

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LOWER MISSISSIPPI VALLEY SHOREBIRD COUNT

Saturday, September 14 & Sunday, September 15

This is the final weekend of the count. Even if you didn't count in August, you can still participate in the September count. In fact, you are encouraged to enter your shorebird sightings at any time of the year (not just the count weekends) in the database. This annual count began in 1999 and is sponsored by the Lower Mississippi Valley Joint Venture Shorebird Monitoring Program. The objective of the Joint Venture is to ensure that adequate habitat for migrating shorebirds is provided on managed public lands as a safety net during years when habitat conditions outside of public lands are poor. The count is designed to provide two types of data: "Reliable estimates of shorebird numbers across the entire region at intervals in migration" and "estimates of turnover rates (how long are birds staying at a particular site)." To this end, volunteers are asked to count during fall migration on one designated weekend in August and another in September. You may count wherever you like for as long as you like. You enter your observations directly into the database at www.lmvjv.org/shorebird. Visit the website to learn more about the program and to register.

BSG LEAST TERN TRIP

members en o f t h e Shreveport **BSG** (Bird Study Group) embarked from Clark's Marina Elm Grove. near Louisiana, Sunday, July 14, for a late afternoon excursion on the Red River.



The weather was wonderful as the previous day's storm had cooled things down a bit. With Captains Barney Poole and Larry Raymond at their respective helms, we first traveled upriver several miles to view the Shaw Lake and Cecile Revetment Least Tern colonies. By paying close attention to the depth finder, one can circle the island near the Cecile Revetment where the terns are. The Shaw Lake colony is more of a challenge. The sandbar there is perpendicular to the river channel and the terns are at the end away from the river. The entrance to this area is VERY shallow. For us to be able to view the terns "up close and personal," the boats had to be hauled across Jerry Bertrand and Barney obligingly this entrance. climbed out of the boats and towed us into the deeper waters beyond. As usual, Jerry was just waiting for a chance to get in the water. We watched the beautiful Least Terns diving and calling and just sitting on the beach. We saw several juveniles. There was evidence of other juveniles, unseen by us, as adults were carrying food to the other side of the sandbar. Lagniappe at this location included two Black Terns hanging out with their beach buddies, the Leasts.

We then headed downriver. Just below Clark's the sandbars are fairly covered with vegetation but hosted a number of Black-necked Stilts. During the NAMC on May 11, Jerry and I saw 25 or more at this location. As we continued downriver, a flock of shorebirds flew high They did not speak to us, so remained overhead. Near Bishop Point were 60 or more anonymous. American White Pelicans. These are apparently holdovers who chose not to migrate north with the rest of the flocks that winter here with us. We turned around in sight of Lock & Dam #5 and headed home. As usual when BSG'ers get together, the consensus was "A good time was had by all."

LEAST TERN SURVEYS, 2002

east Tern surveys were run in conjunction with U. S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) personnel on the Red River in Louisiana in June, July, and August, 2002. Hubert Hervey accompanied George Chandler and David Oliver, both with the USACE. Gary Hanson was with us on August 13. These surveys only counted the terns downstream from Cash Point. I counted the terns upriver from Cash Point with Larry Raymond on July 11. Louisiana trips were made by the writer on June 17. 18. 19. and 20. starting at Cash Bend. Mile Marker 242, and ending at Lock and Dam 1, Mile Marker 40, covering more than 200 river miles. I was again on the river July 9, 10, and 11 in both Arkansas and Louisiana and July 15 and 16 with the USACE. In August we finished this years surveys on the 12 and 13, finding that many terns had already departed. The departure this year was earlier and more complete than in the past, indicating a reluctance to attempt a second nesting upon failure of the first attempt.

This year I found 14 colonies in Louisiana occupied by 304 adult **Least Terns**. These birds fledged 66 juveniles. Some nests were flooded by the river in the pool 5 colonies. Colonies in the path of the hardest of the rainstorms had eggs washed away and nests were abandoned, a common occurrence. This averages 0.43 chicks raised per pair, well under the 0.70 shown by a Missouri River study to be needed to maintain the population. Our high numbers of birds this year can be directly attributed to the success of the 2001 season. The largest and most successful colony was located two miles below the bridge at Coushatta where 40 adult terns fledged 23 juveniles.

In the 14 Arkansas colonies, I counted 372 adult **Least Terns**. These birds fledged 62 juveniles. Eight birds were still on the nest at the time of the survey, so the average number of chicks per pair is probably not much lower than in Louisiana. The .33 average is really low but not especially reliable. I did not survey the Arkansas colonies west of U.S. 71, which in the past has held 4 successful colonies. The largest colony this year was near Hervey, Arkansas, at mile marker 335, where 62 adult terns fledged 22 juveniles.

An article submitted for the September LOS Newsletter covers the past four years and compares the number of years that **Least Terns** have nested on islands in three different areas: in the pool areas below

Shreveport, from Shreveport to Arkansas, and in Arkansas. This article updates *The Journal of Louisiana Ornithology*' study reported in the Summer of 2000 issue. Copies are available by request from *Hawkeyehub@aol.com*.

The main point is that terns attempting to nest in the Pool 4 and 5 area are able to nest only on newly formed islands. These islands are getting smaller and closer to water level each year. My figures for 2002 reveal that seven colonies in the pool areas of Louisiana lasted only 1.14 years per island. Upriver from Shreveport six colonies nested 4.5 years of a six-year period.

In Arkansas thirteen colonies nested 2.46 years of a four-year period. The impact of these figures is that when new islands stop forming downriver from Shreveport, the **Least Terns** will have no place left to nest except upriver. Management procedures have been suggested and I am still waiting to see any of them put into practice.

RED RIVER WILDLIFE REFUGE DEDICATED

n August 26 a dedication ceremony highlighting the market-based approach created the nation's newest wildlife refuge. Entergy Corporation (NYSE: ETR), The Conservation Fund and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service unveiled a carbon sequestration project that will offset the environmental impacts of fossil fuel emissions, provide new fish and wildlife habitat and bring recreation-driven economic benefits to northwest Louisiana along the Red River Valley in Natchitoches Parish south of Shreveport. The area has long been known to birders as the I-49 catfish ponds.

Interior Secretary Gale Norton, U.S. Senator Mary Landrieu and U.S. Representative Jim McCrery, whose district includes the refuge, addressed the success of this public-private partnership at the dedication ceremony attended by representatives of Entergy, The Conservation Fund and the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service.

"The dedication of Red River National Wildlife Refuge represents a triumph of cooperation and partnership in the service of conservation," said Secretary of the Interior Gale A. Norton. "Thanks to the contributions of Entergy and The Conservation Fund, the new refuge will provide habitat for fish and wildlife while offering the citizens of Louisiana recreational opportunities. At the same time, the restoration of the bottomland hardwood forest will remove 240 tons of carbon from the atmosphere each year, providing cleaner air"

"Together we are restoring the rich biological diversity of the floodplain forest that once characterized the Red River Valley as a legacy for future generations of Americans to enjoy," she said.

The Conservation Fund purchased 600 acres of non-productive agricultural acreage along the Red River with financial assistance from New Orleans-based Entergy Corporation. After reforestation, the corporation plans to donate the property, along with a management endowment, to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. This gift will become the first tract of land in the Red River National Wildlife Refuge. This arrangement illustrates recent strides by businesses and environmentalists, who are increasingly forming strategic alliances for their mutual benefit.

The Red River Valley represents a historic corridor for migratory birds funneling out of North America to the Gulf Coast. An important tributary of the Mississippi River, the Red River is one of the most degraded watersheds in Louisiana. Eventually, the refuge will encompass 50,000 acres and in addition to protecting wildlife habitat and enhancing air quality, will offer public recreation opportunities such as hunting, fishing, hiking and educational outreach programs.

"The Red River National Wildlife Refuge restores to the citizens of our region a face of the Red River that was hidden long ago," said BSG member Paul Dickson, chairman of the Friends of the Red River Refuges. "Thanks to this remarkable partnership, the future of the Red River, its people and its wildlife is brighter than ever."



BIRDS TO STUDY, WHITE-FACED IBIS

Author's note: These species profiles for Northwest Louisiana are intended to be a starting point for further study of birds in the Bird



Study Group's home area. It is my hope that readers will add their own data and understanding of these bird species to the Bird Study Group database to further focus the understanding birds of our area.

hite-faced Ibis is an enigmatic visitor to our area; a shy marsh bird and one of those infrequently encountered ones that always adds interest to a birder's day. Not a typical resident for our area, this dark, thin wader is mostly found in migration but occasionally shows up in both winter and summer. White-faced Ibis is a surprise wherever or whenever it is seen in northwest Louisiana.

First recorded on the Red River by Horace Jeter on April 29, 1951, and again by Jeter two more times that year, it was not seen again for thirty years. We can guess that this agricultural wetland feeder was yet another victim of DDT and Endrin, pesticides that decimated many populations of water birds in the middle of the twentieth century.

Beginning in the late 1980's, migrants were seen with increasing regularity along the Red in fall and spring. Winter records began in December of 1997 on Pool 5 principally around mile 209. In several winters, four to six birds have established regular patterns. In the late 1990's the wintering birds used an egret roost in dead willows at the Curtis realignment and fed south of there in

the shallows on both shores. In most other winters none are seen past November. A positive identification of all of these winter birds has not been made. Specimens taken from this group included certain White-faced and others that remain unidentified at the LSU Museum of Natural Science.

Immature plegadis ibis seen here in fall and winter display plain gray facial skin and dark gray legs. This non-definitive appearance often remains into early spring. The possibility of some records actually being of the difficult to distinguish Glossy Ibis (Plegadis falcinellus) certainly exists and, in fact, many field records of plegadis ibis in our area have been assumed to be of this species though breeding colors are often not present. Indeed some photographs appearing to be of Glossy Ibis or even of hybrids have circulated through bird record committees in neighboring states. The difficulty of separating immature and other non-breeding White-faced Ibis from Glossy Ibis adds intrigue to every sighting. There are sound spring and summer records of alternate plumaged Glossy Ibis in neighboring states but thus far none in northwest Louisiana. About half of all observed fall and winter individuals cannot be identified to species, even in the hand. However, most spring and some adult fall migrants can be accurately identified as White-faced Ibis. By the time migrant White-faced Ibis pass up the Red in April and May, they display diagnostic bright red irises, red facial skin and brick-red legs.

All of our records are from the Red River corridor or along near tributaries. Migrants are often seen flying just above the water, following the channel of the river. Others are sighted feeding in shallow water in alluvial areas. They mostly feed in open, shallow waters such as marshes, cattle ponds, flooded pastures and rice fields but are also seen sitting in dead trees and occasionally feeding in swamps containing buttonbush and other semi-aquatic trees. White-faced Ibis keep to their own kind. When feeding in a water body also used by other waders the White-faced Ibis will act independently of the others including White Ibis, feeding and moving as a flock. Migrating flocks are made up of *plegadis* only. Singles are also often seen. Flocks encountered are always small, usually numbering less than 12. A flock of 26 seen in mid-October of 2001 in a rice field in Red River Parish is the largest single flock yet recorded here. No specific behavioral information has been reported from our area. Most birds are seen feeding in shallow water in the manner of White Ibis. Roosting apparently is in association with large egret roosts. Summering birds appear to also be associated with heronries.

Breeding populations in the center of the continent winter along the gulf and are probably at least part of those seen migrating on the Red in spring and fall. Gulf Coast breeding birds could occur here as well at any season. There is no data that can be used to speculate on the origin of the winter residents nor is much known about summering Red River birds.

Much is still to be discovered about this species and its occurrence on the Red River as its population expands. It is one of many species whose presence is solely dependent on the river and the diversity of its wetland habitats.

When and where to find them: Best seasons are late spring and early fall. Best spots to see White-faced Ibis are along the Red River Pools 4 and 5 by boat, the flooded area just south of Yearwood Road on the west side of LA 1, and the rice fields along LA 1 in Red River and Natchitoches Parishes.

SPECIES PROFILE SCISSOR-TAILED FLYCATCHER

con of the Red River Plains, the Scissortail as it is commonly called, is a spectacular and beloved bird of the countryside. Indeed the middle Red River country is the heart of its range and is its stronghold. The presence of Scissor-tailed Flycatcher in Louisiana is beholden to the Red as the river serves as a corridor for expansion into the suitable habitat east of the bird's traditional range. The Red River may have always been the creator of its home. Arriving with the first neotropical summer residents in later March, the Scissortailed Flycatcher can be found throughout the Red River Valley until well into fall after most others have departed. The bird's striking and unique tail, and subtle pastel

coloring of salmon, pink, gray, and black trim set it apart from all others. As if that were not enough, the behavior of these tyrant flycatchers is bold, noisy and entertaining. A Scissortail pair is always ready to assault the wayward crow or hawk that dares to come near their nesting tree. The attack is relentless and head on, with full contact accented by bold and aggressive calls. The chattering is day long and becomes an inseparable element of a summer day in the Red River pastures.

Scissor-tailed Flycatchers are most numerous along the Texas-Oklahoma border and were noted there by Freeman and Custis in 1806 and by Thomas Nutall in 1819. This is a species that stands out and thus was sure to be recorded by these earliest naturalists. Arrivals are fairly typical for the group of neotropical migrant breeding birds, but, in its departure, the Scissor-tailed Flycatcher stands out. A few adults remain, seeming to test the limits of the season until Thanksgiving most years. There are scattered records through December. These lingering holdouts are finally driven south by the cold, the exact date varying from year to year with the weather. Large congregations are seen during staging before migration. The largest of these reported was of 280 seen just south of Lucas on LA 1 by Rosemary Seidler on August 8, 2001.

The bulky nests of mostly grass are found in single isolated trees or in small groups of trees in pasture or prairie-like habitat and in pecan orchards. Nesting is also accomplished on power line poles. Power lines and fence wires are favorite perches especially during late summer staging. This is a bird of the drier parts of the alluvium, rarely outside alluvium in Louisiana. Further upstream and throughout the Blackland Prairie, they are found in dry upland sites as well so long as trees are scattered. Pecan, cottonwood, Osage orange, and sycamore are favorites. They avoid swamps, moist soil areas, and forest. In the lower Red they mostly avoid upland areas even in seemingly appropriate habitat. They are often found nesting in close proximity to two closely related species, Eastern Kingbird, and Western Kingbird without apparent conflict. Such zones are no place to be a crow.

The Scissor-tailed Flycatcher's appearance in the region of the lower Red has been assumed by some to be a recent phenomenon and indeed newly cleared areas have been colonized. Landscape change along the Red River has occurred throughout the last 200 years and perhaps, considering Native American slash and burn agriculture, even throughout the last 1,000 years or more.

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The dynamic nature of the Great Raft of the Red River may have provided ephemeral habitat through the centuries as well. The sudden appearance of savannah may not be a totally new event. Scissor-tailed Flycatcher is very specific about its choice of habitat and tree type, choosing an early succession stage or fire and grazing maintained habitat of open fields and pastures. It is likely that its range has varied with the presence of dry prairie or the anthropogenic equivalent of it for the life of the Red River Valley. So too can it be expected to vary in the future.

When and where to find them: Nesting from mostly in May and June. Large staging congregations are seen in August. Seen along LA 1 at Flournoy-Lucas Road and south for about two miles. Look for large congregations here in early August; nesting pairs are common on Sentell Road at Dixie and along Old Dixie Hwy from Shreveport north to Missionary near LA 2.

INCA DOVES MAKE A HOME IN KEATCHIE!

s I drove down the road to my home outside of Keatchie I was greeted by a flock of Inca Doves. They gathered there because my wonderful neighbor, Lillie Mae Phillips, fed then along with her chickens. Daily they welcome us as we drove back and forth.

Larry Raymond was there one day to bird, saw the Inca Doves and said, "we really need to be looking for a nest. The doves must be nesting somewhere. We just haven't found the nest yet." I thought, "What fun it would be to find nesting Inca Doves."

I walked down to Lillie Mae's house and told her of my interest in the doves. She said, "Oh! They were making a nest on my porch and I got a broom and knocked it down." I almost fainted! Each day I sat on her porch and watched the doves. On May 23 we found the nest on a sycamore tree five feet from her porch. It was a perfect spot. There was a short gnarly limb with an indentation in which they made their nest. It was only 12 feet off the ground.

We had a perfect view from Lillie Mae's porch. I went each morning and evening and watched the dove on her nest - in the same position - never moving. I only saw the parent leave the nest once for five minutes. On May

28 my son, John Fontaine, climbed a ladder and took pictures of two perfect white eggs. On June 6 the Inca Doves hatched. John took more pictures on June 11 and again on June 14 as the chicks developed.

It was fun to sit on Lillie Mae's porch, with her family and my bird friends, sharing the wonders of God's marvelous creation. The parents built a perfect nest, took careful care of their babies to watch them fledge on June 18. I wouldn't have missed it for the world. We have the first documented nesting of Inca Doves in Desoto Parish.

She was wondering what was really occurring. Mac Hardy said that Cattle Egrets eat frogs.

IVORY-BILLED WOODPECKER SEARCH RESULTS

The Cornell Lab of Ornithology

Ithaca, NY/ Richmond, VA, June 9, 2002 - Since early January, bird researchers, conservationists, and bird enthusiasts everywhere have been holding their breath for results of a series of cooperative expeditions conducted by the Cornell Lab of Ornithology, Zeiss Sports Optics, and the Louisiana Department of Wildlife & Fisheries in search of the Ivory-billed Woodpecker. Although the species has been long thought to be extinct, recent reports suggested that a few could have lingered undetected in a remote part of Louisiana.

Analysis of more than 4000 hours of digital data captured by 12 acoustic recording units (ARUs), developed by the Cornell Lab's team of bioacoustics engineers, have shown no indication of the species' presence.

"As you can imagine, this is not what we had hoped for," says John Fitzpatrick, director of the Cornell Lab of Ornithology and a leader of the expedition. "Although we're disappointed by the results so far, it is important from a biological as well as a historical standpoint to determine once and for all the status of this magnificent bird."

From late January through mid-March, the ARUs recorded sounds, natural and otherwise, from 12 different positions throughout the forests of the Pearl River drainage, where they had been deployed by researchers following rugged hikes through bayous, brambles, and mud. At one point during the exploration, two different research teams independently heard loud double raps that sounded suspiciously like the distinctive display drum of the Ivory-billed Woodpecker.

Sadly, analysis of the ARU data proved that the sounds were distant gun shots, with reverberations that sounded to human ears like drumming on a hollow snag.

"If there is good news here, it is in knowing that the ARU technology could provide independent and conclusive evidence as to the nature of these sounds," says Fitzpatrick.

Fitzpatrick adds that he does not consider the results of this winter's work to be conclusive as to the presence or absence of **Ivory-billed Woodpeckers** in southern Louisiana, or even in the Pearl River forests. Persistent accounts bearing a reasonable level of credibility suggest that the possibility demands continued scientific inquiry.

Ivory-billed Woodpeckers were known to be highly mobile, sometimes moving great distances as their principal resources (large, recently-dead trees) became available or aged beyond use. The bottomland hardwood forests of the lower Pearl River are extensive, and they are in better condition to support large woodpecker populations today than they have been for 100 or more years. "We do not view it as impossible that one to several pairs of Ivory-bills could be using portions of the Pearl River forests that were outside the geographic scope of our search," says Fitzpatrick.

The Cornell Lab of Ornithology and Zeiss Sports Optics have had preliminary discussions about how to proceed with follow-up research. "The Ivory-billed Woodpecker continues to be of great interest not only to those of us involved in this recent research but to millions of people worldwide," says Anthony R. Cataldo, vice president and general manager, Zeiss Sports Optics North America. "We look forward to working with our partners at Cornell and the Louisiana Department of Wildlife and Fisheries to map out the next stages of this important research."

According to Fitzpatrick, today's renewed interest in the **Ivory-billed Woodpecker** should kindle much more than dim hopes of a dramatic rediscovery. He says that whether or not the bird still exists, the Ivory-billed story demands full attention as a vivid symbol of what many view as the most comprehensive conservation failure of 20th Century America. By 1900, millions of acres of virgin pine and hardwood still existed in the southeastern U.S., including in Louisiana. For a variety of reasons, those who had opportunities to do so failed to save even a single tract of this primary forest.

As a result of the expeditions, the Cornell Lab of Ornithology researchers are working with others to draft recommendations on how best to manage the habitat for continued regeneration toward old-growth conditions. "Today's generation of Louisianans will never see bottomland forests of the stature that were occupied by Ivory-billed Woodpeckers. Nor will their children, nor their grandchildren," says Fitzpatrick. "Conditions in the Pearl River are steadily improving but they have a long way to go before they reach the age-classes and volumes of standing dead wood that were present when the Ivory-billed Woodpecker was active. And, these forests are still at our mercy. We need to treat them as such."





RED-COCKADED WOODPECKER MANAGEMENT ON THE NATIONAL FOREST

he Kisatchie National Forest is home to approximately 268 Red-cockaded Woodpecker (RCW) families, or clusters. This endangered species once ranged across the Southeast United States. A loss of habitat caused the population to decline and the bird was listed under the Endangered Species Act in 1970.

Removal of the RCW from the endangered species list (recovery) is a major goal of the U.S. Forest Service and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. The range of this species is from Texas over to Florida and north to Kentucky. The National Forests of the south are home to more than half of the known RCW and the Kisatchie harbors more than 75% of the RCW known to live in Louisiana. On the Kisatchie National Forest, the goal is to reach 1,457 clusters on the four southernmost Districts (Kisatchie, Winn, Catahoula, and Calcasieu).

Recovery of the RCW is only one component of the long-term goals of the Kisatchie. The RCW is an indicator species for the longleaf pine/bluestem grass ecosystem that once ranged from east Texas to the mid-Atlantic states and locally from Natchitoches Parish to Washington Parish. The U.S. Forest Service mission is to restore this ecosystem across its native range on National Forest lands.

After the longleaf pine forests of Louisiana and the southeast were cut out between the 1880's and 1930's, reforestation efforts began on a large scale. During the



----early days of Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) reforestation, forest managers realized the value of replacing "like with like", and the overall planted species distribution for CCC plantings was over 60% longleaf. However, because they didn't have modern silvicultural technology, longleaf pine survival was less than 25% by Planting of loblolly 1947. vincreased dramatically by the , mid 50's, so that loblolly now stands as 47% of the lands managed for pine on the National Forest. Overzealous fire protection efforts during the past 60 years allowed this new forest to grow into thick stands of even-aged pines with dense midstory.

The RCW relies on a habitat of open, park-like stands of pine with very little midstory, much like what was reported by this mid 19th century explorer...

"much of the forest is covered exclusively with longleaf pine; not broken, but rolling like waves in the middle of the great ocean...giant pines for a hundred miles or more. The grass grows three feet high and hill and valley are studded all over with flowers of every hue."

Restoration of the RCW habitat on the Kisatchie requires intensive forest management, including timber harvesting, prescribed burning, and herbicide use. Because trees in the original forests were regularly subjected to insects, disease and fires, the Forest Service plans to recapture this sense of openness with regular thinning of the pines throughout the RCW habitat management areas (HMA) on the Forest. Frequent timber sales within the RCW HMAs provide poles, peeler logs, saw timber, and chip 'n saw logs for local mills.

The RCW was historically adapted to the Longleaf Pine/Bluestem ecosystem, which relied on periodic fire to control understory brush and small midstory hardwood trees. Regular prescribed burning of the Kisatchie is necessary to maintain low ground cover and control hardwood sprouting. The Longleaf pine is largely intolerant of competition or shade when it is in the seedling/sapling stage. In combination with burning it is often necessary to apply herbicides to kill competing species in Longleaf plantations.

Off-site species, such as slash and loblolly pine, must be clear cut and replanted with native species in order to achieve the long-term goal of restoration. Within the HMAs, clearcuts are limited to 25 acres in size and adequate foraging habitat must be maintained for the RCW. Older trees will be retained to support the new clusters of RCW needed to attain our forest goal and to supply replacements for existing cavity trees.

All other woodpeckers use dead trees for their cavities, but the RCW is the only woodpecker that makes a cavity in a living pine tree. Most cavity trees are more than 80 years old and many are infected with the redheart fungus, which creates a center of decayed wood within the pine. Making a cavity can take several years, and the excavation process is easier and faster if the tree is infected with redheart. The RCW require older trees because they have enough heartwood to contain the cavity. The cavity cannot be placed within the sapwood since it would fill with resin.

The cavity of the RCW is its home and the place the bird sleeps every night. Most other woodpeckers only nest in a cavity and sleep on branches the rest of the year. Once the cavity is complete the RCW makes resin wells on the tree by pecking on a small area, keeping it wounded and "bleeding" sap. The coating of sap on the tree prevents many predators, such as rat snakes, from climbing the tree and eating the eggs, chicks or adults. The resin coat eventually covers the bark giving the whole tree a distinctive candle-like appearance, which makes it easier to locate in the forest.

The birds live in a group of trees called a cluster; there are trees with completed cavities, cavities under construction, and usually some cavities that are not being used. Cavities are often in short supply and so competition for them is great, especially from cavity users who are unable to construct their own cavities. Many other birds (other woodpeckers, songbirds, owls), mammals (squirrels) and some snakes, frogs and lizards use the cavities. In addition, many critters that use the cavities enlarge them making them unsuitable for RCW to ever use them again. There may be only one tree with lots of cavities or more than 15 trees. In most cases the

trees are within a 1,500-foot circle. The cluster site is open and park like with large trees and grassy undergrowth, and not much midstory vegetation. The RCW requires this open landscape and will abandon an area if the midstory trees obstruct the cavities or flight path between the trees.

The RCW mostly feeds on insects, insect eggs, and larvae on pine trees. Each group establishes a foraging area adjacent to the cluster site and defends it from other RCW. The size of the area depends on the quality of the foraging and the number of trees. Lightning-struck and dying trees become an insect hot spot and offer an easier feeding opportunity for the woodpeckers. Once trees die they become available for other types of woodpeckers to make cavities in and offer more cavities for competitors.

The social structure of the RCW family group is quite unusual. The family group is one breeding pair (adult male and female) and young birds for a few months after nesting. Young males called helpers are allowed to remain in the family group and help with the construction of cavities as well as incubating and caring for the young. The helpers might move into the breeding male position when the dominant male dies. Young females are generally encouraged to disperse (move away) from the "home" cluster by the dominant female (their mother). Dispersed birds either find another cluster to join or stay as floaters outside the territories of a cluster.

The public forest lands in the south create the core populations of RCW, but recovery of the species will depend on management of private forests also. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is responsible for the Recovery Plan of the RCW.

Many forest visitors want to see this unusual woodpecker in its natural habitat and many birders travel long distances to observe this rare bird. The best time to see the RCW is at sunrise or sunset within the cluster area. During the nesting season (March thru July), you may see the birds feeding young and other times of the year (especially in the summer/fall), you might observe the birds working on cavities. PLEASE USE CAUTION DURING THE NESTING SEASON TO AVOID DISTURBING THE BIRDS!! You should stay on the road or at least a safe distance from the birds where they continue their activities and your presence does not disturb them.

Locations to observe the birds are scattered throughout the forest, but a list of easy viewing locations follows. Cavity trees are marked with a large (average 2-foot wide) white painted band on the tree trunk.

Look for these painted trees on the following roads: Winn Ranger District -- Dean Rd (#507), Coochie Brake Rd (#541), and Black Mountain Rd (#509).

RCW populations on the Winn have been as high as 21 active clusters, but have remained stable over the last several years with a population of 17 active clusters. Populations on the Winn and Catahoula Ranger Districts have slightly increased or remained stable, populations on the Evangeline have increased, while populations on the Kisatchie and Vernon have declined.



A SECOND CHANCE FOR THE RED-COCKADED WOODPECKER, PICOIDES BOREALIS

ost of Louisiana's residents have never seen a Red-cockaded Woodpecker (RCW), and for those who have it is usually from a distance. An RCW cluster, the center of a breeding pair's activity, is typically off limits to all but authorized personnel. The RCW has been federally listed as an endangered species since 1968 and therefore is legally protected from disturbance. Concern for the survival of the species has prompted several states to initiate Safe Harbor Programs, which entice private landowners to manage their land for this endangered woodpecker.

R e d cockaded Woodpeckers were once common in the extensive longleaf pine (Pinus)palustris) forests of the southeastern United States. In the early 1900's most of longleaf the forests pine were harvested leaving **RCW** little habitat.



Somehow the species survived and today through recovery efforts the population is in better shape now than in the past. RCWs are the only living woodpecker that builds its nest cavities in living trees and prefers longleaf pine that is 60 years or older. The need for mature trees directly conflicts with the short rotation of timber growth and harvest that most private and commercial landowners have adopted, hence a reason to establish a Safe Harbor Program for landowners and RCWs.

Safe Harbor Programs (SHP) are used by state conservation agency to allow some private landowners to manage their lands without the fears associated with RCWs. SHPs work by assessing a landowner's property for groups of RCWs at the time of enrollment (their baseline) and not holding the landowner accountable for any new clusters of RCWs that develop while under the SHP. This is beneficial to the landowners because their property can be managed, outside of the baseline clusters and foraging areas, to their wishes and they do not have to worry about violating the Endangered Species Act. RCWs benefit from SHPs because enrolled landowners voluntarily manage habitat that is suitable in which the birds can nest and forage. The landowner agrees to management practices and reports accomplishments yearly to LDWF. Landowners are also required to contact LDWF 60 days prior to any major management actions that will take place on the property. This allows LDWF to move, if it so wishes, the affected clusters of RCWs. It is important to note that certain

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management activities inside the baseline area can be made, but have some restrictions (for example the depth of tillage, tree removal, etc.). Louisiana's Safe Harbor Program is in the last stages of review by the US Fish and Wildlife Service and we anticipate implementation will start in early 2003.

At the present time, the majority of Louisiana's RCWs are located on federal or state-owned lands, but there are clusters of RCWs on private lands that currently restrict management. The exact number of RCWs on private lands is not known. With authorization by the private lands for birds. Current tracts of mature pine located on federal or state-owned lands will not be sufficient to allow the number of RCWs to increase enough to be taken off of the endangered species list in this state. Hopefully the program will attract adjoining landowners and let them see the benefits mature pine trees contribute to the continued survival of the Red-cockaded Woodpecker.

A voluntary cooperative effort among federal, state, and private landowners is necessary for the complete recovery of the RCW. Allowing the landowner to continue to manage the land as they desire, while participating in the recovery of an endangered species on their land, should be an uplifting and positive experience The Safe Harbor Program is for the landowner. specifically designed to do this by helping the landowner be free from maintaining habitat for above-baseline RCW clusters and at the same time addressing the needs and concerns for the RCW on private lands. All parties involved must work together if there is to be any hope in restoring the Red-cockaded Woodpecker to its native range that covered most of the southeastern United States.

ashville Warbler is a trusting bird, often coming very close to a birder using a screech owl tape or squeaking. This trait is shared by other birds that, like the Nashville Warbler, come to us from the far north woods. There in the solitude of cool northern forests of mountains and high latitudes alike, they spend the summer and breed. Spring and Fall find them in migration and passing through northwest Louisiana en route to Mexico and Central America.

The first impression of a Nashville Warbler as it appears out of dense cover is of a warbler with a gray hood and a bold eye ring. The next marks to seek are the yellow throat and plain, unbarred wings. These field marks noted, a Nashville Warbler is at hand. They are lively warblers as well, often flicking their tails and sometimes themselves side to side repetitiously as they move through vegetation in search of insects. Nashville Warblers sing in spring migration but are usually silent in fall.

Nashville Warbler stands out in fall as a later migrant. While other northern nesting species begin to appear in our area as early as July, Nashville Warbler does not appear until September at the earliest, and not in good numbers until the very end of that month. October is the month when this

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species is most often encountered in the Red River Valley, a time when most earlier migrant warbler species are already on their wintering grounds. Though it does not winter here, its main passage is concurrent with the arrival of our wintering warbler species. Its spring migration period of mid to late April does not differ markedly from other wood warblers

Where to find it: LSUS Red River Research Park in understory vegetation. Also other brushy and wooded waterside locations such as Bishop Point on Red River and Fleming Park on Cross Lake. Nashville Warbler can show up just about anywhere in thicket type habitat.

A TASTE OF AUTUMN

orthern folks won't understand how we can be so glad to bid "adieu" to summer, but our season of long days and short nights can be beastly hot and brutally dry or equally brutally wet. This summer past was neither, but temperatures above 90°F with 85% humidity are positively enervating, so outdoor activities often become more chores than joys.

Autumn has always been my favorite season. As a child, I looked forward to cool crisp air and the aroma of sweet pecan pie baking in the oven. As an adult, I look forward to cool crisp air and the sounds of Rufous Hummingbirds chp, chp, chppering from the shrubbery.


Today, the first day off after straight days of banding, I slept late and missed the first arrivals. I was disappointed in myself, but set about to see which birds might be around. The first bird in was Ms. Rufous #1, the one that stays over in a neighbor's yard and seldom uses my offerings. She sat sipped from a "Little Beginner" and then chased an immature male Ruby-throated away from the luxuriant Sultan's Turban.

The second visitor was Ms. Selasphorus #3, a youngster who arrived 30 August. I had not seen her since 4 September and thought she had gone. She enjoyed the Red Morning Glory flowers that threaten to overgrow the entire front porch. No feeder for this gal. Wish I could figure out a way to catch her.

Ruby-throated activity was moderate. Maybe I am jaded by the stunning numbers Olga Clifton and Margaret Owens host. The press of work at home cut hummingbirding time short, but as I typed away on an article, I spied Ms. Rufous #4 using a "Four Fountains" near the back fence. I had not seen her since 4 September.

Of the four *Selasphorus* I've tallied so far this fall, three are still around. The fourth one, banded on the right leg, seems to have moved on. She was present for about an hour on 30 August, but she must have heard a call from one of our Humnetters further east.

A taste of autumn is in the air. I just wish it could last forever.

SUBMITTING BIRD RECORDS

By Mac Hardy

he Bird Study Group maintains a permanent computer file of bird records for the region of northwestern Louisiana that includes all of the parishes of Caddo, Bossier, Bienville, Red River, Webster, DeSoto, Claiborne, and the northwestern part (including the Spanish Lake lowlands) of Natchitoches Parish. The database consists of over 116,000 records, dating back to the 1950's. We welcome additions to the database, especially older records that would be very important to document changes in our bird fauna. This article is intended to help you improve the quality of your bird records. The following notes should be followed for every bird outing.

KEEP ACCURATE RECORDS. Record the observers in your party if someone is with you in the



Record the field. specific locality where the birds were seen, the date they were seen, and the numbers individuals of each species seen. Add any other available data, such as the time day, weather conditions, habitat.

etc. Be sure all of your notes are written; do not rely on your memory for any bird data.

AVOID AMBIGUOUS DATA. Locality: A locality given as "LA 1" is just about worthless. Where on this 300-mile stretch of highway was the rare bird seen? Be specific. Write down the parish and the direction and distance to the nearest town (such as 2.3 miles north of

Vivian, Caddo Parish; 10 miles east of Coushatta, Red River Parish; 3.4 miles southeast (by US 171, Keithville, Caddo Parish). *Numbers of birds*: Use numbers and be as accurate as possible. If you could count at least 25, but you know there were more, list the number as 25, not "more than 25" or "25+." If you list "about 20," we record it as 20. Do not list birds as "a few," "some," "many," or other such nonspecific terms. All terms such as these are recorded in the database as 2. If you use only a check mark, it is recorded as 1. Do not guess at high numbers. Report the highest number for which you have 100% confidence.

How to Submit Bird records to the BSG database.

- Use the database (database using DBF format) to record your observations, then email records (some or all of your database) to lsusmus@prysm.net (you can also bring the records to the Museum on disk).
- 2. Use another computer system and export a report in one of the following formats: .DBF (dBase, etc.), .WS (mail merge, comma delimited), .DIF (visicalc), .FXD (random fixed length), .LD (line delimited, one field per line), .SDF (text editor, fixed line with c/r), .USR (user defined delimiters), or .WP (word perfect).
- **3.** Send or e-mail bird report forms or checklists to lsusmus@prysm.net.
- **4.** E-mail reports that consist of a list of species and numbers clearly listed with a specific locality and date.
- **5.** Fax reports or checklist to 318-797-5222.

I will be glad to set up the bird records system on your computer. We will not extract data from paragraphs of descriptions, trip reports, or other wonderful writings.

Keep a complete list every time you go birding. The database should be as comprehensive as possible and contain good data on all species. We want the users to have information that is as accurate as possible. When we generate a list of birds from a particular locality or area, the list should be a profile of the total bird community. The user should be able to tell how prevalent each species is in the community. If common species are omitted from your daily trip lists, then those common species will be severely misrepresented for that community. So, report all of the birds you see -- it is NOT too much trouble.

BIRD REPORT - COMPILED SEPTEMBER 23, 2002

Report bird records for the newsletter to Mac Hardy by the 15th of each month. Following each species is a line of data in the following format: date, initials of observer, number of birds observed, initials of another observer, number of birds observed, etc. For example: 01/12/99 PD two means that on 01/12/99 PD saw 2 birds. For the number of birds observed, a 1 is used both for 1 specimen and for numbers not reported by the observer. All bird records reported here are the responsibility of the observer. The Bird Study Group is reporting observations on the word of the observers.

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

The Double-Crested Cormorant in Northern Lake Michigan

ur November program will be given by Dr. Beth Leuck of Centenary College on November 12 at 7:00 p.m. The **Double-crested Cormorant** populations increased dramatically during the 1990's. To assess their effects on the fish population of northern Lake Michigan, a team of researchers spent the past three years counting individuals in breeding colonies, collecting regurgitated fish from the colonies, and analyzing the stomach contents of adult birds. Their results indicate that cormorants are opportunistic feeders and that there is no evidence that they are directly targeting small-mouth bass or other game fish.

Dr. Lecuck earned her Master's and Ph.D. degree from the University of Oklahoma in zoology and has taught in the biology department of Centenary College for 22 years. Dr. Leuck has been conducting research on Lake Michigan for 17 years on **Double-crested Cormorant** populations.

he forecast for Sunday, October 13, predicted cloudy, overcast skies, 15 to 20 mph winds, and temperatures in the 60's. Not an auspicious day for birdwatching it seemed. Every self-respecting bird would be hunkered down in some dense foliage holding on for dear life, or so we thought. Undaunted, the Big Sitters determined to do the best we could under adverse Jerry Bertrand and I arrived at Bickham conditions. Dickson Park at 6:30 a.m. The front had not moved in and the weather before dawn was warm and muggy. In the distance, a Great Horned Owl hooted. And so the Big Sit of 2002 commenced with the last bird of the 2001 Big Sit.

Dawn had not broken when Laurie Robertson arrived to help set up, hoping to add some owls to her list. By now, cardinals were chipping, Carolina Chickadees were chattering, and Carolina Wrens were singing in the woods. A few minutes after 7 a.m., Charlie Lyon showed up carrying his scope and no chair. Although we did not realize it at the time, "no chair" was significant in more ways than one. Charlie had been monitoring the weather and believed (contrary to the opinion of the lessexperienced-with-the-effect-of-weather-patterns-on-birdmovement birders) that the day could bring some good Jeff Trahan walked up with his scope a few stuff. minutes later followed by ME (Mary Ellen) Lewis and Betsy Moreland, who drove from Claiborne Parish for the Sit. Linda Adrion, taking a break from her usual combined activity of golf-birding, Jean Trahan and Rosemary Seidler were hot on their heels and what would become known as the "2002 Big Sit and Hawk Watch" began in earnest.

Earlier in the week, we had baited the field with platform and hanging feeders and sprinkled mixed seed and corn in bare areas under trees, by the fence, and along the road. The only takers the day of the Sit were a few cardinals on the platform feeders and some Mourning Doves under a tree. Jerry found deer tracks by the seed on the road and one of a group of horseback riders heading to the back of the park said that her horse had discovered the seed on Saturday. So, although we may not have fed many birds, we did attract some critters. If we ever have a deer or horse count, we'll know what to do. We had hung two nectar feeders and Laurie found a Ruby-throated Hummingbird, one of our first birds of the day, perched in the tree near one of the feeders. We determined to put out all the feeders at least two weeks in advance next year.

Although the rest of us had brought chairs, they went virtually unused for the first hours, as the Big Sit became the Big Stand. We milled about in our circle, alternating between periods of scanning the skies and staring into the woods, and pondering such weighty questions as to just how many birders you could put in a 17-foot circle. Late in the day, Charlie remarked and later



repeated in his post to the BSG Bird Alert service that he never thought he could have stayed in one place for so long. My reply was, "Charlie, you haven't." When he wasn't checking out birds through the spotting scope, he was beating the woods, tape player in hand, attempting to summon up birds to perch where we could see them. This was harder than it might seem. Charlie would call out a bird and a location, while those of us directionally challenged would say, "Where, where? In the willow? What's a willow look like? I don't see it. Do you see it?" Jean Trahan, ever the eagle eye, although her specialty is usually large birds at impossible distances, managed to see a Black-throated Green Warbler. But some birds remained elusive. The rules are that, although you may leave the circle to identify a bird, someone in the circle must be able to see or hear that bird. For this reason, despite being sighted by Charlie in the woods, Tufted Titmouse was a heardonly bird.

As the arctic front moved in, the significance of the park's location next to the Red River was apparent. Migrating birds following the river south flew over our heads. Strong flying Greater White-fronted Geese led the way. By the end of the day, 367 had passed over us. Then came the raptors: 51 Broad-winged Hawks, 10 Sharp-shinned Hawks, 5 Red-tailed Hawks, 3 Redshouldered Hawks, 3 Cooper's Hawks, 2 Osprey, a Peregrine Falcon, and an American Kestrel. One would have thought we were at Hazel Bazemore Park in Corpus Christi. Okay, maybe not, but the numbers were

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very impressive for northwest Louisiana. Large migrating flocks of non-raptors included 59 **White Ibis** and 300 **American Robins**.

By 8:30 a.m., 41 of the day's 68 birds had been spotted or heard. Although many of these 41 species would be sighted again during the day, several were neither heard nor seen again after 8:30, including Great Horned Owl, Northern Waterthrush, Lesser Yellowlegs and Common Snipe. In our case, the Van Remsen "the early birder catches the bird" theory held This theory, recently posted to LABIRD, the Louisiana Bird Alert service, by Van, Director of the LSU Museum of Natural Sciences in Baton Rouge, states that 50% of your day's birds can be seen in the time period beginning a half hour before dawn and ending approximately one hour after dawn. The idea seems to be that if you get up really early and start birding before dawn, you will be able to compress your birding into a much shorter period of time, so that you can go home early. To do what, I don't know, probably to take a nap.

The great Neotropic Cormorant/Anhinga debate took place later in the day. Jeff, Rosemary, Jean, and Jerry spotted a bird, which they initially identified as an Anhinga. Charlie got it in his scope and identified it as a Neotropic Cormorant. Jean, amidst accusations from Jeff and Rosemary of being a traitor, sided with Charlie because he saw it through his scope. After listening to Charlie's description of differences between the two species and a field guide consultation, Jerry also agreed with Charlie. The remaining Big Sit participants prudently refused to become involved. After much bickering, uh, excuse me, discussion, the debate was amicably (more or less) settled with the decision that the bird was a Neotropic Cormorant.

Toward afternoon, Rosemary and Jean found a **Green Heron** in the ditch where the culverts run under the road. Hoping to flush the bird so it could be seen from the Big Sit circle, Charlie walked down the ditch while Rosemary clapped her hands loudly. Instead of flying up, the bird only flew further away along the ditch. Later in the day, the bird, unfazed by the earlier attack, returned to the same spot in the ditch. This time, master tactician Jeff Trahan walked through the woods to approach the heron from the other end of the ditch, while Rosemary again clapped her hands at our end. This worked; the heron flew up into one of the dead trees across the road from us and posed for several

minutes, as if to say, "I don't know what the problem is with you people that you can't let a bird sit peacefully, but here I am, take a good look, because it's the last you'll see of me today."

For the preceding two years, **Vermilion Flycatchers** have been seen in October at Bickham Dickson Park and one has stayed the winter each year. The first sightings last year were during the week after the Big Sit. This year, not one but two birds, an adult male and an immature male, had been seen in the park on a regular basis for over a week before the Sit. Hoping against hope that at least one would leave the easy insect pickings over by the lake long enough to be counted from the circle, we were elated when one was spotted flying across the far end of the field. In 2001, circles in Arizona, Texas, and Mexico were the only ones to report **Vermilion Flycatchers.** This year, the exotic location of Shreveport, Louisiana, will join that elite list.

As the day wore on, Bill Wood joined us, Jim Ingold dropped by, and Mac Hardy arrived to bird and hunt spiders. Participants gradually faded away until, by late afternoon, only Mac, Jerry, and I were left. Lily Poole, who had just gotten off work, came to finish out the day with us. Near dusk, we added our 68th and last species of the day, as **Common Nighthawks** performed acrobatics overhead. Finally, at 7:30 p.m., Jerry and I, alone again as we had been at the beginning of the Big Sit, packed up our belongings and headed home, as the eerie call of an **Eastern Screech Owl** sounded in the woods.

Postscript: Species counted during the 2001 Big Sit missing in 2002 included Little Blue Heron, Tricolored Heron, and Cattle Egret (the absence of last year's "heronoid" roost hurt us here), Black Vulture, Northern Harrier (both male and female flew low directly over us last year), Hairy Woodpecker, and Loggerhead Shrike (present by the lake, but not venturing to our side of the park).

MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING

October 8, 2002, 7:00 p.m., Museum of Life Sciences at LSUS

Bill Weyman made a presentation of his favorite videos from the United States, Africa, and Central America along with personal comments and tips on how to take video.

Treasurer's Report - Jean Trahan reported that on August 31 the club had \$2,117.34 in the bank. In addition, we had \$519.66 and \$272.44 in prepaid expenses at the post office and LSUS printing, respectively. The fund balance is \$2,909.44. Total income for the month of August was \$377.00 and expenses totaled \$185.95 yielding a net income of \$191.05 for the month.

Field Trips - Nancy Menasco reported on future field trips. The club will host The Big Sit Sunday, October 13, at Bickham Dickson Park near the horse barn. This will last from dawn to dusk. We will sit in one location and count all of the birds we see. Jim Ingold will lead a field trip to see the **Red-cockaded Woodpecker** in Kisatchie in the National Forest on October 19. Meet at 5:45 a.m. in the Brookshires parking lot at the corner of Barksdale Boulevard and LA 511. On Saturday, November 9, Larry Raymond will lead a bird walk at Eddie D. Jones Nature Park. Participants will meet at 7:30 a.m. at the Museum of Life Sciences.

Bumper Stickers – Lily Poole showed several bumper stickers that she developed. Bill Wood showed another that he had worked on. Club members were asked to select which they thought would work best.

Membership – Lily Poole reported that we have 100 paid accounts and that half are family accounts.

Newsletter – Bill Wood solicited more articles for upcoming newsletters.

Bird Talk – Nancy Menasco and Jerry Bertrand saw a Sooty Tern on the Red River near Bishop Point. They also saw four Roseate Spoonbills and several *Plegadis* near mile marker 208 that they could not specifically identify. Rosemary Seidler saw about 1,600 Chimney Swifts flying down river near the Hollywood Casino downtown on the Red River. Linda Adrion saw two Vermilion Flycatchers at Bickham Dickson Park. One was an adult male, the other an immature male. On September 21, Charlie Lyon saw nine Common Terns on the Red River near Bishop Point and seven more on Cross Lake. In addition he saw a Peregrine Falcon and 248 Caspian Terns on the Red River.



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

Yearwood Road to the WMA searching for sparrows, wrens, Northern Harriers, Short-eared Owls, and other winter visitors. Harriers and Short-eared Owls are often found in the same habitat in the winter. Any of our resident owls, including Barn, Barred, Great Horned, and Eastern Screech are possibilities in this neighborhood. The Barn Owls have their own nesting platforms at the WMA. Participants should be aware of the following requirement of the Louisiana Department of Wildlife and Fisheries:

"Persons using WMAs or other department administered lands for purposes other than hunting and fishing, such as camping, shooting on rifle ranges, berry picking, hiking, photography, bird-watching and the like, must possess one of the following: a valid Wild Louisiana Stamp, a valid Louisiana fishing license, or a valid Louisiana hunting license. Persons younger than 16 or older than 60 years of age are exempt from this requirement." Stamps and/or licenses may be purchased at such stores as Wal-Mart and Academy Sports, by telephone at 1-888-765-2602, or online at http://www.wlf.state.la.us/. The cost of an annual Wild Louisiana Stamp is \$5.00.

EDDIE JONES PARK BIRD STUDY GROUP FIELD TRIP

en BSG members and Don Stoecker of Montana met at 7:30 a.m. on Saturday, November 9, 2002, to caravan to the newly developed Eddie Jones Park in the southwest corner of Caddo Parish. Seven additional people and park ranger, Doug Rainwater, met the group at the site to begin the trip. The caravan stopped briefly just inside the entrance of the park for me to provide a brief overview and orientation to the area.

From there, the group drove to the parking lot near the visitor center, which is still under construction. The visitor center is immediately adjacent to a tall silo that is no longer in use, except as a roosting site for **Rock Dove**.

As the trip leader, I want to extend special appreciation to Charles Lyon and John McBride, Jr. for their assistance in spotting and identifying all birds seen. It's always a treat to have lots of trained eyes and ears on a field trip. Despite a relatively windy morning, we recorded forty-four species in the park. Other participants who helped find and identify birds included Linda Adrion, Jerry Bertrand, Roy and Vera Bott, Mac Hardy, Mary Jacobs, Neilson Jacobs, Ann McLaurin, Nancy Menasco, Mary and Tom Nesbitt, Chuck and Sally Moffett and Jeff Trahan. Roy Bott also used this opportunity to botanize in the park, and Jeff Trahan was able to observe several butterflies that were active during the field trip.

We began birding the brushy areas near the visitor center. Here, we recorded American Kestrel, Eastern Phoebe, Red-bellied Woodpecker, Northern Flicker, Ruby-crowned Kinglet, Eastern Bluebird, Pine Warbler, White-crowned Sparrow, Song Sparrow and others, and a small flock of eight American Goldfinch flying over. From here we walked the unimproved road that travels in front of the Chimp Haven site to the two ponds at the base of the landfill. At one stop, we added lots of birds, including Yellow-bellied Sapsucker, Downy and Hairy Woodpecker, Carolina Chickadee, Tufted Titmouse, Golden-crowned Kinglet, Hermit Thrush, Yellow-rumped Warbler and Pine Warbler. Flocks of fifty and more American Robin flew over our heads periodically all morning.


As we approached the ponds, several people noted a large hawk-like bird approaching. Charlie immediately called out **Osprey** and all of us enjoyed watching the bird circle the ponds. At about the same time, Charlie spotted a **Sharp-shinned Hawk** flying over the old landfill site beyond the ponds. We also added **Turkey Vulture** here. Later we added another **American Kestrel** over the landfill. In the cattails and other vegetation around the pond we noted **Sedge Wren**, **Marsh Wren** and **Swamp Sparrow**. Two **Pied-billed Grebe** were spotted on one of the ponds.

We proceeded to the landfill to look for sparrows and almost immediately began flushing birds. Most of the sparrows that flushed were **Savannah Sparrow**, but at least three of the sparrows were confirmed to be **LeConte's Sparrow**. (We recorded both **LeConte's Sparrow** and **Sedge Wren** on the landfill a couple of

years ago on another Bird Study Group field trip.) Some of the newer members of our group were a little perplexed when we quickly surrounded individual birds and slowly closed our circle to get a better look. In fact, I saw more than one person snicker and comment on our behavior. (I know who you are!) No sooner had Charlie commented that this would be a good place to plant Aristida (a grass), than John pointed out several good-sized patches of Aristida already growing on the landfill. As some of you may know, Aristida is the grass we look for at the airport and other places in order to find Smith's Longspur and other open field birds. We immediately began fantasizing about finding longspurs here later in the winter. Shorteared Owl might even be possible when the vegetation gets a little taller. In any case, I think the Caddo Parish parks department now has a good management strategy for this area.

Along the tree line adjacent to the landfill, several other birds were added, including **Northern Mockingbird** and **Eastern Towhee** (heard only). By now it was approaching mid-day and several members of the group had to get back to tend to other business. We walked along the pond's edge and took the unimproved road back to the visitor center. While calling the list for the day, we added **Rock Dove**, **Black Vulture** and another **Sharp-shinned Hawk**.

A few participants stayed and Doug and I led them by car to the northwest corner of the park where large expanses of Switch Cane (*Arundinaria gigantea*) grow next to Cypress Bayou and its tributaries. Immediately after crossing one of the tributaries, I found a two to three-foot Black Rat Snake sunning on the bank of the stream. At this point, some of the group, who shall remain nameless to protect their dignity, decided that they didn't really need to see a large expanse of Switch Cane. We briefly explored the area and then decided to call it a day. On the way out of the park, John McBride, Don Stoecker, Jeff Trahan and I added another **Sharp-shinned Hawk** and a **Broad-winged Hawk** flying over the future site of the Veterans Cemetery.



For those of you who are interested, the Parish parks department hopes to open the park on a full-time basis right after the first of January. The park will probably open on a Wednesday through Sunday schedule and remain closed on Monday and Tuesday. If you have any questions or need more information, you can call the parks department main office at 318-929-2806. Eddie D. Jones Park has the potential to become a great area for birding. In fact, park ranger, Doug Rainwater, reported seeing eight **Wild Turkey** from the entrance road on November 19. The Louisiana Department of Wildlife and Fisheries released Wild Turkey in this area about ten years ago, and the population appears to be holding its own.

CHASING LOUISIANA'S FIRST TOWNSEND SOLITAIRE

decided to do a late morning Cross Lake boat run on Saturday, with the hopes of finding some exciting species on Cross Lake. I contacted Jeff Trahan, and new birder Neilson Jacobs, and asked them to join me on the boat for one of my surveys. We left the boat dock about 11:15am and had been on the lake less than 10 minutes when my beeper starting going off in multiples. I wasn't on call and almost threw the beeper overboard. My wife paged me, telling me that daughter Samantha had received a call about a Townsend's Solitaire at the Sabine NWR headquarters. I'm lucky to get any message relayed to me from any of the children except Chance the two year old, so I was impressed that Judith O'Neil called and got past Sam. Apparently Judith gave Sam her name, and Sam asked her to repeat who she was. At this point Judith very emphatically stated to Sam, "It's NOT important who I am, just tell him there is a Townsend's Solitaire at the Sabine headquarters, and that's very important". Thanks Judith, Sam got the hint and rapidly relayed the message to me. It was a near first.

I then explained to Jeff and Neilson that there was a Townsend Solitaire in Cameron Parish. Jeff understood what was going to happen next, but Neilson I think was a bit perplexed. I simply stated that the boat trip was over and we had to immediately get off the lake. I've taken longer to get off in a lightning storm. I apologized to Neison, but did give him the option of blazing down to Cameron Parish (a 3 1/2 hour drive) with us. He seemed

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perplexed and asked if we did this often (engage in this seeming bizarre and erratic behavior). I mumbled that perhaps sometimes, but I was thinking not often enough, especially this year. I invited him to come back on the lake with me again, and hopefully he will.

I dropped Jeff off the boat dock running and almost swimming, and suggested that if Jean was to join us, that it would be best for him to quickly get her out of the house and into the car, so that they could meet me at the last Shreveport I-49 exit. I kindly informed him that I would wait 10 minutes for him at the exit before dusting Shreveport. I called Roger Breedlove and arranged to have he and Barbara meet us at the Leesville Burger King at 1:50 pm. We left Shreveport (both Trahans included) at met Roger and Barbara at 1:50.

With Roger driving, we pulled up to the Sabine NWR headquarters at 3:20pm. As we pulled up I noted Winston Caillouet on the roadside next to the parking lot looking across the road. The discussion was as follows:

Charlie: "Have you seen the bird yet?"

Winston: "Yep."

Charlie: "Do you see it now?"

Winston: "Yep."

Charlie (as he's rolling out of the car): "Where is it?"

Winston: He calmly points to the Yaupon across the road.

"In the red berries."

Charlie: "Wow. Thanks."

It just doesn't get any easier than that. Thanks Rob Dobbs for finding the solitaire, and thanks Winston for being the quiet soft spoken pointing bird dog that you were.

I got over 20 minutes of video on the **Townsend's Solitaire**. Mark processed all my prior digital video, and I've not been able to find a program compatible with my IBM system, so I've just purchased a Mac system and video software which will be installed this week. Hopefully I'll get it all processed shortly. Some of my video is at very close range within 20 feet, and there are some pretty good images. Hopefully I can share this with the group, once I get the computer end of all of this figured out.

We visited with a great group of birding friends while visiting with the solitaire. Paul Fontenot and George

Broussard joined us as Winston was leaving. Old friends Mac Myers and Curt Sorrells appeared out of the east, and we had a nice time visiting with them as well. I said goodbye to Roger and Barbara in Leesville, and the Trahans and I made it back to Shreveport by 8pm, which was in time for me to have a late dinner with my family.

In closing, this is a great first state record, but one that seems overdue to me. This year especially my be one in which we may find other western strays heading our way. With the terrible forest fires and drought that has been plaguing the west this last summer, I suspect we may find or at least have a significant chance of finding other western vagrants. West Texans are already noting Pinyon Jays and Steller's Jays, and a Clark's Nutcracker recently appeared in Palo Duro Canyon. We already have one record for Clark's Nutcracker in Louisiana. This may be a good year to look. Lewis's Woodpecker is a strong possibility, and maybe we'll get lucky with Red Crossbills, Mountain Bluebirds, and who knows what else. It's just a thought.

ARKANSAS BIRDING

even BSG'ers left LSUS the morning of Saturday, November 23, bound for the great state of Arkansas. New members, Joann Wilkerson and her sister, Joy Hicks, joined us at Hosston. The caravan, led by Jerry Bertrand with me as copilot, wound its way north, cloudless blue skies above and the trees along the highway dressed in gold and orange and red, brilliant in the sun.

Jerry, having consulted Streets and Trips before leaving home, had decided to follow Highway 245 around Texarkana to avoid the "city traffic." He stated that he'd

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been on that road lots of times, neglecting to mention that he'd never been to the end of it, but only as far as the Eagle Acres Scout Ranch, site of the annual Texarkana Nevertheless, the trip continued Kite Festival. uneventfully along this scenic route until the road deadended at a stop sign. "Hmm," Jerry said, "I thought this was supposed to come out on I-30." Confronted by a sign that said Hope, Arkansas, to the right and Texarkana to the left, he said, "I know I don't want to go to Hope, so I'm turning left." And so he did, followed by an unsuspecting procession of BSG'ers. A short distance down the road, a sign marked I-30 pointed to the right, so everyone dutifully turned right. As we proceeded along this four-lane highway, Jerry, again speaking his thoughts aloud, remarked, "I hope this isn't I-30 because if it is, we're going the wrong way on it!" I, finally speaking my thoughts aloud, gently opined that it would probably be a good thing to print out the Streets and Trips map to take along before embarking on another trip in a leadership position. Not to worry, however, because not far away, entrance ramps to both I-30 East and West appeared. Jerry's normally infallible sense of direction had worked again.

Before long, we were pulling up at the Visitor Center north of Texarkana, where Charles Mills was waiting to guide us the rest of the way. Neilson Jacobs, who had been trying to memorize our route for the trip back home while daughter Mary drove, commented that he didn't think they'd go home that way because he didn't know where we were most of the time. Not wanting the group to lose confidence in our leaders at this critical juncture, I did not confess that, for a short time, no one else did either. Vera Garlough, who was driving from Longview to meet us at the Center, had not yet arrived. Actually, she had arrived; only she was at the Visitor Center on I-30, which is the largest in the state, while we were at the smallest on U.S. Highway 71. With some assistance and a couple of phone calls by the friendly folks at the two Centers, she figured out where we were and soon joined She also generously forgave me for my poor directions.

Anxious to start our birding experience, we headed out, this time led by Charles, who, of course, took us the back way, "through the bottoms," according to Charles, to Millwood Lake. This route follows a dirt road, which is a good road for birds when one has time to do it leisurely. When we traversed this road in June on the way to Millwood, the dust clouds were so thick, the vehicles in

front of us were invisible. This time, though, we could see at least half a vehicle at all times. By the time we arrived at Millwood, Neilson had given up all hope of retracing our route and was giving thanks for the maps we'd received in our Arkansas Vacation packets at the Visitor Center.

At Millwood State Park, Tappa Burt, President of the Tyler Audubon Society, and her daughter, Laura, from San Antonio, were waiting for us. We had met Tappa along with a number of other east Texas birders at the NETFO (Northeast Texas Field Ornithologists) Hawk Watch at Lake o' the Pines in September. Hoping to do our part to preserve the spirit of interstate birding, we sent a special invitation to Tyler Audubon and the NETFO'ers to join us for the Millwood trip. We were delighted that Tappa and Laura took us up on the invitation.

With the morning birding group now complete, we were finally ready to bird. About a week before our trip, Charles and a friend had found a fourth Millwood record



Rock Wren at the Okay Levee at Millwood. If we could locate this bird, it would be a life bird for most of us. The wren had first been sighted in the rocks around the boat launch area at the end of the Okay Levee road. When Charles returned to try to photograph the bird, the parking lot was deserted. Instead of staying on the rocks as a Rock

Wren should, the bird was hopping all around the back of Charles's truck. This was not the picture Charles had in mind. Finally, the wren condescended to pose for Charles in its natural habitat on the rocks. Saturday morning when we arrived, the parking lot was bustling with duck hunters and fisherman putting in and taking out at the boat launch. Nevertheless, we all stared at the spot where the Rock Wren had originally made its appearance the week before, but to no avail; we were going to have to form a search party.

The Okay Levee is lined with rocks on both sides. The road follows the levee for a quarter of a mile or less, then ends in the boat launch parking lot. The levee, on the other hand, doesn't end there, but continues on quite a distance. What were the odds that the **Rock Wren** would be hanging out on the short section of the levee that paralleled the road AND that it would be on the side next to the road, where it could be easily seen by the non-rock climbers in the group, i.e., most of us? The mind boggles.

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Undaunted, Clyde Massey, Terry Davis, and Mary Jacobs climbed (clumb?) the rocks to walk the top of the levee while the main contingent headed back down the road in the same direction. Several of us were working on identifying some sparrows (Song and White-throated) on the other side of the road when we heard whistles and screech owl calls from the group ahead of us. They had been trying unsuccessfully to get our attention for some time and had finally resorted to the screech owl imitation. Against all odds, the **Rock Wren** had been located. We hurried down the road. The wren was hopping in and out of the rocks near the top of the levee, undismayed by 13 pairs of eyes staring at it through binoculars. We watched it work its way along the levee until it was time to head on to our next birding stop. Charles, on being congratulated at his ability to make **Rock Wrens** appear as if by magic, said, "I guess no one noticed the tether attached to its leg." By the way, if you go, take your Sibley's along with you to identify the bird. There may be a **Rock Wren** somewhere that looks like the picture in the National Geographic field guide but not this one.

Our next stop was the overlook at the Beard's Bluff Campground. Hubert and Pat Hervey and granddaughter, Alex Heath, were already there scoping the lake. The lake was sparkling in the sun; ducks and cormorants were everywhere. **Bufflehead** and **Ruddy Ducks** bobbed up and down in the waves like bath toys. A **Common Loon** stayed close to shore while **Horned Grebes** dove nearby, swimming underwater to appear again yards away. **Canada Geese** and **American White Pelicans** floated near the dam. **Hooded Mergansers** and other ducks kept us at scope's length.

Back at the Millwood State Park marina and picnic area, Susan and Ron Martin and Shirley and Ed Huss had arrived. They had somehow miraculously found their way to Millwood without any assistance (probably by forgoing all the back roads we had traveled). Twenty birders sat down for lunch, while Dixie, the park naturalist, readied the barge. She handed out life vests and rearranged birders and deck chairs until, declaring the load sufficiently distributed, she headed the barge out on the lake. While the first group toured the lake, Jerry and I followed Rosemary Seidler back to Okay Levee in hopes of getting pictures of the **Rock Wren**. Apparently, Charles's magic doesn't work *sans* Charles, as we could not find the bird again.

We returned to the marina just as the barge was coming into view. Jerry, having missed out on **Rock** Wren pictures, took a few photographs of the barge

birders instead. The second group now took to the water, hoping to spot something the first group might have missed, a jaeger or a kittiwake, perhaps. Dixie took us as close in as she could to an area where large numbers of gulls and cormorants were congregating, but nothing unusual materialized. It was not to be a jaeger day. We settled for two **Bald Eagles**, several **Forster's Terns**, numerous **Ring-billed Gulls**, **Bonaparte's Gulls**, **Mallards**, **Great Blue Herons**, **Pied-billed Grebe**, and, naturally, more cormorants.

We ended the day with much to be thankful for on this Saturday before Thanksgiving - for Charles Mills who is always ready to share his time and his knowledge of Millwood Lake birds; for the hospitality and friendliness of the people we met, from our boat captain and lake guide, Dixie, to the staff at the visitor centers and the state park to the waitress at the Dixie Diner in Texarkana where Charles, Terry, Jerry and I had supper; for our lifer Rock Wren; and, most especially, for the truly glorious day spent birding with friends.

RECENT SIGHTINGS

s usual October and November always seems to bring a surprise or two and this past October and November was no exception. In fact, there were quite a few surprises! On November 17 Charles Lyon reported two **Surf Scoters** and a flock of 21 **Black Scoters** while surveying Cross Lake by boat. The two **Surf Scoters** are only the fourth northwestern Louisiana records. The third record of **Surf Scoter** was a single bird Charles noted on Cross Lake on November 11, just six days prior. The 21 **BLACK SCOTER** marks the second record in northwestern Louisiana.

Cross Lake also bought sightings of three **Horned Grebes**, 60 **Green-winged Teal**, two **Greater Scaup**, and an amazing 3,600 **Franklin's Gulls** all see by Charles Lyon on November 11.

Back on dry land, Hubert Hervey reported a banded **Harris' Sparrow** and **White-crowned Sparrow** at his place in Stonewall on November 19. Hubert also had a lingering **Ruby-throated Hummingbird**. Speaking of hummingbirds, a **Broad-tailed Hummingbird** reported on November 3 by Paul Dickson marks the first confirmed sight of this species in our area.

HELP MONITOR BIRD FEEDERS FOR IMPACT OF WEST NILE VIRUS

hen most people think of West Nile virus, they think of its effects on people. Despite the publicity surrounding its human impact, the virus is primarily one that affects birds. And just what kind of effect is it having on birds? Researchers at the Cornell Lab of Ornithology invite bird-feeding enthusiasts to help them find out.

Since 1987, the Cornell Lab has been conducting Project FeederWatch, a winter bird survey that invites bird enthusiasts of all ages, skill levels, and backgrounds to count the numbers and kinds of birds that visit their feeders from November through early April. Cornell Lab researchers analyze the data to determine changes in population distribution and abundance of some 100 species that regularly visit feeders.

Although crows and jays were among the first species known to be affected by West Nile virus, more than 110 species of birds have been infected, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDCP). What will this mean for North America's beloved feeder birds?

"Because Project FeederWatch has more than 15 years' worth of data, we have a strong baseline to determine population changes in recent years that may be attributable to West Nile virus," says David Bonter, project leader for Project FeederWatch. "But to be able to make an accurate assessment, we need as many people as possible to tell us which bird species they're seeing at their feeders and in what numbers."

The CDCP points out that the virus is spread among birds and to people by mosquitoes, and reassures that there is no connection between bird feeding and West Nile virus.

Currently, almost 17,000 "citizen scientists" from across the U.S. and Canada are signed up for the project and contribute their observations to researchers at the Cornell Lab. Participants count birds for as long or as little time as they wish on select days throughout the winter. They may submit their observations over the Internet or on paper forms sent by regular mail. Data are combined and findings are published in scientific journals, magazines, and on the Lab's web site.

FeederWatch data have already contributed to important breakthroughs in scientists' understanding of bird diseases. In recent years, FeederWatchers have been helping track the spread of mycoplasmal conjunctivitis, or

"House Finch eye disease." The illness primarily affects a common bird called the House Finch, manifesting itself in the form of swollen, crusty eyes and frequently leading to blindness and eventually death as the birds starve or are caught by predators. Results of the study were published in the prestigious Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences. Cornell Lab researchers continue to rely on project participants to help them understand the dynamics of this disease and why it persists.



Project FeederWatch also produced the first study to document cyclical changes in Varied Thrush abundance and the irruptive movements of the Common Redpoll. "These findings have been possible simply because so many birdfeeding enthusiasts are serving as our eyes and ears, since researchers can't be everywhere at once," says Dr. Wesley Hochachka, assistant director of Bird Population Studies at the Cornell Lab and the scientist

and coauthor of many of the FeederWatch findings. "Involving the public in our research is the best way to acquire vast amounts of data."

Participants in Project FeederWatch receive a Research Kit that includes a full-color feeder-bird poster, a calendar, and the FeederWatcher's Handbook containing bird-feeding tips and other useful information. They receive summaries of FeederWatch data and other findings published in the Lab's quarterly newsletter, Birdscope. A \$15 fee helps cover the cost of materials and data analysis.

FeederWatchers and others especially look forward each year to the "FeederWatch Top 10 List," the 10 most frequently reported species in North America. This year's list reads: 10) House Sparrow, seen at 56% of feeders; 9) American Robin, 57%; 8) White-breasted Nuthatch, 62%; 7) Northern Cardinal, 69%; 6) Blue Jay, 74%; 5) American Goldfinch, 75%; 4) House Finch, 76%, 3) Downy Woodpecker, 77%; 2) Mourning Dove, 79%, and the species most frequently reported by FeederWatchers is 1) Dark-eyed Junco, seen at 83% of feeders.

The cost of an annual Wild Louisiana Stamp is \$5.00.

2003 LOS WINTER MEETING

fter 10 years the LOS Winter Meeting will return to Lake Charles from Friday, January 24 though Sunday, January 26, 2003. The LOS is fortunate to have as our Saturday evening speaker, Kelly Bryan, who will give a presentation on "Birds of the Davis Mountains." Kelly's program will characterize and describe the Davis Mountains, comparing them to other mountain ranges in the region. He will present other important aspects of this area's avifauna, including tape recordings of songs of selected bird species.

Kelly, obtained a Master's Degree from Sam Houston State University and began his career with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Service at Huntsville State Park. He went on to serve 18 years as Superintendent for Kickapoo Cavern and the Davis Mountains State Parks. He was then appointed Coordinator of Natural Resources Management for all of the western Texas State Parks. He retired from this position in 2002. His wide personal interests include banding and drawing birds, photography, recording bird songs, and serving as Chief of the Volunteer Fire Department.

Kelly's intensive studies of the avifauna of the Davis Mountains began in 1991 and continue today. His investigations have led to the discovery of one species new to Texas.

The Davis Mountains of western Texas have been characterized as one of the last ornithological wildernesses in the state. Unlike the nearby Guadalupe and Chisos Mountains, which are included in the national parks, the Davis Mountain range has remained almost entirely privately owned

The discovery of nesting Buff-breasted Flycatchers there in 1999 provided a new species to the state's bird list, as well as a first nesting record. Photographs obtained of the Olive Warbler (1992), Berylline Hummingbird (1997), and the Slate-throated Redstart (1997 and 2000) represent the first documented records for Texas. Additional first Texas nesting records include the Gray Flycatcher (1991), White-eared Hummingbird (1993 probable), Mountain Bluebird (1995), Dusky Flycatcher (2000), Greater Pewee (2002), and MacGillivray's Warbler (2002) as well as many other important records/observations of birds.

Our Friday evening speaker will be our own Dr. Jim Ingold, Professor of Ornithology from the Department of Biological Sciences, LSU in Shreveport. Jim also serves as Editor of the *Journal of Louisiana Ornithology*. His talk will be the "History of Louisiana Ornithology," the paper he presented in 2002 at the North American Ornithological Conference in New Orleans.

Jim said that while working on an annotated bibliography of Louisiana ornithology, he became interested in Louisiana's role in the science of ornithology from pre-history to Audubon, and from Edmund McIlhenny to George Lowery of LSU and his students, on up to 2002. Many of our state organization members should be very interested in the talk, as they have lived through part of this history!

AFTER MOONSET, BEFORE SUNRISE



he darkest time of day and my favorite time of day is after the moon has slipped beneath the horizon, yet before the sun has had a chance to shed any light at all on the day to come. The temperature gauge on the mirror of my vehicle read 28 degrees F. Not bad at all since I was fortified with steaming hot chocolate and warm wraps. All the meteorites were shooting toward the east. Some were large and disappeared into the trees before burning up. Then I watched as one shooting star passed by like a vehicle going the wrong way on a one-

way street. I wonder how it could do that? Go due west like a contrary heifer refusing the round up. Not a breeze stirred the tree leaves, no roaring and crashing of motor boats heading to the duck blinds disturbed the peace, just the hooting of the **Barred Owls**, that noisy nocturnal bird of prey.

The time came to walk the half-mile of abandoned oilwell road that would bring me to the place where I had

learned to best enjoy the start of my small portion of the Shreveport Christmas Bird Count. Almost imperceptible was the gradual disappearance of the dimmest of the stars, as there was a hint of daylight. The starry sky with its shooting stars gave way with reluctance. The Eastern Screech-Owl was still responding to my imitation of his calls, which don't resemble screeches at all. The



Splash came gently from the bayou, followed by more rhythmic splashes, fairly evenly spaced. With my great woods lore I deduced that a canoe was approaching from the lake. But I espied not a boat. Well then, it must perchance be a hunter in hip boots, but obviously the second half of duck season did not start this morning, or the air would already be filled with the frequent boom of shotguns and the quacking of duck hunters testing their calls in the near dark. No hunter appeared. But a pair of otters did. They were swimming upstream and surfacing in unison like dolphins. The splashing was the sound of them surfacing and diving. As they passed by, they separated to opposite sides of the small bayou and then

met in the middle with renewed splashes. I was thankful for the wonderful experience and the gift of appreciating nature.

A small, dark **Winter Wren** gave a loud, high at me or maybe at the crack, that almost sounded like a .22 rifle. A couple of hounds were baying and maybe the hunter had found a squirrel. Crack again, but more like a thud than the sound of a gun. Splat again, coming

from up the bayou and getting closer. The head of the beaver appeared in mid-bayou as he headed toward Cross Lake. Opposite my side of the bank he gave one last splat, almost managing to startle me. The splashed bayou water droplets reached my bank. I think he laughed out loud.

After adding a dozen more birds to my list, I reluctantly

headed back down the long trail westward to the car. I would have over forty species of birds listed before leaving the Quad Paw Hunting Club area. Looking back over my shoulder to the east I observed the red sun, only half showing above the horizon, and couldn't help but think about how lucky I had been to have such an enjoyable dawning.

GOOD BIRDING AREAS CLOSED

hile doing the Caddo Lake Winter Bird Count I've always looked forward to birding the Jeems Bayou WMA. That area can only be reached by boat now. The oil pipe bridge has been cut in two. Obviously on purpose, because a cutting torch has been used to cut out one section which has been dragged onto the bank. This area was scheduled to be in the new edition of *Hot Spots*, but that is pointless unless the bridge is to be repaired in the future.

Another area familiar to me because of CBC work is closed. The Rice Road Farm Lake has been drained and is waterless. The owners have opened a dirt pit and are selling the dirt to GM. The pit is located below the large lake, but is scheduled later on to be a new lake. Then the silted-in old lake (100 acres or so) is to be made into a dirt pit, containing lots of silt. The old lake was 115 years old, but is now just dry dirt, soon to be dirt pit. Time changes everything.

SHREVEPORT GREAT BACKYARD BIRD COUNT FOR 2002

he Christmas Bird Counts of 2002 have been compiled and the North American Migration Count is still several months away. It's February and you're having count withdrawal symptoms. You wax nostalgic over memories of arising at 4:00 a.m. to meet your CBC team to listen for owls calling before dawn. You regale anyone you can corner with endless stories of the counts you've participated in, from how you found that rare bird to where the best restrooms are in your circle. You practice estimating individual numbers of large flocks of constantly moving birds by counting the **House Sparrows** in your backyard. But it's not enough; you've got count fever and it seems to be incurable. Birders, take heart! Salvation is at hand! It's time for the Great Backyard Bird Count of 2003!

Originally conceived as a count of 100 common "backyard" birds, the GBBC was expanded at the behest of participants to include all birds sighted during the count period, whether in the backyard, the front yard, or twenty miles down the road. Last year's Great Backyard Bird Count was a "great" one for northwest Louisiana. Shreveport topped the list of Louisiana cities in total number of species sighted with 90 over the four-day count period. With 15 more species, Shreveport would have been in the top 10 cities in number of species reported in the entire United States. The only other northwest Louisiana city in the Louisiana Top 10 was Keithville, which reported 52 species. What's especially significant about the Keithville numbers is that they were all reported by one observer, the BSG's own Bill Wood.

This year, co-sponsors, Audubon and the Cornell Lab of Ornithology, are asking participants to pay special attention to birds on the Audubon WatchList. Once again, Nancy and Lily are compiling a birding "hit" list for northwest Louisiana and we'd like your help in getting these species into the GBBC database. Hit list birds are selected from the Audubon WatchList 2002 and unusual bird species currently wintering here. "Most Wanted" birds for this year include **Short-eared Owl**, **Vermilion Flycatcher**, **Bald Eagle**, and wintering hummers.

We're using the BSG database to determine areas where hit list birds might be located and to create a species "locator grid." This grid will be published in the February newsletter. We'd like interested members to select a most wanted species and bird the most likely locations for the targeted bird one, two, three, or all four

of the count days. You're on your own schedule here; bird for as little or as long as you want.

can GBBC data be entered online at www.birdsource.org/gbbc. If you are not online, you can turn in your birding list to Nancy Menasco at 868-3255. For the GBBC, bird sightings are reported by zip To find a zip code for a particular birding location, go to http://www.usps.com/zip4/welcome.htm. You will need to know a street or road name, but not an exact address. If you can't find a road name (Parish Road 100 won't work), ask somebody who lives along the road what the zip code is. We did just that last year and were very surprised to learn that the Bayou Pierre WMA road where the Barn Owl platforms are located is in zip code "71115" and is, therefore, considered to be in Shreveport as far as the GBBC is concerned. This is even more interesting when you consider that the WMA is in Red River Parish. If you don't live in or near a town big enough to have its own zip code, you just get swallowed up by some big city that takes all the credit for your birds.

Be sure to report your GBBC sightings to the BSG database as well, but also note exactly where you saw each bird on your list. Using a zip code for location here could cause just a little confusion for BSG database As an example, let's continue with the possibilities for zip code "71115" and let's say your list includes the following: Short-Eared Owl, Barn Owl, Swamp Sparrow, Vesper Sparrow, Bewick's Wren, Ring-billed Gull, and Bald Eagle. Did you see those owls in Towne South Subdivision or on Yearwood Road? Does that seem like a silly question? Then what about the sparrows and the wren - Bishop Point, Yearwood Road, or one of half a dozen other possible spots? Consider the gull and the eagle - LSUS parking lot or Bishop Point? Not quite as obvious, is it? Ringbilled Gulls may be seen at both locations just about anytime you care to look in February. The eagle might seem a highly unlikely bird for LSUS, but picture this. You're standing on one of the athletic fields gazing across the levee during a lull in the action in your child's soccer game. What do you see soaring over the river? It's a, it's a, IT'S A BALD EAGLE! Case closed. If you have questions about how to turn in your list to the BSG, call Mac Hardy at the LSUS Museum at 797-5338.

To learn more about the GBBC, read the article that follows or visit the website referred to above. Get out there and bird. Have a good time. Turn it into a scavenger hunt and take your friends, remembering the birding code of ethics at all times, of course. Or have

your own Great Backyard Bird Counting party instead. Invite a couple of neighbors for tea and cookies, fill your bird feeders, and watch from the warmth of your own house.

However you choose to become involved, whether alone or with a group, we hope you'll join us for the Great Backyard Bird Count, starting Valentine's Day, February 14, 2003.

6TH ANNUAL GREAT BACKYARD BIRD COUNT FOR 2003

Il across North America, birds face survival challenges ranging from loss of habitat to introduced predators and diseases such as West Nile virus. The 6th Annual Great Backyard Bird Count (February 14-17) promises to add important new information to our understanding of birds' movement and overall health by focusing our attention on common birds as well as on birds of special concern.

Once again, the Cornell Lab of Ornithology and the National Audubon Society call on birders of every age and skill level to make the count possible. "We need every birder to join us," said Audubon Senior Vice President of Science Frank Gill. "The Great Backyard Bird Count (GBBC) has become a vitally important means of gathering data to help birds, but it can't happen unless people take part. Whether you're a novice or an expert, we need you to take part and help us help birds."

A project of the Cornell Lab of Ornithology and Audubon, with sponsorship from Wild Birds Unlimited, the GBBC combines high-tech Web tools with an army of citizen-scientist bird observers. The GBBC asks families, individuals, classrooms, and community groups to count the numbers and kinds of birds that visit their feeders, local parks, schoolyards, and other areas during any or all of the four count days. Participants enter their sightings at BirdSource, www.birdsource.org/gbbc. The state-of-theart web site was developed by Audubon and the Cornell Lab.

Begun in 1998, the GBBC has engaged more than a quarter of a million Americans of all ages and backgrounds and united them in the effort to keep common birds common. "When the last **Ivory-billed Woodpecker** was seen in the 1930s, there was no concrete way for citizens to help professional ornithologists monitor bird populations," says Cornell

Lab of Ornithology director John Fitzpatrick, who this past year led an expedition hoping to rediscover one of North America's most spectacular birds. "We cannot allow other species to face the same fate as the ivory-bill. The Great Backyard Bird Count provides a way for citizens to help us determine which birds are where and in what numbers, so we can take steps to protect those that need protecting."

Too many species are already showing population declines. GBBC 2003 will put the spotlight on birds that appear on Audubon's WatchList, an accounting of bird species in decline or at conservation risk due to dwindling habitat and other threats. "The WatchList is an early-warning system designed to raise awareness of birds in trouble, before they become endangered or threatened," says Audubon's Gill. "Think of the WatchList as preventative medicine."

Audubon and the Cornell Lab are asking participants to pay special attention to the nearly 200 species of birds on the WatchList, which was updated in October of 2002. The site includes features relating to these birds and what participants can do to help them.

The GBBC is also important for more common species. In 2002, more than 47,000 participants counted millions of birds throughout North America. They helped the Cornell Lab and Audubon researchers make interesting observations. Evening Grosbeaks, plentiful in California in 2001, were nearly absent in 2002. Snowy Owls, magnificent hunters found predominantly in the northern part of the continent, were reported in 20 states and provinces during the 2002 count, including sightings from as far south as Oklahoma, Colorado, and Virginia. Last year's count was again instrumental in helping track winter finches, such as Common Redpolls, Pine White-winged Crossbills, Grosbeaks. and periodically shift their winter ranges southward, particularly in the Northeast.

For the last four years, GBBC participants have shown that **Eurasian Collared-Doves** are also "on the go," backing results from other studies such as the Cornell Lab's Project FeederWatch. Since their introduction into Florida in the 1980s, the birds have increased in number in that state and have steadily expanded their range in the U.S. They were reported in 21 states during the 2002 count. GBBC 2003 participants will continue to help scientists keep track of the consequences of this movement.

To view these results, beginners and experts alike are invited to visit the web site. There they will also find a vocabulary section, bird-watching and bird-feeding tips, bird vocalizations, and more, including information about

House Finch eye disease and the Cornell Lab's groundbreaking study involving citizen scientists. Educators will find the bibliography and geography sections especially handy, and will also find suggestions on how to conduct the count with groups of kids. For those tired of winter and ready for spring, there will be tips about planning and preparing for the spring bird garden.

"The Great Backyard Bird Count is a terrific way individuals, families, schools, and community groups to contribute to a better understanding of birds," says the Cornell Lab's Fitzpatrick. "In return, they learn more about birds in the process. I can't think of a more enjoyable and more rewarding way to spend a little time on a late-winter day."

Instructions for participating can be found at www.birdsource.org. There is no fee or registration. Those who would like to participate but aren't online can try their local library. Many Wild Birds Unlimited locations also accept reports. FOUR HUMMINGBIRDS SPECIES

his morning, December 4, 2002, I identified one of my yard's "phantoms" as a female Rufous/ Allen's. This makes four hummingbird species presently using my yard. I may seem redundant in my reveling in this but it is a truly amazing situation. I am not on the Gulf Coast but 250 miles north of it. Prior to HUMNET, the publishing of Hummingbird Gardens and the resulting dissemination of information on this winter garden hummingbird phenomena, Shreveport had only scattered, single records of hummingbirds in winter. We had no certain record for Black-chinned or Broad-tailed and only one certain Rufous record. Single birds identified to genus only had been recorded in about 10 winters over the past 60 years but sporadically so, with no single bird known to have stayed all winter long. suppose that our trend mirrors that of the Gulf Coast but with lesser diversity and a lower numbers of birds. In any case, I am astounded by the fact that I have at least four winter resident birds now of four different species.

My excitement over having four species in my Shreveport yard went up another level two days later when I caught the recently arrived Rufous and found that it was previously banded! Fred Bassett banded this adult female near Mobile Bay last January. I visited with Fred today and found that his data for her were very similar to mine. He will be looking for her to show up back on the Alabama Gulf Coast in a few weeks! She now has an orange painted crown to go with her band. She was healthy and so tolerant of the capture process that she went back in the trap and fed at the feeder inside within minutes of being released. Obviously she was hungry as well. Though her gorget pattern looks just like the Rufous that I had last year, the banding date proves that it is not the same bird.

This morning I found the Broad-tailed, the Black-chinned and maybe the Rufous but I couldn't see for sure. Plastic tarps are preserving about half of my plants but I can't keep that up for ever. I have winter plants in bloom including S. iodantha, S. disjuncta, S. puberula and a supposed hybrid S. puberula x karwinskii, winter shrimp, two variations on giant Turks Cap, and of course lots of fall blooming salvias still holding blooms. I wonder how much nectar is being produced though. The winter hummingbird phenomena just keeps racing forward even here, 250 miles from the Gulf Coast. How do these birds find our gardens? The whole situation just leaves me in awe.



Meet at the LSUS Museum of Life Sciences at 7:00 a.m. Saturday morning. We will head east to Monroe, where we will join Northeast Louisiana Bird Club member, Joan Brown. Joan will lead us on tours of Mollicy Farms, located near Bastrop, Louisiana, and Black Bayou NWR near Monroe on Saturday. We'll have dinner in Monroe, then head to Delhi where we'll spend the night at the Best Western. On Sunday we'll tour the Tensas River National Wildlife Refuge near Talullah.

Mollicy Farms borders the Ouachita River. This land was farmed for soybeans in the 60's and part of it is still farmed. Many of the fields have been replanted in

trees in order to restore the land to bottomland hardwoods, while some have been left empty for waterfowl. The owners built a levee along the river because the area floods easily. The levee has broken in the past and if it should break again, the plan is to let it go. There are usually large populations of waterfowl, along with Bald and Golden Eagle. There have been Short-Eared Owls in the past, although none have been sighted so far this year. Joan says there are more **Northern Harriers** there than she's seen anywhere else. Since the two species often go hand in hand, we may get lucky. We will do as much car birding as possible, but this is dependent on road condition, so there will probably be some walking. We will tailor the trip to the group, but if you're interested in sparrows, the walking could be intense. The fields are sometimes muddy and wet; so bring rubber boots if you plan to walk. Bring your scope if you have one.

Black Bayou National Wildlife Refuge is the newest in the North Louisiana Refuge Complex. Black Bayou Lake is the backup water supply for the city of Monroe. The city owns the land and has leased it to Fish and Wildlife for 99 years. The refuge has bought additional land surrounding the lake. An old planter's house was restored for use as a visitor and educational center. There are some great exhibits there. (Restrooms too!) There is a boardwalk near the house and near the boardwalk is a pier that extends out into the lake. On another part of the lake is a deck with a spotting scope. An arboretum has been planted with native trees. We may find sparrows in the wildflower meadow. Joan tells me that the trails on Black Bayou could be walked in your 'Sunday best.'

The Tensas River National Wildlife Refuge was established in 1980 in an effort to preserve the largest privately owned bottomland hardwood tract in the Mississippi Delta. U.S. Fish and Wildlife plans to acquire more land as funding permits and someday the refuge may encompass more than 85,000 acres. The refuge includes the area once known as the Singer Tract, one of the last strongholds of the Ivory-billed Woodpecker in Louisiana. The last known recording of an Ivory-billed was made here in the 1940's by Dr. James Tanner. Today the Tensas is known for its large populations of **Barred** Owl, a remnant population of the threatened Louisiana Black Bear, and other bottomland inhabitants. There is a visitor center with life-size exhibits and restrooms. A boardwalk, observation tower, and walking trails are nearby.

Please contact me in advance to sign up for the trip. Due to the proximity of Monroe (two hours) and Delhi (three hours or less) to Shreveport, participants who can't join us for both days are welcome to meet us for either Saturday or Sunday. Let me know your plans when you sign up.

What to bring: Binoculars, scope, rubber boots, mosquito repellent, picnic lunches for Saturday and Sunday. Please make your own reservations at the Best Western Delhi Inn. SOME LAST WORDS ON THE BIG SIT! 2002

he results have been tabulated for the Big Sit of and are now online at http:// members.aol.com/nhbirdclub/bigsit.htm. The data is in the form of a species list with a list of states and foreign countries where each species was sighted. As you know, for the second year in a row, BSG'ers sat at C. Bickham Dickson Park. The weather on October 13 was cold, overcast, and a strong wind was blowing out of the north. This was quite a contrast to 2001 when we sat under clear blue skies with temperatures in the 70's and our species list reflected the difference. In 2001, the Vermilion Flycatcher who wintered at the park did not make an appearance until the week after the Big Sit. In 2002, not one but two arrived the week before the Big Sit and one providentially flew within binocular distance of our circle the day of the Sit. How unique was our Vermilion Flycatcher in comparison to all reporting circles? I contacted John Triana, the compiler of TBS! 2002 (and all prior Big Sits) to find out.

John tells me that the only other circles in the U.S. to report **Vermilion Flycatcher** were three circles in Texas: Dick Heller, El Rio RV Park, Falcon Heights; Texas, Jim Sinclair, Dairy Lake, Kleberg County, Texas; and Kay Baughman, backyard, Rio Hondo, Texas. What's especially notable about these circles in relation to our circle at C. Bickham Dickson is that Falcon Heights and Rio Hondo are both in the Rio Grande Valley. Kleberg County is less than 100 miles north of "The Valley" as it is known by birders far and wide (speak in hushed tones when you say the words). Is the day too far distant when all you have to say is "CBD" to elicit the same reverent response?

John also writes, "You didn't see any species that were unique in TBS! 2002, but you did have three other birds that were only seen in two or three other circles (in the U.S.). You were one of only four circles to see **Baltimore Oriole** (Indian River Co., FL, Veracruz, Mexico, and Norfolk, VA). You were also one of four to see **Northern Waterthrush** (Key West, FL, Cape May, NJ, and Veracruz, Mexico). Finally the "rarest" bird you had was **Common Nighthawk**, which was only seen in two other circles (Conway, AR and Norfolk, VA)." Our **Northern Waterthrush**, which was heard by Charlie Lyon, was one of our circle's early birds. Charlie confirmed the identification when he found the waterthrush by one of the culverts running from the river

under the road near our Sit site. **Common Nighthawk** was the last bird of the day for our circle. Diehard sitters Jerry Bertrand, Mac Hardy, Nancy Menasco and Lily Poole sighted several of the birds flying overhead around 6:30 p.m.

Reviewing the online species lists for other fairly unique sightings for our circle, I discovered some interesting facts. Neotropic Cormorant was only seen in two other states, Arizona and Texas. We shared White Ibis with Florida, South Carolina, and Texas. Circles in California, Missouri, Oklahoma (including David Arbour and company at Red Slough), and Texas also saw Greater White-fronted Goose. Because of Red Slough's and C. Bickham Dickson Park's shared proximity to the Red River and that strong north wind, it's quite possible that the migrating geese David's circle saw early on were the same ones we saw later in the day. Broad-winged Hawk was also seen in Florida, Georgia, Oklahoma (Red Slough again), Texas, and Virginia. We were one of only six states to report Eastern Screech-**Owl**. Did some participants just not get up early enough?

Hanging hummingbird feeders the week before the Sit resulted in us being included in the six states reporting **Ruby-throated Hummingbird**. Thanks to a lingering **Scissor-tailed Flycatcher**, we joined the only two other states, Arkansas and Texas, which reported this species. We were one of 31 circles in the running for the **Golden Bird** award by virtue of our sighting of **Green-winged Teal**. We lost out in the random drawing to Tom Hince's circle at Holiday Beach Conservation Area in Essex County, Ontario. Tom's group donated the \$500 award to the Holiday Beach Migration Observatory.

For more statistics on TBS! 2002, check out the website listed above. If you see a species reported for Louisiana that's not on the BSG list, it's because there was one other circle in Louisiana, Van Remsen's backyard in St. Gabriel. Among others, Van added Yellow-billed Cuckoo (seen only in Louisiana, Connecticut, and Texas), Black-chinned Hummingbird (Louisiana, Arizona, New Mexico, and Texas), and Acadian Flycatcher (Louisiana and Maryland) to the state list. By the way, while you're at the website, take a look at the Captains' Notes, where you can read comments from many of the circle captains. If you want more information about which particular circles saw which species, contact John Triana itriana1@mindspring.com and he will be glad to answer any questions you have.

leven BSG participants, seeing 53 species of birds. A cool breeze made locating small birds more difficult than usual, but we had good luck with the sparrows, finding Chipping, Savannah, Fox, Song, White-throated, three Harris's, White-Swamp, crowned, and Dark-eyed Junco. Also, the owl prowl was successful, with two Barn Owls, three Barred Owls. two Eastern Screech-Owls, and one Great-horned Owl (a bigheaded, dark shape in a tree top way in the distance). While waiting by the grassy field where many Northern Harriers had dropped down for the night, some of us heard several barks like the short bark of the Short-eared Owl, but nobody saw one or said for sure what they heard. Incidentally, Rosemary Seidler has an excellent picture of the two Barn Owls that we saw, posted on the BSG website. I always enjoy the hawks on the trip to Yearwood Road. We saw many Red-tailed Hawks, a Red-shouldered Hawk, a Cooper's Hawk, ten Northern Harriers, and a couple of American Kestrels. We also saw several **Loggerhead Shrikes**, which I like to include in the hawk list because they are really raptor wannabees, fierce little guys that almost rival Carolina Wrens in their grit and pluck. We were successful in leaving the area shortly after 7:00 p.m. I heard one of the trip members say that she had gained four life birds on the trip. That always makes the leader happy to know that he has helped someone gain life birds and hopefully, a greater appreciation of the world of birds.

GREAT BACKYARD BIRD COUNT

alentine's Day is almost here and this not only means sweets for your sweetie but, for bird lovers the beginning of the Great Backyard Bird Count. Using Audubon's Watch List and the BSG data base Nancy has compiled two lists to help BSG members locate specific target birds. In last years GBBC, Northwestern Louisiana birders recorded a record high of 90 bird species making Shreveport the city with the most bird species sighted in the state of Louisiana. This year we are hoping, that with the use of the species and locator grids, BSG members will once again put Northwestern Louisiana on top. We would like members to select one of the target species and to bird its location's) in the hopes

of seeing that bird. The GBBC is February 14 though February 17. You can bird one, or all of the count days. Choose one location to bird, or several. GBBC bird lists are turned in online at www.birdsource.org/gbbc. If you are not online, turn in your bird list to Nancy (868-3255), or myself (687-2994). Remember that for the GBBC, bird sightings are reported by zip code. Be sure to report your GBBC sightings to the BSG data base as well, but also note exactly where you saw each bird on your list. If you have any questions about how to turn in your list to the BSG, call Mac Hardy at the LSUS Museum at 797-5338."

I would also like to see the GBBC used as an opportunity for members, both experienced and inexperienced, to share their field trips with other BSG members. For example, I plan to bird Cypress Black Bayou Park to locate the nesting pair of **Bald Eagles**. Anyone that would like to go birding with me to see the eagles is more than welcome to come along. If you want to share your field trip, post the date, time and meeting place on the BSG's Bird Alert server (phonetree). Those members wishing to participate should respond to that e-mail.

Another opportunity that the GBBC could provide is the comradery of birding from the comfort of your kitchen or living room window with friends. Some members are no longer comfortable going on field trips but, would welcome the pleasure of a count day and sharing their birding experience with others. Use the GBBC to invite birding friends over to your homes, or have an open house to invite new birders. Relive the joy of seeing your first **Brown-headed Nuthatch** or **Purple Finch** through the eyes and enthusiasm of a new birder. For the beginning birder that feels too inexperienced to participate, the GBBC is a great introduction to a count day. Consider the GBBC as, Count Day 101. A fun, learning experience, you won't soon forget.

One more interesting feature of the GBBC is that you can log onto their web site and see the bird species numbers come in. As far as I'm concerned these live updates are better than watching the Super Bowl. Click on Results > Maps > Select the bird species, year and region, ours is the south-central region, and watch the bird species "pileup." Do your own "dance in the end zone" when you see the Vermilion Flycatchers, Spotted Towhee, Harris's Sparrows, and wintering hummers have been "scored" by yet another BSG member. Common-ground Doves! Bald Eagles! Red-necked Grebes!?! Go BSG! So lets go out there and win one for the Gipper!...Ah, I mean...Oh Look! There goes a Northern Flicker!

SECOND ANNUAL AUDUBON COUNTRY BIRDFEST

eliciana Nature Society's Second Annual Audubon Country BirdFest will be held April 4, 5, and 6, 2003. This event is held in the scenic and historical Feliciana Parishes of Louisiana, in which John James Audubon completed many of his famous bird paintings. Visitors to this year's event are sure to have an exciting experience as they take birdwatching tours, visit historic sites, and learn about birds.

The keynote speaker of the festival is Ms. Diana Wells who published "100 Birds and How They Got Their Names" in 2000. Ms. Wells will discuss intriguing facts about the names of birds, the naturalists who named them, and even mythical stories of the gods associated with bird names. A colorful slide show accompanies this interesting discussion. Ms. Wells will speak on Friday, April 4 in St. Francisville at Hemingbough at 7:00 p.m. A dinner, live auction, silent auction, and door prizes will be a part of this festive opening night.

On Saturday, April 5, the Friends of Oakley will sponsor "An Evening with Audubon" to share interesting tales of John James Audubon's time in the Felicianas. A wine and cheese reception will accompany this presentation, which will begin at 7:00 p.m. at Jackson Hall in St. Francisville.

This year's birdwatching tours will be held on all three days of the festival. They include trips to Port Hudson State Historic Site, Cat Island National Wildlife Refuge, Tunica Hills Wildlife Management Area, Mary Ann Brown Nature Preserve, and Murrell Butler's Oakhill. Tours to Rosedown Plantation State Historic Site and Catalpa Plantation will include tours of the homes and birdwatching on the grounds of the properties. A walking tour of the town of St. Francisville will visit riparian areas along the Mississippi River. A trip to East Feliciana Parish will include a tour of Centenary State Historic Site, birdwatching along sandy Thompson Creek, and a stop at the Highlands Wine Festival. A tour to Afton Villa Gardens will be geared toward beginner bird enthusiasts. All birdwatching tours are led by experienced birdwatching guides.

Throughout the day on Saturday, April 5, Parker Memorial Park in downtown St. Francisville, will be the site for food, workshops and vendors. Seminars beginning at 10:30 a.m. will be presented to visitors. Topics include raptor rehabilitation with live birds, a discussion about how people affect birds and their environment, a slide

show of nesting birds of Louisiana, learning how to garden for birds and an opportunity to build bird houses. Additionally, a children's tent will allow kids to do bird-related crafts. The park will be open from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. for visitors to buy lunch and crafts, bird houses, art, books and plants.

This year's feature festival bird is the Orchard Oriole. This striking black and orange bird frequents the Felicianas in spring and breeds there throughout the summer. Their nests are often made inside clumps of Spanish moss that hang from the many live oaks that dot the landscape of this area. The melodious song is heard from the treetops as they mark their territories each spring. To celebrate this bird, a poster painted by renowned local artist Murrell Butler is available to commemorate the festival.

HELP SAVE BOLIVAR FLATS

he Houston Audubon has been working several years to acquire 750 acres on the Bolivar Peninsula known as the Horseshoe Marsh. It is a beautiful saltmarsh area with exposed oyster reefs at low tide and yet also with some significant upland habitat. It serves as home for many shorebirds, **Roseate Spoonbills**, oystercatchers, **Long-billed Curlews**, **Seaside Sparrows** and meadowlarks among many others.

We are now in the final stages of completion of the project. However, due to the nature of the bankruptcies proceedings, we could not know the actual acquisition price until the last step of the process. We have received the appraisal of \$800,000. We have received a federal grant to protect the wetlands, but we still need to raise about \$300,000 as quickly as possible.

Bolivar Flats has been recognized for more than a decade by the Western Shorebird Network as a place of "hemispheric importance." Most recently, it was recognized as a place of "Global Significance" by BirdLife International in its Important Bird Area program.

MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING

January 14, 2003, 7:00 p.m., Museum of Life Sciences at LSUS

Announcements — Mac Hardy made an announcement while waiting for Bill Wood to arrive so that Bill could introduce the speaker. Mac said that the next board meeting would be February 4, at 7:00 p.m., at the museum. At that meeting we will have a representative from the post office present to determine if the club could change the mailing of the newsletter to periodical status. Lily Poole announced that we need a new publicity chairperson for the club and asked for volunteers. Mac said that the hospitality committee needs

some help and asked for volunteers. Mac also reported that the club needs several members to help fold and mail the newsletter. He also asked for volunteers.

Christmas Count – Paul Dickson reported on the BCBCBC. He said that on this count, there were 50% more party hours than previously. Rosemary Seidler had a party of nine at Bishop Point. We saw fewer ducks and juncos than usual. He reported a huge increase in corvids, chickadees and titmice. There was also a large increase in woodpeckers. In particularly there was a doubling of Red-bellied Woodpeckers and three times as many Downy Woodpeckers. Several Gray Catbirds were seen which is typical of a warm winter. There were three new birds for the count. Jim Ingold saw a Goldencrowned Sparrow associating with White-throated Sparrows, Charlie Lyon saw a Common Ground-Dove, and Paul Dickson saw a Caspian Tern on the Red River. Caspian Terns are very uncommon in January. In all, 127 species were seen. The record number of species on this count was 134 in 2000.

Program – Bill Wood had not arrived, so Mac Hardy decided to continue with the program. Mac introduced the speaker Lynn Jackson who spoke on managing the **Red-cockaded Woodpecker** in the Kisatchie National Forest, Winn Ranger District.

Field Trips – Mac Hardy reported that Jim Ingold would take his class to see the Red-cockaded Woodpeckers on January 28 in the morning. Jim will also lead the field trip to Cheneyville to see the Sandhill Cranes. Bird banding at Paul Dickson's deer farm is scheduled for February 15, but Paul wants to change the date to February 22. However, Jim was not at the meeting to discuss the matter. Mac also reported that Jim would be banding at his eastern Texas site on January 18. Instructions on how to get there were available from Mac. Nancy Menasco reported that Hubert Hervey would lead the owl prowl on Yearwood Road. She said that anyone who participates would need a Louisiana Department of Wildlife and Fisheries License to be able to enter the wildlife management area. Nancy also reminded everyone that the LOS winter meeting was January 24-26. in Lake Charles.

Miscellaneous – Lilly Poole reported that we have 100 paid accounts. Mac Hardy read a letter from Will Smolenski thanking the club for the awards he received. Mac also said that the deadline for submitting bird reports was the 25th of the month. He reported that the board had approved an award for the best science fair project pertaining to birds and birding at the Regional Science Fair. Amanda Crnkovic will judge the projects and

present the award. Mac told everyone that Rosemary Seidler had been elected president of LOS.

Treasurer's Report - Jean Trahan reported that on December 31, the club had \$2,156.65 in the bank. In addition we had \$482.84 and \$472.81 in prepaid expenses at the post office and LSUS printing, respectively. The fund balance is \$3,122.80. Net income for the month of December was \$565.96.00, and there were no expenses. Jean also reported that proceeds from the Christmas party/auction were \$848.75, which was up 51% from the previous year.

Subscriptions Committee - Hubert Hervey, chair of the committee, said that his committee recommends that we drop our memberships in the North American Hawk Migration Association and the Bluebird Association. A motion was made to that effect and passed.

Bird Talk – Jeff Trahan saw a Common Ground-dove at Bickham Dickson Park. Nan Franks sought identification of a hawk she saw in her back yard. It had white and black bands on its tail. Most members thought it might be a Sharp-shinned Hawk. Linda Adrion saw a Greater Roadrunner in Lincoln Parish and wondered how far west their range extended. Nancy Menasco reported Bonaparte's Gulls, American Pipits, and Ring-billed Gulls at Bickham Dickson Park. She also reported both Vermilion Flycatchers at the park Tuesday and a Blue-headed Vireo in her backyard today.

GREAT BACKYARD BIRD COUNT AFTERMATH

North American Migration Count (NAMC), the primary focus of the Great Backyard Bird Count (GBBC) is on common birds and keeping them common. Birders being birders, we find it hard to stop with our backyards. So, after duly recording the yard birds, we take to the roads to count everything we can find. With four days in which to count, we avoid the somewhat frenetic pace of the one-day CBC's and NAMC and bird at our leisure (at least until final count day). No other count provides us with the immediate gratification of being able not only to track our area's results online but to target species missed on previous days of the count. And so, a friendly competition develops.

We analyze seasonal occurrence charts, field trip reports, and database listings to plan our strategy. We confer with our fellow birders as we meet them on the road. "Did you get the Purple-throated Whatsis on Highway 1?" "No, but we got Lesser Magenta Whatchamacallits on Cross Lake." Ultimately, it's not about the number of species we see, but what we learn and the fun we have while adding to the body of knowledge of our feathered cohabiters of this earth.

That said, let's get back to our friendly competition. As of Friday, February 21, Shreveport was in first place in Louisiana and 22nd place in the United States and Canada with 102 species, Homer was in third place in Louisiana with 69, Stonewall was in sixth place with 64, and Keithville was in ninth place with 54 species. We won't know the final results until after February 28, the deadline for turning in checklists, at which time write-in species will be added to the totals.

We asked BSG'ers to comment on their Great Backyard Bird Count experience. Here's what they said:

Hubert Hervey: This was my first GBBC, because I have always preferred birding at exceptionally birdy locations to sitting around waiting for birds to show up, unless hawks are involved, in which case I'll take them wherever I can find them. The thing I like the most about doing this count is that I can do it at my convenience, working in birding times around other activities. Therefore the Hours Spent column on the report form is rather meaningless, as the feeder watching bird hours are impossible to report accurately. I also enjoyed watching the counts add numbers from day to day. The idea to have a four day count is very clever as it motivates participants from day to day to seek out species missed. That was especially important this year due to the adverse

weather encountered on the first three days of the count,. Windy, rainy, and cold conditions limited my success, though I did report the **Spotted Towhee**. However, those same conditions were responsible for my best surprise bird, two **Ross' Goose** about a mile and a half from the house. All of my birding was done within four miles of the farm, all in DeSoto Parish and north and east of Stonewall. I'm already looking forward to next year.

Rosemary Seidler: Linda Adrion and I birded South Lakeshore, North Lakeshore, and West Lakeshore. I'm sure that she can tell a better story than I. (Why would she think that I would stop somewhere to get something to eat?) Jeff Trahan and I noticed the lack of **Hooded Merganser** on the Shreveport list so we zipped out between classes to Highway 71 north of town to get them. If we had had more time we'd have gone back to Yearwood road to hunt down a **Harris's Sparrow**. It was fun.

Linda Adrion: I am a better birder because of Rosemary. She shared her food and taught me so much, like how to hold and focus binoculars with my right hand while feeding my face with my left. I am forever in her debt.

ME Lewis: I birded at our home on Lake Claiborne morning and afternoon all four days, made two trips to the North Louisiana Hill Farm and other locations on Lake Claiborne. Youngsters also participated in "bird activities." In Girl Scouting, the girls younger than "Brownies" are "Daisies" (kindergarten age). Two "Daisies," a "Cadette" and their troop leader visited my residence for the bird count.

Since it was cold and wet that afternoon in Homer, we all sat on the living room floor next to the big windows with paper and pencil in hand. With this ringside seat each participant had a "bird profile sheet" depicting several common feeder birds. Hopefully we'd see the birds and be able to match color, shape, size, etc., to the picture. Brilliant red **Northern Cardinals** really stole the show with the girls counting 17 species.

Then, it was outside to the covered porch, where it was at least dry if not warm, to make pine cone, peanut butter and bird seed feeders. After refreshments, it was time to load up and drive home to Homer.

I'm very proud of Homer! This year two schools, the library, the state park, and the Scouts were involved, plus two garden clubs and the DAR ladies.

Nancy Menasco and Jerry Bertrand: Our checklist from Sunday included Barn Owl, Eastern Screech-Owl, Vesper Sparrow, Brewer's Blackbird, and American Woodcock to add to the list of reported species for Shreveport zip codes. The Trahans and the team of Rosemary Seidler and Linda Adrion each had sightings of Lincoln's Sparrow. This is a write-in and apparently takes awhile to be included the totals.

We visited the Harris's Sparrow location on Yearwood Road twice with no luck, lots of White-crowned Sparrows and a smaller number of White-throated Sparrows there though. We tried for Shorteared Owls, also with no result, but while playing the Short-eared Owl tape, we heard an American Woodcock call and then it flew across the road near us.

We ran into the Trahans at Lock & Dam #5 Sunday. They birded Bishop Point and Highway 1 back to Shreveport while we did Yearwood Road. Earlier in the day, we found two Brewer's Blackbirds and one **Eurasian Collared-Dove** at the intersection of Highways 1 and 175. We found the Vesper Sparrows, American Woodcock, Wilson's Snipe, Barn Owl and Eastern Screech-Owl on Yearwood. We had already birded Hart's Island Road on the way south, where we had three Fox Sparrows and seven Brown Thrashers. Trahans had birded Hart's Island on Saturday. I know they did Bickham Dickson, don't know what day(s), but that's where they had Great Horned Owl and, of course, **Vermilion Flycatcher**. We did some late birding at CBD Saturday. Jerry wanted to take our neighbors' canoe out for a little while. I stayed on land and had a Purple Martin. He spotted a Cooper's Hawk from the canoe, which was the only Cooper's turned in so far.

Linda Adrion, Jerry, and I rechecked a couple of Cross Lake locations on Monday, hoping for **Marsh Wren** (unsuccessfully) and then did some Highway 71 and Old River Road area birding. We picked up nine **Northern Shovelers** on Highway 71, but Rosemary and Jeff had been there before us and had spotted ten of them along with two **Hooded Mergansers**, which we missed. Across the road from the ducks was a field where Jerry

counted over 950 American Crows.

Postscript: During the count period, there was a distinct lack of variety in our backyard bird species list, which was mainly dominated by that ubiquitous interloper, the **House Sparrow**, with not much more than our faithful little **White-throated Sparrows** to brighten the scene. Of course, since then we've been visited by three **House Finches** and three **Inca Doves** who were apparently just waiting until the count was over to drop in.

Bill Wood: On the way home of the first day of the count I spotted a single American Woodcock flying south across the road at the intersection of Bert Kouns and Linwood Avenue. After it flew across Bert Kouns, it disappeared into a grassy area across the street from the McDonald's. I would rather have added it to my Keithville area count but Shreveport got this one.

I only got to bird Friday and Saturday morning and for a few hours Sunday in an effort to keep Keithville in the Top 10 for a third year in a row. I missed several species from last year, Pine Siskin, Fish Crow, Purple Martin, and Rusty Blackbird but added Ruby-crowned Kinglet, Field Sparrow, and Savannah Sparrow for the first time. I also got Ring-billed Gull, Rock Dove, and Brown-headed Nuthatch that I missed last year. I lucked out with Inca Dove by seeing one fly across the road on the way to my brothers house. Looks like I barely made the Louisiana Top Ten list this year holding onto the number 10 spot!

Paul Dickson: My boys were in a Lacrosse tournament last weekend. We were gone from home all weekend but I did get out early Sunday morning for an hour. I saw the **Broad-tailed Hummingbird** at my feeder. Another yard local for me is **White-breasted Nuthatch**.

At the deer farm where we will band the ducks, I had a few species which you might have missed: Northern Pintail, American Wigeon, Gadwall, Green-winged Teal, Blue-winged Teal, Pied-billed Grebe, Vesper Sparrow, and the usual sparrow mix.

Lily Poole: I had to wait around the nest until the eagles came to roost but I was finally able to see and hear the **Bald Eagles** at 4:30 p.m. The temperature was 35 degrees, drizzly & windy. I must have been crazy to stay. Other good birds were three **Eastern Towhees** and two **Hermit Thrushes**. My best yard bird was a **Purple** Finch that my 'non-birding' husband Barney spotted, "Hey, there's different kind of 'red' bird at 'your' feeder..."

BIRD NAME CHANGES

he 43rd Supplement to the American Ornithologists' Union "Check-list of North American Birds" was recently published in the Auk (vol. 119, no. 3, p. 897-906, 2002). There are four changes that effect us directly and another (maybe more) that potentially could effect us in the future. Only a single change involves a common name.

The scientific name of the **Roseate Spoonbill** has been changed to *Platalea ajaja* from *Ajaia ajaja*. Its sequence is unchanged.

The scientific name of the **Purple Gallinule** has been changed to *Porphyrio martinica* from *Porphyrula martinica*. Its sequence is unchanged.

The common name of the **Common Snipe** has been changed to **Wilson's Snipe** and its scientific name has been changed to *Gallinago delicata* from *Gallinago gallinago*. Its sequence is unchanged.

The scientific name of the **Blue Grosbeak** has been moved to the genus *Passerina* so it is now known as *Passerina caerulea* rather than *Guiraca caerulea*. Its sequence is unchanged.

Now for the potential change. This change does NOT effect our bird list at this time; however, the species might be detected in our area eventually. If it is found it better be by us. The **Black-crested Titmouse** (*Baeolophus atricristatus*) is now recognized as genetically distinct from our **Tufted Titmouse** but thus far, according to the AOU Checklist Committee, can only be distinguished vocally. The distribution of the **Black-crested Titmouse** includes Grimes county, just east of Bryan, Texas. That is only about 150 airline miles from Caddo parish, Louisiana.

The number of species recognized as occurring in the *Check-list* area (main list) is now 2,030 (from 2,023). The complete list of bird species known in the AOU *Check-list* area may be accessed at http://www.AOU.org/aou/birdlist.html.

MINUTES OF THE BOARD MEETING

February 4, 2003, 7:00 p.m. Museum of Life Sciences at LSUS

Board members present at the meeting were Mac Hardy, Jeff Trahan, Hubert Hervey, Nancy Menasco, Larry Raymond, Lily Poole, Linda Adrion, and Jean Trahan.

Science Fair - Mac Hardy reported that the Regional Science Fair will take place March 14, 2003. The club will sponsor an award for the best project on birds and/or birding. We will award a \$50 savings bond and a plaque for the best project. Amanda Crnkovic will judge the fair and award the prizes for the club.

Blue Bird Boxes - Mac Hardy said Holly Martin from Earth Team has 300 bluebird boxes that they want to install in Caddo Parish. Larry Raymond said that the club could put most of them up in Eddie Jones Park.

Periodical Mailing Permit - Mac Hardy has acquired information about a periodical mailing permit that the club might want to use rather than the bulk mailing permit. Mac has acquired a manual on the topic and reports that the advantage of using the periodical mailing permit is that periodicals are given priority over other mail and that we would not have to mail a minimum of 200 pieces at a time as we have to with bulk mailing. The cost of applying is a one-time fee of \$375.00 that is not refundable. At this time, we pay an annual fee of \$150.00 for bulk mailing. One problem is that we must report the number of periodicals that we printed and account for each one when we do periodical mailing. Mac said that he would study the manual and report back to the board.

Gulf Coast Birding Trail - Mac Hardy reported that a person named Sima from Brown and Caldwell Consulting Co. have the project of developing the Gulf Coast Birding Trail. They are looking for an advisory group and asked if the BSG would do that. They need ideas about user needs, what to consider and ideas for design. If we give them ideas for design, they would design it. The board decided that the club needs more information before making a decision. Brown and Caldwell should send a statement of their expectations in writing including what kind of compensation they would offer. Mac said he would contact them to find out more information.

Black-headed Grosbeak - Mac Hardy said that Alvin Astrup in Greenwood has been hosting a **Black-headed Grosbeak** in his backyard. Mac distributed a map of how to get to Mr. Astrup's house and said that Mr.

Astrup would be glad to have visitors in their backyard to see the bird. Alvin has already taken good video of the bird and will show it at the next club meeting.

Field Trips - Nancy Menasco reported on future field trips. The Great Backyard Bird Count will take place on February 14 through 18. Bird banding at Paul Dickson's deer farm will be February 22, and a field trip to Bickham Dickson Park will be led by Bill Wood on March 23. Joan Brown will help lead the field trip to Mollicy; Black Bayou Lake and Tensas River NWR March 1 and 2. Nancy wanted to get permission to buy Joan lunch that day. The board agreed.

CONGRESS APPROVES FUNDS FOR RED RIVER WILDLIFE REFUGE

his week Congress appropriated \$3.9 million for the acquisition of land for the Red River National Wildlife Refuge. The money will be used to purchase two tracts currently held for RRNWR by the Louisiana Nature Conservancy and a portion of the headquarters site currently held by The Conservation Fund. These two conservation organizations have been key to the success of land acquisitions for RRNWR and are due our deepest appreciation. Congressman Jim McCrery and Senator Breaux and Landrieu made great efforts to land these funds. We owe them our thanks as well. The TNC tracts lie along the Red River and contain both forest and grassland, all top quality neo-tropical bird habitat. They contain rice fields and former catfish ponds which will provide excellent waterfowl and shorebird staging habitat. Moreover, the fact that one tract borders the Red River for about a mile, puts the refuge on the river itself thus opening up the door to USFWS aid to the river system's wildlife. The TNC tracts lie only 25 minutes south of Shreveport. The headquarters tract adjoins the city limits of Bossier City.

On Sunday morning, our route will take us to the Atchafalaya Basin where we'll bird the fabled Whiskey Bay Road (Highway 975) and surrounding area north of I-10. The Atchafalaya Basin is Swallow-tailed Kite and Species possible in addition to songbird territory. Swallow-tailed and Mississippi Kites include Whiteeyed and Red-eyed Vireo, Northern Parula, American Redstart, Prothonotary Warbler, Swainson's Warbler, Kentucky Warbler, Common Yellowthroat, Hooded Warbler, Yellow-breasted Chat. and Summer Tanager. We'll head back to Shreveport Sunday afternoon.

GO EAST, YOUNG BIRDERS!

t was the kind of morning when you just want to stay in bed. Dawn didn't break; it crept in unnoticed **L** through the heavy, dark clouds and drizzling rain. This was not boding well for our weekend. But we had miles to go, people to meet, and birds to see, so we stoically put on our boots, stowed our raingear in the car, and, along with Jeff and Jean Trahan, headed east on I-20. Other intrepid birders joined us along the way so that by the time we left Monroe, we were ten in number. Our first destination was to be the Mollicy Unit of the Upper Ouachita National Wildlife Refuge, followed by Black Bayou NWR, and finally the Tensas River NWR on Sunday. The National Wildlife Refuge System celebrated its one-hundredth anniversary on March 14, 2003. It seemed fitting that we would spend the first two days of the month visiting three of Louisiana's refuges.

Mollicy, a 16,000 acre unit bordering the Ouachita River on the east, is often known as Mollicy Farms. In the 1960's, the bottomland hardwood forest was cleared for farmland. Today, re-establishment of that forest is a prime consideration. The area is protected by a levee system for now but if the river should breach the levees in the future, plans are to allow the river to take its natural course. At present, much of Mollicy is closed to the public unless you know someone who has access, such as a U.S. Fish and Wildlife type. Fortunately, we did, in the person of Steve Pagans. Steve and Joan Brown, who had kindly arranged this trip for us, met us in Monroe to guide us to Mollicy. We followed Highway 165 north from Some time and several back roads later, including such roads as Prairie Debutte and Cave Off, we made the final turn to Mollicy from a road by the name of Long Lonesome. A Loggerhead Shrike greeted us.

Apparently, this was his corner as he was still there when we passed by again several hours later. The rain had

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lessened to more of a heavy mist and by early afternoon, despite overcast skies, it ceased altogether. As we drove a road between fields with scattered trees and shrubs, ME Lewis spotted a couple of **Wild Turkeys**. This was prime **Northern Harrier** habitat and we would see 15 or more



before the day was over. Everyone was on the lookout for eagles. The first candidates turned out to be **Red-tailed Hawks**, but soon someone spotted what would be known as the "Trash bag Eagle." There was a strange effect in those fields that both

Jeff Trahan and I commented on whereby distant objects appeared to be much larger than they really were in relation to other objects. It was difficult to tell how far away an object was so this made judging size difficult. I opined that it was probably due to some weird curvature of the earth there, but there were no other takers for that theory. At any rate, from at least a couple of hundred yards away, the "Trash bag Eagle" looked like a large trash bag caught in a bush. No one was confident of that identification so out came the scopes. This still didn't resolve the issue and there was much discussion, with some on the side of the trash bag identification and others voting that it was an eagle. Finally, the "trash bag" turned its head and we were able to discern white on the back of its head; it was a Bald Eagle! We certainly had not expected to see an eagle sitting in a bush, but that is just what it appeared to be doing. This would be the first of six **Bald Eagles** we would see that day, one adult and five immatures, in various stages of immaturity. Most of the others were much closer and readily identifiable, although later on we would unsuccessfully try to turn one of them into an **Osprey**.

Sparrows popped in and out of the bushes, weeds, and ditches lining the road and it would be a nine-sparrow day before it was over. Vesper, Field, Savannah, Song, Swamp, White-throated, and a couple of elusive LeConte's Sparrows were all seen here. Unbeknownst to us, the best was yet to come in regard to sparrows though. We left this section of Mollicy to visit another area which is open to the public. On the way, we passed a granary where the spilled grain had attracted an assortment of birds, including cardinals, sparrows, and blackbirds. New sparrows seen there were Dark-eyed Juncos and Chipping Sparrows.

Our next stop was a pond where Purple Martins and

Tree Swallows were zipping about over the water. Other species seen here included Northern Flicker, Eastern Phoebe, Ruby-crowned Kinglet, and more Bald Eagles. A Barred Owl called in the distance. The road curved around the pond and we stopped again on the other side. Here a dirt (make that mud) road led off into the distance toward a flooded area where we could see ducks flying. The mud wasn't too bad, so we decided to walk down the road to see what we could see. Through our binoculars we could see a large shape perched on a pole or tree out in the water. Out came the scopes again. Through the scopes the black-tipped white tail of an immature Golden Eagle could be distinguished. This was a life bird for several of us.

Eager to observe the eagle at closer quarters, we continued walking down the road. This is when it happened, the unbelievable sparrow experience. Bushes and small trees lined one side of the road with fields We were watching Savannah and Whitethroated Sparrows as we walked, when we saw a LeConte's Sparrow sitting in a bush. Then we saw another and another and another. One of our party remarked that this just wasn't right. You were supposed to have to walk through fields catching only glimpses of the little creature as it scurried mouse-like through the grass in front of you. To actually get a good look at one, you would have to be in a party large enough to surround one so it would sit up for a minute or so while contemplating its method of escape. These LeConte's were perched in bushes and trees only a few feet away from us. For Linda Adrion, this was her second life bird of the day, the other being Golden Eagle. We had to tell her that this was a very unusual situation and that adding LeConte's Sparrow to your life list normally requires a lot more effort than this.

At last, we neared the end of the road. By then, the Golden Eagle had flown so we watched ducks instead. Two **Green-winged Teal** flew in. Other ducks present were **Mallard, Gadwall**, and **Northern Shoveler**. We visited one last area of Mollicy where a levee overlooked a backwater area, other ponds and the river in the distance before we left.

On the way back to Monroe for dinner, we stopped at Black Bayou National Wildlife Refuge, which is on Highway 165. It was getting late, so we settled for checking out the observation deck and walking the boardwalk that extends into the lake. Several pairs of **Wood Ducks** flew as we approached. Black Bayou is definitely worth another trip. For those who plan on visiting, the trails are paved and handicapped accessible.

River area were heavily logged in the first half of the twentieth century. The 80,000 acre Singer Tract, the last known bastion of the **Ivory-billed Woodpecker**, was felled in the 1930's and early 1940's. As you enter the

refuge, signs in the fields inform of ongoing hardwood restoration.

Volunteers, of whom Joan Brown is one, staff the visitor center on the weekends.

After dinner, Jerry Bertrand, ME Lewis, and I drove to Delhi to spend the night. We awoke the next morning to blue skies and the sun shining on us for our trip to the Tensas National Wildlife Refuge. A few miles east of Delhi, we took the Waverly exit from I-20. As we were crossing over I-20 to take Highway 80 east, ME called out that she saw a couple of raptors in the grassy area below us between I-20 and the access road. Just then, one of them, a Sharp-shinned Hawk, flew over us. The other was still sitting in the grass, so Jerry crossed back over the bridge, turned the car around and stopped on the side of the road where we could overlook the raptor. There sitting in the grass, to our surprise, was a Mississippi Kite. We checked our Northwest Louisiana Seasonal Occurrence Chart and found this northeast Louisiana sighting on March 2 to be a very early date compared to those reported on our side of the state. Jerry got out of the car, hoping to get a picture, but when he started to take his coat off, the kite flew off into a field.

At the turn onto Highway 80, directly in front of us was another granary where blowers were drying grain under a big tent-like structure. Hundreds of **Brewer's Blackbirds** with a smaller number of **Red-winged Blackbirds** and one lone female **Brown-headed Cowbird** were feasting on the grain that spilled out from under the tent.

Another few miles east on Highway 80, you cross back over I-20 on to a gravel road which leads through agricultural fields to the Tensas NWR 7 miles to the south. As we neared the refuge, ME, who may win the award for best spotter of the trip, saw a number of raptors circling overhead. We stopped and watched as four **Redshouldered Hawks** soared above us, calling to each other as they did so. The Tensas was once part of a 25 million acre bottomland hardwood forest that stretched throughout the Mississippi River Valley. Today there are less than 5 million acres. The virgin forests of the Tensas

It was in the Singer Tract in April of 1935 that Dr. Arthur Allen of Cornell University and his team, which included a young graduate student, James Tanner, observed and filmed several Ivory-billed Woodpeckers and made the only known recording of their call and drumming. Tanner would return and spend several years in the late 1930's studying the Ivory-bill and hoping in the process to discover a way to save them. The Singer Sewing Machine Company had leased the tract to the Chicago Mill and Lumber Company. Tanner developed a proposal whereby the area could be logged but under a management plan which would provide enough unlogged area for the Ivory-bill to survive. Chicago Mill and Lumber would have none of it. Despite local support and the support of four governors, including the governor of Louisiana, the U.S. Forest Service, the National Park Service, the Fish and Wildlife Service, and the War Production Board, and led by the president of the National Audubon Society, in 1943 the fight to save the Singer Tract failed. Chicago Mill and Lumber refused to make any concessions, citing loss of revenue and jobs. Their reasoning seems flawed since the State of Louisiana was offering \$200,000 for the purchase of the land, a goodly sum in those days. As for lost jobs, the actual logging of the Singer Tract was done by German P.O.W.s, who were aghast at the wasteful methods of the lumber company who would take the best logs and leave the rest in wreckage. This spelled the end for the Ivorybilled Woodpecker in the Tensas.

The last authenticated sightings of the Ivory-bill in the United States were made by wildlife artist Don Eckelberry in April 1944 in the Tensas River area near Today the refuge Visitor Center sits on John's Bayou. land where that last woodpecker, a female, ranged. In the Visitor Center are life-size dioramas of the denizens, past and present, of the area. Two Ivory-bills cling to the side of a tree, their size and magnificent huge ivory bills a contrast to the Pileated Woodpeckers displayed in a case nearby. While he was President, Theodore Roosevelt visited the area on a bear hunt in late 1907 or early 1908. There are photos of him and his companions on display. Roosevelt commented that he thought the abundant woodpeckers of various species were the region's "most characteristic birds." He saw three Ivory-billed

Woodpeckers while there. Woodpeckers are once again abundant on the Tensas, excepting, of course, the Ivorybill. Red-headed, Red-bellied, and Downy Woodpeckers and Northern Flickers were everywhere when we visited. Pileated Woodpeckers called and we even saw one Yellow-belled Sapsucker, considered an uncommon species there.


Behind the Visitor Center is the Hollow Cypress Wildlife Trail, which is a boardwalk leading to an observation deck overlooking fields, forest, ponds, and flooded areas. From the boardwalk, we saw numerous birds, including Carolina Chickadee, Tufted Titmouse, Brown Thrasher, Hermit Thrush, White-throated and Swamp Sparrow, Carolina Wren, and one Winter Wren, who hopped out from underneath the boardwalk. We heard a **Barred Owl** call but did not get to see one. The Tensas is noted for having the highest concentration of Barred Owls anywhere in the world. In the Tensas also lives a remnant population of the endangered Louisiana Black Bear. Visitors are asked to report any sightings. So far, we had nothing to report. An auto tour road nearby took us through an area partially overlooked by the observation tower. On the ponds were Greenwinged Teal, Gadwall, many Northern Shovelers, and one Greater Yellowlegs. Winging over the ponds were Tree Swallows and Purple Martins. On the back side of the auto loop, we found Eastern Towhees in the bushes along the road.

Another trail, the three-and-a-half mile Rainey Lake Trail, is accessible from two different directions. We started from the autotour side but turned back because of high water on the trail. We returned to the trail entrance near the Visitor Center. From that end, we encountered several places where the water was two or three inches deep over the trail, but we forded the areas without too much difficulty. The forest floor was carpeted with leaves and everywhere palmetto fans introduced patches of green amidst the browns and grays of the late winter woods. Sixty-eight years ago, when Dr. Allen's team camped in the Tensas, they cut palmetto leaves to place their bedding on to keep it out of the water if it should rain. We retraced our steps as it was nearing sunset and, at one point along the trail, Jerry told us to stop. He said he saw something that could be a bear. After further investigation (through binoculars), he declared it was not a bear. I think he was disappointed; ME and I were not!

The Tensas River flows along side the main refuge road and, as we drove out, a beautiful pair of **Wood Ducks** swam peacefully beside us. On leaving the refuge, we passed a road we had not noticed before on our way

in. A sign down the road indicated that this was private property of the Chicago Mill & Lumber Company. The old nemesis of the **Ivory-billed Woodpecker** still maintains a presence in the area. To me, it was a reminder of something precious lost but I am also reminded of something I read recently in the book, *Hope is the Thing with Feathers*. Christopher Cokinos, the author, writes, "We must confront loss rather than deny it and, in doing so, nurture the energies to cope with the difficulties of loving a world we have systematically diminished." The Tensas River Wildlife Refuge was established in 1985, too late for the **Ivory-billed Woodpecker** but not too late for other species.

Theodore Roosevelt laid the foundation for the National Wildlife Refuge System in 1903 when, by Executive Order, he declared Pelican Island, Florida, the first federal bird reservation. In 1915, he spent several days visiting and cruising by boat the area of Breton NWR, a group of islands off the southeast Gulf coast of Louisiana and the second oldest refuge in the United States, created by Roosevelt in 1904. On visiting an island outside the reservation where eggers had only that morning plundered the island, taking the eggs, and shooting many of the gulls and terns nesting on the island, Roosevelt remarked that "it was a good object-lesson in the need of having reserves, and laws protecting wildlife, and a sufficient number of efficient officers to enforce the laws and protect the reserves." In this 100th anniversary year of the National Wildlife Refuge System, it is appropriate for us to reflect on those who work to protect our federal and state refuges, however flawed the system may appear at times. In writing of his trip to the bird reserves at the mouth of the Mississippi, Roosevelt was moved to declare that "the 'greatest good of the greatest number' applies to the number within the womb of time, compared to which those now alive form but an insignificant fraction. Our duty to the whole, including the unborn generations, bids us restrain an unprincipled present-day minority from wasting the heritage of these unborn generations. The movement for the conservation of wild life, and the larger movement for the conservation of all our natural resources, are essentially democratic in spirit, purpose, and method."




INTERNATIONAL MIGRATORY BIRD DAY (IMBD)

articipate in the IMBD Saturday, May 10, to celebrate and support migratory bird conservation. IMBD was created in 1993 by visionaries at the Smithsonian Migratory Bird Center and the Cornell Laboratory of Ornithology. Now under the direction of the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation and U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, IMBD continues to focus attention on one of the most important and spectacular events in the life of a migratory bird -- its journey between its summer and winter homes. Today, it is celebrated in Canada, the U.S., Mexico, and Central America through bird festivals and bird walks, education programs, and Bird Day! We invite you to join us in this important celebration

The IMBD 2003 theme, Catalysts for Conservation, explores how birds have been the inspiration for many of the most significant conservation actions in the Americas. Thanks to birds, people have been motivated to improve conditions for all wildlife and ourselves!

The IMBD 2003 art by Gerald Sneed portrays a variety of species that catalyzed conservation action, literally "poster birds" for environmental improvement! The extinction of the Passenger Pigeon, the last wild individual of one of the most numerous bird species on Earth, was killed in 1900 helped ignite the conservation movement, waking society up to the permanent damage caused by unregulated harvest. Many other species such as the Snowy Egret were slaughtered for fashion - bird plumes and skins were used to adorn ladies' hats in the late 1800s. In response to this overconsumption, bird lovers called for the formation of bird sanctuaries, including the first U.S. National Wildlife Refuge in 1903, Pelican Island, home to colonies of Brown Pelicans. A hundred years later, there are now over 500 National Wildlife Refuges, many founded for birds and all of which set aside land purely for the needs of wildlife. Responsible sportsmen also recognized the need for regulated hunting of migratory waterfowl, such as the



Green-winged Teal, other ducks, geese, and swans. Hunting licenses for waterfowl have funded the acquisition and management of millions of acres of wetlands, providing benefits to non-game wetland birds, such as the Yellow-headed Blackbird, many other kinds of wildlife, and humans, as well as waterfowl.

Our recognition of the long-distance migrations of birds such as the American Golden Plover resulted in powerful, lasting protective treaties between countries of North America and Asia; the treaties signed by Canada, U.S., Mexico, Japan and Russia legally protect almost all migratory birds from harm and set the stage for international cooperation for all migratory wildlife. The need for international cooperation has come up again and again, particularly because of the Thick-billed Parrot and other parrots drawing attention to the issue of harmful wildlife trade, and because of the Black-throated Blue Warbler, Black-throated Green Warbler, and other neotropical migrants drawing attention to habitat loss and degradation in the tropics.

When populations of Osprey, Brown Pelican, and other top-of-the-food-chain birds crashed in the 1960s, society realized the far-reaching effects of environmental contaminants and reassessed our controls on pesticides and other toxins. Thanks to these "canaries in a coal mine," our environment is cleaner for wildlife and people alike.

PAINTED HUMMINGBIRDS

banded and marked my first Ruby-throated Hummingbird this morning. I plan on color marking adult birds in several locations area-wide through the summer. Using a technique developed by Nancy Newfield, I would like to keep record of any

marked birds that are seen. If you see a hummingbird at your feeder that has any color on the crown other than the usual green, please take careful notes on color and pattern. I will first mark all spring arriving birds with white typewriter correction fluid, which is temporary, wearing off in about two weeks. Once a white marked bird appears to be a summer resident, I will recapture it and color mark it with an acrylic paint that lasts for much of summer season.

So that I may individually identify local breeders, I will use the following colors in combinations of two yellow, pink, blue, purple, orange. These will be combined in one the following patterns on the crown of the hummer: **two dots** (with right and left being specific), **two parallel lines** running from above the bill to nape (ditto r & l), **one 'V'** with the point above the bill and the open end at the nape and one dot in the center of the 'V."

The combination of these patterns and colors allows me to individually mark 75 males and 75 females. If I mark this many, I can add white to the mix and get another 33 of each. This should be plenty.

If you see a marked hummer please look for these colors and patterns, making written notes on which dot or line is on the bird's right and which is on the bird's left. Also note the sex of the bird. Please e-mail your sightings to me or call right away. If you have a white-crown marked bird that has been at your feeder for more than one week, call me and I will come over and color mark it.

Bob Sargent, a well known bander from Alabama has published some remarkable data on commuting in resident Ruby-throateds. Bob had birds traveling many miles back and forth all day from his garden to nesting areas. A marked bird using my yard could show up anywhere in Shreveport or Bossier. I will band in north Caddo Parish, north Red River Parish, maybe DeSoto Parish, and in Claiborne Parish at ME Lewis' house so marked birds could show up just about anywhere in our area. Keep a close watch and thanks for helping with my study.

Friday's registration will begin at 6:00 p.m. There will be a hospitality table and a sales table. The meeting will begin at 6:45 with a speaker at 7:00 p.m.

To help beginning birders and folks new to Cameron learn its many outstanding birding areas, we will have a field trip leaving from the Cameron Motel parking lot (near the restaurant) at 6:30 a.m. Saturday morning. We will carpool as much as possible. We will bird several habitats on both sides of the ferry.

Registration for the evening meeting begins at 6:00 p.m. on Saturday. The buffet will be served from 6:30 - 8:00 p.m. No food will be served after 8:00 p.m. The meeting will begin at 7:30 p.m. The Saturday evening speaker is Mark Bonta.

Saturday night presentation - *Thirty-Five Years after Monroe Birds and Birding in Honduras*. The late Burt Monroe's magisterial 1968 *Distributional Survey of the Birds of Honduras* remains the centerpiece of Honduran ornithological knowledge. Mark Bonta will briefly summarize Monroe's contributions as well as what came before it, then discuss recent Honduran developments in

both knowledge and conservation of avifauna. The talk is focused on Mark's 1991-present study area, the province of Olancho.

Mark Bonta is an Assistant Professor of Geography at Delta State University in Cleveland, Mississippi. He was born and raised in central Pennsylvania, where he became a birder around the age of two. He participated in Christmas Bird Counts, Big Days, the Pennsylvania Breeding Bird Atlas, and he compiled an inventory of the birds of Brush Mountain. Before becoming a cultural geographer specializing in Central America, he traveled to five continents, both as a nature-lover and as a student of human cultural diversity.

Mark accepted a two-year Peace Corps position in Honduras in 1991. He was assigned to the cloud forest conservation sector under leading Honduran environmentalist Jorge Betancourt. His site was the Sierra de Agalta National Park. He organized a bird inventory of the park and surrounding regions, where the current species total stands at 478. He was a co-founder of the El Boqueron Natural Monument.

After serving in the Peace Corps, he earned an M.A. in Geography from the University of Texas-Austin. Under Robin Doughty, he wrote a thesis entitled *Shared Worlds People and Birds in Central Olancho, Honduras*. A vastly expanded version of this will be published in July 2003 as *Seven Names for the Bellbird Conservation Geography in Honduras*.

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

EDDIE JONES PARK FIELD TRIP

ix Bird Study Group members (Jacque Falkenstine, Jack Land, Susan and Ron Martin, Lily Poole and Larry Raymond) met at the LSUS Museum of Life Sciences parking lot for 7:00 a.m. on Saturday, April 19, 2003. At 7:05 a.m., the group left in a caravan to Eddie Jones Park via Colquitt Road (LA 525) west, to LA 169 south, and finally on LA 789 southeast to the entrance to the park. Roy and Vera Bott joined the group at the entrance gate to the park. After parking near the visitor center the group birded the open areas near the parking lot. Park ranger, John McBride, assisted the group in the areas near the visitor center. Although conditions were cloudy and windy, several good birds were seen by everyone in the group.

A very vocal Yellow-throated Vireo managed to remain hidden despite singing continuously for several minutes. Eastern Phoebe, Chipping Sparrow, Indigo Bunting and a motionless female Blue Grosbeak in a low branch of a tree provided good looks for everyone in the group. However, a vocal Common Yellowthroat was not so obliging and never would pop up for us to see. We started down the hiking trail and quickly got good looks at a Black-and-white Warbler that John had spotted earlier. The warbler responded to squeaking and gave everyone good looks at a close distance. Yellow-breasted Chat could be heard but did not respond to squeaking and would not be seen until later. Other birds seen or heard along the hiking trail included Red-bellied Woodpecker. Downy Woodpecker, White-eyed Vireo, Red-eyed Vireo, Carolina Chickadee, Tufted Titmouse, Carolina Wren, Blue-gray Gnatcatcher, Wood Thrush, Blue-winged Warbler, Hooded Warbler, Summer Tanager, Northern Cardinal and Indigo Bunting.

Once we reached the ponds below the old landfill, we decided to leave the hiking trail and bird around the pond and open area. A very cooperative male Blue Grosbeak perched nearby for all of us to appreciate. The cloud cover amplified the deep blue of the grosbeak and the rusty wing bars stood out like a neon sign on a dark night. At least six Barn Swallows flew back and forth over the pond, often just above the water's surface. Male and female Red-winged Blackbirds were scattered around the pond. Walking up onto the landfill from the ponds, we added a pair of Eastern Kingbirds, a pair of Brownheaded Cowbirds and a Turkey Vulture, but saw no activity in the grassy areas. Two Cattle Egrets flew over

us, and two Wood Ducks landed and took off again from the pond. Walking back toward the visitor center along the road between the ponds, we added Chimney Swift, a male Orchard Oriole, Belted Kingfisher and a Green Heron. On the walk back to the visitor center, more Summer Tanagers, Hooded Orioles and other birds of interest were added. Several White-throated Sparrows, an Indigo Bunting and a Yellow-breasted Chat were seen in the second-growth areas cleared for the extension of the road from the visitor center back to LA 789. Arriving back at the visitor center, we added Rock Doves in and around the silo, Eastern Bluebirds and European Starling. A few of us walked the bike trail north of the visitor center for a short way hoping to see or hear Louisiana Waterthrush. Although we didn't find a waterthrush, we did get a good look at a Hooded Warbler and heard a Kentucky Warbler. The trail is very technical in this area and climbs up and down slopes that vary by as much as 75 feet from top to bottom. We eventually worked our way to the top of the slope and came back to the asphalt entrance road and returned to the visitor center to end the day.

Despite the gusty winds, we had good looks at several birds. Our list totaled forty-three species for the day in Eddie Jones Park. I saw or heard my first Eastern Kingbirds, Blue-winged Warbler, Kentucky Warbler, Yellow-breasted Chat, Blue Grosbeak and Orchard Oriole of the season. There are still lots of areas to be explored in the park and lots of species that we can add to the park list. Anyone wishing to visit the park will find it open 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Wednesday through Saturday, and 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. on Sunday. Park ranger, John McBride, can assist you in

April 1, 2003, 7:00 p.m. Museum of Life Sciences at LSUS

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



IMPORTANT BIRD AREA

new Bird Study Group committee, The Important Bird Area Committee, met at the Museum of Life Sciences, LSUS, on May 16, 2003. Our purpose is to decide on the locations in our area that fulfill the requirements needed to qualify as an Important Bird Area. The reader is encouraged to contact me if you have an area you would like for us to consider submitting to the state committee. The area should be used by an endangered species, a threatened species, or a vulnerable species, or have a large number of birds of a single species that nest, over-winter, or find the area important during migration.

We decided to apply for the Red River Valley, from Alexandria north to the Arkansas line, as our first Important Bird Area. The criteria that make this a promising candidate for an IBA are: The presence of nesting endangered **Least Terns**, use of the river sandbars by **Piping Plovers** and **Snowy Plovers**, use of backwaters by endangered Wood Storks, and threatened southern Bald Eagles. The documentation of records at the Bird Study Groups database should prove invaluable to verify our claims to large numbers of birds such as: half a million Purple Martins, ten-thousand White-rumped Sandpipers, or even a piddling 200 Buff-breasted **Sandpipers**. Another potential boost to our case could be the possible restoration of native prairie grasses, in the Wardview and Missionary Plantation areas, after attaining NWR status, where we have records of nesting Bell's Vireo. Grasshopper Sparrow, and Meadowlark.

I heard today, May 22nd, from Louisiana IBA Committee head Don Hendricks, who said they were very excited about our pending application, and offered to

meet with us. I am proud of our committee members, Paul Dickson, Mac Hardy, Jim Ingold, and Jeff Trahan and look forward to working with them on this project. The ongoing acquisition, and subsequent management of portions of the Red River Valley for the Red River National Wildlife Refuge should also be very advantageous for the IBA application.

FROM THE PRESIDENT, THE BSG IN REVIEW

The past three years have been fun for me as I served as president of the Bird Study Group. From my limited perspective the time has brought change and growth. The birds we have seen are most of the reason for our existence, and according to the BSG bird database, it has been a very good time for bird records. The bird records stand at 130,565 with the publication of this newsletter (an increase of more than 41,000 since February of 2001). During the summer, before the issue of the next Newsletter (volume 18, number 1), we will receive many records from the brave summer birders, who will unflinchingly face the heat, humidity, dust, mosquitoes, mud (if it rains), and thirst of birding in Louisiana. We also will continue to enter the bird records of Jim Stuart from the 1950s and 1960s (and later) into the BSG database. These records are giving us a very valuable historic background to the bird life in our birding area.

During the past year we have awarded the first BSG Science Fair award for the best project in the regional Science Fair concerning wild birds. The award, a plaque, a savings bond, and a years membership in the BSG, went to Erin Dupree. We also have compiled a list of birders who would be willing to serve as birding guides for outof-town visitors. We have made considerable progress on the revision of the Birding Hot Spots. Important activities that continued this year included the Hunting and Fishing Day at Bodcau Bayou, the Big Sit, and the Great Backyard Bird Count. Also, we saw the dedication of the National Red River Wildlife Refuge. During the summer we will present two classes for the Bird Study merit badge for the Boy Scouts of American, Norwella Council. We also have a committee preparing a report on Important Birding Areas for northern Louisiana that will be forwarded to the state IBA committee.

Well-deserved recognition of three of our most dedicated members (Shirley Huss, Will Smolenski, and Pat Lonnecker) was a high-point in our organization. The quality and reputation of the BSG is due to the many members who continue to support the BSG through their memberships, their service, and their birding. Several of our members have brought recognition to the BSG through publicity related to their own outstanding work related to birding in northwestern Louisiana.

Charlie Lyon's work on the birds of Cross Lake and the resulting discovery of new species for our area, Hubert Hervey's work on Least Terns, and Paul Dickson's work on the establishment of the Red River National Wildlife Refuge have given us coattail support that increases our exposure to the community. Many others, who maintain a busy professional life, and yet find the time to contribute to birding in our area, include Clyde Massey, Bill Wood, Larry Raymond, Jeff and Jean Trahan, Rosemary Seidler, Nancy Menasco, Jerry Bertrand, Jim Ingold, Dan Weber, and many others. Barney Poole continues to make our web site one of the best in the country. Thanks Barney for your wonderful dedication. Everyone who takes part in any BSG activity contributes to the quality and success of bringing birding to all who wish to enjoy it in our area.

Look at page 2 of your last newsletter to see the list of 26 members who have held offices, chaired committees, or served on committees during this year. The list is longer than it appears because several persons who have served on ad hoc committees or have simply volunteered for other duties are not listed on that page. To all of these persons I want to express my deepest gratitude for your service during the past two years.

Of all of the seasons of the year, the summer is the least well represented in the BSG bird database. This is the time when birding only comes with considerable discomfort and even the birds often seem hard to find. Yet, we need good representation of this season also. So, during the time when we are not meeting regularly we do need to continue birding and keeping good records. Keep checklists with you so you will be able to easily record the details of location, date, numbers, etc. of the birds you encounter this summer. Also keep a couple of BSG business cards and brochures readily available in your pocket or car to give persons who might be interested in the BSG. Since we will not be meeting for awhile it may be inconvenient to pick up needed materials from the museum. Just give me a call and I can drop the items you need in the mail. Good birding and have a great summer.

NORTH AMERICAN MIGRATION COUNT, 2003

By Hubert Hervey

We had a record number of birding participants (20), but we didn't do as well getting a high count of different species. In 2002 we counted 140 species, but in 2003 the best we could get was 124. The problem was the high winds, which kept us from hearing the calls and songs of the migrants, and even worse kept us from getting any boats out on the Red River, where so many of our migrating shorebirds are likely to be found. A trip on the river the day after the count located about ten species that did not show up on the count. The following is a list of the ten most common birds counted on May 10, 2003, with comparisons to 2002, and 2001. Some of the species shown may surprise you.

The obvious question is why were the Cedar Waxwings slower than usual to move out of our area? I noticed lots of them feeding on blackberries, and mulberries. That may be part of the answer. What birds dropped out of the list? Great Egret is the most notable with 203 counted in 2002, and only 140 this year. Maybe there are fewer on the Cross Lake rookery. Common Grackle is the other loss from the list. Did I say loss? It was replaced by the American Crow. Don't you think that is an even swap?

A motion was made to nominate Jeff Trahan, Jean Trahan, Hubert Hervey, Amanda Crnkovic, and Jerry Bertrand to three-year terms on the board. The motion passed. Election of board members will take place at the next regular meeting of the club.

Field Trips - Nancy Menasco reported that there is an overnight field trip on May 17 and 18. The group will tour the south Louisiana rice fields to find shorebirds on May 17. She said that we need fresh faces in these positions. uoted from the pamphlet, "Memorandum to Cooperators", from the Breeding Bird Survey, dated Summer, 2003, by the U. S. Geological Survey, Patuxent Wildlife Research Center Laurel, MD.

"Of pressing concern is that in five states -Louisiana, Michigan, Mississippi, New York, and Rhode Island - more than 50% of the routes are not being sampled - - please help your coordinator by enlisting some of your qualified birder friends into the ranks of the BBS."

The drastic decline is illustrated by the comparison of 68 available routes in Louisiana, to the number actually sampled. In 2001 our state cooperators ran 43 routes, but in 2002 that number had plummeted to 27.

At the May BSG meeting I made our members aware of the above facts, and three people volunteered to take on one route apiece. All that is required is knowledge of the breeding bird songs of our area, and one morning to listen to singing birds at the fifty stops along the twenty-five mile route.
