 1995 at the Hervey Dairy Farm. The early morning walk group went to the pond, to the woods and the green-tree area. The long rays of the sun showed us a **Solitary Sandpiper** and a **Snowy Egret** at the pond. Down deep in the woods, we walked a newly bulldozed path to the green-tree area. The name green-tree means that the area is only flooded for 80 - 100 days during the mid-winter months. This way the trees remain alive and produce acorns and other mast for ducks. A water level control structure is required for proper management of a green-tree reservoir.

We had both **Downy** and **Hairy Woodpeckers** respond to the Screech Owl Tape. A good size comparison was possible with the larger size and strength of the bill of the **Hairy Woodpecker** being obvious. The best bird was a **Philadelphia Vireo.** The solid wash of yellow underneath was noted by several observers.

The Hervey Hawk Watch started at 10:00 a.m. Conditions were right with scattered puffy clouds starting to build. We began to see a few Red-Tailed Hawks and Red-Shouldered Hawks. Also both Cooper's Hawks and Sharp-shinned Hawks came over before noon. A few people had to leave and I must admit the first two hours of counting had been slow. But shortly after 12:00, I was watching a large flock of wheeling, darting Chimney Swifts, to the northeast through my binoculars when the picture changed. I announced, "I've got Broad-winged Hawks!". Sure enough, more than thirty Broadwinged Hawks were gliding through the Chimney Swifts and coming on until they passed overhead. About a half mile to the southwest, they formed the next kettle and began spiraling upward. Like steam

from a teapot boiling on the kitchen stove, they circled and rose higher and higher. As the hawks neared the "kitchen ceiling", they seemed to buzz about frantically, looking like flies flitting around in a pyrethrum cloud. And then they glided off to the southwest toward Texas. Between 12:15 and 3:15 p.m., three kettles of **Broad-winged Hawks** numbering 107 birds passed over us.

Everyone seemed well pleased that the hawks had cooperated so well. I was even fortunate enough to get the scope on a dark phase **Broadwinged Hawk** and we all got a good look at this unusual bird. We had 149 raptors migrating during six hours of watch. This includes quite a few **Black Vultures**. I think this qualifies as our best local Hawk Watch!

SODA LAKE REPORT

Beautiful early fall weather greeted 13 SBSG members for the 7th of October trip to Soda Lake. We were also met by a group of warblers feeding in the goldenrod and hawthorns. Larry promptly announced that they were Nashville Warblers.

The water level in the pool areas is being maintained at a low level until later in the year, so I didn't expect much in the way of ducks. However, quite a few Wood Ducks were swimming in and out of the Button Willows. One Hooded Merganser hen disappeared into the trees. A Northern Shoveler showed up while we were on the observation tower. The Snowy Egrets put on an entertaining show, chasing each other and chasing minnows with equal enthusiasm.

A mystery hawk presented a going-away glimpse and opinion divided between Merlin and Accipiter sp. Much later as the trip was ending, we saw both an adult Merlin and a Cooper's Hawk very well.

Our next trip to Soda Lake is in mid-winter. The water will be up and many more ducks will be around.

Pat and I went to Egan Lake after the SBSG trip. This lake is up the water pipeline at the

north end of the Soda Lake Area and is farther than we are usually able to go. The road deteriorated to a 4-wheeler track as I bounced the pick-up through a couple of wet ditches. I was glad I had not attempted to drive our caravan of birding vehicles up that way. We added 16 Bluewinged Teal and an Orange-crowned Warbler at Egan Lake. There is a maintained nature trail circling up that way, going on both sides of the pipeline and I hope to have time to walk it very soon; perhaps with some of you.

Hagerman National Wildlife Refuge

Pat and I enjoyed a trip to Lake Texoma on October 22, 1995 with Russell and Billie Lynn Raybourn. This part of Texas is an easy weekend trip from Shreveport. Ducks were present in good numbers. Redheads were the most

numerous with American Widgeon, Mallards, Gadwall, Blue-winged and Green-winged Teal, Ruddy Ducks, Buffleheads and Red-breasted Merganser also present in decreasing abundance. Large fields were planted in winter grasses in preparation for the flocks of geese that would soon appear. We were surprised that only one small flock of Canada Geese was present.

The checklist showed all four Longspur species as rare in fall and winter. American Avocets were seen from a viewing tower which we braved during a near gale. I recommend this spot to our readers as a November to February trip.

Extralimital Dates: Raptors

This is the sixth in a series of reports on extralimital dates for migratory birds in our area. It is based exclusively on the Bird Study Group Bird Report data base. The intent of this series is to alert birders of the approximate arrival and departure dates of migrants (based on our data base) and of times during the year in need of better documentation. In some cases, permanent residents (PE) are included if annual data is incomplete. At least six dates (if available) are given for each species. For summer residents (SU) the first three dates are the earliest arrival dates in the spring and the last three dates are the latest departure dates in the fall. For winter residents (WI), the first three dates are the latest departure dates in the spring and the last three are the earliest arrival dates in the fall. The last column gives months for which additional data is needed. For non-resident migrants the first line (SP) contains the earliest three arrival and latest three departure dates for the spring and the second line (FA) gives the earliest arrival and latest departure dates for the fall migration. In some cases fewer than three dates are available for a given category. Accidentals (AC) contain only one or two records.

HOTSPOT GUIDE NO. 9

BODCAU BAYOU WILDLIFE AREA


This is the largest area covered in our series of site guides. A cross section including every type of birding opportunity available in northwestern Louisiana can be found here, because of the diverse habitats. The only exception is the lack of large areas of open or deep water which attracts diving ducks, grebes, loons, pelicans, etc., for which we have no records at Bodcau Bayou Wildlife Management Area.

All 32,471 acres are owned by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and managed by the Louisiana Department of Wildlife and Fisheries. Bodcau includes:


- 1. Lovely Swamps my favorite part with many mature cypress trees
- 2. Wide Bayous good for float trips
- 3. Upland Streams TURKEY country
- 4. Open Lake water sports on Ivan Lake
- 5. Hillside Seep near Wenks Landing, ferns
- 7. Old Prairie Remnant- with unique plants and wildflowers
- 8. Pine Hills timber land
- 9. Old Pine Stands Red-cockaded Woodpeckers are here
- 10. Grassland in the dam area and old homesteads
- 11. Wildlife Food Plots good birding areas
- 12. Campgrounds and Picnic Areas a nice place to stay

Located north of Belleview and stretching to the Arkansas line, Bodcau forms a very important corridor for migrating birds. The mixture of food plants and mixed forest is important because much of North Louisiana has been planted in pine plantations or is in open pastures. Nature Conservancy has recognized the unique and critical nature of 8 areas within Bodcau and acquired them for protection. These areas are marked on the accompanying map.

Two easy four-hour float trips are recommended. First - from Crow Lake to Wenks Landing, all wide bayou and easy paddling. Second - downstream from the dam. This trip enters a pristine, aged Cypress Swamp area but may require a few portages in times of low water.



NORTH HALF



To attempt to name all the birds in this large, diverse area would be to list nearly every bird known to North Louisiana. We have 367 records of 123 species in our data base. The most unusual of these are:

- 1. White-tailed Kite 04-07-89 at Headquarters by manager, Richard McMullen
- 2. White-breasted Nuthatch common
- 3, 4. Parula and Prothonotary Warbler both seen nesting here
- 5. **Henslow Sparrow** banded by Jim Ingold 02-19-94 and observed 03-05-94 by SBSG outing
- 6. Great-tailed Grackle 05-04-93 by float trip members of SBSG

Obviously, we need to do more birding in this area to increase our migratory bird species count. From what I have observed this area ranks as the most important habitat for us to be concerned about conserving in Northwest Louisiana. It is in great shape now and our job should be to see that it stays that way.

Nature Conservancy Areas

Site #1	Cason Natural Area 624 acres of hardwood bottom.
Site #2	Upper Calico Creek Natural Area 138 acres of riparian forest is connected by a corridor to #3.

A River Bottom Diary

Part 11

With the first frost life changes overnight. Most seasonal things come gradually, but a few like great migrations and first frosts are moments of sudden change. November is the time for both.

In early November we witness the full scale arrival of the winter residents of this Red River Valley. Massive movements of birds take place. Some years this migration is only noticed by the increase in numbers at the feeders or of waterfowl on the ponds and on the river. Other years,

memorable years, the weather sets the stage for a one day massive passage of staggering magnitude. Such a passage occurred in the month of November this year.

The weather reports showed a major cold front stretching from the Rockies to the Great Lakes. In front of it was calm, balmy weather, nothing that would move a bird to leave what ever refuge it had settled into in the mild "Indian Summer" of Little serious weather changes had October. occurred for three weeks. Few migrants had passed since early October. The marsh had been empty since the blue-winged teal left a month before. Indeed the setting was right. This front carried cold and snow, inhospitable things to many south seeking birds. It also carried a fierce north wind, fierce that is to those locked to the To those with miles to fly towards ground. southern homes the north wind is a blessing. Such a wind saves many a million wing beats for the same number of travelers. Confirmation of my suspicions came first with the news that radar sites at airports across the Midwest were jammed by migrating birds. Tangible confirmation came at dawn on November 3rd, a day when a continent moved. I sat by the river and witnessed what I had not since a similar day eleven years earlier, and once before that fifteen more years back. The dawn lifted as a curtain to a stage; what was revealed was a continent in motion. The product of vast fields and waters, the dwellers of countless hidden places were revealed in the timeless spectacle of migration. From horizon to horizon were hundreds of birds, mostly waterfowl: geese, ducks of all species, sparrows, gulls, herons, virtually anything that could be seen at this place at that time passed overhead, over the head of a spellbound observer, over the head of human comprehension. To move such masses is a Godly thing. The morning is best described as a painting: a rosy dawn, a sky full of birds in classic v-shaped skeins, singles, pairs, small shapeless flocks, all in a uniform flow from north to south. The north wind stiffens and puts a shimmer on the water of the river, which sparkles in the new light. The chatter of hundreds of ducks, the honking of geese, the short, sweet calls of small passerines fill the quiet atmosphere. By sunrise 25,000 birds had passed by in view. As the sun climbed over the trees the spectacle ended, the curtain closed. Sparrows dropped into the grass, ducks fell to the flooded woods. Only the snow geese continued to pass over throughout the morning. Novembers to come hold promise of more such sights, but I am left wondering what must have passed this spot before Novembers were counted, before marshes were drained and prairies plowed. What multitudes passed this spot when this place was theirs alone. Migration is timeless, these creatures are timeless. First frosts are as well.

The mass migrations are frequently ahead of cold, clear arctic air which brings the first frost of the year. Usually for the farm this is greeted as a time of change from pastures to hay and feed for the livestock. For the birds it is more a fulfillment of the season, for they are ready and awaiting.

The early morning is crisp and clear, the frost adorns all green things across the fields. It looks deceptively harmless on the remaining summer grasses and weeds. It covers them so lightly, so delicately but completely. Shortly after sunrise it vanishes as if never there. By noon its seeming innocence also vanishes and its incredible might is revealed. As sudden as the mass migration of birds, is the mass withering of all that lingers green into November. Only the newly emerging winter grasses are left. The fields wither, then yellow. By the next day the landscape is hardly recognizable as the same one a day before. Winter has come in a night. Several more frosty mornings follow. The last leaves of the pecan, hackberry, osage orange, and cottonwood are vanquished from their limbs. The sparrows seem more at home now in their brown and umber refuge. They seem to have swelled in number as well. The land is neatly put to rest. The winter birds have come. The trees are bare, all that is left is the coming of the cold and winter rain. Water pipits are in large flocks in the alfalfa field. Over 200 green wing teal rest on the marsh. A dozen white crowned sparrows hop about the road. All seem to have been there before; to have been there all along. But only days before things were green and warm, in transition. The first frost brings sudden change as did the north wind and its mass migration; but change in what context? Indeed the less these things change the better when viewed in the greater scope of time. Perhaps nothing changes in that context but the observer.

Extralimital Dates: Wild Turkey through Terns

This is the seventh in a series of reports on extralimital dates for migratory birds in our area. It is based exclusively on the Bird Study Group Bird Report data base. The intent of this series is to alert birders of the approximate arrival and departure dates of migrants (based on our data base) and of times during the year in need of better documentation. In some cases, permanent residents (PE) are included if annual data is incomplete. At least six dates (if available) are given for each species. For summer residents (SU) the first three dates are the earliest arrival dates in the spring and the last three dates are the latest departure dates in the fall. For winter residents (WI), the first three dates are the latest departure dates in the spring and the last three are the earliest arrival dates in the fall. The last column gives months for which additional data is needed. For non-resident migrants the first line (SP) contains the earliest three arrival and latest three departure dates for the spring and the second line (FA) gives the earliest arrival and latest departure dates for the fall migration. In some cases fewer than three dates are available for a given category. Accidentals (AC) contain only one or two records.

BIRD REPORTS Help!

by Mac Hardy

With the passing of each month our Bird Records data base becomes more valuable as a resource to study the distribution and abundance of birds in northwestern Louisiana. With ten years of data we have enough to detect changes in our local bird fauna.

In order for anyone to use our data effectively we must have accurate locality and date information along with the numbers of birds observed. It is very important that the locality be as specific as possible. If your observations are from your residence or some other specific address then the location is precise and identifiable. If your observations are away from town then give the location as carefully as possible from a definite landmark (for example, "3.4 miles east of Bellvue" or "Jacob's Memorial Nature Park" or "intersection of Mt. Zion rd. and Linwood Ave."). Always include the parish and date on your data sheets.

Do not use a location that cannot be identified to a specific place. A locality stated as "South on LA. 1" tells the reader that the location was somewhere in Louisiana between the Arkansas state line north of Rodessa and Grand Isle, a distance of about 420 miles that includes at least ten different habitats. Thanks to someone for a good example. You may think this is silly; however, your colleague in birding should not have to guess if the bird was seen 5 miles south of Shreveport or 50 miles south of Alexandria! If the person would have included the parish it would have reduced the mystery locality to a mere 60 miles.

If you can indicate numbers of birds seen on your outing, do so. A check mark is interpreted as a one! Aren't you proud that your sighting of 89 Wood Storks is recorded for posterity to enjoy as, "1 Wood Stork." The other person that saw the 89 Wood Storks will wonder where you were when the other 88 flew by!

Most of the bird records are entered in the data base by volunteers, or sometimes a student worker in the Museum. This time-consuming job is vitally important to the quality of the data base. The computer operator should not have to try to unravel your locality or take time to figure out what parish you were in. It is the observer's responsibility to state the location accurately so others can find the place many years from now.

Please help improve the quality of our data base by filling out the bird record sheets completely. Give a precise locality, the date, the parish, and the numbers of birds seen. This will greatly assist me and the other volunteers who compile your bird records.

Extralimital Dates: Doves through Owls, Kingfisher, Woodpeckers

This is the seventh in a series of reports on extralimital dates for migratory birds in our area. It is based exclusively on the Bird Study Group Bird Report data base. The intent of this series is to alert birders of the approximate arrival and departure dates of migrants (based on our data base) and of times during the year in need of better documentation. In some cases, permanent residents (PE) are included if annual data is incomplete. At least six dates (if available) are given for each species. For summer residents (SU) the first three dates are the earliest arrival dates in the spring and the last three dates are the latest departure dates in the fall. For winter residents (WI), the first three dates are the latest departure dates in the spring and the last three are the earliest arrival dates in the fall. The last column gives months for which additional data is needed. For non-resident migrants the first line (SP) contains the earliest three arrival and latest three departure dates for the spring and the second line (FA) gives the earliest arrival and latest departure dates for the fall migration. In some cases fewer than three dates are available for a given category. Accidentals (AC) contain only one or two records.

A River Bottom Diary

Part 12

A cold January wind blows this dawn. The ink black night imperceptibly fades into a soft, cold gray light. With ashen overcast skies, sunrise is only an assumption. A harrier sits nestled in the hayfield, his night's wait nearly over. Hidden in a vast expanse of dried grass he avoids the dangers of the night as a needle in a haystack. All night he has heard the rustling sounds of prey while lying on the very same ground as they. With the growing light the calls of sparrows ring throughout the field. The harrier springs into the air. In a moment he has thrown the shackles of the night and ascended to his airy throne.

With strong thrusting strokes he climbs skyward until the chosen height is attained. Now over the bayou he swings around and floats back to the hayfield. The field was planted in pearl millet and hayed three times over the summer. The final stand was left as much weedy johnson grass had invaded. The result was a light stand of seedy grass with an open understory and stiff clusters of millet heads here and there. This provides a very different environment than the dense weeds of the fields which were never cut. On this hayfield the harrier stakes his winter claim.

Wings arched back into the harrier's characteristic dihedral he floats against the north breeze. Muted by soft gray plumes he parts the air without a sound. His colors are those of the winter sky, his passing is as a ghost. Only his eyes betray the fierce intent of his purpose. Sharp as diamonds they pierce the matrix of stalks and blades searching for what might dare to move. Ears equally alert, he hears the high pitch tinkling call of a shrew, hunting on another level. A puff of wind deflects from the ground, another gust swirls around. The surface is rarely smooth yet the harrier rides the pool of air, ever alert. The gust parts the soft feathers of his right wing, he checks with a twist back right, then thrusts downward with his long tail, stemming the coming stall. On he glides, fine tuned to ride upon an ocean of air whose swells and currents are known only to those who fly. He banks upon reaching the treed fence row and turns about in

the wind. Suddenly a motion ahead triggers the predator's response; in a swirling dive he descends like a leaf caught in a whirlwind but to a precise point he falls only to narrowly miss; a cotton rat flees. Again he pumps skyward and resumes the hunt. Floating across the wind he checks into it until nearly motionless and then drifts back along its edge once again. A LeContes sparrow darts through the grassy maze; under the canopy it is safe. As the sparrow crosses an opening, the harrier strikes. Talons end the sparrows' journey as the harrier climbs skyward, his first meal firmly grasped.

He alights on the open ground of the newly planted alfalfa field. His first bite takes the head, then limb by limb with ravenous intent, he feeds.

I watch the harrier often. He misses more than he succeeds. In his misses he shows patience or perhaps resolve. In his successes he shows an urgency, a need as if another meal may be long in coming and as if he must hurry lest this one should be taken from him.

After finishing the sparrow, the harrier sits for quite sometime, looking about as if hoping to find a last piece. I walk toward him marking the clod on which he sits. Intolerant of my presence he leaves the field and strokes swiftly over the bayou and out of sight. Quickly striding to the spot I can only find a few breast feathers. Nothing is left to waste.

Turning my attention to the hayfield, I see that this incident is already past. The sparrows are perched high on the stalks, some singing others just sitting in the morning light. The field is good habitat, full of the seeds of johnson grass and millet. The sparrows are many, mostly savannah sparrows but I also find LeContes, swamp, Lincoln's and song sparrow. Along the trees at the edge of the field are white-throated, white-crowned, and more song sparrows. A flock of goldfinches comes in from high and alights on the tops of the grass stalks. Later in the morning, hoards of blackbirds swirl upon the field.

So much life, so much tragedy, lies in so simple a place. Lives depend on and lives end on a field of dead grass.

Later that day, I pass the hayfield again. The harrier is perched upon a roll of hay. He is

feeding. Pausing, I focus my binoculars to see him tear a long piece of hispid cotton rat and swallow it in an exaggerated gulp. His life is spared once more.

Along the ditch, which borders the hayfield and the main road on the farm, grow thick stands of ragweed and scattered osage orange trees, White-crowned "bow-darcs" by local tongue. sparrows along with a number of other species find refuge in this brushy row. Some of the white-crowned sparrows are feeding in the road this gray afternoon, while others sing from the thorny branches of the osage orange. Suddenly all freeze, then dash for cover as a blue-backed, long tailed missile streaks amongst them. cooper's hawk nimbly twists down the ditch and flares upward then swoops down again with fantastic speed and agility. He pierces the brushy refuge and sweeps in and out in a frantic attack. Another pass and then without pausing or looking back, continues straight ahead across the hayfield over the bayou and out of sight. The attack is The sparrows reappear, all facing the direction of the accipiter's departure. As he disappears from sight, the singing resumes, others hop back in the road and return to feeding. As quickly as this drama begins, it ends. Life goes

In all this drama who is to be pitied? It is human nature to side with the meek, indeed that is the noblest of human inclinations. But as I watch the sparrows calmly feed, finding seeds readily, singing unconcerned throughout the day, it is the hawk that seems more deserving. His meals are never known until the moment his talons close. The hawk is the master of the sky, but with that high and powerful throne comes a life always on the edge of desperation. The swift cooper's hawk is always one twisting turn away from a high speed crash. The harrier is never more than a fortnight away from starvation. Their complex weapons and awesome mastery of the air are indeed their bonds. For they must use them all in intense resolve every day of their lives, or lose their lives. Likewise the sparrow can never let down its guard. No, in nature there is balance; none are to be pitied so long as there are weedy fields and ditches. Pity must be spent on those who seek such winter homes but find only barren places that harbor no life at all.

As darkness softly falls this gray wintry day,

the harrier swoops low over the center of the hayfield and all at once falls quietly into it. The chirping of the sparrows subsides. Night returns to the farm.

Extralimital Dates: Larks through Starlings

by Mac Hardy

This is the eighth in a series of reports on extralimital dates for migratory birds in our area. It is based exclusively on the Bird Study Group Bird Report data base. The intent of this series is to alert birders of the approximate arrival and departure dates of migrants (based on our data base) and of times during the year in need of better documentation. In some cases, permanent residents (PE) are included if annual data is incomplete. At least six dates (if available) are given for each species. For summer residents (SU) the first three dates are the earliest arrival dates in the spring and the last three dates are the latest departure dates in the fall. For winter residents (WI), the first three dates are the latest departure dates in the spring and the last three are the earliest arrival dates in the fall. The last column gives months for which additional data is needed. For non-resident migrants the first line (SP) contains the earliest three arrival and latest three departure dates for the spring and the second line (FA) gives the earliest arrival and latest departure dates for the fall migration. In some cases fewer than three dates are available for a given category. Accidentals (AC) contain only one or two records.

New Business

Paul Dickson has BCBCBC reports for the last eight years. Awards for 1996 are as follows:

HIT LIST - Birds difficult to find - Hubert & Pat Hervey

NO DOZE - Awards birders who diligently count every bird - Charlie Lyon for 539 Killdeer.

IRON BINOCULARS - General toughness in birding and hours put in - Paul Dickson and Bruce Crider

GOLDEN BIRDIE -Award for the best bird - Bill Wood for the Wilson's Warhler.

Paul said that because of the Red River project, habitat has changed dramatically ecologically, for instance, on the BCBCBC, Paul and Bruce found 400 Canvasbacks, up to 2,000 Lesser Scaups and 1000-1500 Ring-billed Gulls.

Charlie Lyon said the Shreveport Christmas Count had a total of 105 species. A new area is 12-mile Bayou where Meadowlarks, Horned Larks and American Pipits were found. Heretofore, there were 8 or 9 parties for the count, but this year there were only 7 parties. On Cross Lake, there were 9,600 Double-crested Cormorants, 308 Great Egrets and 1300+ Cedar Waxwings. Because of residential development, Shreveport's count has a potential of only 112 - 115.

Dorothy Metzler faxed the Christmas Count of Caddo Lake showing 105 species.

Brazoria, Texas will have a migratory count on April 18, 1996.

Rosemary said that she, Hubert and Pat took part in the Natchitoches Christmas Count and had over 90 species. Also, she always does the New Orleans Christmas Count in which they had over 145 species with 5 species of hummingbirds.

At the Board Meeting last week, Jim brought up the news that an 8' long by 2' wide permanent sign/banner would cost \$140.00. Because the price was over \$100.00, it had to be brought before the membership for approval. At the regular meeting, he asked for a motion that we buy the sign. It was moved, seconded and approved.

Jim received a newsletter from a former student, Timm Otterson, who is editor of LSU Raptor & Wildlife Rehabilitation Unit. For a \$20.00 donation, you will receive a bi-annual newsletter.

Bird Talk included a White-tailed Hawk near Welch, LA. Jim had a Pine Siskin at his feeder. Paul told of an almost totally white Red-tail Hawk (with red in the tail) along Hwy. 1 near Flournoy Lucas and Leonard Roads. The Lesser Goldfinch was last seen on December 23rd.

Hubert showed various books on the birds of Texas and if anyone was interested, they could take closer look at them.

Charlie Lyon and Roger Breedlove will lead a three-day trip to the Hill Country of Texas beginning April 12. Some possibilities include Rufous-capped Warbler, Varied Bunting, Painted Bunting and Lazuli Bunting. He had handouts on Victor's Birding Trip of Chalk Bluff and other possibilities. Van rental, gasoline and accomodations will be about \$250.00 per person.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:05 p.m.

Extralimital Dates: Tanagers through Juncos

by Mac Hardy

This is the eleventh in a series of reports on extralimital dates for migratory birds in our area. It is based exclusively on the Bird Study Group Bird Report data base. The intent of this series is to alert birders of the approximate arrival and departure dates of migrants (based on our data base) and of times during the year in need of better documentation. In some cases, permanent residents (PE) are included if annual data is incomplete. At least six dates (if available) are given for each species. For summer residents (SU) the first three dates are the earliest arrival dates in the spring and the last three dates are the latest departure dates in the fall. For winter residents (WI), the first three dates are the latest departure dates in the spring and the last three are the earliest arrival dates in the fall. The last column gives months for which additional data is needed. For non-resident migrants the first line (SP) contains the earliest three arrival and latest three departure dates for the spring and the second line (FA) gives the earliest arrival and latest departure dates for the fall migration. In some cases fewer than three dates are available for a given category. Accidentals (AC) contain only one or two records.

MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING

The regular meeting of the SSNS Bird Study Group was held February 13, 1996, in the Museum of Life Sciences of LSUS. The meeting was opened at 7:03 PM by President Jim Ingold, who welcomed several guests.

One of the guests spoke for a few minutes regarding 44,000 acres of the Vernon Ranger District in Kisatchie National Forest, being acquired by the U.S. Army to be used as tank training areas. Within those acres are 186 clusters of Red-cockaded Woodpeckers, which is the 3rd largest colony in the world, plants, orchids and much more natural habitat that should be conserved. This acquisition will occur without public knowledge. It was suggested that everyone inform their senators that the public should be made aware of the Army's plans and allowed to have some input into such a devastating situation.

President Ingold then introduced the speaker, Ms. Karen Hagerty who gave a program on The Effects of Bottomland Hardwood Thinning on Neotropical Migrants.

During the business portion of the meeting, we were reminded of the next field trip, being February 17th to Cheneyville, La. on Mr. Wimple's farm for Sandhill Cranes, led by Dr. Bill Hall. Hubert Hervey will lead a trip to Yearwood Road. Meet at the Museum at 7:30 AM on March 2nd. Then on March 16th, Hubert will lead a trip to Ponderosa Farm in the Bodcau Wildlife Management Area for Wild Turkeys. Meet at 6:00 AM (we need to be that early in order to see the turkeys) at LSUS Museum.

Treasurer Betty Mason gave her report: \$2362 balance, Hibernia balance, \$2463.43, \$58.51 - Gift Shop, \$36.33 - Post Office, \$300 to Gift Shop and \$200 to mail to Post Office, About \$500 to Baton Rouge Audubon Society and Caroline Dorman.

Program Chairman Gay Vekovius reported that the April program will be by Bill Vermillion on Partners In Flight.

Bobbe Wommack had agreed to handle Publicity in the absence of Betsy Reisinger, however, we now need someone to take over that position.

Bird Chat - Information from internet revealed that Swainson's Hawks are being killed by pesticides in Argentina with numbers reaching up to 20,000. The Canadian population of these hawks is between 20 and 30 thousand pairs.

Seven birders showed up for the Soda Lake trip. The water level in Soda Lake was very low because the 30 foot uphill distance required to pump the water out of 12-mile bayou is a slow way to fill the impoundment and winter rains have been well below normal. Mallard, Green-winged Teal and Sharp-shinned Hawk were among the 45 species seen.

Paul Dickson's Bird Banding Day on February 10th, netted eight species: 1 American Goldfinch, 1 Northern Cardinal with 1 retrap, 16 Swamp Sparrows, 10 Savannah Sparrows, 2 Lincoln's Sparrows, 8 LeConte's Sparrows, 20 White-crowned Sparrows with 2 retraps, and 21 Song Sparrows. Species observed included a Bald Eagle, Northern Harrier, House Finch, and Eastern Bluebird.

Bird Talk: Some species seen were Pine Siskin, Purple Martin, Henslow's Sparrow, American Woodcock and Inca Dove.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:20 PM.

A Neotropic Cormorant was found on Caddo Lake (Caddo Parish), near Summer Point Restaurant, between LA Hwy. 1 and the Caddo Lake dam on 16 March 1996 by Dorothy Metzler and Cameron Cox. This very recently received record has good supporting details and the bird was seen at close range in excellent conditions. To our knowledge this is the first record for northwestern Louisiana. This brings the total new birds for this birding year to eight!

Call me (925-9249) if you have any unusual birds nesting in your quad and also call for information on how to help the club on Bayou Pierre Lake quad.

Recent Significant Fall and Winter Bird Sightings

The Bird Study Group now is into its 10th year of activity and we've now accumulated approximately 30,000 bird sighting entries into our database. It's therefore much more difficult to add first records for new species to our file. This last fall and winter, we've done an exceptionable job.

We've added seven new species to our list of birds seen in northwestern Louisiana. To my knowledge, none of these seven species have been recorded previously in the history of birding in northwestern Louisiana.

- 1. Yellow Rail -- Rice is a relatively new crop in northwestern Louisiana. In the Powhatan area, which is just at the southern edge of our reporting zone, rice has now been planted for three years. We've had previous success with flushing Yellow Rails in southern Louisiana while riding rice combines. I therefore made arrangements with a rice farmer in Powhatan and a number of us rode these combines searching for rails. The dates (and numbers) for Yellow Rail sighting were October 1 (8 birds), 7 (5), 11 (1), and 12 (1), 1995.
- 2. Black Rail -- Two sightings were made for Black Rail on October the 7th, which represented either one or two individuals. An additional individual was also reported on October the 12th. Although we've recently removed the Yellow Rail from the Review List of the Louisiana Ornithological Society, the Black Rail is still extremely uncommon and is a Review List species.
- 3. Northern Wheatear -- Prior to 1991, this species had only been seen once in this state and that was in 1888. An individual appeared in eastern Orleans Parish in 1991 and then another individual was noted on the Crowley Christmas Bird Count in December of 1992. This bird lingered through February of 1993 and was viewed by a multitude of observers from throughout the entire country. This species is a truly incredible sighting for northwestern Louisiana and obviously represents the first ever sight-ing for this region. This bird was noted at the Hervey Dairy Farm on October 4, 1995, and was seen by numerous observers. I obtained photographs and submitted this to the Bird Records Committee. This is obviously a Review List species. It's also of merit to note that a Northern Wheatear was subsequently seen south of Sulfur, Louisiana, approximately a week after this sighting. It's interesting to speculate if this could not have been the same individual.
- 4. Clay-colored Sparrow -- This is a predominately western species but nonetheless does breed as far east as upstate New York. It's therefore a bit surprising that this species has never been reported from this region. This however, is the first ever record for this species in north-

western Louisiana. I sighted this species on October 14, 1995, at Richard Fleming Park on the north side of Cross Lake. Based on historic data, the most consistent time to see this species in this state is the month of October. It is quite uncommon, but expected areas to see it in October are eastern Orleans Parish and coastal Cameron Parish.

- 5. White-winged Scoter -- Horace Jeter and I discovered this bird on Cross Lake on October 30, 1995 in the company of small flock of Lesser Scaup. This is the first ever documented record for this species in northwestern Louisiana. This Is a Review List species for this state and is quite uncommon anywhere. I should note that this winter there were two individuals seen in Orleans Parish and another individual seen in Cameron Parish. This species is quite uncommon but nonetheless does seem to be a bit more regular on east Texas lakes in the winter.
- 6. Lesser Goldfinch -- This species was seen on December 21, 1995, and then again on December 23rd in Dr. Bill Hall's backyard at his bird feeder. It was seen by a number of observers. This is another truly incredible record, as to my knowledge it represents only the second ever sighting of this species in this state. The only other one was in 1954 in the town of Cameron, Louisiana. This western species was not expected to occur anywhere in Louisiana. This is obviously a Review List species and for official acceptance by the State Records Committee, documentation needs to be provided.
- 7. **Broad-tailed Hummingbird** -- This was a great winter for hummingbirds and there were at least several reports of hummingbirds in the Shreveport area this winter. This is the first ever record of the **Broad-tailed Hummingbird** in northern Louisiana. To my knowledge, this is the only individual that was positively identified. I identified this individual as an immature male. In the cases of the other sightings of hummingbirds, they had disappeared by the time I or other birders with hummingbird identification experience had been notified. It's of note that there was a report of two **Rufous Hummingbirds** spending much of the winter in Tallulah (northeastern), Louisiana. A male **Anna's Hummingbird** was noted in Daingerfield, Texas, this winter. In Lafayette, Louisiana, eight species spent the winter and there were over 100 indivi-

duals. Over 60 of these were banded. In Baton Rouge, Louisiana, there were well over 100 individuals that spent the winter and again, eight species were noted. I'm not certain of the numbers for New Orleans but again, there were incredible numbers present there as well.

For two species, this is the second ever reported sighting. The species of note, are as follows:

White-winged Dove -- This bird was found by Hubert Hervey on the Hervey Dairy Farm on November 12, 1995. This represents the first record of this species in the Bird Study Group data base, but this is the second Shreveport area record. The first record is of an individual discovered by Horace Jeter at Robson, Louisiana, on May 1, 1949. It's also of interest to note that the first "live" record of White-winged Dove for northeastern Texas was found in Tyler on December 17, 1995. There is a record of a White-winged Dove found dead at a feeder in Longview in an earlier year. This bird has become much more common in southwestern Louisiana and now breeds in Cameron Parish. It's still quite uncommon in the interior of the state.

Surf Scoter -- An immature male Surf Scoter was discovered by Paul Dickson and Bruce Crider on the Bossier-Caddo-Bienville Christmas Bird Count. The date of this observation was January 1, 1996. Paul was kind enough to take me out in frigid conditions on January 3, 1996, to again view this species with him. There is one previous record for this species in our data base and that is on November 2, 1992. This is not a first sighting but nonetheless it's significant, therefore I've included it in this list. This, the most common of the scoters in Louisiana, is not a Review List species, but it is nonetheless quite rare in northwestern Louisiana. I should also note that it does appear to be a bit more regular on northeastern Texas lakes.

This concludes our list of rare fall and winter seasonal bird sightings. Hopefully, the coming spring and the summer of this year can yield us similar excitement. Perhaps our next "hot bird" will be something like a **Ruff**.

BAYOU PIERRE OUTING: March 2, 1996

This outing was well attended. We had four vehicles loaded with birders and their equipment. Our first stop was at the Caddo-Bossier Port on former Red River. We set up our scopes and started trying to identify the ducks on the eastern shores of Lake Red River. Despite the glare from the sun we were making a fair start when a security guard drove up and asked us to leave. We must have formed a suspicious looking crowd, all peering through our binoculars and spotting scopes. Apparently, recent acts of vandalism had caused a change of policy, because two days previously Pat and I had no problem birding this same location. Permission must be obtained from Mr. Rick Nance of the Caddo-Bossier Port Commission, phone 861-4981, before birding this location, even though it is a public facility being funded by our tax dollars. It will be gated and is not intended for public access in the future.

Sometimes an unpleasant experience can be cancelled out by a very pleasant happening. We were fortunate to have a good experience at Lock and Dam #5. The very congenial operator asked us to come upstairs and tour the facility. We watched as a small boat passed through the locks and went down stream. We saw displays explaining how the lock and dam worked. Two young girls in our group were allowed to blow the whistle telling the boat it was safe to leave. Some of our members were allowed to "make bubbles" (by pushing a button!). I think it had to do with the electronic controls of the water flow openings. We were duly impressed with the facility. The friendly attitude of the operator helped to cancel out the unhappy experience that had started this outing. Thank you very much U. S. Army Corps of Engineers.

On we went to the southern entrance of Yearwood Road onto La. 1. Since this winter has been so dry, field preparations were well ahead of usual. Tractors were plowing and disking and many birds were following this activity. Killdeer, Eastern Meadowlarks, Redwinged Blackbirds, Savannah Sparrows,

Mourning Doves, Rock Doves, and American Crows were all cleaning up in the newly turned soil. The two species I most wanted to show our group did not disappoint us either. Large flocks of Vesper Sparrows and a few American Pipits were spotted. Of course with all this occurring the birds that take advantage of the concentration of small birds were also present. We saw a Merlin, and several Northern Harriers hoping to "drop-in" unexpectedly for dinner. American Kestrels watched from the electric wires and pounced on smaller prey.

My favorite of the raptors present in the Yearwood Road area however has come to be the Red-tailed Hawk. Many are present and every color phase imaginable has been seen here, from Krider's to Harlan's and Colouris to Fuertesi subspecies. But my favorite is a bird I have seen wintering in the same place for eight vears. It is a very dark melanistic Red-tailed Hawk. She is very large and the boss bird in her territory. I usually find her near the grain storage bins on the gravel road entering Bayou Pierre WMA. She pleased us with a slow fly-by on this day and we could compare her to a Harlan's hawk seen just a short while earlier with the difference in the tail markings being obvious. Our subject bird could easily be mistaken for a Turkey Vulture and her tail had no hint of a bar at its tip. A beautiful lady she is!

We also rousted a pair of Barn Owls from their day time rest in one of the silos. Then we continued to the waterfowl refuge because several in the group had not been there before. Grass and weeds kept us from seeing many ducks, but I knew from previous trips that Mallards, Green-winged Teals, Northern Pintails, and Wood Ducks were safely concealed in the vegetation covered waters.

We had one last memorable experience as we watched finches and sparrows at several bird feeding stations. A Barred Owl was located sitting on a limb about 2 feet above a small bayou. He was looking down as if watching the water or something in the water. He held this pose for many minutes, until a dog disturbed him.

On the way back to LSUS, Pat and I saw the Krider's hawk near the intersection of

Leonard Road and La. 1. This is a very light hawk, well worth looking for. But I still think my melanistic **Red-tailed Hawk** of Yearwood Road wins the beauty pageant prize.

BODCAU BAYOU TURKEY TRIP MARCH 16, 1996

We had 55 species of birds on this trip and glimpsed one Wild Turkey. Bodcau Bayou Reservoir is very low, so the usual waterfowl were absent. Pat spotted an immature Cooper's Hawk at eye height, as we drove along, only a few feet away. The bird's brown color, streaked breast, rounded barred tail, and yellow eyes made the identification easy. Accipiters are aged by their eye color, with the color changing from yellow, to orange, to red as the bird ages.

We spent more time on the Ponderosa Ranch than usual and were rewarded with such birds as Blue-winged Teal, Cattle Egret (very early), Pileated Woodpecker (overhead fly-by) and Purple Martins.

I also learned a new tree. Mr. Bob Goins, the gracious owner of the Ponderosa, told us that the tree in his yard, which we had noticed a year ago and wondered about, is a soapberry tree, Sapindus drummondii. The common name is the chinatree or wild chinatree. In Louisiana Trees and Shrubs author Clair Brown says these trees are known only from Tangipahoa and Calcasieu Parishes and are cultivated in Rapides and Winn Parishes. The fruit is very similar to the chinaberry (Melia azederach) in appearance but the blossom is white rather than lavender. This native tree has gray roughened bark rather than the smooth brown bark of the chinaberry.

We drove around several areas including Ivan Lake and the large native prairie wild-flower preserve. We had a picnic lunch at Wenk's Landing, where we observed a **Redheaded Woodpecker** attending a cavity almost directly overhead.

The weather was gorgeous and we had a great day. Next year this trip will be booked as a camp out on Bodcau Reservoir, with Wild Turkey and Red-cockaded Woodpecker possible. We will forget the early 6 a.m. departure time and try to make it more convenient for our members to enjoy this wonderful area.

A BIRD AND RECYCLING

An overnight shower had softened the leaves underfoot. Our progress through the tall trees was stealthy and silent. Hopes of hearing turkeys gobbling ran high. A Rufous-sided (excuse me) Eastern Towhee put in a brief appearance above a cluster of tree limbs left over from a recent selective thinning timber improvement operation. It had a few white markings showing on the margins of the inner secondaries but certainly did not have the conspicuous white streaking on the wings and back of the species now called Spotted Towhee. Yes, that could be considered recycling of a sort. A species once existed, then vanished, and has now reappeared to enhance my life list. But that is not the recycling to which the title refers.

Next we saw a lovely Solitary Vireo. This was a life bird for Linda Miller so I took care to point out the eye-ring and blue head. I used to think that plumbeous referred to plumcolored, which would be the bird we were observing. It was Rosemary Seidler, a chemistry professor who set me straight. The chemical symbol for lead is Pb taken from the Latin plumbeus meaning resembling lead. Again, recycling of a sort, a word and its meaning, but that is not what I started to tell you about either. She was flying back and forth from a round ball of leaves high in a water oak to a cone covered shortleaf pine tree. She would tug and pull on the ball of leaves and twigs until she selected one exactly right. Then she would fly to the pine tree and disappear in a thick clump of pine needles. I finally realized that she was dismantling a Red-eyed Vireo nest from last year and recycling it into her nest for this year. I wonder if perhaps a Tufted Titmouse, we heard them everywhere, might be tempted to recycle the Pine Warblers nest in the spring of 1997.

Bird Name Changes AOU 40th Supplement

The 40th Supplement of the American Ornithologists' Union Check List of North American Birds has been published (Auk 112(3):819-830, 1995).

There are only six changes that involve the bird fauna of northwestern Louisiana. Four of those include changes in common names and two involve taxonomic changes that do not affect the common names.

The two taxonomic changes that do not involve changes in common names are as follows: The species name for the American Golden-Plover changes spelling only from *Pluvialis dominica* to *Pluvialis dominicus*. The Great Egret genus is changed so the scientific name changes from *Casmerodius albus* to *Ardea alba*.

The four name changes include species with just a change in the common name, one with a change in the common name and scientific name, and two species that are split, resulting in two additional species for our area.

The simple name change is the American Swallow-tailed Kite changed to Swallow-tailed Kite. The common and scientific name change is Sharp-tailed Sparrow (Ammodramus caudacutus) changed to Nelson's Sharp-tailed Sparrow (Ammodramus nelsoni).

The **Rufous-sided Towhee** (*Pipilo erythrophthalmus*) has been split into the **Eastern Towhee** (*Pipilo erythrophthalmus*) and the **Spotted Towhee** (*Pipilo maculatus*).

The Northern Oriole (Icterus galbula) has been split into the Baltimore Oriole (Icterus galbula) and Bullock's Oriole (Icterus bullockii).

This added two new species to our avifauna: Spotted Towhee and Bullock's Oriole.

Be careful to distinguish these new species on bird reports from now on.

All of the changes in North America can be reviewed in the complete AOU checklist available in my office.

Extralimital Dates: Longspurs through House Sparrows

by Mac Hardy

This is the eleventh in a series of reports on extralimital dates for migratory birds in our area. It is based exclusively on the Bird Study Group Bird Report data base. The intent of this series is to alert birders of the approximate arrival and departure dates of migrants (based on our data base) and of times during the year in need of better documentation. In some cases, permanent residents (PE) are included if annual data is incomplete. At least six dates (if available) are given for each species. For summer residents (SU) the first three dates are the earliest arrival dates in the spring and the last three dates are the latest departure dates in the fall. For winter residents (WI), the first three dates are the latest departure dates in the fall. The last column gives months for which additional data is needed. For non-resident migrants the first line (SP) contains the earliest three arrival and latest three departure dates for the spring and the second line (FA) gives the earliest arrival and latest departure dates for the fall migration. In some cases fewer than three dates are available for a given category. Accidentals (AC) contain only one or two records.

NEW BUSINESS


A nominating committee was appointed consisting of Rosemary Seidler, Larry Raymond and Jeff Trahan to select five board members whose terms are up.

Mama, the Birds, and Me

She was beside herself that warm, sunny morning as I drove up to get her to bring her back to Shreveport so that she could have cataract surgery the following day. As I looked up, I could see the cause for her excitement. Eight to ten **Purple Martins** were circling the open expanse of sky above her gourds and wooden bird houses. My brother tells her, "They are only teasing you, Mama, they only like those 'new fangled' aluminum houses. They won't nest in your gourds." She, of course, knows that this is not so and hopes year after year that they will

decide to take up residence in front of her house. Since she can no longer raise those good ol' vegetables to feed her family in this mowed over garden plot, she relishes the idea of whiling away the hours listening to the birds' melodious songs and watching them soar lazily in the sky. We watched intently as they sat on the highline wires located conveniently close to the houses and gourds, surveying her accommodations. "It's perfect for them," she says. "They like open spaces and wires to perch on! Everything is right here. Stay!! Please stay!!", she pleads.

When we drove up to her house a couple of days later, after she had her surgery, I scouted the skies to see if I could see the **Purple Martins**. "I see some birds up high, Mama, but I can't tell what they are." "I hope it's them," she said. "They've come so many times before and never have stayed, I pray I'm lucky this time."

Before leaving, I had the privilege of watching other birds feeding next to her house. Mama has been an avid bird watcher for years, and she has various types of feeders just outside her living room window and her front door. Her place has always been a commune for Northern Cardinals. The ground between her living room window and a tree bank only a few feet away was completely covered with brilliant Indigo Buntings and American Goldfinches. Dispersed among them, feeding and flitting about, were Northern Cardinals and sparrows. It was such a beautiful sight. It is indelibly etched on my mind and will always be a sweet memory no matter what I may encounter in my passion for birding.

Upon arriving home and checking my messages, I heard her excited voice saying, "The **Purple Martins** have built in my gourds. They are staying!" They say, "God works in mysterious ways." I'll say he definitely made an elderly country lady very happy with eyes that can see and something so very beautiful to look at.

HEARD IN McKINNEY, TEXAS

On March 30, 1996 Pat and I had the pleasure

of birding in the McKinney, Texas area. This old east Texas town is on U. S. 75 about 20 miles north of Loop 635, LBJ Freeway in Dallas. Some of our club members have birded just south of McKinney, at Allen, which is known for having several species of longspurs wintering nearby. Allen water tower is where we found our first McCown's Longspur a couple of years ago.

I am considering including a trip to McKinney on our next year's outing schedule. To help me make this decision I need your input. I will pass out copies of additional information to those interested at the May meeting, and answer your questions during the June meeting. I think that plan is best so as not to take extra time away from our very special speaker, Nancy Newfield.

The major reason for going would be to tour the grounds and building of The Heard Museum. In addition to being a fine natural history museum, other activities include:

- 1. A major raptor rehabilitation center,
- 2. The major bird banding station in Texas,
- Feeding stations with plate glass windows for viewing,
- 4. Nature trails up and down the limestone, blackland hills,
- 5. Native prairie restoration area,
- Wetland habitat with shorebirds, gulls, ducks, etc.
- 7. This museum has had visitors from all over the world and the director has agreed to give us their best tour, since we are especially interested in birds, as he is.

The director recommended a visit either in October or May as bird banding will be operating full time, with lots of migrants. We could also combine this trip with a stop at Lake Tawakoni Dam, Paul Matthews Grassland Prairie, or Hagerman NWR depending upon the wishes of the group and the season of the year. Charlie Lyon has mentioned to me that he would be willing to lead us to Lake Tawakoni in the winter. I guarantee we will have fantastic birding.

To get the most from the Heard Museum trip a stay overnight in McKinney would be best. So please come to the meeting and let me know if this interests you. And while I really did hear a lot while in McKinney, that was not what I meant when I titled this article "Heard in McKinney."

ANSWERS TO BIRD QUIZ #42

- 1. The Cuban Bee Hummingbird is the smallest.
- 2. The Ruby-throated Hummingbird is the only one to breed in Louisiana.
- 3. Ten species of humming birds have been recorded in Louisiana, ${\bf 6}$ annually.
- 4. Anna's Hummingbird nests the earliest, since it breeds in late winter or early spring.
- 5. \$1,000! It would take approximately 100,000 Cuban Bee Hummingbirds to equal the weight of 1 adult (male) Ostrich.

- 14 North American Hummingbirds have totally black bills:
 Green Violet-ear, Lucifer, Bahama Woodstar, Blue-throated,
 Magnificent, Plain-capped Starthroat, Ruby-throated, Black-chinned,
 Costa's, Anna's, Calliope, Broad-tailed, Rufous, and Allen's (based on
 National Geographic Society Field Guide).
- 7. The **Broad-billed Hummingbird** has a broad bill to help it catch the insects that make up most of its diet. It eats more insects than any other hummer.
 - 8. The Ruby-throated Hummingbird can fly 60 mph.
- 9. The ${\bf Calliope}$ ${\bf Hummingbird}$ may use an old nest after refurbishing it.
- 10. The largest Hummingbird in the U.S. is the Magnificent Hummingbird at 5.25 inches; largest hummer in the world is the Giant Hummingbird at 8.5 inches.

thinking I must be the biggest sucker he has ever seen, but in my heart, I knew I really needed it!

The "gadget" sat in my garage for a full month till I could muster the courage to assemble the "darn thing that I just had to have." Well, to my surprise and astonishment it only took about 15 minutes to put up. I tied the spout of the mister to a branch of a mimosa sapling that has grown up closely to one of the windows of my sunroom. I

tied the small black rubber hose of the mister to the trunk tree with the twist ties that came with the gadget. It is indeed a tacky "do-hickey," as my daughter has termed it.

However, to my surprise and ultimate delight, within five minutes of turning the water on I had a beautiful male **Ruby-throated Hummingbird** bathing contentedly within the fine mist of my "tacky gadget"! Several neighbors pulled up lawn chairs to watch the fascinating sight of all the little hummers attracted to the mist as well as many other common backyard birds. 1996 MIGRATORY BIRD COUNT RESULTS

by **Hubert C. Hervey**

We had wonderful participation by the birds for this May II, 1996 NAMC. All seven groups reported great birding. This was partly due to the weather. A wet, cool front moved through our area about dawn, with thunderstorms which ended by early morning. The ground was wet and water was pooled in the fields. Such unusual birds for our area as Willet, Baird's Sandpiper, and Dunlin were observed because of these advantageous weather conditions. Twenty-two warbler species were seen including, Chestnut-sided, Blackburnian, Tennessee, Wilson's and Canada.

An amazing eleven flycatcher and kingbird species were totalled. This includes vocal identification of several difficult Empidonax flycatchers by Jim Ingold. This list includes Olive-sided, Yellow-bellied, Acadian, Willow, and Least, plus those species we expect to see and one never seen here before. That bird will apparently have to remain as a choice between Tropical and The visual distinction Couch's Kingbird. between these two species is so limited that the call or song of the bird in question must be heard before a positive determination can be made. We did not hear the bird and so it must remain Tropical\Couch's Kingbird. The odds would seem to favor it being a Couch's Kingbird judging by the nesting area being nearer to our

state. It was found by Hubert Hervey and Pat Hervey two miles west of Keatchie, La. on La. 172. Identification assistance was received from Horace Jeter and Charlie Lyon, who photographed the bird. It was not located the next day.

As you will see by the tables printed below this was our best year by a total of 13 species. We will have to go some to beat this record. I am sure this is the highest single day outing our club has ever had: 130 species in Caddo Parish, 132 species adding DeSoto and Caddo Parishes.

A special thanks to Larry and Anne Raymond for their hospitality by letting us gather at their home and feeding us after the NAMC was completed.

WHITE-FACED IBIS: NEW AREA BIRD

Six White-faced Ibis were sighted on May 4, 1996, two and one-half miles south of McDade, Bossier Parish, Louisiana by several Bird Study Group members who were on the way to Caroline Dorman's Briarwood Nature Preserve. Hubert and Pat Hervey and Will Smolenski stopped on the return trip at a slough on the east side of U. S. 71. The birds had remained there feeding until 1:30 pm and completely ignored us as we viewed them with binoculars and a scope. The white faced feature showed up very clearly. These dark

birds are actually very colorful when well seen in the spring and summer, with shades of rich maroon intermingled with glossy purple and green. The legs were reddish. One of our members has an old record of White-faced Ibis here in the spring but this is the first record for our data base.
