#### **UPCOMING FIELD TRIPS AND EVENTS**

#### LOWER MISSISSIPPI VALLEY SHOREBIRD **COUNT**

Saturday, September 6 – Sunday, September 7

This is the final weekend of the count. Even if you didn't count in August, you can still participate in the September count. In fact, you are encouraged to enter your shorebird sightings at any time of the year (not just the count weekends) in the database. This annual count began in 1999 and is sponsored by the Lower Mississippi Valley Joint Venture Shorebird Monitoring Program. The objective of the Joint Venture is to ensure that adequate habitat for migrating shorebirds is provided on managed public lands as a safety net during vears when habitat conditions outside of public lands are poor. The count is designed to provide two types of data: "Reliable estimates of shorebird numbers across the entire region at intervals in migration" and "estimates of turnover rates (how long are birds staying at a particular site)." To this end, you are asked to count during fall migration on designated weekends in August and September. You may count wherever you like for as long as you like. Enter your observations directly into the database at <a href="www.lmvjv.org/shorebird">www.lmvjv.org/shorebird</a>. website to learn more about the program and to register. Remember to report your observations to the BSG database as well.

How to get there: Take I-20 west from Shreveport to exit 617 (Marshall/US 59 exit). Turn right onto US 59 for 19.2 miles. Turn left onto SR 49 in Jefferson for 3.5 miles. Turn left onto FM 729 for 3.4 miles. Turn left onto FM 726 for 2.6 miles. Turn right into the overlook parking lot just before the dam at Lake O' The Pines.

### RED RIVER NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE AT WESTDALE, LA

Meet at the LSUS Museum of Life Sciences. This 1,500 acre property, purchased by The Nature Conservancy in December of 2002, was recently transferred to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service as the first tract in the Bayou Pierre unit of the Red River National Wildlife Refuge. It is located about 30 minutes south of LSUS in Red River Parish and is bordered by the Red River to the east and LA Highway 1 to the west. About 400 acres have been farmed for rice and, in previous years, Sora, Yellow Rail, and Virginia Rail have all been observed here. There are a couple of ponds connected to the river that usually hold waterfowl. In addition, there are a number of good walking trails that wind through a 250-acre riverfront forest stand (cottonwoods, cypress, etc.) in the sand along the water. Plan on car birding and moderate walking.

What to bring: binoculars, scope, water, and snacks. The nearest restroom is located at Lock & Dam #5.

The 11<sup>th</sup> Annual Big Sit is sponsored by the New Haven, CT, Bird Club and *Birdwatcher's Digest*.

Participants will count from within a 17-foot diameter circle. The count officially begins at midnight and ends 24 hours later. Swarovski Optik co-sponsors the event by donating \$500 to the team who gets the "Golden Bird." The "Golden Bird" is a bird selected by random drawing from the list of all birds sighted. All of the circles which list that bird are then placed in another random drawing. The winning circle chooses a non-profit environmental-based organization to be the recipient of the \$500. Sitters may come and go at will. Beginning birders are especially encouraged to participate in this event. This is an excellent opportunity to observe behavior and patterns of bird activity over a day's time. Last year, assisted by a cold front that brought migrating raptors and geese over our location, our count total was 68 species, up from 53 species in 2001. We may not be

able to top that, but come out and help us try. Park in the parking lot next to the old horse barn. Signs will lead you to our circle. The circle will be in the field around the first curve of the gated road that leads to the back of the park. If you need assistance carrying your chair or anything else, someone at the Sit will be glad to help you. We will have access to the restrooms by the barn. If you want to contact us at the Sit for any reason, call or e-mail me ahead of time and I will give you our cell phone number.

What to bring: binoculars, scope, field guides, chair, hat, mosquito repellent, sunscreen, drinks, breakfast, lunch, snacks.

#### LOS FALL MEETING, CAMERON, LA

### FAMOUS AND NOT-SO-FAMOUS HAWK WATCHES

#### HAWK WATCHES NEAR US:

NETFO (Northeast Texas Field Ornithologists) Hawk Watch – The hawk watch is located at Lake O' the Pines west of Jefferson, Texas, on the overlook above the dam. The 2003 watch will be held Saturday, September 27, and will be manned beginning at 8:30 a.m. For more information, see page 3 of the newsletter or see the NETFO website at

http://members.tripod.com/~NETFO\_TX/.

Smith Point, Texas, Hawk Watch – The hawk watch tower is located at Candy Abshier WMA in Chambers County. Texas, at the tip of a peninsula extending into Galveston Bay and East Bay. The hawk watch. conducted by the Gulf Coast Bird Observatory, Hawk Watch International, and Texas Parks and Wildlife, is in operation from August 15 to November 15. Volunteers man the tower between 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. daily. Raptor migration workshops will be held on Saturday. September 27, and Saturday, October 4, 2003, from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. For more information on the workshops, check the "Activities Calendar" at the Gulf Coast Bird Observatory website at http://www.gcbo.org. For more information on the Smith Point Hawk Watch, go to http://www.gcbo.org/research/sphawk.htm. While you're in the neighborhood, you may also want to visit Anahuac National Wildlife Refuge (about 25 miles away) and High Island (about 40 miles away).

How to get there: Take I-10 south from Beaumont, Texas. Take exit 813 and turn south on Highway 61. Go to the 4-way stop. Proceed through the 4-way where the road becomes FM 562. Follow FM 562 until a fork (Y) in the road. Follow to the right at the Y. After approximately 14 miles you will arrive in the small village of Smith Point. Continue straight toward the bay and follow the black and white Hawk Watch signs.

Facilities: Smith Point does have one gasoline station, one restaurant, a super RV Park and Lodge (The Spoonbill, call 409-355-2347), and one small store for snacks and drinks (at the gas station).

Hazel Bazemore Hawk Watch - The hawk watch is located at Hazel Bazemore County Park west of Corpus Christi in Nueces County, Texas. The watch, sponsored by Hawk Watch International, is manned daily from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. from August 14 through November 15. It is estimated that 95% of the North American population of **Broad-winged Hawks** fly over Hazel Bazemore each fall with single kettles of 10,000 hawks being routine. Single day totals of 100,000 to 400,000 hawks have been recorded during the peak of migration (generally around the last weekend in September). A massive cold front brought in a record 750,000 hawks to roost overnight October 4-5, 1977. A "Celebration of Flight" is held annually at the park during peak migration. This year's dates are September 25 through 28. For more information, check out the website at http://www.ccbirding.com/thw/hb.html.

How to get there: Hazel Bazemore County Park is located west of Corpus Christi, Texas, on the Nueces River, just off of Farm Road 624 and County Road 69.

#### HAWK WATCHES NOT SO NEAR US:

Hawk Mountain Sanctuary, Pennsylvania – The granddaddy of all hawk watches, the watch was founded in 1934 and, except for three years during World War II, has been conducted continuously since then. Free programs are held most weekends between April and November. The fall hawk watch begins August 15, with the greatest variety of raptors being in mid-October. For more information, check out the website at <a href="https://www.hawkmountain.org">www.hawkmountain.org</a>.

Cape May, New Jersey – In the fall, prevailing westerly winds push large numbers of southbound migrants toward the Atlantic coast where they are funneled down the peninsula that is southern New Jersey. Cape May's location on Delaware Bay at the tip of the peninsula makes it a migrant trap "sans pareil" (without equal) in eastern North America. Most hawks and other migrants confronted with the bay pause to get their bearings before deciding on the next leg of their migration route. The Cape May Bird Observatory's official hawk counters have staffed the hawk watch platform from September 1 through the end of November since 1976. Fall visitors to Cape May will find an abundance of daily programs conducted by the CMBO, including field trips, workshops, and mini-programs on hawk identification. The 57<sup>th</sup> annual Cape May Autumn Weekend will be held October 31 through November 2 in 2003 and a fiveday fall raptor workshop will be conducted October 17 through 21 by Cape May Bird Observatory's own raptor experts, Pete Dunne, Pat Sutton, and Clay Sutton. If you go, don't forget that Cape May is also noted for the millions of shorebirds and seabirds who pass through annually. ### Least Tern Nesting Survey Results, Red River, 2003

This report covers three trips made on June 16-18, July 14-16, and August 12-13, 2003, by the author with U. S. Army Corps of Engineers, USACE, personnel and other private survey personnel. The area covered was from Cat Island in the north at Mile Marker (MM) 244 to Fort Buhlow to the south, near Alexandria at MM 90.

On the June trip **Least Terns** were attempting to nest at several locations in Pool 5 (the area above Lock and Dam 5) from MM 200 to MM 238 at Cattle Island. They were present at MM 238, 222, and 203. This represents a smaller number of birds attempting to nest at fewer locations than in any of the previous years that I have records. The subsequent trips in July and August found that no young terns were produced at any of these locations.

The results in Pool 4 (MM 168) were similar. There were two locations where Least Terns attempted to nest behind newly constructed dikes. Silt and sand forms the surface of islands as it settles out in the slow moving waters behind the new rock deposits that are placed by the USACE to channel the flow of the river. These newly formed islands are perfect places for terns to nest during the first year, as they are virtually free of vegetation. By the second year vegetation has taken over the islands and the few terns that try to nest are seldom successful. Terns always abandon these islands by the third year. This sequence of events is man made due to the reduced scouring effect of seasonal rising in water levels. This scouring takes place in the free-flowing river above the Lock and Dam system that ends at Shreveport. Thus Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, and Louisiana (north of Shreveport), have islands that are scoured clean in the winter and spring and are nested on repeatedly by terns. The terns failed to raise any young at both of the Pool 4 locations.

The results in Pool 3 (MM 116) were different. Forty-seven Least Terns were present at a series of four new islands formed behind newly built dikes at Poissant Revetment (MM 144.5) in July and, by the August survey, 21 fledged juveniles were present. This location may be free of vegetation enough to raise a few terns next year. This location represents the farthest south terns have nested since records of their presence have been kept. Poissant Revetment is downriver from Natchitoches and five miles upriver from the St. Maurice boat launch.

The **Least Terns**' attempts to nest in Pools 4 and 5, MM 145 to MM 240, were a complete failure. Nearly

100 miles of river with great fisheries for birds to utilize is now void of these terns. Upriver the colonies use the same islands, averaging 5 years out of 6 at the same place. In the pooled area of the river a colony now averages 1.25 years per island. Unless more dike work is done, no new islands will form and **Least Terns** will have nowhere left to nest in this part of the river.

The USACE has personnel available and willing to do the work needed to keep a few islands in a condition acceptable to the terns. To date no work order has come down to accomplish jobs that need to be done to help endangered subspecies recover from the losses caused by the J. Bennett Johnson Waterway system. A recovery program needs to be started. You can help by notifying your public officials, i.e., U. S. Representatives and Senators, of your concern. The program thus far has been a passive one of merely counting the birds. The new program needs to be an active one of helping the birds.

How can they be helped? Vegetative control by whatever means available is first and foremost. Maintaining separation from the shore thus preventing land-based predation is also a prime concern. Breaking the dike at the connection to the shore to restore water flow around the island can do this. Creating new islands with dredges is a very real and easily accomplished possibility. A large dredge is currently working at the Port of Shreveport. Artificial nesting platforms created on derelict barges are an untested possibility. A program of public awareness also needs to be implemented as the public's use of these lovely sandy islands is becoming a greater problem each year. Will you please show your concern by contacting some of our lawmakers? A proactive program will only happen if pressure comes from the top.

### FROGS, MUDBUGS, AND SWAMP CANARIES

#### Day 1:

Saturday, May 17, 2003, found BSGers Rosemary Seidler, Vicki LeFevers, Mac and Marilyn Hardy, Jerry Bertrand, and Nancy Menasco in the town of Rayne in Vermilion Parish, Louisiana. We were there to meet Dave Patton of Lafayette, who would be our guide for the day. Dave arrived with several fellow LABA (Louisiana Birders Anonymous) members in tow, Paul Conover, Judith O'Neale, and Elouise Mullen, along with Olga and Walter Clifton from Abita Springs. After checking to see that we were all on the same channel, at least where our radios were concerned, our caravan set

out. As we wound our way through the streets of Rayne, signs and murals informed us that we were in the Frog Capital of the World! A quick poll of our group determined that no one present really knew why Rayne had been designated the Frog Capital of the World so, unfortunately, we had to continue on that day unenlightened. We (and you) will not remain in that state, however, because, upon returning home, I researched the matter. I have learned that the association of Rayne and frogs goes way back. In the 1880's, a chef by the name of Donat Pucheu exported frogs from Rayne to New Orleans restaurants. The fame of Rayne's frogs grew and Rayne frog legs found their way onto the menus of such world-renowned restaurants as Sardi's in New York. Today Rayne keeps its frogs at home but displays them once a year at the annual Frog Festival. We were disappointed not to see any of these frogs while in Rayne, but, after all, we are the Bird Study Group, not the Frog Study Group.

Putting our disappointment aside, we returned to the main focus of this trip, birds. Dave had scouted the rice fields south of Rayne prior to our visit and had some good prospects for us. The wind was blowing mightily but, despite having to hold on to our vehicles to keep from being blown away while scoping the fields, we saw beaucoup des shorebirds and waders. A word of warning here – It is imperative in this area of Louisiana that one throw in a French phrase now and then so that the words "I'm from North Louisiana" emblazoned on one's forehead will not be quite so visible to the locals.

At our first stop, a single Glossy Ibis was hanging out with a flock of White-faced Ibis and a nice-sized contingent of shorebirds while in the field across the road Fulvous Whistling Ducks were feeding. A reconnoitering Peregrine Falcon caused a commotion among the shorebirds. The list of sandpipers seen here and at various other locations along the back roads and byways of Vermilion Parish included Stilt Sandpipers in full breeding plumage, White-rumped, Semipalmated, Solitary, and Pectoral Sandpipers, and Greater and Lesser Yellowlegs. In a dry, plowed field with encroaching water, which Dave said was perfect habitat for Buff-breasted Sandpipers, we found (vou guessed it!) Buff-breasted Sandpipers, a life bird for at least two of us. Black-bellied Plovers, resplendent in their breeding plumage finery, were abundant. Other shorebirds present were Whimbrel, Short-billed Dowitcher, Ruddy Turnstone, Dunlin, Black-necked Stilt, and Killdeer. Two Swainson's Hawks identified by Paul Conover were lagniappe.

We ate lunch at Suire's Grocery and Restaurant on LA Highway 35 between Kaplan and Forked Island. If you're in the neighborhood, be sure to stop in here for

triple-decker BLTs, crawfish pistolettes, and more. At Suire's several of us perused the map with Dave in the hope of learning where in the heck we'd been so that we might be able to visit the area again in the future without having to call on Dave for assistance in getting us unlost. After lunch we traveled even further south to Pine Island Road, which skirts the Intracoastal Canal west of Forked Island and passes through large expanses of very old bottomland hardwoods, a habitat that is increasingly rare. In this beautiful forest we found an impressive number of both breeding bird species and individual birds. The list included Northern Parula, Prothonotary Warbler, Hooded Warbler, Acadian Flycatcher, Painted Bunting, Barred Owl, Red-shouldered Hawk, and Broad-winged Hawk. Possible breeders observed included an American Redstart and a Black-and-white Warbler. Several of us had our first introduction here to the nest-finding legerdemain of Walter Clifton when he spotted the nest of an Acadian Flycatcher. Even after Walter told us not only where to look but also the secret to finding an Acadian Flycatcher's nest, it took some of us forever to spot it through our binoculars and, if we lowered our binoculars to look, we were hopelessly befuddled. By the way, the secret is that just as the settlers of what we know today as the Acadiana region of Louisiana used Spanish moss in the construction of their homes, the Acadian Flycatcher constructs its nest on a base of Spanish moss with a foot-or-so-long strand of moss hanging down from it.

Saturday birding ended with a quick stop at Lake Martin on our way to Breaux Bridge where we would spend the night. ME Lewis and Betsy Moreland joined us in time for dinner. Following the lead of some of our feathered acquaintances earlier in the day, we dined on crawfish at Mulate's. A Cajun band was playing but, unfortunately or fortunately depending on your point of view, we'd left our dancing shoes at home so had to content ourselves with just watching.

#### **Day 2:**

On Sunday, May 18, at Judith O'Neale's invitation, we joined LABA and the Baton Rouge Audubon Society (BRAS) for their annual joint field trip and picnic at Sherburne WMA and the adjacent Atchafalaya National Wildlife Refuge in the Atchafalaya River Basin. The basin is the largest bottomland swamp in the United States and is legendary for the density of its breeding birds. The refuge and the WMA, located in St. Martin and Iberville Parishes with the northern part of the WMA in Pointe Coupee Parish, are both managed by the Louisiana Department of Wildlife and Fisheries. The refuge has been identified as a Globally Important Bird Area by the American Bird Conservancy. The magnificent Swallow-tailed Kite nests here and was our

target species for the day. It would be a life bird for many of us. Linda Adrion met up with us here and Lynne Fitzgerald and Ann McLaurin wandered in for part of the day.

Our birding started at the Krotz Springs end of LA Highway 975, the famous Whiskey Bay Road, with Cliff Swallows under the US Highway 190 bridge. A short distance down the road by the railroad tracks, we found among others Chestnut-sided Warbler, Summer Tanager, Red-eyed Vireo, White-eyed Vireo, Prothonotary Warbler, Yellow-billed Cuckoo, Carolina Chickadee, and Tufted Titmouse. The heron and egret family was well represented, including both Black-crowned and Yellow-crowned Night-Herons.

A little further on, we parked and walked down a forested oilfield road with birds singing on both sides of us. Then everyone moved their vehicles up this road to the turn off which leads to the nature trail. Prothonotary Warblers were everywhere flying back and forth over the road and through the trees. These bright little yellow birds are affectionately called Swamp Canaries in south Louisiana. Through the gaps in the canopy, we could see Red-shouldered and Broadwinged Hawks circling overhead. Walter Clifton continued to amaze with his uncanny nest-finding ability. Another Acadian Flycatcher nest built on a limb overhanging the road may not have been particularly difficult to find even though almost everyone had walked under the nest and not seen it, but the White-eyed Vireo nest complete with nestlings he found about 15 or 20 feet off the nature trail couldn't even be seen from the trail. A few lucky folks saw a Swainson's Warbler while walking along the trail and Hooded Warblers were heard and seen here and there.

We had a grand picnic at the WMA headquarters camping area overlooking the Big Alabama Bayou but the day was wearing on and nary a Swallow-tailed Kite had we seen. Some friends from Shreveport had come down with Linda, Lynne, and Ann and were in another area of Sherburne. While we were picnicking, Linda heard from them by phone that they had come across a researcher who had led them to an area off the Alabama road where Swallow-tailed Kites were probably nesting. Needless to say, we loaded up our vehicles and headed for the Alabama Road. We arrived just in time to hear, "You just missed them. A couple of minutes ago, there were nine kites circling overhead." Grrrrrr! But, before we had the opportunity to get too upset, first one, then another, and finally, five Swallow-tailed Kites appeared in the sky above us. We watched the glorious aerial display until the birds were out of sight.

Back on Whiskey Bay Road, we continued south toward the Whiskey Bay end. About one-third of a mile

from I-10, on the east side of the road, is a waterhole where Paul Conover does bird banding. The waterhole was very productive as birds came down for a drink or to bathe. American Redstart, Common Yellowthroat, Yellow-breasted Chat, Painted and Indigo Buntings were some of the birds seen in this area. Mississippi Kites flew overhead. One area we did not have time to explore is the Happytown Road, which leads into the Atchafalaya NWR. The eastern end of this road has been closed off and there is an observation platform there.

If you go to Sherburne, be prepared. There are no public restroom facilities anywhere along Whiskey Bay Road, not even at the WMA headquarters, so you'll want to stop in Krotz Springs if you're coming from Highway 190 or somewhere along I-10 if you're starting at the southern end. Bring insect repellent. The mosquitoes were not bad at all on the day we visited but can be. There are chiggers in grassy areas such as where we saw the **Swallow-tailed Kites**, so take proper precautions. You can obtain maps at the WMA headquarters or at the self-clearing stations and remember that you must have a current Wild Louisiana stamp or fishing or hunting license to visit a WMA in Louisiana.

Our birding day was not over yet. Dave Patton was in touch with a friend, Jim Delahoussaye, who lives with his wife at Butte La Rose on the banks of the Atchafalaya River. Jim invited us all to come on over. Upon our arrival, Jim kindly offered us bathroom facilities and cold drinks so we all traipsed through the house. The necessities taken care of, we now were able to appreciate Jim's wonderful yard. There are birdhouses built by Jim all over the yard. We were able to look inside one of them in which Prothonotary Warblers were nesting and see their tiny eggs. Yellow-billed Cuckoos nest in the trees there and Ruby-throated **Hummingbirds** buzzed around us. In the backvard we followed steps leading to a dock on the river. A Spotted Sandpiper teetered on a log nearby. Before we left, Jim presented Jerry Bertrand as fund-raising chairman of the BSG with a birdhouse, which he had built. Jim says it's a 301-year-old birdhouse. He built the birdhouse a year ago and the cypress boards from which it was fashioned came from a barn that was over 100 years old. The cypress tree from which the wood came was at least 200 vears old when it was cut down to build the barn. This very special birdhouse, which is just perfect for Swamp Canaries, will be auctioned off at the BSG Christmas auction. Jim has offered his home and yard to LABA and BRAS for next year's picnic.

Our appreciation goes out to Dave Patton, Judith O'Neale, Jim Delahoussaye, and all the other folks whose hospitality and generosity made our trip south such a success. Although it was difficult for some of us, we did our best to comport ourselves in the manner expected of us as representatives of the BSG so that we might be asked back in the future. We invited everyone to come to Shreveport. We also warned them that we'd had such a good time, we might come back every year for their annual field trip and picnic.

For those of you sending in bird records from your computer databases (and those ready to begin doing so) please note the following changes and suggestions: Use **Wilson's Snipe** (WISN) not Common Snipe; do not use spaces in the abbreviation field (LMH&LRR, not LMH & LRR); and use 2003 for the year not 1903. #### **Bird Name Changes**

The 44<sup>th</sup> Supplement to the AOU checklist (Auk 120:923-931) lists the following changes that affect the species of birds in our area.

**Eastern Screech-Owl** is changed from *Otus asio* to *Megascops asio*.

**Snowy Owl** is changed from *Nyctea scandiaca* to *Bubo scandiacus*.

**Ovenbird** is changed from *Seiurus aurocapillus to Seiurus aurocapilla* (spelling only).

Rock Dove is changed to Rock Pigeon.

Move all of the species of Anseriformes and Galliformes to the beginning of our checklist (in front of the loons).

Studies of the following species have shown that they should be transferred to another, but still indefinite, position or family (they are marked with an asterisk [\*] in AOU lists): Yellow-breasted Chat, Summer Tanager, Scarlet Tanager, Western Tanager, Lapland Longspur, Smith's Longspur, and Chestnut-collared Longspur.

Use the bird report to see what other birders have been seeing and where to go find the bird you want to see. Observers are abbreviated by the first and last initials. Dates and localities of observations are summarized under the observer's initials. Sightings are arranged by species. Following each species is a line of data in the following format: date, initials of the observer, number of birds observed, initials of another observer, number of birds they observed, etc. For the number of birds observed, a 1 is used for both 1 bird and for numbers not reported by the observer. For example: 01/12/99 BB 2 means that on January 12, 1999, BB saw two birds. Then by looking on the observer list you can determine that BB is Bob Birder and on 1/12/99 he was birding C. Bickham Dickson Park.



### RED RIVER NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE AT WESTDALE, LA

Meet at the LSUS Museum of Life Sciences. This 1,500 acre property, purchased by The Nature Conservancy in December of 2002, was recently transferred to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service as the first tract in the Bayou Pierre Unit of the Red River National Wildlife Refuge. It is located about 30 minutes south of LSUS in Red River Parish and is bordered by the Red River to the east and LA Highway 1 to the west. About 400 acres have been farmed for rice and, in previous years, Sora, Yellow Rail, and Virginia Rail have all been observed here. There are a couple of ponds connected to the river that usually hold waterfowl. In addition, there are a number of good walking trails that wind through a 250-acre riverfront forest stand (cottonwoods, cypress, etc.). Plan on car birding and moderate walking.

What to bring: binoculars, scope, water, and snacks. The nearest restroom is located at Lock & Dam #5.

#### DAPHNE PRAIRIE, MT. VERNON, TX

Located only three hours from Shreveport near Mt. Vernon in northeast Texas, Daphne Prairie is a unique ecological experience. This nearly 1,000-acre unplowed remnant of Texas' Tallgrass Prairie is not bisected by roads or even utility poles and is a winter home to **Smith's Longspurs** and other grassland species, including **Short-eared Owls** and **Sprague's Pipit**. The pimple mounds (small hummocks usually one to two

feet tall) here are some of the tallest left in the state and give the visitor the feeling of traveling back in time to an earlier era. This land has been in the same family since the 1830s and has changed very little since that time and you will be among the very first birders to witness it. This area is not open to the public and native prairie remnants are so rare in Texas that most Texans, not to mention Louisianans, have never seen one. Our trip will be led by Matt White, author of *Birds of Northeast Texas* and longspur expert. Those of you who have read Pete Dunne's article, "Birder at Large: Seeking Smith's," in the August 2003 issue of *Birder's World* will be familiar with Matt. The article is the story of Pete and Linda Dunne's visit to Matt in their successful quest to see this most of elusive of longspurs in its winter home.

In order to get an early start on Sunday, we will spend Saturday night in Mt. Vernon. However, anyone who does not wish to stay overnight should plan to meet us in Mt. Vernon that Sunday morning. We will carpool from Mt. Vernon to Daphne Prairie, where we will spend a half day walking through portions of the prairie in search of longspurs and other birds. Although not necessary, you may want to bring along your spotting scope for even closer looks. Participants will want to prepare for the possibility of cold weather and some type of waterproof footwear may also be helpful. There are no restroom facilities on site, so it will be necessary to return to Mt. Vernon for lunch and restroom breaks.

There are other fine birding sites in the Mt. Vernon area, including Lake Cypress Springs and Mt. Vernon's DuPree Park, which we may visit on Saturday or Sunday afternoon.

The cost of this trip is \$50 per person (not including lodging or meals) which will go toward helping the landowner to preserve this prairie. Matt says this area is one of the most remote and beautiful areas he has ever seen. The Texas Ornithological Society (TOS) has a field trip scheduled for the Daphne Prairie the next weekend after the BSG trip and is charging \$100 for TOS members and \$115 for nonmembers, with part of the proceeds going to TOS.



Following in the footsteps of Freeman and Custis, an expedition of twenty intrepid birders set out in four small boats on Sunday, August 24, 2003, to explore the Red River. Two scouting parties had been out on the river prior to the date set for the expedition. Upon their return they told stories of a large wading bird with a long bicolor bill of pinkish orange and black<sup>1</sup>, ducks with blue bills<sup>2</sup>, and small birds standing camouflaged and motionless in the reeds, their long necks stretched toward the sky<sup>3</sup>. Enticed by these stories and undeterred by the scouts' tales of blazing heat, wild animals, and treacherous shoals and mudflats that would eat a boat alive, the hardy voyagers embarked from Bishop Point above Lock and Dam #5.

For better or worse, the expedition found the river much changed since the days of Freeman and Custis. Then (1806), the river level fluctuated with the seasons. The river overflowed its banks and cut new channels, creating new oxbow lakes as it did so. Sandbars formed and reformed and, during periods of high water, the river scoured the bars clean of vegetation. Navigation on the Red was hazardous and the river was virtually impassible north of Natchitoches because of the Great

Raft, an immense logiam or series of "rafts" extending beyond present-day Shreveport and estimated at one time to be over 150 miles long. In 1806 Freeman and Custis encountered the Great Raft below Twelve Mile Bayou. With great difficulty, they cleared passages through three separate rafts varying in length from 40 to 300 yards long and spanning the entire width of the river. As logs were removed, the spaces left were soon filled by other logs. Freeman wrote, "The labor incident to the formation of a passage through these small rafts is so great that the navigation of this part of the river is never attempted; for it would require to be repeated every time a passage is attempted." The river's overflow as it backed up behind the Great Raft formed swamps, lakes, and bayous "communicating with and running into each other, for perhaps 6 or 8 miles on each side of the river." Today, the Great Raft is no more. Captain Henry Miller Shreve began clearing the river in the 1830s using "snagboats," a type of boat invented by Captain Shreve for this purpose. Others would continue the work until the Great Raft was finally dismantled under the direction of Lt. E. A. Woodruff of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers in the early 1870s.

In recent years, since the creation of the lock and dam system, whose northern terminus is Lock and Dam #5 in south Caddo Parish, dikes and revetments have been constructed to keep the river in its channel and the channel itself is marked with red and green buoys. Seasoned river pilot Jerry Bertrand explained the difference between dikes and revetments and the meaning of the navigational buoys. Dikes run perpendicular to the current or channel and revetments run parallel. To stay within the channel, all one has to do is remember the phrase "red right return." Keep the red buoys on the right when returning from the sea, i.e., heading upriver, and the green buoys on the left. Accordingly, the green buoys should be on the right and the red buoys on the left when heading downriver.

But the safety of the channel was not for this group and so helmsmen Barney Poole, Larry Raymond, Paul Dickson, and Charlie Lyon carefully navigated between the dikes around sandbars now overgrown with vegetation. Hazards in the form of snags, the remains of trees inundated when the lock and dam was constructed, lurk just below the surface. Behind the sandbars and revetments, the depth of the river may vary considerably from several inches to many feet. As must have happened many times during the Freeman and Custis expedition, the Poole boat, with a deeper draft than the other three boats, had to be hauled through the mud occasionally by Barney and son Jason, the youngest member of the BSG expedition. Narrowly missing succumbing to the same fate, Larry Raymond was able

to extricate his boat from the mud without getting his feet wet

The second northwestern Louisiana record Marbled Godwit seen by scout Paul Dickson one week before the main expedition was long gone. The two male Ruddy **Ducks** in high breeding plumage observed the day before by Charlie Lyon, Kreg Ellzey, Jerry Bertrand, and I were nowhere to be found either. However, this very early record combined with the Charles Mills' discovery this year of Ruddy Ducks nesting in Miller County, Arkansas, about 17 miles east of Texarkana, was very intriguing. Our observation, also on Saturday, of an adult and an immature Least Bittern provided evidence of successful nesting by this species on this area of the Red River. There is apparently only one other record of Least Bitterns nesting here. On Sunday, an adult Least **Bittern** was discovered in the same location as the two the day before.

Herons and egrets were in abundance, including Tricolored Herons, which have only recently begun nesting here, possibly due to habitat loss further south. Shorebirds included the now common Black-necked Stilt. American Avocet. Black-bellied Plover. Killdeer, Greater and Lesser Yellowlegs, Spotted, Semipalmated, Least, Baird's and Stilt Sandpipers, and both Short and Long-billed Dowitchers. Dickson and his crew members, Susan and Ron Martin, along with Jason Poole, bravely waded through the murky waters to get closer looks at the birds. Paul was rewarded for his efforts when he found two Soras hiding in the tall grass on a sandbar. In Paul's absence. Rosemary Seidler, probably aware that it was customary in olden times for the ship's captain to provide his sailors with a ration of rum or some such beverage, found that Paul had apparently not heard of this practice. She called over to Charlie's boat to see if he had perhaps stocked some beer, but to no avail. It seems that this custom has died out, at least among the modern BSG captains.

In the meantime, two **Wood Storks** glided by to roost in a dead tree. After an intense effort by Jean Trahan to describe over the radio which dead tree the storks were in, all the directionally challenged birders in the other boats were finally able to locate them. As the sun set,

our little flotilla headed in with the hope that this expedition would be found worthy to join those listed in the annals of Red River exploration.

In addition to those already mentioned, BSG expedition members included Lily Poole, Shirley and Ed Huss, Linda Adrion, Judy Williams, ME Lewis, Ellen Tippet, Jeff Trahan, and Rosana Shelby.

### Hervey Farms Hawk Watch, September 20, 2003 by Hubert Hervey

Apparently the promise of hawks and food is an unbeatable combination. More than thirty participants enjoyed the burgers, ably fixed by Jerry Bertrand, and food prepared by many others. The hawks also participated in the hawk count with nine species and about 150 raptors counted. The most numerous bird species in the sky was the omnipresent Chimney Swifts, which were seldom out of sight. The Broad-winged **Hawk** was the most common hawk with 59 individuals. Other hawks were 1 Osprey, 1 Mississippi Kite, 2 Sharp-shinned Hawks, 3 Cooper's Hawks, 6 Redshouldered Hawks, and 1 Red-tailed Hawk. Vultures were present most of the time with a count of migrants being determined at 59 Black Vultures and 31 Turkey Vultures.

Everyone will want to know about the big dark bird that flew across the western sky with slow wing beats alternated by short glides. I have read "Hawks in Flight," by Dunne, Sibley, and Sutton this morning and the section "Telling Big Black Birds Apart" on page 154-156 only serves to reinforce my notion that we saw a Golden Eagle. The bird was less than a mile away. and flew through two groups of Black and Turkey Vultures and was definitely the largest bird in the air. I believe I can rule out **Bald Eagle** by the long wings and smaller head, Red-tailed Hawk by size and method of flight (never soaring). But I'm not sure I can rule out dark phase Ferruginous Hawk, or Rough-legged Hawk, since I have only limited experience with all three species in question. I am pretty sure of Golden Eagle, with the two last mentioned species as slightly possible. I will be glad to hear from anyone who cares to reinforce or shoot down this idea. P. S. I'm not officially reporting it.

The early morning bird walk brought several pleasant surprises with species such as **Snowy Egret**, **Green Heron**, **Eastern Phoebe**, **Bell's Vireo**, **House Wren**, **Blue-gray Gnatcatcher**, **Prairie Warbler**, **Summer**  Tanager, and Painted Bunting. When there were no birds to be seen, we enjoyed the butterflies, even the diminutive southern skipperling, a very small brownish-orange skipper. It has been drizzling rain all day today (the day after the field trip) and it would have been a terrible day to have a hawk count scheduled. Weren't we fortunate?

### Boy Scouts Earn Bird Study Merit Badge with the Help of the BSG

Tuesday, June 24th, 2003. The Garland Boy Scout Ranch Bird Study Merit Badge class and field trip went well. There were six young men in the class. We started at 9:00 a.m., 81°F.

I spent 30 minutes showing the boys how to use their binocs. Then I had them look at some 30 bird photos and listen to calls of birds that they might see or hear on our hike. I had made my recording selections from birds Mac and I had seen and heard on our first survey of Garland Ranch. Mac informed that the trail we had scouted earlier in the month, the one he had taken his Scouts on, had too much human activity for birdwatching. So, instead, we hiked the main road from the Lodge to Cub Lake. A Mourning Dove and Turkey Vultures were the first birds spotted. While we were looking at the vultures we heard several American Crows calling in the distance. This was perfect as part of the badge requirements include identifying five birds by call. We continued on our two mile round-trip hike towards the lake. I was pleased to note that the boys were not too noisy. Consequently, we first came upon a cottontail rabbit and later a doe crossed the road. After the doe had determined that we were no threat, she signaled and her fawn then came skipping across the road

So far so good! During our stops to see the rabbit and deer, we saw and/or heard **White-eyed Vireo** (step to the rear – hick), **Tufted Titmouse** (peter, peter, peter) and **Red-bellied Woodpecker.** 

I heard a **Yellow-breasted Chat** in a nearby bush. When we could not get a good look at it, I explained to the boys that I would try and spish the bird out in the open. Prior to starting, I explained why spishing might or might not work. Then I crossed my fingers. The bird seemed agitated that we were there. When I spished, it agitated him even more so that he came out and gave us at first some peeks through the leaves and then a nice look at him before he flew back in to the bushes. This was one of the birds I had the boys listen to prior to the hike. As we walked down the road, I continued my

running bird ecology commentary. I mentioned groups such as The Nature Conservancy, Ducks Unlimited, and Quail Unlimited as programs that strive to improve habitat so as to improve bird populations. I mentioned that birds are our miner's canary – if the canary died the miners knew that poisonous gases were at a dangerous level. We had seen a similar situation in the 70's when birds of prey numbers plummeted due to the use of pesticides. Now, through successful conservation, we have **Bald Eagles** breeding at Cypress Black Bayou.

At Cub Lake all we saw was a Turkey Vulture which seemed to have been feeding on something. No, let's not see what it's feeding on. On the way back to camp we heard a Barred Owl (Who cooks for you?). On a prior Akala camp weekend with my son's Cub Scout pack, I had heard quite a few owls calling so I made a point to include owl calls on my tape. It was "very cool" to have heard the Barred Owl calling in the daylight. Other birds we heard were Carolina Wren, and Carolina Chickadee. Birds we saw and heard were Northern Cardinal, Eastern Bluebird, Indigo Bunting, and Red-eyed Vireo. Only a half mile to go and we'll be out of this 91° heat! A Black Vulture came into view and then a really interesting sight two Redtailed Hawks "playing" with each other in the sky. The two put on quite an aerial display. Wow, what a way to end our hike!

I enjoyed my time at Garland Ranch. It is a wonderful facility with a great staff. I was glad for the opportunity to teach the Boy Scout Bird Study Merit Badge. The young men I taught were interested in learning, yet, "boys at heart," a couple of them tried to frighten me with a possible snake sighting. Too bad for them I grew up in Texas where, snakes are a dime a dozen'. The boys found the taped owl calls to be interesting, since there are many owl species on the Ranch. Interestingly enough the Scouts thought the spishing was a cool technique. I hope to get the opportunity to teach the Boy Scout Bird Study Merit Badge or the equivalent Girl Scout Badge again.

#### Least Terns Shouldn't Be Last

The Shreveport Times ran an editorial on September 2, 2003, titled, "Least Terns shouldn't be last in river plan." I think we can consider it a call to action. The Bird Study Group has already started to encourage our members and other concerned citizens to write their congressmen expressing our concern that Least Terns attempting to nest on the Red River are continuing to be ignored by the people who are responsible for improving their nesting success. We now have posters ready to put up in businesses that are willing to show their concern. Thanks to Lily Poole and Nancy Menasco for their efforts to make more people aware of this issue. We have a website with information and a suggestion for a letter to your congressmen and women, to be used as a guide, and containing information a letter writer might use. Other clubs are helping with their own letter writing campaigns.

The editorial listed four ways to mitigate the damage to the islands that terns need for nesting:

- 1) Maintaining vegetation-free areas where needed,
- 2) Keeping current flowing around both sides of mid-stream islands,
- 3) Opening the shoreward side of dikes so water current will prevent islands from attaching to shore
- 4) Using dredged spoil dirt to form islands at favorite nesting locations.

Citizens need to be assured that further river navigation will not be at the expense of a diminishing natural resource such as the **Least Tern**. The U. S. Army Corps of Engineers can and should act now to restore these birds to their former range and to prevent the destruction of future generations. In so doing they will reassure the caring public of the value of further dams upriver from Shreveport. Another effort that might prove worthwhile is to write to the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service as they have the duty of oversight authority of the Endangered Species Act. The facts are that no **Least Terns** were fledged in 2003 in the nearly 100 miles of Pool 5 and Pool 4 between Cash Point (MM 241) and Poisson Revetment (MM 144), for the

most recent three-year period, this area had the most successful tern colonies in our area, **Least Tern** numbers are beginning to show a downturn that can only continue if successful nesting is not restored. There are other measures than those listed above that could be taken if the order is given, but those would at least show us that someone is willing to try.

#### MINUTES OF THE BOARD MEETING

September 2, 2003, 7:00 p.m. Museum of Life Sciences at LSUS

Board members present at the meeting were Mac Hardy, Jeff Trahan, Nancy Menasco, Lily Poole, Linda Adrion, Larry Raymond, Michele Andrews, Jerry Bertrand, Amanda Crnkovic, and Hubert Hervey.

**Treasurer's Report** – The treasurer, Jean Trahan, was not present at this meeting. However, she sent a report that was distributed to each board member that showed a summary of income and expenses for the last three years. Lily Poole reported that the treasurer would like to have a budget for the club. A motion was passed to authorize the treasurer to develop a budget to present at the next board meeting.

Miscellaneous – Mac Hardy reported that we already have enough volunteers for Wildlife and Fisheries Day at Bodcau that will take place on September 27, 2003. He also reported that he and Lily Poole conducted a birding merit badge course at Garland Scout Ranch. Lily will write an article about their experiences for the newsletter. Mac Hardy reminded everyone to send in bird records to the database. Larry Raymond said that he has not received any new articles for the Hot Spots publication. ### BIRD REPORT - compiled September 22, 2003

Use the bird report to see what other birders have been seeing and where to go find the bird you want to see. Observers are abbreviated by the first and last initials. Dates and localities of observations are summarized under the observer's initials. Sightings are arranged by species. Following each species is a line of data in the following format: date, initials of the observer, number of birds observed, initials of another observer, number of birds they observed, etc. For the number of birds observed, a 1 is used for both 1 bird and for numbers not reported by the observer. For example: 01/12/99 BB 2 means that on January 12, 1999, BB saw two birds. Then by looking on the observer list, located after the sightings, you can determine that BB is Bob Birder and on 1/12/99 he was birding C. Bickham Dickson Park.

Report bird records for the newsletter to Mac Hardy by the 15<sup>th</sup> of each month. All bird records reported here are observations of the observers and are therefore the responsibility of the observer.

#### DAPHNE PRAIRIE, MT. VERNON, TX

Located only three hours from Shreveport near Mt. Vernon in northeastern Texas, Daphne Prairie is a unique ecological experience. This nearly 1,000-acre unplowed remnant of Texas' Tallgrass Prairie is not bisected by roads or even utility poles and is a winter home to Smith's Longspurs and other grassland species, including Short-eared Owls and Sprague's Pipit. The pimple mounds (small hummocks usually one to two feet tall) here are some of the tallest left in the state and give the visitor the feeling of traveling back in time to an earlier era. This land has been in the same family since the 1830s and has changed very little since that time and you will be among the very first birders to witness it. This area is not open to the public and native prairie remnants are so rare in Texas that most Texans, not to mention Louisianans, have never seen one. Our trip will be led by Matt White, author of Birds of Northeast Texas and longspur expert. Those of you who have read Pete Dunne's article, "Birder at Large: Seeking Smith's," in the August 2003 issue of Birder's World will be familiar with Matt. The article is the story of Pete and Linda Dunne's visit to Matt in their successful quest to see this most of elusive of longspurs in its winter home.

In order to get an early start on Sunday, we will spend Saturday night in Mt. Vernon; however, anyone who does not wish to stay overnight, should plan to meet us in Mt. Vernon. We will carpool from Mt. Vernon to Daphne Prairie, where we will spend a half-day walking through portions of the prairie in search of longspurs and other birds. Although not necessary, you may want to bring along your spotting scope for even closer looks. Participants will want to prepare for the possibility of cold weather and some type of waterproof footwear may also be helpful. There are no restroom facilities on site, so it will be necessary to return to Mt. Vernon for lunch and restroom breaks.

There are other fine birding sites in the Mt. Vernon area, including Lake Cypress Springs and Mt. Vernon's DuPree Park, which we may visit on Saturday or Sunday afternoon.

The cost of this trip is \$50 per person, not including lodging or meals, which will go toward helping the landowner to preserve this prairie. There is no cost for children under 12. Matt says this area is one of the most remote and beautiful areas he has ever seen. The Texas Ornithological Society (TOS) has a field trip scheduled for the Daphne Prairie the next weekend after the BSG trip and is charging \$100 for TOS members and \$115 for nonmembers, with part of the proceeds going to TOS.

### **Red River National Wildlife Refuge Field Trip** by Dan Weber

On Saturday, October 4, a group of us visited the newly established Bayou Pierre Unit of the Red River National Wildlife Refuge near Westdale. This tract contains approximately 1,500 acres and is located between LA Highway 1 and the Red River. The property had been in rice and soybean production prior to purchase by The Nature Conservancy and was transferred to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service this past August. A second 650-acre tract is located nearby but was not visited on this trip.

Our hopes were high after a number of rails (Black, Yellow, Virginia, and Sora) were observed in the rice fields the previous weekend by Charlie Lyon while riding on a combine during harvest. By the time we arrived, the machinery had gone and we were left to flush the birds ourselves. This proved fairly difficult on foot as the rice fields were deeply rutted with knee-high rice stalks. However, we did succeed in flushing a single Virginia Rail that quickly evaded us in the rice stalks. A several Wilson's Snipe were also seen circling the field and at close range on the ground. Wrens are making good use of the vegetation on the small levees between rice fields. We observed both Sedge and Marsh Wrens feeding together in these areas.

We then went to explore the approximately 400 acres of forest along the river. The forests were fairly quiet but the lakes and sloughs attached to river provided some interesting birds. These included a pair of **Black**-

**crowned Night-Herons**, **Anhinga**, **Belted Kingfisher**, and **Double-crested Cormorant**. We also got a nice look at one of two alligators seen sunning that day. The second was floating in the Red River!

It was a beautiful early fall day but a difficult one from a birding standpoint. Overall, 33 species were recorded, but we were almost shut out by the rails. I feel confident that this tract will become a premier site for shorebird and waterfowl viewing in our area once the USFWS begins managing the water on the rice fields.

### They Said It Couldn't Be Done! The 2003 Big Sit!

They said it couldn't be done! There was no-o-o-o way the Bird Study Group Big Sitters could surpass last year's amazing Big Sit total of 68 species of birds. But when the fat lady sang, the response was a resounding, "Yes, Way!" On Sunday, October 12, 2003, a record number of twenty Sitters logged an incredible 70 bird species, 10 butterfly species, and three hot air balloons. Seven Sitters experienced their first C. Bickham Dickson Park (CBD) Big Sit and 12 new species were added to the list of birds seen and/or heard from the circle in the last three years.

But let's go back now to how the third annual C. Bickham Dickson Park Big Sit began. When we went to bed on Saturday night, the weather prognosticators were predicting a front would be moving in on the morrow, powered by winds from the north of 15 to 20 miles per hour. At one time, we might have been discouraged by this news as the traditional thinking is that windy weather is not good for birding. But we had learned our lesson in 2002 when strong, arctic winds brought such goodies as **Peregrine Falcon**, **Broad-winged Hawk**, and **Greater White-fronted Goose**. During the night, however, the front stalled somewhere to the north of us and by late morning on Sunday, only scattered wisps of clouds floated across the blue sky. A light breeze would blow on and off all day.

Jerry Bertrand and I clocked in at 6:30 a.m. to listen for owls and stake out the official Big Sit tarpaulin, which serves to define our 17-foot diameter circle. **Great Horned Owl,** the last species recorded in 2001 and the first species of 2002, would repeat as our first species of 2003 as we heard not one but three owls hooting to each other in the darkness. By the time Charlie Lyon and Marti Carroll, participating in her first Big Sit, arrived a little later, we had added several other species to the list, including **Common Nighthawk**, which had been the 68<sup>th</sup> and final species of 2002. In the

first hour we would rack up 29 species, one of which, **Black-crowned Night-Heron**, is a rare visitor to the park.

As the morning wore on, Sitters continued to arrive. Shirley Huss brought Pat Lonnecker with her. It was Pat's first Big Sit at CBD. Ron Martin, also a neophyte Sitter, spent most of the day with us until wife Susan arrived to drag him away. ME Lewis once again made the journey from Lake Claiborne. Mac Hardy wandered in and out during the day and Amanda Crnkovic showed up for the late afternoon and evening shift. Charlie Lyon searched the woods for forest birds with assistance from Mark Wilson. Their challenge was to get someone back in the circle to see or hear the birds once they found them. At least one person in the circle would hear the White-eved Vireo they found and most of us were able to locate Yellow-bellied Sapsucker, Ruby-crowned Kinglet, Black-throated Green Warbler, and Scarlet and Summer Tanager, but the Baltimore Oriole and the immature male American Redstart they rustled up went uncounted.

Eastern Phoebe, Eastern Wood-Pewee, and Gray Catbird perched within yards of the circle as small flocks of ducks flew over us. Most were Wood Ducks, a species which breeds in the Park, but also seen were Blue-winged Teal, Mallard, and Northern Shoveler, a species making its debut to the list. Practicing their now-you-seem-'em, now-you-don't Venetian blind effect, American White Pelicans soared and wheeled overhead.

Frequently during the day, Sitters found themselves in a now familiar quandary (appropriately defined in *The Random House Dictionary* as "a state of perplexity and uncertainty") as spotters, attempting to convey a bird's location to potential viewers, fell back on the standard C. Bickham Dickson Park descriptions of "in the willow" or "at the top of the dead tree" with an occasional variation for raptors in the distance of "above the tallow tree." Anyone who's ever visited our Big Sit location at CBD knows how much help that is. Linda Adrion suggested as a partial solution to this perennial problem that, prior to next year's Sit, someone paint numbers on all the dead trees, high enough up so everyone could see them. Surprisingly, there were no volunteers.

The Trahan clan had turned out in force for the Sit. Jeff's arrival just after sunup was followed much later by Jean. In the afternoon, daughters Karen (Schneider) and Kathryn and two-and-a-half year old grandson, T.J., came by for a while. This was T.J.'s second Big Sit as he had attended the inaugural CBD Sit in 2001 when he was just a baby. He looked through the scope but was more fascinated with the butterflies flitting around us. A hackberry emperor landed on several people in the circle

and T.J. very much wanted that butterfly to land on him. But he was just too sweet as compared to the sweaty adults around him to appeal to the butterfly.

No one goes hungry at the Big Sit as someone always brings extra food. This year though a minor crisis arose regarding the water situation. Jean Trahan had left for home, ostensibly to bring back a supply of ice water for her and Jeff. Time passed and Jean did not reappear, with or without water. Learning of the situation, Linda Adrion graciously offered to share her water with Jeff. Jean never did turn up (apparently, she came up with some lame excuse for her absence), but Jeff's family did not completely desert him as daughter Kathryn did return later on with a peanut butter sandwich for Dad.

In mid-afternoon, Mark Wilson and Jerry decided to take a break to go for coke floats. During their absence, the intervals when clouds would mercifully cover the sun became nonexistent. Unlike Jean, Mark and Jerry did return, only to find those they had left behind jampacked together in the shade of a purple patio umbrella. Fully cognizant that possession is nine-tenths of the law, none of us was willing to yield our position to any returnees or new arrivals until it clouded over again later on

The chronology of total species sightings throughout the day was similar to last year. We doubled our 7:30 a.m. count of 29 shortly after 11:00 a.m. and, by 12:30 p.m., the total number of species had reached 66. It would take the rest of the afternoon to bring the total to 70. I spotted an Anhinga soaring high above us. Jeff Trahan was the first to catch sight of an adult Bald Eagle flying past. The eagle obligingly decided to take a few turns around the park before heading off to the northwest. ME Lewis heard geese calling and the flock of 125 was finally located almost directly above us at about stratosphere level. A field guide consultation was required to identify their calls as that of Greater Whitefronted Geese (also known as "specklebellies"). Kreg Ellzey, up from Hornbeck in Sabine Parish, arrived in time to identify Tricolored Heron in the flocks of herons and egrets returning to their nightly roost at Champion/Mayer's Lake to the north of CBD. At least 16 individual birds were counted as **Tricolored heron**, returning to the list after a one-year absence, became our 70<sup>th</sup> and final species for the day.

Our august BSG President, Lily Poole, had to work most of the day but she kept informed of circle happenings throughout the day via my cell phone until she could join us in the late afternoon. As in 2002, she made it in time to help count the last species of the day. Jim Ingold dropped by for a short visit before returning to work.

Although we did not achieve the individual raptor numbers of 2002, the species diversity was equivalent. Eight Red-shouldered Hawks were spotted, Osprey made its perennial flyover, and American Kestrel, which winters in the park, showed up right on cue. Three Red-tailed Hawks and two Broad-winged Hawks were sighted and the Bald Eagle noted above substituted for last year's Peregrine Falcon. Not to be left out, the accipiter family was represented by two Cooper's and one Sharp-shinned Hawk. During the Big Sit of 2001, both male and female Northern Harrier flew low over our circle, but none have visited us since then.

Mark Wilson, a new BSG member and first-time Big Sitter, had arrived early and stayed late and he would be rewarded for his perseverance. Toward nightfall, as most of us were packing up, Amanda Crnkovic called out, "Owl!" A **Great Horned Owl** flew low over us to land at the top of a tall dead tree and provided Mark with his first sighting ever of the species. The final Sitters left at 7:15 p.m., except for Amanda and Mac Hardy, who stayed on until 8:30 p.m. in the hope of adding another owl species to the list. It was not to be though and the species total remained at 70.

Unlike last year, no **Vermilion Flycatchers** had wandered north to CBD in time to be counted. In the afternoon, Shirley Huss had a possible **Purple Martin** but no one could help to confirm it. Mac, while hunting for spiders, found **Yellow-crowned Night-Heron** by the pond behind the trees on the north side of the field but it was never seen or heard from the circle.

The bar has been raised. The three-year Big Sit total stands at 87 species. Two, possibly three, additional species have been present but uncountable in the circle area. They said it couldn't be done but the seemingly impossible has come to pass. Bird Study Group Sitters bested last year's total by two species. What does the future hold? How many Sitters can fit on a 17-foot diameter tarp? Make your plans now to be at C. Bickham Dickson Park on the second Sunday in October of 2004 to find out. See you next year!

# Congressman McCrery Responds to BSG's Tern Save Campaign

In an October 1, 2003, letter to BSG President Lily Poole, United States Congressman Jim McCrery responded to concerns about the conservation of the endangered **Interior Least Terns** nesting on the Red River.

Congressman McCrery stated, "In an effort to be of assistance I have forwarded our shared concerns regarding this matter to the U.S. Corps of Engineers in Vicksburg, Mississippi. The Vicksburg Study Manager for this project is actively working to obtain Operations and Maintenance funding to maintain the habitat of the Least Terns. It is expected that a study draft will be completed this month followed by public hearings. The United States Fish and Wildlife Service has also been asked to include a 'Coordination Act Report' within the study. Please know that I will closely monitor this situation and keep your thoughts in mind as the U.S. House of Representatives considers legislation that would fund U.S. Corps of Engineers programs in Fiscal Year 2005."

### BIRD REPORT – compiled October 20, 2003

Use the bird report to see what other birders have been seeing and where to go find the bird you want to see. Observers are abbreviated by the first and last initials. Dates and localities of observations are summarized under the observer's initials. Sightings are arranged by species. Following each species is a line of data in the following format: date, initials of the observer, number of birds observed, initials of another observer, number of birds they observed, etc. For the number of birds observed, a 1 is used for both 1 bird and for numbers not reported by the observer. For example: 01/12/99 BB 2 means that on January 12, 1999, BB saw two birds. Then by looking on the observer list, located after the sightings, you can determine that BB is Bob Birder and on 1/12/99 he was birding C. Bickham Dickson Park.

Report bird records for the newsletter to Mac Hardy by the 15<sup>th</sup> of each month. All bird records reported here are observations of the observers and are therefore the responsibility of the observer.



301-Year-Old Birdhouse

A special birdhouse will be part of our annual Christmas auction. The certificate accompanying this birdhouse reads a follows: Delahoussaye Birdhouse #52 Provenance—This birdhouse began life as a bald cypress tree in Louisiana's Atchafalaya River Basin over 300 years ago. Although the exact age of the tree cannot be determined, it is known that when it was harvested in the late 1800s, all of the giant bald cypress trees in the area were at least 200 years old. In the early 1900s, the lumber from this tree was used to build a barn on Bayou Grosse Tete, just outside the Basin. In 2002 Mr. Gene Seneca salvaged the barn, which had become unstable, for its lumber. Mr. Seneca donated some of the lumber to Jim Delahoussaye of Butte LaRose, Louisiana, with the advice, "Just make it come alive again." Mr. Delahoussaye believed that there could be no better way to do that and preserve the romance of the old wood than to make things with a forest theme, hence the birdhouses.

This birdhouse is #52, initialed and numbered by Mr. Delahoussaye. It was presented by him to the Shreveport Bird Study Group on May 18, 2003, for the Christmas auction with the wish that its future owner and occupants have many years of enjoyment with its use. In 2003, the birdhouse is over 301 years old, 200 years as a tree, 100 years as a barn, and one year as a birdhouse.

The first Christmas Bird Count was held on December 25, 1900. There were 25 counts that year. Many of the counts in the early years would continue to be held on Christmas Day. Now there is a count season and very few counts actually take place on Christmas Day. For this year, the occasion of the 104<sup>th</sup> Christmas Bird Count, a count may take place any day between Sunday, December 14, 2003 and Monday, January 5, 2004.

#### **Bird Study Group Media Field Trip**

Bird Study Group members Jim Ingold, Lily Poole and Larry Raymond served as birding guides for a recent media field trip coordinated by the Shreveport/Bossier Convention and Tourist Bureau. Public relations specialist Brandy Evans organized the trip for four out-of-town journalists. The journalists included Bruce Leonard, a freelance travel writer for *Trailer Life* 

Magazine; Randy Buker, a freelance outdoor writer for Hunt Club Digest; Roy Campbell, a freelance travel writer for Today's Photographer, Travel and Leisure, and Today's Photographer International; and Gail Todd, a travel columnist with the Chicago Daily Herald. Also joining us on the trip were Pat Gill, Internet Systems Manager for the Tourist Bureau) and Alyson Briggs, Williams Creative Group.

We met at the horse barn and arena in C. Bickham Dickson Park at 10 a.m. on Sunday, November 9. The BSG members briefly described the Red River Research and Education Park concept and offered binoculars to the participants who needed them. Overcast skies, occasional light rain, and gusty winds made finding birds difficult. Despite an overall lack of birds, the group enjoyed a hike to see the Red River and used the time to interpret plants native to the park. The invasive Chinese tallow tree also generated some good discussion. Fortunately, scorpionflies were particularly numerous and cooperative during the hike and they helped to fill in for the lack of birds.

Before we even walked past the gate to hike the trail to the river, a flock of about 27 American White Pelicans circled in front of us for everyone to observe. The next bird we spotted was an Eastern Phoebe that perched long enough for everyone to get a good look at it through the spotting scope. We also spent a little time observing Red-bellied Woodpecker and Yellow-bellied Sapsucker. A Pileated Woodpecker made its presence known by its call and a Downy Woodpecker was observed a little farther up the trail in the woods. Carolina Chickadee and Ruby-crowned Kinglet also cooperated at one point along the trail.

Returning to our vehicles after about 1½ hours in the park, we noted large numbers of **Double-crested Cormorants** streaming overhead toward the river. My final tally was around 275, but I am sure it was a conservative estimate. After a brief look at an **American Kestrel** through the spotting scope, we watched as more than 90 **American White Pelicans** soared over the park before loading up into our vehicles and driving to Monjuni's on Youree Drive for lunch. A leisurely 1½ hour lunch gave us plenty of opportunity to visit and expand on what Shreveport has to offer.

We reassembled at the Stoner Avenue Launch around 2 p.m. where we were picked up by Sam Flood and the *Spirit of the Red* for a 1½ hour cruise. We slowly cruised up the river to Cross Bayou, made a nice loop through the bayou, and resumed a northward route for a brief time before turning around and returning to the launch. Before reaching Cross Bayou, Sam stopped at the *Spirit of the Red* ramp near Sci-Port and picked up three additional customers.

Although the diversity of birds was again fairly small, we did see good numbers of **Great Blue Heron** (25), **Great Egret** (40) and **Ring-billed Gull** (45). A **Cooper's Hawk** was spotted perched below the Barnwell Center and a **Red-tailed Hawk** was seen in a tree along Cross Bayou. Other birds of interest included 2, possibly 3, **Spotted Sandpiper** and eight **Belted Kingfisher** (six in Cross Bayou alone).

Upon returning to the Stoner Avenue launch, Brandy and the journalists headed to Monroe for their next adventure. The ladies were headed to Lake D'Arbonne State Park for a fishing experience and the guys were scheduled to spend the night in a lodge in preparation for an early morning goose hunt.

Hopefully, we provided the journalists with an idea of what a bird outing is like and maybe, if we are lucky, we will even get some press out of the adventure. A complete list of the birds seen is available in the Bird Report in the back of the newsletter.

### Caddo Lake National Wildlife Refuge A Refuge in Transition

On October 21, 2000, the Longhorn Army Ammunition Plant at Karnack in Harrison County, Texas, became the Caddo Lake National Wildlife Refuge. The plant began operation in 1942 on land purchased from Thomas Jefferson "T. J." Taylor and other families (T. J., the father of Claudia Taylor, better known as Lady Bird Johnson, also donated land for the nearby Caddo Lake State Park.). The plant was in operation until 1997, manufacturing TNT in its early years and rocket motors later on. It has not been officially transferred to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) pending designation of areas "appropriate for inclusion into the wildlife refuge." Due to soil and water contamination during plant operation, the site is on the EPA's Superfund National Priorities List. Remedial actions are ongoing and the EPA has concluded that the "site currently does not present an immediate threat to the public or the environment," but access is restricted at this time.

Jerry Bertrand and I visited the refuge on November 14, 2003, along with members of the Lower Mississippi Valley Joint Venture Western Gulf Coastal Plain Landbirds and Quail Teams, which were meeting at Caddo Lake State Park. Our host was onsite manager Paul Bruckwicki of the USFWS. Other participants were Cliff Shackleford of Texas Parks and Wildlife, author or co-author of several Texas birding publications; Jim Neal of USFWS, who has spent over

20 years in the area; Jerry Davis of the U.S. Forest Service, who is Forest Wildlife Program Manager for the Ouachita National Forest; and Ron Mize of the U.S. Forest Service, Wildlife Biologist for the Angelina National Forest. The collective knowledge of this group was impressive and they generously shared it with us. There wasn't a question Jerry or I had that someone couldn't answer.

The refuge borders Caddo Lake, which is the only naturally formed lake in the state of Texas. consensus is that the lake was created in the late 1700s or early 1800s as waters backed up behind the massive Red River logiam known as the Great Raft. In the early 1830s, Captain Henry Miller Shreve, under contract from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, cleared part of the logiam and, for a time, a boat could journey from Caddo Lake down the Red River to its confluence with the Mississippi and then on to New Orleans. Jefferson, Texas, became the principal river port of Texas as steamboats carrying trade goods and passengers plied the waters of the lake even as the logiam reformed. Navigation on the lake ended in 1873 as the lake was drained when the Corps of Engineers permanently cleared the Great Raft. But sometimes, what the Corps taketh away, the Corps giveth back, if only in part. Oil was discovered in the lake area in the early 1900s and the swamp that Caddo Lake had become by that time did not lend itself to the movement of heavy drilling equipment. So, in 1914, the Corps, at the behest of the oil industry, constructed an earthen weir Mooringsport, Louisiana, to raise the level of the lake. The weir has served to maintain Caddo Lake at a level six to nine feet lower than it was in its early days. limiting traffic on the lake to small boats.

In 1993, a portion of Caddo Lake was designated a "wetland of international significance" under the treaty known as the Ramsar "Convention on Wetlands of International Importance especially as Waterfowl Habitat." It is one of only fifteen regions in the United States to be so designated.

Caddo Lake NWR is primarily a forested landscape of bottomland hardwoods, Southern baldcypress, and pine. Loblolly and slash pine have replaced much of the native short-leaf pine, which was heavily cut prior to acquisition of the land by the federal government. The first area we visited was an old cemetery where tombstones dated back to the 1800s. Here we found several short-leaf pine trees, which had escaped cutting over the years by virtue of their location. Jerry and Ron, our forest experts, explained how to identify short-leaf versus loblolly pine by the length of the needle and the size of the pine cone. Later on, we walked down a road to where someone had planted long-leaf pines years

before. As we walked along, common buckeyes were everywhere. Native grasses such as little bluestem and brushy bluestem lined the road and **Song**, **Swamp**, and **White-crowned Sparrows** popped up in the brush. Only a few of the long-leaf pines remained. We learned that long-leaf and loblolly are more southerly species. Ice storms can be deadly for these trees because of the weight of the ice accumulation on their longer needles. Loblolly is valued for timber over the native short-leaf because it grows straighter and faster. We brought samples of the three species home.

At Starr Ranch, which is on Caddo Lake, the old buildings seem to be held up by the vegetation covering them. Some of the birds we saw here were **Double-crested Cormorant**, **Great Blue Heron**, **Ruby-crowned Kinglet**, **Eastern Phoebe**, **American Goldfinch**, and **Field**, **Song**, **Swamp**, and **White-crowned Sparrows**.

One very special place we visited was Harrison Bayou, along which is one of the few undisturbed bottomland hardwoods stands in the region. Jim Neal recounted the history of the place. It seems that, prior to the dismantling of the Great Raft, the area was flooded. As the water level fell, old stream channels formed small oxbows. This along with frequent periods of high water combined to make accessibility difficult, with the result that the area was not logged during the late 1800s and early 1900s. Although sections would be cut over in later years, several tracts have survived. In these tracts of virgin timber are the State Champion water hickory or bitter pecan and the third largest overcup oak. (A State Champion tree is the largest specimen of an individual species in a particular state.) The bayou was dry but will fill and perhaps even overflow its banks with the winter rains. Cliff did an incredible Barred Owl imitation to see what birds he could bring in. Responding were Yellow-bellied Sapsucker, of which there were at least five, Northern Flicker, Downy and Red-bellied Woodpeckers, Tufted Titmouse, Carolina Chickadee, Pine Warbler, Orange-crowned Warbler, and American Crow. Paul took us to an area where ducks normally abound, but drought had reduced the normally football-field-size pond to a shallow depression a couple of feet across where only butterflies perched.

The last site we visited was an old concrete building. Many of the buildings on the refuge are being dismantled because of the hazard they could present as they deteriorate. But the concrete buildings will probably outlast all of us. High up on the interior walls, Rafinesque's big-eared bats clung in the darkness. Near the building, giant concrete pilings that used to support storage tanks towered over us. 50-year-old trees hugged their sides but the pilings showed no sign of giving way.

Our tour ended at noon and we headed east. As we crossed the Texas-Louisiana border, I hoped we would not be arrested for transporting pine needles and pine cones across the state line. We arrived home without incident, looking forward to our next trip to Caddo Lake National Wildlife Refuge and the Pineywoods of eastern Texas.

## LMVJV Landbird/Quail Meeting at Caddo Lake -- A Summary

It all began when Lower Mississippi Valley Joint Venture (LMVJV) Science Coordinator Randy Wilson extended an invitation to BSG members to attend the LMVJV West Gulf Coastal Plain (WGCP) Landbird and Quail Teams joint meeting being held at Caddo Lake State Park on November 12 and 13. With my present interest in the Red River's Interior **Least Tern**, Randy's presentation at the October BSG meeting on "Biological Planning, Monitoring and Evaluation for Shorebirds in the Mississippi Alluvial Valley" had wet my appetite for more information on how the LMVJV goes about the process of "developing habitat objectives and then translating those to conservation objectives."

Our own Jim Ingold, a member of the Landbird team, had schedule conflicts and would be unable to attend the meeting, so he graciously forwarded all his meeting information to me and Nancy Menasco. Hmmm, let's see – Meeting itinerary, lunch and dinner plans, sleeping accommodations, and an acronym cheat sheet.

I left early Thursday morning for Caddo Lake State Park in Karnack, Texas, with a stop at the I-20 Waskom exit where I was to be joined by Nancy Menasco and Jerry Bertrand. I wish I could say I had an uneventful trip, but while waiting for Nancy and Jerry, I left my van lights on. So, before we could continue on to Caddo Lake, Jerry had to "jump start" my car. Thanks, Jerry.

The itinerary had stated that the purpose of the meeting was to "review and refine WGCP conservation planning methodology with an emphasis on methodology for stepping down Partners in Flight (PIF) Continental population objectives, establishing landscape level conservation objectives for forested wetlands, and parameterization of a quail model for upland systems." What it comes down to is that Partners

in Flight, through the cooperative effort of both public and private organizations, and by using Geographic Information System (GIS) plus historical bird population, habitat, and distribution information coupled with present day statistics, has created a national model for at risk bird species. The physiographic spatial unit chosen by PIF for planning purposes is known as a Bird Conservation Region (BCR). Now the LMVJV teams would have to take the national statistics and data models and "step them down" to our BCR, the West Gulf Coastal Plain. Those agencies represented at the meeting for our BCR were the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service, Louisiana Department of Wildlife and Fisheries. Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, Oklahoma Department of Wildlife Conservation, Arkansas Game and Fish Commission, U.S. Forest Service, and U.S. Geological Survey.

The amount of available information that LMVJV had brought to the meeting was impressive, plus facilitators had been brought to help with the planning BCR population-habitat models had been created from the PIF Continental plan. Now it would be the job of the teams to look at the assumptions used in these models to determine if the assumptions are valid for our BCR. I found the entire scientific process fascinating. It all really came together for me on the second day when the meeting shifted from Forested Wetland Landbirds to Upland Systems - Quail. Quail populations throughout the U.S. have declined 90% in the last 20 years. Population declines can be traced to available habitat degradation due to agriculture, cattle grazing, and removal of native grasses. In the report Texas Quail Conservation Initiative, it was estimated that an additional 1.1 million quail coveys would be needed to restore populations to 1980s levels. achieve this population growth, 100 million acres of improved habitat would be required.

To me the prospects seemed dim. Then along came the endangered Red-cockaded Woodpecker (RCW) people. As luck would have it, our BCR's pine savannah habitat that has been set aside for the RCWs has the desirable grasslands that the quail need to thrive. Not only do the quail benefit from RCW-managed lands, but other bird species that require grassland/shrubland, such as Loggerhead Shrike, Bachman's, LeConte's, Grasshopper, and Henslow's Sparrows, benefit as well. Of course, there is still the problem with some RCW land tracts being isolated islands. "Lucky" for everyone, quail need large interconnected land tracts. Now maybe some of those landowners who have held out against the Wildlife Habitat Incentives Program (WHIP) for the RCWs might come on board for the Ouail Recovery plan.

The Joint Venture's Bird Conservation Partnership is described as "a private, state, and federal bird conservation partnership focused on increasing coordinated conservation of all birds in all habitats in the Mississippi Alluvial Valley and the West Gulf Coastal Plain." It seems that the Partnership is headed in the right direction. One final thought, if we were not being "politically correct," the meeting could have been called the Non-game Bird and Game Bird committees meeting for the LMVJV-WGCP Initiative.

#### How Rural Landowners and Land Managers Can Help Native Birds Across Texas

Note: Although this was originally written for Texas landowners, it is equally applicable to Louisiana landowners.

According to over three decades of Breeding Bird Survey data, our native birds are declining at an alarming rate. Additionally, Texas is rapidly losing native wildlife habitat that these birds call home. Since the majority of Texas is in private hands, private landowners hold the key to reversing these declines. We citizens of urban centers should adamantly support private land incentive programs since we cannot expect the private landowner to *foot the bill* for everything being done and needing to be done.

The list below includes a variety of management action tips that landowners and land managers can do to help our native birds (as well as other plants and animals). Please promote these with your neighboring landowners – working together with larger pieces of land will do so much more for wildlife conservation. These items are not listed in any particular order:

- Conserve and restore <u>native</u> plant communities (habitats); plant <u>native</u> vegetation only, especially warmseason grasses. For example, meadowlarks, bobwhite, and other native grassland birds typically do not thrive in pastures dominated with non-native coastal bermuda. Control invasive plant species.
- Apply prescribed fires where appropriate (i.e., grasslands, shrublands, savannahs) every few years depending on rainfall amounts and range conditions.
- Avoid fragmentation of existing habitat. Fragmentation is the breaking up and loss of substantial and contiguous blocks of habitat. Retain large blocks of

native habitat instead of cutting it up with roads, utility lines, real estate subdivisions, etc.

- Practice rotational grazing; limit populations and impacts of browsing animals (i.e., livestock, deer, exotic ungulates) especially in riparian areas, spring heads, glades, bogs, and other sensitive places.
- Limit or stagger mowing and haying efforts to allow wintering grassland birds to depart (which is about early March), and so breeding birds can complete their nesting cycle (usually April July depending on vegetative conditions and rainfall amounts that year).
- Mow or plow starting in the middle of a pasture or field, then proceed towards the outside so that skulking birds won't keep concentrating in the center area and get run over in the end. Instead, give them a chance to flee.
- Leave thickets (understory) and grassy areas for cover whenever possible. Avoid mowing and plowing the entire property -- leave some natural areas completely unmowed or unplowed.
- Restore <u>natural</u> wetlands. Depending on the region, allow natural areas that once experienced seasonal water fluctuations to retain water like playas, oxbows (resacas), beaver ponds, marshes, coastal potholes, cienegas, etc. Bottomland hardwood forests in the eastern third of Texas need occasional understory flooding to maintain forest health. Providing water in the form of a traditional "stock pond" or "stock tank" is not as beneficial to a diversity of birds as is commonly thought.
- Control feral hogs since their rooting can destroy the regeneration of bird habitat.
- Control feral and free-roaming domestic cats since they hunt and kill native birds.
- Do not remove tree-falls or rotting logs as they provide cover and perch sites; let them rot where they lay.
- Eliminate the spraying of canopy insects since this can be an important source of food for birds. Over half of our native birds are insectivorous -- let them do their job.
- Encourage cavity users to nest by leaving snags (dead trees) standing or by mounting and maintaining manmade nest boxes.
- Avoid clearcutting large blocks of forest or woodland; try selective harvesting to leave some attributes of natural forests with midstory and understory. Leave broad strips of woody vegetation along waterways to avoid erosion and so riparian birds have important habitat, too.

#### MINUTES OF THE BOARD MEETING

November 4, 2003, 7:00 p.m.

Board members present at the meeting were Mac Hardy, Jeff Trahan, Nancy Menasco, Lily Poole, Larry Raymond, Jerry Bertrand, Amanda Crnkovic, Jean Trahan, and Hubert Hervey.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u> – Jean Trahan reported income during October of \$234.05 and expenses of \$420.30. The expenses included a \$100.00 honorarium to the speaker, but the speaker has since returned the check to the club. The club has \$1,871.17 cash in the bank, \$173.76 at the post office for mailing newsletters, and \$118.29 at the LSUS printing office for printing newsletters. He talked to Jane Ledwin from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service in Columbia, Missouri. She said that she was not the Least Tern Recovery Leader and that there was no team leader. The person in charge of our area is Linda LaClaire who is headquartered in Jackson, Mississippi. She is only involved with the tern population on the Mississippi River. Hubert says that the next step is to contact Jim McCrery to get him to see that a person is put in charge of Least Terns on the Red River.

Lily Poole reported that she called the Bass Pro Shop and arranged for the club to have a booth at the grand opening of the store. Lily also said that since Bill Wood resigned, we will have to have someone to replace him. She will ask for volunteers at the next meeting.

Nancy Menasco reported on the tax-exempt status of the club. She said that the club qualifies as a tax-exempt organization because we satisfy specific criteria and that we don't have to send in any forms.

<u>New Business</u> – Jerry Bertrand said that the club needs items for the auction for the December meeting. Some club members have already reported starting their "auction boxes." After much praise of his auctioneering abilities, Hubert Hervey agreed to be the auctioneer.

<u>Programs and Fundraising</u>— Jerry Bertrand is making walking sticks and bird houses for the raffle. Amanda Crnkovic reported that she has been told that the club cannot call the raffle a raffle because the state will say that it is gambling. We must think of another name for the raffle.

#### **Minutes of the Regular Meeting**

### BIRD REPORT - compiled November 20, 2003

Use the bird report to see what other birders have been seeing and where to go find the bird you want to see. Observers are abbreviated by the first and last initials. Dates and localities of observations are summarized under the observer's initials. Sightings are arranged by species. Following each species is a line of data in the following format: date, initials of the observer, number of birds observed, initials of another observer, number of birds they observed, etc. For the number of birds observed, a 1 is used for both 1 bird and for numbers not reported by the observer. For example: 01/12/99 BB 2 means that on January 12, 1999, BB saw two birds. Then by looking on the observer list, located after the sightings, you can determine that BB is Bob Birder and on 1/12/99 he was birding C. Bickham Dickson Park.

Report bird records for the newsletter to Mac Hardy by the 15<sup>th</sup> of each month. All bird records reported here are observations of the observers and are therefore the responsibility of the observer.







#### **Christmas Bird Count Quiz Answers**

by Nancy Menasco

There was a three-way tie between Linda Adrion, Rachel Demascal, and Jim Ingold for the highest number of correct answers to the Christmas Bird Count Quiz. A drawing was held to determine the winner. The winner is Jim Ingold, he will receive a \$10 gift certificate from the Wild Bird Center. The correct answers follow.

#### Part I:

**#1 and 2:** Where was the first Christmas Bird Count held in Louisiana and during which count did that first Louisiana CBC take place?

The Baldwin, Louisiana, Christmas Bird Count (CBC) was one of the 25 counts held in the U.S. and Canada during the very first Christmas Bird Count on December 25, 1900. It was the only count to be held during the inaugural CBC in the entire southern part of the United States. Mrs. L.G. Baldwin, the compiler and sole participant, reported eight species, Killdeer, Blue Jay, Carolina Chickadee, Carolina Wren, Redwinged Blackbird, grackle species, Mockingbird and Turkey Buzzard. Baldwin, which is located just off U.S. Highway 90 about 45 miles southeast of Lafayette in St. Mary Parish, was also the site for the only count conducted in Louisiana during the second Christmas Bird Count. Mrs. Baldwin was again the compiler. She added four more species to her list, Red-headed Woodpecker, crow species, Tufted Titmouse, and **Ruby-crowned Kinglet**. After the 1901 count, the Baldwin count disappeared from the count lists and has never reappeared. The next Louisiana counts would be held on December 25, 1905, in the sixth year of the Christmas Bird Count, when the first New Orleans and the first and only Lake Catherine CBCs took place.

#3 and 4: Which count holds the record for the oldest, consecutively run count in the state of Louisiana and when was the first count for #3 conducted?

The Shreveport CBC is the oldest, consecutively run count in the state of Louisiana. It was first conducted on December 24, 1950, during the 51<sup>st</sup> count year. The count held on December 14, 2003, in the 104<sup>th</sup> year of the Christmas Bird Count, was the 54<sup>th</sup> Shreveport count. For the 1950 count, there were three observers in two parties, Horace Jeter, the compiler and legendary Shreveport birder; Ambrose Daigre, scientist and artist who, between the years of 1955 and 1964, constructed the nine habitat dioramas which are the highlight of the exhibit area of the LSU Museum of Natural Science in Baton Rouge; and G. Dale Hamilton. There were 82 species sighted that day, including one **Short-eared Owl** 

and two **Red-cockaded Woodpeckers**. The Shreveport count has had only two different compilers during its history, Horace Jeter and Charles Lyon.

**#5:** Ivory-billed Woodpecker appears on two different Louisiana CBCs in two different years. Name one of these counts.

**Ivory-billed Woodpeckers** have been observed on two Louisiana counts, four on the Tallulah count of December 25, 1933, during the 34<sup>th</sup> CBC, and two on the Singer Tract count of December 24, 1937, in the 38<sup>th</sup> CBC. Both of the counts were in Madison Parish. The Tallulah count participants (the compiler was not identified) were John S. Campbell, J. J. Kuhn, George H. Lowery, Sr., and George H. Lowery, Jr. The Singer Tract CBC compiler and only participant was James T. Tanner.

#### Part II (Bird Names):

**#6:** The Baldpate is now known as the **American Wigeon**.

**#7:** The Titlark is the **American Pipit**.

**#8:** The Chewink is the **Eastern Towhee** or **Spotted Towhee** (formerly one species, the Rufous-sided Towhee.)

**#9:** The Red-backed Sandpiper is the **Dunlin**.

**#10:** The Florida Gallinule is the **Common Moorhen**.

### BIRD REPORT – compiled December 21, 2003

Use the bird report to see what other birders have been seeing and where to go find the bird you want to see. Observers are abbreviated by the first and last initials. Dates and localities of observations are summarized under the observer's initials. Sightings are arranged by species. Following each species is a line of data in the following format: date, initials of the observer, number of birds observed, initials of another observer, number of birds they observed, etc. For the number of birds observed, a 1 is used for both 1 bird and for numbers not reported by the observer. For example: 01/12/99 BB 2 means that on January 12, 1999, BB saw two birds. Then by looking on the observer list, located after the sightings, you can determine that BB is Bob Birder and on 1/12/99 he was birding C. Bickham Dickson Park.

Report bird records for the newsletter to Mac Hardy by the 15<sup>th</sup> of each month. All bird records reported here are observations of the observers and are therefore the responsibility of the observer.

# The Endangered Black-capped Vireo

by Dr. David Cimprich

#### FEBRUARY PROGRAM

When: Tuesday, February 10, 6:30 p.m.

Where: LSU-Shreveport, Museum of Life Sciences

Dr. David Cimprich of The Nature Conservancy will present a program on the endangered **Black-capped Vireo**. For the past  $2\frac{1}{2}$  years, Dr. Cimprich has worked for The Nature Conservancy's Fort Hood Project in Central Texas. His responsibility is to oversee monitoring of the large population of the endangered **Black-capped Vireo** that breeds on the installation. His presentation will profile this species, the studies he has conducted on it, and how it coexists with activities on the U.S. Army's largest tank training area.

Dr. Cimprich obtained an Associate's Degree in Wildlife Management from Hocking College (Nelsonville, OH), a Bachelor's and Master's degree in Zoology, a Master's in Science Education from Ohio State University, and a Ph.D. in Biology from the University of Southern Mississippi. For his doctorate, he studied predator avoidance behavior of songbirds during migratory stopover. Some of you may remember that he gave a presentation here on that research three years ago.

The BSG will be taking a field trip to Fort Hood on May 1 and 2, 2004, to see the **Black-capped Vireo** up close and in person.

#### The Great Backyard Bird Count

Developed and managed by the Cornell Lab of Ornithology and Audubon, with sponsorship in part from Wild Birds Unlimited stores and the Natural Resources Conservation Service (a division of the USDA), the GBBC will help researchers understand the status of the birds that people all over North America so enjoy. Participants simply keep track of the birds they see on any or all of the count days, then log their sightings into the BirdSource database at <a href="www.birdsource.org/gbbc">www.birdsource.org/gbbc</a>. This year's count encourages participants to become more "bird-friendly" in their day-to-day lives, everything from getting their families interested in birds to creating bird habitat in their backyards.

#### A Snapshot of Last Year's Great Backyard Bird Count Findings

Last winter, as part of the Great Backyard Bird Count (GBBC), bird enthusiasts across North America submitted some 50,000 checklists totaling more than four million birds of 512 species. The event, one of the largest citizen-science projects in the world, documented regional declines of the American Crow that may be the result of West Nile virus in those regions. Crows, for example, are particularly vulnerable to the virus and were reported in far fewer numbers in Illinois and Ohio, where West Nile virus has had a strong presence, backing findings from the Christmas Bird Count and a project, winter-long citizen-science **Project** FeederWatch. "This decrease may or may not be related to West Nile, but the situation is certainly something we need to pay attention to," says John Fitzpatrick, director of the Cornell Lab of Ornithology.

Some species showed increases last year during the GBBC. Participants in the East counted more **Dark-eyed Juncos** than they had since GBBC 2000, perhaps because of the massive snowstorm that hit the eastern seaboard during the weekend of the count, driving birds to feeders in high numbers. That same snowstorm apparently held early migrants like **Red-winged Blackbird**, **Eastern Meadowlark**, and **American Woodcock** farther south, compared to previous years.

In the West, **Mountain Bluebirds** were reported farther south than the year before, and all of the **rosy finches (Black, Gray-crowned, Brown-capped)** were documented farther north. In previous years, GBBC maps of **Eurasian Collared-Doves**, introduced in the Bahamas before reaching Florida in the 1980s, showed

the species spreading quickly northwestward. Last year's maps show no change, suggesting a slowdown in the rate at which the bird's range is spreading.

How will this winter compare to the last six? What will it reflect about our bird populations? The participation of novice and expert bird watchers alike will help us answer these questions. "We need every birder to participate with us," said Frank Gill. "The Great Backyard Bird Count has become an important means of gathering data to help birds, but it can't happen unless people take part. Whether you're a novice or an expert, we need you to help us help birds."

# BSG Plans for the Great Backyard Bird Count of 2004

Last year Shreveport took first place among Louisiana cities with a total of 104 species for the four days of the 2003 Great Backyard Bird Count (GBBC) with Homer, Stonewall, and Keithville joining Shreveport in the top ten. Shreveport was also only 13 species short of being in the top ten cities in the entire United States. According to the BSG database, over 170 species of birds have been sighted in the month of February in the BSG area, so topping our 2003 total is definitely within the realm of possibility. But the GBBC is not just about counting birds; it's also about becoming more bird-friendly in our everyday lives by creating habitat in our yards and by encouraging others, especially children, to become interested in birding. To these ends, the BSG recommends the following:

• Organize a mini-field trip and sign up for a bird or birds from the BSG target bird list. The list includes birds on the Audubon Watch List and some of the harder-to-find local birds. The list and a locator chart can be found online at:

www.softdisk.com/comp/birds/SelectCheck.html.

Also available on this webpage is a checklist for your use for the GBBC. The checklist has been developed from February sightings on Jeff Trahan's Chart of Seasonal Occurrences. There will be sign-up sheets at the February meeting for organizers and participants of mini-field trips or you may post details and contact information to the online Bird Alert Service.

Two Mini-field trips are already planned. Nancy Menasco and Jerry Bertrand will target **Virginia Rails** 

at dawn near Cross Lake, owl prowl, and bird the Red River by boat. Nancy says, "anyone is welcome to join us on any of our trips; however, our boat will only hold two people. If you have a canoe and would like to be towed from Bishop Point to the nearby sandbars and back (weather permitting), we have done this with the Trahans without mishap. Contact me or Jerry at <a href="mailto:nmcpa@aol.com">nmcpa@aol.com</a> or <a href="mailto:jeb1954@aol.com">jeb1954@aol.com</a> or 868-3255." Lily, Barney, and Jason Poole will bird Cross Lake by boat (tentative). Contact Lily at <a href="mailto:leg2bap@earthlink.net">leg2bap@earthlink.net</a> or 687-2994 if you would like to join this trip.

- Organize a bird walk through your neighborhood or at a park for your own children or grandchildren or other group of youngsters or invite them to count backyard birds with you. Be sure to have supplies such as a backyard bird checklist for each participant, backyard bird recognition charts, and one or more field guides for reference. Binoculars may have to be shared, but try to let each child get a good look at one or more birds through the binoculars. Make feeders out of recycled materials such as oatmeal boxes or milk jugs or make up a batch of peanut butter no-melt suet and pack in pine cones. Serve refreshments.
- Give a simple presentation at a nearby library, church, school, or Community Renewal Center, on backyard birds, habitat preservation, and the GBBC. The Bird Study Group and the Museum of Life Sciences have materials that you can use in your presentation. - Make tea and cookies and invite the neighbors to watch your backyard birds.
- Invite a new birder and/or member of the BSG to join you on a birding trip or to come watch your backyard birds.

# A Prairie Tale by Nancy Menasco

We came from near and far, from north, south, east, and west, to converge in Franklin County, Texas, for the weekend of November 29-30, 2003. We had come to visit Daphne Prairie, a one-thousand-acre remnant of virgin tallgrass prairie located just north of the town of Mount Vernon. The tallgrass prairies once stretched across 20 million acres of Texas from San Antonio to the Red River, but now less than five percent remains. Beginning in the late 1800s, acre by acre, the prairies fell

to the plow and today a virgin prairie the size of Daphne is very rare. Daphne has fortuitously been owned by the same family since the 1830s and has been used over the years as a hay meadow. The infrequent mowing has actually contributed to the prairie's well-being by stimulating grasses and eliminating brush. In the past, fire has also played an integral role in maintaining the prairie as a prairie.

Daphne is dotted with mounds known as mima or pimple mounds. There are various theories as to the origin of these two to four feet tall mounds, which are also found on other sites in Texas. One theory is that they could have been created by earthquake activity. Daphne Prairie lies only a few hundred miles to the southwest of the New Madrid seismic zone (NMSZ). During the winter of 1811-1812, a series of earthquakes, the epicenter of which was located near the town of New Madrid, Missouri, occurred along this fault line. The New Madrid earthquakes, the largest in recorded American history and considered by seismologists to be the greatest known release of seismic energy in the world, caused the Mississippi River to run backwards for a short time. The upheaval resulting from these and earlier earthquakes along the NMSZ could have contributed to the formation of the pimple mounds.

The land of Daphne Prairie has changed little in the past 200 years but many of the creatures who lived on this land are gone. Bison once roamed here while vast flocks of the now-extinct Carolina Parakeet, the United States' only native parrot species, and Passenger Pigeon, believed to be at one time the most numerous birds in the world, filled the skies. A traveler in the area in the 1860s noted that the most abundant resident bird on the prairie was Attwater's Prairie-Chicken. Today Attwater's Prairie-Chicken, one of three original subspecies of the Greater Prairie-Chicken, is the most critically endangered bird in North America. Habitat loss and uncontrolled hunting have taken their toll. Where once a million Attwater's Prairie-Chickens roamed six million acres of prairie in Texas and Louisiana, by 2001 there were only about 50 birds living in the wild, all in three southeast Texas counties, and 200 birds in captive breeding programs in Texas. Of the other two subspecies of Greater Prairie-Chicken, the Heath Hen of the east was hunted to extinction by the 1930s and the northern Great Plains nominate race is on the decline due to habitat loss.

But we had come to see living birds, two elusive and secretive bird species that have historically wintered on the prairie, **Smith's Longspur** and **Sprague's Pipit**. A prairie is a diverse ecosystem. As many as 200 to 300 different kinds of native grasses and wildflowers can be found in an acre of virgin prairie. The original

northeastern Texas prairies with their higher rainfall were dominated by Silveanus dropseed and longspike tridens as Daphne still is. The golden color of these grasses in winter is echoed by the winter plumage of **Smith's Longspur** and **Sprague's Pipit** and the seeds provide sustenance to the birds during their Texas sojourn.

To get a good look at both Smith's and Sprague's, it is usually necessary to flush them so they will sit up momentarily on a hillock of grass or perhaps in a small bush or tree. Accordingly, 30 eager birders led by Matt White, Smith's Longspur expert and author of The Birds of Northeast Texas, spread out across the prairie. As we walked, Sprague's Pipits and Savannah Sparrows flushed in front of us only to fly a short distance and dive back into the grass. The pipits could be distinguished by the habit of Sprague's of calling or singing as they flew up. Finally, it appeared that one Sprague's had decided to light on the ground and stay put or at least stay in one small area. The first challenge for Matt was to get all 30 of his charges in close enough to see the bird without spooking it. It was like the child's game, "Mother, May I?" Matt would say, "Take three steps forward" and the word would be passed down the line. Everyone would move forward and attempt to locate the bird. If you think it's easy to describe the location of a little bird as he moves in and out of depressions and grass clumps which are the same color as the bird, you've never visited a prairie in winter. Eventually, we were all crowded together, some stooping or crouching so as not to block the view of those behind. Miraculously, the bird remained in a very limited area until everyone had the chance to view it. Then Matt moved in to photograph it. You can see the result on the following website:

We were able to see **Smith's Longspurs** in flight but they were too far away for close scrutiny. They retreated to an area across a fence line, thumbing their bills at us. Other good birds seen by some participants were **Grasshopper** and **LeConte's Sparrows**. During the winter **Short-eared Owls** often roost in the trees rimming the prairie but they were absent when we visited.

We applaud B. F. Hicks and his brothers, the owners of the Daphne Prairie, for choosing not only to preserve Daphne in its natural state but also for their decision to restore adjacent pastureland which had until recently been leased out for cattle grazing. With the assistance of Matt White, they are hoping to be able to maintain Daphne through ecotourism. The standard rate for the future for tours of Daphne will be \$50 per person, but the Bird Study Group and guests have been invited to

return at a lower rate in the spring to see the prairie ablaze with wildflowers and to hear the songs of two very special species which breed at Daphne, **Grasshopper Sparrow** and **Bell's Vireo**. For two photos of Daphne wildflowers in the spring, see www.jtrahan.com/daphne/daphne.htm

The Carolina Parakeet and Passenger Pigeon are both extinct and will never return but perhaps someday Attwater's Prairie-Chicken will rejoin the longspurs, the pipits, the sparrows, and the vireos and once again boom across Daphne Prairie.

Although we had come to the Mount Vernon area primarily to visit Daphne Prairie, we took advantage of some of the multitude of opportunities for birding in the vicinity. Some of us were staying at Selah Inn or in one of the guest cottages at Selah Ranch. Selah Ranch, located a few miles from Mount Vernon and Daphne, is a working ranch where Black Angus cattle are raised without chemicals or hormones. The Inn, an imposing two-story manor house, is built of Austin stone and has ten guest bedrooms. Dave and Candy Hickerson, the owners, had invited the entire group to bird the ranch on Saturday afternoon. There are eight lakes and miles of trails on the ranch and we couldn't begin to do it justice in the three hours we spent birding. We had 40 species, including eight species of sparrow, four species of woodpecker, and White-breasted Nuthatch. Many of these we found in the trees and a natural creek area right in front of the house. A Greater Yellowlegs surprised us at the pond nearest the house. Cooper's Hawk, American Kestrel, and Northern Harrier were also seen. Dave and Candy provided refreshments for us that included among other items their own special cocoa and spiced tea mixes, myriad varieties of regular and herb teas, crackers, cheeses, grapes, and homemade cookies. We called the afternoon's list in the Inn's large and comfortable living room

On Sunday morning, after we left Daphne, we birded U.S. Highway 167 and a couple of smaller roads. This is an area of wide, open pastures, rolling hills, and ponds or small lakes. Northern Harriers coursed over the land as ducks, including Gadwall, American Wigeon, Mallard, Northern Shoveler, Green-winged Teal, Ring-necked Duck, Lesser and Greater Scaup, Bufflehead, Hooded Merganser, and Ruddy Duck floated on various ponds. When we returned to Mount Vernon, it was beginning to seem like the entire county had rolled out the welcome mat for us as B. F. Hicks and Mayor Richard Mavis and his wife Barbara joined us for lunch at Hubbard's Restaurant. Both the mayor and his wife are birders.

On Sunday afternoon, we divided into two groups to bird Lake Cypress Springs by pontoon boat. The captain

of our boat was Brian Philhower, who owns Tall Tree Marina, Bar and Grill and the boats. Harve Truskett, who had joined us from NETFO, the Longview bird club, was sitting next to Captain Brian in our boat. Since it could be difficult for the captain to hear us over the noise of the motor, when we wanted to get in closer to an area or go in a different direction, we would communicate the request to Harve for him to relay to the captain. Harve, apparently fearing the possible consequences of incurring the wrath of the captain (being hung from the yardarms, forced to walk the plank, or some other similar unpleasantness), would always preface the request with "They want you to do x, y, or z." For this, Harve was subjected not to our wrath but to unmerciful kidding. Methinks Harve's been watching too many pirate movies as Captain Brian readily took us anywhere we wanted to go. Our best birds on Lake Cypress Springs were Horned Grebe and Bald Eagle.

Several members of the Northeast Louisiana Bird Club were able to stay over an extra day and were treated to a tour of the new nature trail at Mount Vernon's Dupree Park on Monday morning led by B. F. Hicks himself. When we return in May, Mr. Hicks has offered to give a reception for us at the Old Church Inn. The Inn is the old Methodist church which Mr. Hicks saved from destruction and moved to his property because of the role it has played in his family's history. We are also hoping to see some of the collection of bird eggs for which Mt. Vernon has become famous. William Cleveland of Ohio and his son began collecting bird eggs in the 1880's. Cleveland moved to Texas in the 1920s and after he died, his daughter sold the collection of 220 eggs to A. W. Nations. Mr. Nations hoped to establish a natural history museum in Donna, Texas, but the town apparently wasn't interested. After Mr. Nations' death, his son learned from a friend of plans to establish a museum in Mount Vernon and, in 1991, he donated the collection, along with his father's butterfly collection, to the Franklin County Historical Association (FCHA). In the collection are eggs of the extinct Carolina Parakeet, Passenger Pigeon, and Heath Hen. There are only 12 other sets of the Carolina Parakeet and 148 sets of the Passenger Pigeon eggs known to exist in North American museums today. The FCHA and the town of Mount Vernon are in the process of raising \$25,000 to modify part of the museum so the eggs can be properly cared for and protected. Donations would be gratefully accepted.

#### Some Hints on Bird Records By Mac Hardy

Always give us the bare essentials, the date of the observation, the parish, and the exact location. Be as precise as possible. Remember that "LA 1" gives your wonderful sighting as somewhere along a 350 mile highway! If you remember to say "Caddo Parish, LA 1" you have narrowed it to about 80 miles—still almost useless. Be as exact as possible. Remember also that other birders might want to go to your sighting location. Make it easy for them.

Above all, send in your records. Frequently we discover that a rare bird sighting has never been sent to the BSG database, so we do not have a record for that sighting.

# **Submitting Electronic Records By Mac Hardy**

Several of you use some form of electronic database system for your bird records. Many of those systems can be easily used to submit records to the BSG database.

BSG database users (PC-File) should select the records to send by the newsletter number (1806 represents the number of this newsletter; vol. 18, number 6; next month will be 1807, etc.). Select the following options: Utilities, Export, New database (.dbf), provide a file name (use your last name; be sure to select the correct drive and folder, as appropriate), ok, yes (flip data is ok), all fields, some records, simple, fill in 1807 in the newslet field, ok if first record showing on the screen is correct select all, ok. Email the .dbf file to lsusmus@prysm.net (it is not necessary to send the .dbh file).

Other users (any .dbf database or product that can export a .dbf database) should select your records by observation date. Select those observations before a date (i.e., Feb. 20, 2004) and after a date (i.e., Jan. 23, 2004). Export them in a .dbf format. Email to lsusmus@prysm.net. NOTE: This is the next best option.

If your system will not support .dbf files, then use any of the formats listed in the BSG Newsletter 18(4).

Otherwise, call me at 797-5338; we can probably determine a way to export your records.

# Christmas Bird Count Quiz Correction by Nancy Menasco

In the last issue, I stated that the Shreveport Christmas Bird Count has had only two different compilers in its history. There have actually been three compilers, Horace Jeter, James R. Stewart (who now lives in Houston), and Charles Lyon. I apologize to Jim Stewart for the omission and thank Horace Jeter for bringing this to my attention.

#### Caddo Lake Bird Count

by Dorothy Metzler

We counted a total of 107 species on the December 6, Caddo Lake Bird Count, with three new species added to the count list: **Greater White-fronted Goose, Merlin**, and **Barn Owl**. Other notable species were **White Ibis** (6), **Osprey** (1), **Bald Eagle** (2), **Purple Finch** (6 found by three different parties), **Rusty Blackbird** (35), and **Brewer's Blackbird** (1).

All duck numbers were below average, except Canvasbacks. Woodpecker numbers were up, with the highest-ever numbers for Yellow-bellied Sapsucker, Hairy Woodpecker, Northern Flicker, Pileated Woodpecker; and above-average numbers for Redheaded, Red-bellied and Downy Woodpeckers. (Maybe woodpeckers are just more concentrated this year because there's been so much clear-cutting around Caddo Lake.) Ring-billed Gull, Bonaparte's Gull, and Forster's Tern came in with new high counts. Other high-count species: **Double-crested** Cormorant, Turkey Vulture, Eurasian Collared-Dove, Inca Dove, Eastern Screech-Owl, Blue-headed Vireo, Blue- gray Gnatcatcher, Ruby-crowned Kinglet, Carolina Chickadee, Tufted Titmouse, Orange-crowned Warbler, and Lincoln's Sparrow.

We had our second highest number ever for **Fish Crows** (74). Incidentally, the Lake O' the Pines count had 59 **Fish Crows** -- a big jump in that population. They first showed up at Lake O' the Pines on the 1995 CBC. I think **Fish Crows** sometimes retreat farther south in cold winters, but clearly did not do so by count time this year.

#### MINUTES OF THE BOARD MEETING January 6, 2004, 7:15 p.m. Museum of Life Sciences at LSUS

Board members present at the meeting were Mac Hardy, Jeff Trahan, Nancy Menasco, Lily Poole, Larry Raymond, Jerry Bertrand, Amanda Crnkovic, Linda Adrion and Michele Andrews.

Treasurer's Report – Jean Trahan was not present. However, Lily Poole distributed her report to each of the board members present at the meeting. She reported income during the last month of \$1,841.75 and expenses of \$1,594.13. The club has \$3,161.97 cash in the bank, \$142.53 at the post office for mailing newsletters, and \$164.73 at the LSUS printing office for printing newsletters. The total assets are then \$3,469.23. One highlight of the report was that the club received \$986.75 as a result of the Christmas auction.

**Old Business** – Lily Poole reported that Dan Weber said that the government hasn't acknowledged that there are **Least Terns** on the Red River. He says that we have to convince them and that we have to get into the process of getting the terns in the recovery plan. Dan is hopeful that this can be done. Lily also said that the club is now on the Time-Warner Channel 12 Community Bulletin Board.

New Business – Lily reminded us that the regional science fair is March 6 and that the club gives an award for the best science project pertaining to birds or birding. Amanda Crnkovic evaluated the projects and made the award last year, but cannot do it again this year. Linda Adrion volunteered to take care of the awards this year. Lily also said that Dennis Forshee has agreed to be a board member, however this must be voted on by the membership of the club.

**Donations** – Nancy Menasco reported that some money has been donated to the club specifically for refuges. Nancy moved that if the club receives donations for refuges, that the club will contribute it to the Baton Rouge Audubon Society (BRAS) specifically for the new wildlife refuges that BRAS is attempting to acquire on the Louisiana coast. This property is composed of two tracts that contain the same coastal woodland habitat critical for migrating birds as Peveto Woods. The motion passed.

**Bird Records** – Mac Hardy said that he wants to show club members how to enter data into the database at the next meeting.

Newsletter – Amanda Crnkovic asked about how to collect charges for ads in the newsletter. The board decided that the treasurer should send an invoice.

**Beginning Birders** – Lily said that Dennis Forshee will take on the beginning birder committee when he is a board member. Larry Raymond reported that Walter B. Jacobs Nature Park will be doing many beginning birder programs in the near future.

Field Trips – Nancy Menasco reported on future field trips. Mac Hardy will lead the trip to the Eugene Smith Tract of the Red River Wildlife Refuge on January 17. The Louisiana Ornithological Society meeting in Monroe is at the end of January. The Great Backyard Bird Count will take place from February 13 through February 16. Lily and Nancy suggested that we have a get together on Saturday or Sunday of that weekend. Also, the club will have a trip to Indian Creek near

Alexandria to see **Red-cockaded Woodpeckers** and **Bachman's Sparrows**.

**Library** – Linda Adrion and the board discussed the state of the library. The board decided that we should use the Dewey Decimal System, that we need a list of books present in the library, and that ownership plates should be placed in each of the books. Nancy Menasco moved that the club purchase the Birds of North America software for the museum library. The motion passed.

#### Minutes of the Regular Meeting January 13, 2004, 7:00 p.m., Museum of Life Sciences at LSUS

**Program** – Ron and Susan Martin told of their birding trip to Spain. They discussed where they went and how and where to get information on birding in Spain. They showed many slides of birds that they saw and attempted to see and of the areas that they visited.

**Treasurer's Report** – Jean Trahan gave the treasurer's report for the month ending December 31, 2003. She said the club had \$3,161.97 in the bank. In addition we had \$142.53 and \$164.73 in prepaid expenses at the post office and LSUS printing, respectively. The fund balance is \$3,469.23. Net income for the month of December was \$1,841.75, and expenses were \$247.62. Jean said that the club earned \$986.75 at the Christmas auction.

Field Trips – Nancy Menasco said that Walter B. Jacobs Nature Park would have an owl prowl on Saturday, February 28, at 6 p.m. The park will also have a nest box workshop on January 24, at 2:00 p.m. Mac Hardy will lead a field trip to the Spanish Lake Lowlands (Eugene Smith Tract of the Red River Wildlife Refuge) in Natchitoches Parish on Saturday, January 17. **Programs** - Jerry Bertrand said Dr. David Cimprich would speak at the next meeting on the endangered **Black-capped Vireo**.

**Hospitality** – Amanda Crnkovic thanked Linda Adrion, Mary Jacobs, Eileen Banach, and Mac Hardy for setting up the tables for the Christmas party. Amanda also thanked Betty Speairs for relieving her when Amanda had to leave.

**Newsletter** – Amanda Crnkovic said that she needs help folding and collating the newsletter. She needs someone to take charge of the process.

**Election** – Bill Wood stepped down as a board member. Dennis Forshee was nominated to the board and elected.

Bird Talk – Jane Mollett says that she does not have as many birds at her feeders as she has had in past years. ### BIRD REPORT – compiled January 23, 2004

Use the bird report to see what other birders have been seeing and where to go find the bird you want to see. Observers are abbreviated by the first and last initials. Dates and localities of observations are summarized under the observer's initials. Sightings are arranged by species. Following each species is a line of data in the following format: date, initials of the observer, number of birds observed, initials of another observer, number of birds they observed, etc. For the number of birds observed, a 1 is used for both 1 bird and for numbers not reported by the observer. For example: 01/12/99 BB 2 means that on January 12, 1999, BB saw two birds. Then by looking on the observer list, located after the sightings, you can determine that BB is Bob Birder and on 1/12/99 he was birding C. Bickham Dickson Park.

Report bird records for the newsletter to Mac Hardy by the 15<sup>th</sup> of each month. All bird records reported here are observations of the observers and are therefore the responsibility of the observer.

### Next Meeting-March 9, 2004 Hot Pink Birds, Pink Dolphins, & Frogs with Red Feet by Amanda Crnkovic

#### MARCH PROGRAM

When: Tuesday, March 9, 6:30 p.m.

Where: LSU-Shreveport, Museum of Life Sciences

Bird Study Group member, Amanda Crnkovic, will present a program describing her trip to Brazil. Amanda traveled to Brazil in June of 2003 with Mac Hardy, also a BSG member, to attend professional meetings. The trip included 3-day excursions to both the Aldophe Ducke Ecological Reserve and to the Anavilhanas Ecological Reserve. Researchers from the two reserves guided them in an exploration of the Amazon rainforest and the Rio Negro. During these excursions they birded at every opportunity and captured, photographed, and released amphibians and reptiles.

Come hear the stories of a field biologist's first trip to the Amazon rainforest, see photos of the spectacular birds and other wildlife, and experience Brazil off the beaten track and on the muddy trail.

Amanda received a Bachelor of Science in Biology from LSUS in May of 2000 and a Master of Science in Biology from LSU-Health Sciences Center in August of 2003. Amanda is a Herpetologist (someone who studies reptiles and amphibians), but is interested in biodiversity including birds and mammals. Amanda is currently the Collections Manager of the Museum of Life Sciences and is currently teaching General Zoology at LSUS. She is also the editor of the BSG newsletter.

#### UPCOMING FIELD TRIPS AND EVENTS

**IMPORTANT NOTICE**: Field trips will **LEAVE** the designated meeting place at the time posted for each field trip. Plan to arrive early for field trip orientation and carpooling/caravanning arrangements, if necessary.

### INDIAN CREEK RECREATION AREA, WOODWORTH, LA

Saturday, March 13, 2004, 7:00 a.m.

Meet at the LSUS Museum of Life Sciences. Indian Creek Recreation Area is located south of Alexandria in the Alexander State Forest in Rapides Parish and includes the 2,250-acre Indian Creek Lake. Target birds include **Red-cockaded Woodpecker** and **Bachman's Sparrow**. Plan on moderate walking on the 2½-milelong Indian Creek Nature Trail. The trail winds through a mixed pine-hardwood forest and "traverses uplands and minor stream bottoms, providing access to a variety of habitats supporting numerous plant and animal species." If you are not up to walking the trail, there are paved roads throughout the area and a number of sites where you can just sit and wait for the birds to come to you. Restrooms are located onsite. There is an entrance fee of \$3.00 per vehicle. We will lunch at Lea's

Restaurant in Lecompte and then spend a couple of hours birding by car looking for **Sandhill Cranes** and other area birds. We will be back in Shreveport by dark but participants may leave the field trip whenever they wish. What to bring: \$3.00 per car admission fee, snacks, drinks, two-way radios, scope.

#### BISHOP POINT AND SMITHPORT LAKE DAM

Meet at the LSUS Museum of Life Sciences. The Bishop Point area, located just north of Lock and Dam No. 5 on the Caddo side, is one of our newest Hot Spots. The habitat includes grassland, cattail marshes, ponds, woods, and the Red River. Most areas can be viewed from the road between the dam and Bishop Point. From Bishop Point, we will continue on to Smithport Lake and Smithport Lake Dam to look for Northern Parulas and other early migrants. Last year's March 23 field trip to these areas turned up 73 species, including five wren species. Plan on some light walking. Bishop Point has Port-o-lets. Restrooms at the dam may or may not be available. What to bring: snacks, drinks, two-way radios, scope, and a lunch, or plan to pick up a burger or sandwich at the Martins' store, which is located on LA 1 at the turn to Lock and Dam No. 5 and Bishop Point.

Meet at the LSUS Museum of Life Sciences. Another of our new Hot Spots, Eddie Jones is managed as an adventure park and has over 15 miles of trails for hiking, mountain biking, and horseback riding. Habitat ranges from open field to edge of forest, second growth and mature forest. There are large expanses of switch cane, two ponds, and a couple of large creeks. Park specialties include **Wild Turkey**, **Northern Bobwhite**, **Sedge** and **Marsh Wrens**, **Louisiana Waterthrush**, and **Blue Grosbeak**. #### LOS SPRING MEETING, CAMERON, LA



#### **Instructions for BSG Trip Leaders**

by Nancy Menasco and Hubert Hervey

Field trip leaders are needed for future BSG field trips, including the summer and fall of 2004. Please consider volunteering to lead a trip. You may choose your location and date, if you like. You do not have to be an expert birder to lead a field trip; there is almost always at least one experienced birder on all field trips that can assist in identifications. If not, participants will have an excellent opportunity to learn the process of bird identification, from noting field marks to narrowing down the possibilities. Here are some guidelines for trip leaders.

#### Before the trip:

• Scout location ahead of time. If birding away from home, enlist the assistance of local birders if possible.

- Contact private landowners to confirm date and time of expected entry.
- Establish a rainy day policy and alternate date when possible.

#### Day of field trip:

- Arrive early at the meeting place.
- Greet participants as they arrive. Make sure everyone is introduced.
- Briefly outline the field trip agenda including destination, target species, rest stops, physical requirements, and ending time. Determine if anyone has any special needs or interests that can be accommodated.
- Distribute checklists.
- If caravanning to field trip location, organize the vehicles into carpools. To ensure that no one gets left behind, distribute FRS 2-way radios to the lead and last vehicles along with fresh batteries, if necessary. Verify that radios work and are on the same channel and subchannel. If birding by car, try to equip all vehicles with radios so that stops and bird sightings may be communicated to all participants. Remind drivers that each vehicle in the caravan is responsible for keeping the vehicle behind him or her in sight.
- Leave on time.
- Drive the speed limit or slower. Communicate turns ahead of time by radio and use your turn signals!
- Make sure all stops are in safe locations.
- Attempt to include rest stops at reasonable intervals.
- Don't trespass on private land.

#### At field trip location:

- Spend a few minutes orienting group.
- Identify beginning birders who may need extra assistance.
- Encourage quiet participation for the enjoyment of all. Remind participants of birding etiquette avoid sudden or loud noises, unnecessary talking and gesturing, walking in front of the leader, etc.
- Encourage all participants to report sightings or vocalizations.
- Ask an experienced birder to take up the rear so that those furthest from the leader will have someone to assist them. If group is large, consider dividing into two groups.
- Assist all trip participants in locating all birds.
- Call the list during breaks and at the end of the trip.

#### After the field trip:

• Turn in the official checklist to the BSG database.

• Write an account of the trip for the next BSG Newsletter or ask a trip participant to do so.

#### **Parish Year List Competition**

In January of this year, David Muth of New Orleans proposed a friendly Parish Year List Competition, which would have "the added advantage of generating some useful information about bird distribution in the state." Here are the guidelines as David described them:

"The goal will be to see as many species as possible in a given parish. Anyone can enter for any parish and for any number of parishes. A winner will be declared for each parish.

In addition, the total statewide parish lister will be a winner. In other words, we will add up the cumulative total of individual parish lists to get an overall winner. If you get 200 species in one parish, 100 in another, 50 in two others, and 25 in five others, then your total parish list for the year would be:

200+100+50+50+25+25+25+25+25=525.

Honor system applies, but any bird on the LBRC Review List must be submitted to the committee in order to be countable. Submitted – we won't wait for the deliberations of the committee.

You don't need to announce your entry, though if you want to e-mail me (dmuth@bellsouth.net) and let me know you are in, I'll be pleased to hear from you."

Judith O'Neale immediately jumped on the bandwagon and committed the Louisiana Ornithological Society (LOS) to providing prizes for the parish and overall winners. BSG member Rosemary Seidler volunteered to compile the list of all species sighted by parish during the year 2004.

Our own Hubert Hervey suggested that we sweeten the pot for Bird Study Group members by supplementing the prizes to be awarded by the LOS. The BSG Board of Directors approved the idea and the membership voted at the February meeting that the BSG will provide \$25 prizes for the BSG members who report the highest total number of species in each of the parishes covered by the BSG database. These parishes are Bienville, Bossier, Caddo, Claiborne, DeSoto, Natchitoches, Red River, and Webster. In addition, the BSG member with the highest combined total in the eight-parish area will receive a \$50 prize. Note that this is not the total number of different species for all eight parishes, but the total number of species seen in each parish added together (see example above in David Muth's guidelines). In order to qualify for the BSG prizes, participants must submit their records to the BSG database.

Submit your sightings monthly, if possible, to the BSG database. See page 10 of the December 2003 BSG newsletter at

http://www.softdisk.com/comp/birds/newsletters.html

for the information required for each sighting and the various ways you can submit your records or call Mac Hardy at 797-5338. You may submit your species list by parish to Rosemary at rseidler@centenary.edu (species only, not numbers of birds). Rosemary has created an Excel spreadsheet you may use to track your species count by parish. Download the spreadsheet at <a href="http://www.softdisk.com/comp/birds/SelectCheck.html">http://www.softdisk.com/comp/birds/SelectCheck.html</a>. Deadline for final submission to the BSG competition of your species count for each of the eight BSG parishes will be announced in a future newsletter.

#### MINUTES OF THE BOARD MEETING February, 2004 Virtual Board Meeting

The BSG Board conducted its first "virtual" board meeting. This meeting was conducted via email and monitored by the club president Lily Poole. Lily sent the agenda to all board members January 30. The meeting concluded February 6.

Board members participating in the meeting were Lily Poole, Jerry Bertrand, Jeff Trahan, Jean Trahan, Linda Adrion, Michele Andrews, Amanda Crnkovic, Mac Hardy, Hubert Hervey, Nancy Menasco, Larry Raymond, Dan Weber, and Dennis Forshee. Committee chairpersons and others participating were Rosemary Seidler, Barney Poole, and Jim Ingold.

**Treasurer's Report** – Jean Trahan reported that for the month ending January 31, 2004, the club had \$2,853.38 in the bank. In addition we had \$312.66 and \$264.73 in prepaid expenses at the post office and LSUS printing, respectively. The fund balance is \$3,430.77. Net income for the month of January was \$97.00, and expenses were \$235.46.

Important Bird Areas – Hubert Hervey chairs the BSG IBA committee. Other committee members are Mac Hardy, Jim Ingold, Paul Dickson, and Jeff Trahan. Hubert said that Louisiana has no recognized Important Bird Areas (IBA). He intends to submit the Red River Valley; from Alexandria to the Arkansas line as an IBA. Hubert said that he has lost the application form, but will obtain another copy.

**LOS Contest** - Hubert Hervey reported that David Muth from New Orleans has proposed a competition supported

by the Louisiana Ornithological Society (LOS) to see who can see the most species of birds in each Louisiana parish in 2004. Hubert suggested that the BSG participate and supplement the awards for the BSG area parishes. After some discussion via email, the final motion was "The BSG will participate in the LOS contest for 2004 by providing an award to the person who turns in to the BSG database the high count of bird species for each of the eight parishes in our area. The BSG will also provide an award of two times the individual parish award for the high count of bird species in all eight parishes totaled. These parishes include Bienville, Bossier, Caddo, Claiborne, DeSoto, Red River, Webster, and all of Natchitoches Parish. This award will be set at \$25 per parish, plus \$50 to the overall winner thereby totaling a payment of \$250. The type of award, whether cash, store certificate or other value, would be set by the BSG board. All review list species must have documentation sent to the LOS to be counted in this competition." The motion was seconded and passed by the board. Because the amount to be awarded as prizes is greater than \$100, this motion must be approved by the general membership at the February meeting.

**Library** – A motion was made to purchase the DVD "Watching Sparrows" for the library. The treasurer said that the only money specifically designated for library expenditures is the June Haynie Memorial Fund, which has a balance of \$137.05. The motion passed.

Hot Spots – Larry Raymond reported that he is almost ready to assemble the review team for the second edition of "Birding Hot Spots." Once the review team has made their corrections and we are ready to go to print, the board will have to decide how many copies to print and whether or not to send some to ABA.

Fund Raising – Jerry Bertrand reported that he would like help building a few birdhouses and/or feeders and has asked for more donations. He said that we had a pretty pitiful auction last month. Also, if anyone knows a source of birdhouse material, please let him know as his lumber supply is getting rather thin.

Monroe Bird Club Challenge – Nancy Menasco reported that Gerry Click of the Northeast Louisiana Bird Club (Monroe) told us during LOS winter meeting that the Monroe club would like to challenge us to a one-day birding competition. A day would be chosen during spring migration during which each club's members would bird their home parish area. That would be Caddo Parish for the BSG and Ouachita Parish for the

Monroe club. The club with the most species wins North Louisiana bragging rights. A motion was made to accept the challenge and to share the cost of a trophy or plaque. The trophy or plaque would be passed to the winning club each year. The motion passed.

Field Trips —Nancy Menasco reported on future fieldtrips. They are: 1) Bishop Point/Smithport Lake on Saturday, March 27, 2) Eddie Jones Park field trip in April. Larry Raymond will be the leader. 3) NE Bird Club Challenge. This is tentative and the date is not yet set. 4) LOS Spring Meeting, Cameron, Louisiana, Friday, April 23-Sunday, April 25. 5) Fort Hood, Texas to see Black-caped Vireos, May 1 and 2. Nancy also reported on additional field trips in May and June. She also said that she needs volunteers to lead field trips, especially to local Hot Spots, and has asked for suggestions for future field trips.

Miscellaneous – Rosemary Seidler reported that there are 56 members on the Bird Alert. Lily Poole welcomed Dennis Forshee to the board as chair of the Beginning Birders committee. Lily also reported that we have 93 paid accounts. Michelle Andrews has sent our February meeting information to the Shreveport newspaper. Barney Poole reported that the 2003 NW Louisiana checklist is posted on the web site.

#### Minutes of the Regular Meeting February 10, 2004, 7:00 p.m., Museum of Life Sciences at LSUS

**Program** – David Cimprich presented the program on the endangered **Black-capped Vireo**. David has worked for the Nature Conservancy's Fort Hood Project in central Texas for the past 2½ years. He oversees the monitoring of the large population of **Black-capped Vireos** on the installation.

LOS Competition – Hubert Hervey reported that David Muth from New Orleans has proposed a competition supported by the Louisiana Ornithological Society (LOS) to see who can see the most species of birds in a Louisiana parish in 2004. Hubert suggested that the BSG can participate and augment the award. Hubert made the following motion: "The BSG will participate in the LOS contest for 2004 by providing an award to the person who turns in to the BSG database the high count of bird species for each of the eight parishes in our area. The BSG will provide an award of two times the individual parish award for the high count of bird species in all eight parishes totaled. These parishes include Bienville, Bossier, Caddo, Claiborne, DeSoto,

Red River, Webster, and all of Natchitoches Parish. This award will be set at \$25 per parish, thereby totaling a payment of \$250. The type of award, whether cash, store certificate or other value, would be set by the BSG board. All review list species must have documentation sent to the LOS to be counted in this competition." The motion was seconded and passed by the membership present at the meeting.

**Treasurer's Report** –Jean Trahan gave the treasurer's report for the month ending January 31, 2004. She said the club had \$2,853.38 in the bank. In addition we had \$312.66 and \$264.73 in prepaid expenses at the post office and LSUS printing, respectively. The fund balance is \$3,430.77. Net income for the month of January was \$97.00 and expenses were \$235.46.

Field Trips – Lily Poole reported that Bodcau Wildlife Management Area will have a weekend seminar on March 27-28 to train individuals in wildlife Nancy Menasco said that the Great rehabilitation. Backyard Bird Count will take place this weekend. She said that the club will strive to make Shreveport the Louisiana city with the highest species count. A brunch is planned for Sunday at 10:30 a.m. at Amanda Crnkovic's house for the purpose of making plans for the remainder of the count. Nancy said that a field trip to Bishop Point and Smithport Lake is planned for March 27. Also, the Northeast Louisiana Bird Club has challenged the BSG to a one-day birding contest to see which club can observe the most species of birds in one parish. This would be Caddo Parish for the BSG. There would be a trophy that would be passed to the winning club. This contest will take place the same day as the North American Migration Count that will take place on May 8 this year. Nancy reported that there will be an out-of-town field trip to Fort Hood, Texas, to see the **Black-capped Vireos** on May 1 and 2.

Miscellaneous – Hubert Hervey reported that he had Paul Dickson's records for the BCBCBC. The data from these Christmas Counts include years before and after the installation of the lock and dam system on the Red River. He would like someone to work with the data to determine how this significant change in the river habitat has affected the avifauna. Amanda Crnkovic reported that Nan Franks has offered to coordinate the folding and mailing of the newsletter. Rosemary Seidler said that there are 56 members on the Bird Alert service. Linda Adrion said that the club's library will order "Watching Sparrows" in DVD format. Larry Raymond reported that the Hot Spots publication will be ready within one month.

Bird Talk – Hubert Hervey said that he attended Eagle Fest in Emory, Texas. Hubert said that this is supposed to be the eagle capital of Texas. He saw no eagles; however, he did see two Crested Caracaras. Jim Ingold reported on the bird banding at Paul Dickson's farm. He said that four species were banded. Those included Song Sparrow, Swamp Sparrow, Northern Cardinal, and White-crowned Sparrow. Those attending the bird banding saw a total of thirty species. Rosemary Seidler reported that Bobbe Womack has an Allen's Hummingbird at her house.

#### **BIRD REPORT** – compiled March 24, 2004

Use the bird report to see what other birders have been seeing and where to go find the bird you want to see. Observers are abbreviated by the first and last initials. Dates and localities of observations are summarized under the observer's initials. Sightings are arranged by species. Following each species is a line of data in the following format: date, initials of the observer, number of birds observed, initials of another observer, number of birds they observed, etc. For the number of birds observed, a 1 is used for both 1 bird and for numbers not reported by the observer. For example: 01/12/99 BB 2 means that on January 12, 1999, BB saw two birds. Then by looking on the observer list, located after the sightings, you can determine that BB is Bob Birder and on 1/12/99 he was birding C. Bickham Dickson Park.

Report bird records for the newsletter to Mac Hardy by the 15<sup>th</sup> of each month. All bird records reported here are observations of the observers and are therefore the responsibility of the observer.

#### **Uncommon Birds Made Easy**

Five members of the Shreveport Bird Study Group, Linda Adrion, Rosemary Seidler, Jeff Trahan, Jerry Bertrand, and Nancy Menasco, journeyed to Rapides Parish on Saturday, March 13, to spend the morning birding with four members of the Alexandria Loose Alliance Birding Club, Jim Johnson, Tiny Moore, Eric Sipco, and Joe Daniels. Jim had agreed to be our leader for the trip. Despite telling us that he'd been unable to find much on his Friday scouting trip and that the woods just seemed dead on Saturday morning, he delivered on all three of our target species, Red-cockaded Woodpecker (RCW), Bachman's Sparrow, and Henslow's Sparrow, and he made it seem easy in the process. Our first stop was on the road leading into Indian Creek Recreation Area, not far from the turnoff from Indian Creek Road. This area is part of the Alexander State Forest, administered by the Louisiana Department of Agriculture. This brief stop was unproductive, so we drove a little further along the road to an area where the trees were marked with white paint, an indication of use by RCW. While we were getting out of our vehicles, Jim heard a call and before long, we were watching not one but two Red-cockaded Woodpeckers (Target #1) foraging in the pine trees along with Brown-headed Nuthatch, Pine Warbler, Yellow-rumped Warbler, Tufted Titmouse, and Carolina Chickadee. A Pileated Woodpecker called, Rosemary heard a Hermit Thrush, and Jerry spotted and identified an adult Bald Eagle flying by while the rest of us were still trying to figure out what large, dark bird would be flying through a pine forest.

Jim next led us a few miles away to Castor Plunge Road, which runs through the Caney Ranger District of the Kisatchie National Forest. We stopped along the road by an area of Longleaf pine forest that Jim said looked like a likely spot for **Bachman's**. The forest really did seem dead as the only sound we heard was one lone **Pine Warbler** singing across the road. In no time though, Jeff and Rosemary flushed a bird, which quickly dove for cover. As we approached, another bird flushed but this one landed in a tree and seemed content to stay there. It was easily identified as a **Bachman's Sparrow** (Target #2). We wandered around looking at the forest floor flora, Linda practiced reading sign (deer tracks), and still the **Bachman's** sat. Note that at this point we

are still about 100 feet from the road and there are apparently only three birds in the whole darn forest and one of them is a **Bachman's Sparrow**.

Although he was batting a thousand, Jim warned us that Henslow's Sparrow might have already departed the area but that it had been found earlier in the winter next to the Booker Fowler Fish Hatchery. By now, we had great confidence in Jim and we followed him back down Indian Creek Road, firmly believing the Henslow's would still be there. Sure enough, Henslow's Sparrow (Target #3) was found in a field right across from the installation. Unfortunately, only a couple of our participants got much of a look at the elusive birds. The first one identified headed for the woods across the road and the second one hid himself but good. We consoled ourselves with the other birds hanging out at the hatchery, two Belted Kingfishers, Barn Swallow, Purple Martin, Chipping Sparrow, and Killdeer. By the way, this is the NEW fish hatchery, which we were told has tanks that, regrettably, do not hold water.

BSG members lunched at Lea's in Lecompte, then birded Bayou Road and Cheneyville-Echo Road, hoping for Sandhill Cranes, which were not found, probably because of Jim's absence. However, in some flooded fields along the Cheneyville-Echo Road, we found a large flock of *Plegadis* ibis. At least two were Glossy Ibis as we were able to get the scope close enough to them to see the blue facial skin. White Ibis, Gadwall, Mallard, Blue-winged and Green-winged Teal, Northern Shoveler, Northern Pintail and Ring-necked Duck, Great Blue and Little Blue Heron, and Great, Snowy, and Cattle Egrets were also present.

We had picked up 21 species at 70 mph on our way down I-49 from Caddo through DeSoto and Natchitoches Parishes to Rapides Parish, including a Northern Harrier just north of Natchitoches and an **Anhinga** at a pond just south of Alexandria. Jerry and I decided to stop by Lock and Dam No. 4 in Red River Parish on the way home. We could not go all the way to the dam as the road has been closed for some reason just before the backwater on the south side of the road, but we nevertheless added a second Bald Eagle (an immature, probably third-year bird), American Wigeon, Wood Duck, Common Moorhen, and American White Pelican, among other birds. Then, on LA 1, just after 6:30 p.m., we spotted two Great Horned Owls, both sitting on utility poles, the first just north of Armistead and the second three miles north of there beside the Red River NWR Westdale unit. This brought the total species count for the day to 74. A fine time was had by all, lagniappe being that the day's outing had added to our total species counts for five different parishes.

#### **Great Backyard Bird Count 2004 Wrap Up**

What can a small group of people with determination and teamwork do? For the 2004 Great Backyard Bird Count, they can put four northwestern Louisiana towns in the Top Ten Cities in Louisiana in numbers of species reported AND put one of those cities, Shreveport, in the Top Ten Cities in the entire United States and assist Louisiana in tying New Mexico for seventh place in the U.S. with 180 species reported. That's what they can do!

#### **CITY REPORTS:**

Shreveport had 116 species and ranked first in Louisiana and eighth in the United States. All the other nine cities in the Top Ten cities in the U.S. in number of species reported are within 50 miles of the Pacific Ocean, Atlantic Ocean, or Gulf of Mexico in California, Virginia, Florida, or Texas. Shreveport, which is approximately 190 miles (as the pelican flies) from the Gulf, was the only inland city and the only Louisiana city in the Top Ten.

Homer had 84 species and ranked second in Louisiana (tied with New Orleans). Stonewall had 58 species and ranked seventh in Louisiana. Keithville had 56 species and ranked ninth in Louisiana. Mansfield had 39 species and ranked sixteenth in Louisiana. Benton had 31 species and ranked twenty-third in Louisiana. Blanchard had 17 species and ranked forty-sixth in Louisiana. The total species reported in northwestern Louisiana was 126.

#### **PARISH REPORTS:**

Caddo, Bossier, and part of Red River Parish:

Mac Hardy delivered on his Bert Kouns Loop Greater Roadrunner and he and Amanda Crnkovic rounded up the first pair of Barn Owls sighted. Rosemary Seidler, alone or with Vicki LeFevers or Linda Adrion and Ann McLaurin, swept the Cross Lake area; Jeff and Jean Trahan were responsible for their home-away-from-home, C. Bickham Dickson Park, which was also visited by Bobbe Wommack (of Allen's Hummingbird host fame) and Norma Cobb; and Jim Ingold, in between visits to Velda Neilson's to band and confirm what was probably the first record ever of Sage Thrasher in northern Louisiana, birded here, there, and yonder. John McBride and Terry Davis birded North

Shreveport and the Dixie-Belcher-Gilliam area; Lily Poole visited hummingbird hosts and Cypress Lake Nature Preserve: Karen Gordon volunteered her Rufous when Paul Dickson's Hummingbird cooperate; and Larry and Anne Raymond reported from the Blanchard area. Jerry Bertrand and I concentrated on Hart's Island Road, Bishop Point, and the Red River and, with Mary Jacobs, checked out Ellerbe Road and Wallace Bayou. Bill Wood turned in his usual dazzling species numbers from Keithville; Ginny Hooper and Lelia Vaughan observed the only Canvasbacks found over the four-day count from Ginny's home on Cross Lake: and Linda Adrion and Ann McLaurin went wherever it took to mop up missing species. It seemed like almost everyone visited Yearwood Road at some point during the count period.

#### Claiborne Parish:

ME Lewis at her birding mecca on Lake Claiborne was ably assisted by Linda Adrion and Ann McLaurin on Saturday and Terry Davis on Sunday in putting the Homer zip code in second place in Louisiana with species like **Bewick's Wren**, **Grasshopper Sparrow**, and **Henslow's Sparrow**, and in settling once and for all the question, "Are there any birds in Claiborne Parish?"

#### DeSoto Parish:

The unbeatable combination of Hubert and Pat Hervey in Stonewall with **Harris's Sparrow** and **Rufous Hummingbird** and Velda Neilson near Mansfield with her **Sage Thrasher** once again put DeSoto Parish on the birding map.

#### What species did we miss entirely?

Here's a list of some of them:

- ➤ Geese Not a gaggle to be found.
- > American Wigeon
- **▶** Blue-winged Teal
- ➤ Little Blue Heron One of those off-again, onagain species possibly dependent on how warm it is up here during the count.
- ➤ Common Loon, Red-breasted Merganser, Horned and Eared Grebes These species often require a boat trip on Cross Lake to be seen.
- ➤ Sandhill Crane Sometimes found in Bossier Parish in the winter, more scouting or expanding our territory might find these next year.
- ➤ Greater and Lesser Yellowlegs, dowitchers Possibly same problem as Little Blue Heron or maybe not enough time spent on Red River (it was cold out there, folks!).
- ➤ **Vermilion Flycatcher** A non-arrival at CBD this winter, but a possible sighting the week before on

- Cross Lake and a March Yearwood Road appearance indicates they're out there somewhere, so let's resolve now to hunt every nook and cranny for them next year.
- ➤ Horned Lark and Lapland Longspur Despite extensive searches, none were found. Were they even here this year?
- > Sedge and Marsh Wren Sedge Wren is getting harder and harder to find. There are Marsh Wrens in Caddo Parish, but migrant wren numbers appeared to be down this year. We'll get 'em next year.
- > Sprague's Pipit and Smith's Longspur Major habitat loss over the years for these uncommon species, which used to be found at the Gilliam Raceway, sometimes found at the airport, none reported this winter to the database.
- ➤ Common Yellowthroat Same habitat as Marsh Wren, but can be as hard to find.

Our thanks go to Amanda and Joel Crnkovic for hosting Sunday's strategy brunch and to everyone for the good eats to fortify us for the rest of the count.

#### **Great Backyard Bird Count Diary**

#### Lily Poole:

2/13/04, 1930 – I called Bobbe Wommack to get her Friday GBBC bird list. Can you imagine reading off a Shreveport, LA, backyard bird list that includes an **Allen's Hummingbird**?!

2/14/04, 0700 – I woke up Saturday morning to the sound of rain. A sensible person would have rolled over and gone back to sleep. Instead I dressed for the 36-degree rain and left for Paul Dickson's house to attempt to see his winter rarities for inclusion in the GBBC.

0800 – Can you imagine a Shreveport, LA, backyard bird list that includes **Broad-tailed Hummingbird**, **Ruby-throated Hummingbird**, and **Summer Tanager**? Too bad I missed his **Rufous** hummer.

2/15/04, 1330 – I had made plans to meet at Cypress Black Bayou Nature Center with Girl Scout Troop 177 to work on their Outdoors Badge. Plans don't always turn out as expected and instead of 3 adults and 3 scouts, there was one adult, Marie Williams, and her daughter Bonnie. Oh well, we could still work on the Badge and I would hopefully add **Bald Eagle** to the NW LA GBBC

species list. We had not been at the Nature Center 5 minutes when Bonnie pointed out a bird. Hermit Thrush! Good Start! After giving Marie and Bonnie an overview of the park's common birds and their calls, we started down the trail to see the Bald Eagle's nest and hopefully a Bald Eagle. It was a good thing my review of bird calls had included the Barred Owl and Bald Eagle as Marie and Bonnie were quite pleased to be able to identify these birds by their distinctive calls. Unfortunately we had to be satisfied with eagle calls because, while we located the nest, we only heard an eagle calling. Many thanks to park naturalist/educator Melissa Whittington for her help with the Outdoors Badge requirements.

1930 – Called Bobbe to take down her yard list. Added **Great Horned Owl** along with **Allen's Hummingbird**. At this time, this was the only owl species for Shreveport.

2/16/04, 1030 – GBBC Brunch/Social at Amanda Crnkovic's was a great success. Great food, good company and a list of bird species that we would like to locate to put Shreveport and NW LA in the running for the top spots in Louisiana and the United States.

3/17/04 — As usual I've enjoyed the GBBC. Northwestern Louisiana is doing well in the Top Ten GBBC lists. Shreveport, Homer, Stonewall (Hubert and Pat's **Harris's Sparrows**) and Keithville are in Louisiana's Top Ten cities for number of species seen. Mansfield (Velma's **Sage Thrasher** — Woo Hoo!), Benton, and Blanchard are well represented. Louisiana is the eighth state in the United States for number of species seen and it looks as if Shreveport will be in the Top Ten cities in the United States for number of species seen. Really impressive team work and a good time had by all. Geaux BSG!

#### Nancy Menasco and Jerry Bertrand:

We arrived home a little before 11 p.m. on Monday, February 16, from a last-ditch attempt to fill in as many gaps as we could. We had met Terry Davis and John McBride south of Shreveport on Gayle Levee Road about 4:15 p.m. Terry and John had already gotten a Bald Eagle at the port, the second Bald Eagle of the day as one had been spotted downtown by Perry Tuminello, Pat Young, and ten others. We headed down Hart's Island Road, where we found 14 Rusty Blackbirds (not new for the count but a Watch List bird), to LA 1 to Bishop Point at Lock and Dam No. 5, arriving about 6 p.m. In one of the cattail marshes along Bishop Point Road was a heard Virginia Rail (new count bird). We saw two red-phase Eastern Screech-Owls on either side of the road that leads to the gated levee just before you get to the boat launch, heard eight others before we left Bishop Point, and picked up two more in other spots for a total of twelve **Eastern Screech-Owls**. At the same spot on the levee, we heard two, possibly three, **Great Horned Owls**.

John had to leave so Terry, Jerry, and I continued on. On Yearwood Road, we had four **Barn Owls**, all of them seen and one of them heard as well. Two of them were probably the same ones Mac and Amanda had the day before. All of them were out hunting; three flew over and around us.

Best Bird of the Night: One, possibly two, Short-Eared Owls on Yearwood Road. Two owls flew up, over, and around us right next to the road. Only one could be positively identified as a Short-eared Owl. Toughest Bird of the Night: Barred Owl. At this point, we weren't going home until midnight or we found a Barred Owl, whichever came first. We tried numerous spots and kept coming up empty. Finally, after 10 p.m., we stopped on Robson Road near the bridge. Terry squeaked and called but there was no reply. Just as we were getting ready to move on, we heard a cracking, crashing sound a few feet over our heads in a tree right beside us. A Barred Owl flew out of the tree to another a very short distance away. It had come in so silently that we had not heard it. Apparently, the branch it perched on was rotten and gave way when it started to move. We got wonderful looks. Total Owls for the night - 21: Eastern Screech-Owl, 12; Great Horned Owl, 2; Barn Owl, 4; Short-eared Owl, 1; Barred Owl, 1; unidentified, 1. Owls seen, 9; owls heard only, 12.

#### Just another Vermillion Flycatcher

"Just another Vermillion Flycatcher," I never thought those words would pass from my lips let alone say the phrase every other time I picked up my binoculars. It's just another day of birding in Mexico.

My first trip to Mexico was a 10-day, 3,400-mile journey in April of 2002. Dr. Mac Hardy and I set out on this expedition in order to attend a scientific meeting in Cuernavaca, Mexico (just south of Mexico City). But as biologists and birders, we couldn't just drive straight back without making a slight detour to see a sample of the variety in habitats and fauna Mexico has to offer. We drove south through scrub and thorny desert on the way to Mexico City, then south through less arid and more mountainous regions in Cuernavaca and Oaxaca. We went east crossing the mountainous region on the Isthmus de Tehuantepec to the coast arriving in Veracruz. On our return north we drove along the coast and stopped at the lush cloud forest in Gomez Firaz.

As we traveled from state to state, we passed many agricultural check-points where officials asked you to discard any fruits, vegetables, or plants before entering their state. It was reassuring to see officials working to protect natural habitats and the agricultural industry. But for every glimmer of hope for conservation that I saw, there was an equally disturbing reminder of the lack of respect for the environment still present in some of the local people. The first was a string of roadside vendors selling wild-caught caged birds. I did not expect to see for sale along the highway a ring-tail (a raccoon cousin) being dangled by his tail or Burrowing Owls stuffed into homemade cages. Another surprise was on the road to the northernmost cloud forest in the new world near the town of Gomez Firaz in a nature reserve. The only restaurant and pit stop in the entire town had caged birds from the surrounding forest, including Curassows and a Military Macaw, arranged in a courtyard showcase. They were charging money to look at the birds they kidnapped from the forest. The Macaw was beating his empty metal feeding dish against the cage in between attempts to bite the dog that was sniffing around under his cage.

Driving in Mexico was an experience in itself. It was not uncommon to come to an intersection and have two signs for the same destination pointing in two different directions. My favorite Mexican road memory is the highway that is finished on the map, but without warning suddenly drops off from paved four-lane highway into a two-lane dirt road. Obvious benefits to driving in Mexico included: **oropendolas** flying across the road to land in their hanging basket-like nests; **Crested Caracara**, **Roadside Hawk**, **Gray Hawk**, and **White Hawk** all seen from the highway; and fresh, cold coconut sold by roadside vendors.

The rich culture of Mexico is infused in every detail from vibrant colors, wonderful food, and real mariachi bands to families gathering in the city center in the evening. I often found myself wondering how I could still be so close to the United States and still a world away. The birds of Mexico are a treat for any birder, but the overall experience of Mexico is what makes a lasting impression.

I highly recommend a birding trip to Mexico. The birds, the culture, and the country are beautiful. So step out of your comfort zone and venture across the border. Mexico, with a mixture of the unexpected and the predictable, is a sure bet for a memorable birding adventure.

#### MINUTES OF THE BOARD MEETING

March 2, 2004

Museum of Life Sciences at LSUS

Board members participating in the meeting were, Jerry Bertrand, Jeff Trahan, Linda Adrion, Hubert Hervey, Nancy Menasco, and Amanda Crnkovic. Proxies were held for Jean Trahan, Michele Andrews, Lily Poole, and Mac Hardy. Jerry Bertrand conducted the meeting since the president was not present.

**Treasurer's Report** – Jeff Trahan gave the report for Jean Trahan for the month ending February 29, 2004. He said the club had \$2,917.39 in the bank. In addition, we had \$279.98 and \$250.65 in prepaid expenses at the post office and LSUS printing, respectively. The fund balance is \$3,448.02. Also, it was reported that David Cimprich, who was the speaker at the last regular meeting, requested that his \$100 honorarium be donated to the Nature Conservancy.

**Old Business** – Jerry Bertrand reported that Tern Save will probably have a meeting on March 8 and that the Regional Science Fair will take place March 5. Also, Sarah Hancock will be helping Linda Adrion judge the fair. The recent virtual board meeting was discussed and did not receive good response from the board members present.

**Bird Records** – Amanda Crnkovic reported for Mac Hardy. Mac has asked that the bird records have the same deadline as the newsletter deadline each month.

**Important Bird Areas** – Hubert Hervey chairs the BSG IBA committee. He said that he will conduct a virtual meeting with the committee members.

**Field Trips** – Nancy Menasco stated that all field trips should leave at the advertised departure time. Upcoming field trips are Indian Creek on March 13, Bishop Point/Smithport Lake Dam on March 27, Eddie Jones Park on April 10, and Noah Tyson Park on April 18.

Dates and localities of observations are summarized under the observer's initials. Sightings are arranged by species. Following each species is a line of data in the following format: date, initials of the observer, number of birds observed, initials of another observer, number of birds they observed, etc. For the number of birds observed, a 1 is used for both 1 bird and for numbers not reported by the observer. For example: 01/12/99 BB 2 means that on January 12, 1999, BB saw two birds. Then by looking on the observer list, located after the sightings, you can determine that BB is Bob Birder and on 1/12/99 he was birding C. Bickham Dickson Park.

### Bishop's Point, Lock and Dam 5, Carmel, and Smithport Lake Outing

Eighteen BSG members and visitors went birding at the above locations on March 27, 2004. The weather was delightful and all of the birds we had hoped to see were present at the expected locations. That makes it fun to be the leader because nobody is disappointed.

We traveled south on LA Hwy 1 to a half-mile north of Yearwood Road, where a large flock of **American** 

Golden-Plovers had been seen. We counted 67 as they walked, fed, rested and occasionally flew short distances. It would have been nice if they all had flown at once because I always enjoy seeing the tight flock, and unison maneuvering of these large birds. A mile or more down the road we scoped out the Greater and Lesser Yellowlegs, Blue-winged Teal, Gadwall, Tricolored Heron, Little Blue Heron, and listened to a Belted Kingfisher belting out his rattled call. We had a mystery bird here that I really don't want to mention because to do so admits that I have fallen off my pedestal. To me it looked like a dark brown Greater Yellowlegs. To others it looked like a Stilt Sandpiper. Its bill was as long as the bill of a yellowlegs, no eyestripe, and very light under-wings. It flew right over us, but offered no defining markings, and no call that I could hear. We voted, as democratic birding organizations must, and the non-committed vote won by a huge majority.

At Lock and Dam 5 we went down the gravel road south, and the **American White Pelicans** put on a glorious show as they sailed overhead almost within reach of a butterfly net. The **Double-crested Cormorants** were paled by comparison. Large numbers of **Cliff Swallows** again are nesting along the south end of the lock. I once had a pair **Cave Swallows** nesting a Lock and Dam 1, so be sure to look for them here. Many **Barn Swallows** and **Purple Martins** were also present.

Moving on to Bishop's Point we saw Forsters' Tern, Herring Gull, Ring-billed Gull, and American Coot. A few Tree Swallows were far out over the water's of Pool 5, and I was able to scope up one Spotted Sandpiper. I'm sure it was difficult for some of us to remain bound to the land, when we knew there were many species unseen only 2 miles up the river in an area accessible by boat only. We had lunch here at the pavilion of this new and very nice facility.

We had more Yellowlegs, **Pectoral Sandpipers**, ducks, and one **Solitary Sandpiper** farther down Hwy 1, on the way to Carmel. The main attraction was the Rock Chapel at Carmel, built about 1890 by monks. Yellow fever caused severe death losses and the abandoning of the colony. I think it moved to Germantown north of Minden, LA. We did see **Brown-headed Nuthatches** in Carmel.

People were happy, snacking on leftovers from lunch, birding and enjoying the dogwoods, redbuds, wild jasmine, red buckeye and wisteria blooming. We had one last stop. At Smithport Lake Dam the butterflies were putting on a better show than the birds. We did see both target birds, **Northern Parula** and **Yellow-throated Warbler**. I learned that I can still hear the high pitched call of the parula. I was afraid I had lost

that ability, and that it was only present in memory. With that good news I bid the group farewell, although I had the opinion many were reluctant to leave one of the most picturesque places in northern Louisiana, the Spanish Moss draped Cypress Swamp at Smithport Lake.

#### A Weekend in Cameron Parish

The LOS spring meeting was held in Cameron Friday, April 23 through Sunday, April 25, 2004. Fourteen members of the BSG attended this weekend of LOS meetings and birding. I went for the birds but also enjoyed the meetings. I birded with Mac Hardy. Our goal was small, to see Rose-breasted Grosbeaks, and our results were good, a total of 94 species on Saturday including the Rose-breasted Grosbeaks. Unexpected afternoon rain resulted in not only wet shoes but also six species of warblers in one tree (Chestnut-sided Warbler, Black and White Warbler, Tennessee Warbler, Yellow Warbler, Black-throated Green Warbler, and Swainson's Warbler). The highlight bird for most of us over the weekend was Cape May Warbler at the Peveto Woods Sanctuary. Mac and I had missed it on Saturday, so on Sunday we went for another look. Upon our arrival, we were told, to our disappointment, that no one had seen it on Sunday. We joined the Trahans and the Martins in looking for the Cape May Warbler in the "warbler tree." Luckily it appeared. Not only did it appear, but it perched directly over our heads in plain view. It did not take long for the crowd of anxious birders to assemble.

Other good trip birds included: Black Tern, American Avocet, Bobolink, Indigo Bunting, and Painted Bunting. Among the shorebirds we identified: Semipalmated Plover, Piping Plover, Black-necked Willet. Stilt. Whimbrel, Ruddy Turnstone, Sanderling, Least Sandpiper, Dunlin, Caspian Tern, Royal Tern, Sandwich Tern, Least Tern, and Black Skimmers. An American Oyster Catcher was nesting near the Cameron parish/Texas border. We did not see this bird. After hearing where it was, we realized that not only did we drive past it but also ate our lunch 100 yards from it with out ever seeing it. Well, it just proves you can't see everything even if you are trying to, especially if you are hungry.

One thing that impressed me on this trip, other than the warblers, was the number of **Boat-tailed Grackles** (and even a few **Great-tailed Grackles**) in Cameron parish. They were absolutely everywhere. The males were in full mating mode, displaying for every grackle to

see. They called and displayed (head up, tail up, feathers fanned) on every imaginable perch telephone lines, posts, and roads.

Next spring I encourage you to go the LOS meeting in Cameron. It is a great birding weekend with great migrant birds and fellow birders. The LOS also meets in Cameron in the fall. That is a good meeting to get acquainted with the area so that you will be ready for the spring.

Hospitality and Special Events organizes members to bring goodies to monthly meetings and to the Christmas banquet and helps set-up and clean-up the snack area.

### **Make Checklists from your BSG Bird Database** by Mac Hardy

A new report (SPLIST.REP) format for the BSG Bird Database is available that will generate a species list (a field checklist of names) for any group in our database. Contact me if you want the new report format or want to start using the BSG database.

You can use this report for any field or combination of fields in the database. For example, all species from Soda Lake on a certain date or by a certain observer.

This report should give us a much better ability to find areas that need more birding exploration.

#### **Bird Records Notes**

by Mac Hardy

I suggest that users of the BSG Bird Database use Macro C when entering new bird records in your database, rather than typing in the species abbreviation each time. Use of the macro (Macro C) to enter new bird records provides two very important functions for maintaining the quality of the BSG Bird Database. First, it gets the correct name of the species from the names database on your disk. This prevents misspellings and typographical errors (such as capitalization or omitting hyphens). Second, it also gets the correct sequence number. The sequence number is what allows any report that lists names to list them in the correct AOU sequence.

Use of the macro eliminates the need to find and correct names and/or sequence numbers and saves me a lot of time when the bird report is being prepared.

**Treasurer's Report** – Jean Trahan reported income during the last month of \$266.00 and expenses of \$83.81. The club has \$3,129.12 cash in the bank, \$250.44 at the post office for mailing newsletters, and \$250.65 at the LSUS printing office for printing newsletters. The total assets are \$3,630.21.

**Old Business** – Sarah Hancock and Linda Adrion selected a winner for the BSG regional science fair award. The winner was Robert Yokem with the project "Safe Guarded Birdhouse." Lily ordered and picked up a plaque for \$37.17 that will be presented to Robert at the next meeting.

New Business – Nominating committee. The nominating committee is composed of Amanda Crnkovic, Lily Poole, Nancy Menasco, and Rosemary Seidler. Board members whose terms are up are Dan Weber, Nancy Menasco, Larry Raymond, Roy Bott and John McBride. Dan Weber has said that he has chosen not to return to the board. Nancy has volunteered to

return to the board and has suggested that we ask at the next meeting if anyone is interested in serving.

**Bird Hot Spots** – Larry Raymond reported that the Hot Spots publication is close to complete. He expects it to be finished in a few weeks.

service to get cost estimates for hosting for the BSG as well as top level domain naming options and pricing.

# BIRD REPORT – compiled April 28, 2004

Use the bird report to see what other birders have been seeing and where to go find the bird you want to see. Observers are abbreviated by the first and last initials. Dates and localities of observations are summarized under the observer's initials. Sightings are arranged by species. Following each species is a line of data in the following format: date, initials of the observer, number of birds observed, initials of another observer, number of birds they observed, etc. For the number of birds observed, a 1 is used for both 1 bird and for numbers not reported by the observer. For example: 01/12/99 BB 2 means that on January 12, 1999, BB saw two birds. Then by looking on the observer list, located after the sightings, you can determine that BB is Bob Birder and on 1/12/99 he was birding C. Bickham Dickson Park.

Report bird records for the newsletter to Mac Hardy by the 15<sup>th</sup> of each month. All bird records reported here are observations of the observers and are therefore the responsibility of the observer.



# **North American Migration Count 2004**

This year's count took place at the earliest possible date, May 8th. As predicted it was a very good count, although not a record breaker. We had 7,531 birds of 146 species. It will always amaze me when the results are so similar to previous counts. For example in 2003 we counted 7,531 birds and in 2000 we counted 7,199 birds. The exception to this was the record-setting year of 2002 when 12,626 birds of 171 species were counted. For those of you who like to speculate about the possible number of birds that can be seen in northern Louisiana during a single day count that we call a "Big Day" that 171 species would be a noteworthy accomplishment. The highest interior location "Big Day" I know of is around 150 species.

Our participation level was high again, with 20 people enjoying the good weather and good birding. The biggest disappointment was, as usual, the small count of

warbler species. We always have some, but never enough. Vireos were present in good numbers. On the same day that "Smarty Jones" won the second jewel of the Triple Crown at the Preakness, we had a race too.

Here's the call: the high numbers count within a species was claimed once again by that front running horse, neatly trimmed in yellow and black with the name of Dickcissel (635), with Cattle Egret (592) losing by a nose (I mean beak), and the white show horse was Great Egret (475). "Also rans" with red/yellow epaulets were Red-winged Blackbird (420), the red silks of Northern Cardinal (313), a gray horse trimmed in white Northern Mockingbird (271), high flying Purple Martin (228), a speckled dark horse European Starling (207), a somber Morning Dove (199), and a popular newcomer carrying a heavy load up front, American White Pelican (176). The most interesting new horse in the race was the unexpected late entry of Purple Gallinule sponsored by Red River stables. Horses of that color have not been seen up here for over forty years. One horse entered by Claiborne Parish Racing Association was wearing a cockade of red as part of its Red-cockaded Woodpecker silk colors. A less stunning bay entry from DeSoto Parish, the likes of which is seldom seen in these parts was a Bachman's **Sparrow**. Thank you for coming to the races. I hope you will return again next year. An inside tip - place your money on the horse trimmed in yellow and black.

# Fort Hood and Songbirds – A Lesson in Peaceful Coexistence

The afternoon of Saturday, May 1, 2004, found our group of 15 birders in Killeen, Texas, gateway to Fort Hood. The morning's rain had ended, leaving overcast skies, temperatures in the low 60's, and 15-to-25 mph winds. Expecting the typical spring weather of central Texas in early May (warm to hot), we had arrived unprepared for this chilling aberration. However, undaunted by the conditions, we donned every layer of clothing we could find and set out with our guide, Rich Kostecke of The Nature Conservancy of Texas' Fort Hood field office. Since our Fort Hood trip was not until Sunday, we were taking the opportunity to visit some of the other beautiful birding areas in the vicinity.

Our birding began at Chalk Ridge Falls Park on the Lampasas River in Bell County. From the parking lot, the trail follows the river through a canyon. As the green waters of the Lampasas descended into the canyon over the 20-foot falls, a boardwalk and a series of steps took us from one level to another. We crossed a suspension

footbridge over the river and found ourselves on a shady woodland trail bordered by pale blue dayflower (Commelina communis) and spiderwort (Tradescantia spp.). Appropriately, a Canyon Wren called as did a Yellow-billed Cuckoo. A Yellow-throated Vireo flew back and forth feeding a fledgling perched on a branch high in a tree overlooking the river. We held our collective breaths when the fledgling seemed to fall from its perch and were much relieved when it fluttered to safety on a lower branch. The vireo was a life bird for Herb Pearce, who, in a reversal of the birds' spring migration, had flown south from Arlington, Massachusetts, to combine a visit to his mother in Shreveport with a birding trip. Other birds seen by members of our group included Red-eyed Vireo, Ovenbird, and Least Flycatcher.

Our next stop was Union Grove WMA, located a short distance from Chalk Ridge Falls on Stillhouse Hollow Reservoir. The reservoir was formed by the impoundment of the Lampasas River. A walk down a long road led us to a point where the waters of the lake lapped the shore at our feet. Braving the wind, **Dickcissels** sang as they clung to the small trees swaying beside the road. An Osprev hunted for fish near the dam. Having viewed the American Coots on the lake, Jean Trahan and I decided to look for rails and bitterns as the reeds along the road seemed like good habitat. Not only did we find neither rail nor bittern, but in the process of our search, we managed to miss getting to see a Peregrine Falcon and a Franklin's Gull in breeding plumage, which were spotted over the water. Janis Harrison continued to demonstrate her lightning-quick ability to set up her spotting scope, focus it on the intended subject bird, and take a great picture with her digital camera held up to the eyepiece in about the time the rest of us were taking to get our binoculars focused on said bird.

We dined that evening at the historic Stagecoach Inn in Salado. The Inn was built in the 1860's at the crossroads of the Chisholm Trail and the Old Military Road, which linked a chain of forts. Our waitress, who has been at the Inn for over 40 years, recited the menu to us as did the local housewives who once met the stagecoaches and cattle drives so many years ago. There were now 16 of us as Jim Ingold had arrived in time for dinner.

On Sunday Rich met us at 6:00 a.m. to escort us onto Fort Hood. There we met our host, Gil Eckrich, who is the Outreach Coordinator for the Army's Natural Resources Management Branch on Fort Hood. Gil and Rich lead many birding tours on Fort Hood every year and we felt very fortunate to have such knowledgeable and hospitable guides. David Cimprich, who oversees

the monitoring of Fort Hood's **Black-capped Vireo** population for The Nature Conservancy, joined us for part of the day. David spoke to the Bird Study Group in February of his work at Fort Hood.

Fort Hood, the U.S. Army's largest tank training installation, lies in Bell and Coryell Counties in the ecoregion known as the Lampasas Cut Plain. The same type of limestone rocks that underlie the Edwards Plateau extend northward beyond the Colorado River to form the Lampasas Cut Plain, but the topography differs from the Edwards Plateau. Wide alluvial valleys lie between mesa uplands and the area is primarily grassland with scattered mesquite woods. Although eastern birds predominate, a number of western species are also present and canyon land species can be found on the rocky slopes.

Fort Hood's specialties are the endangered Blackcapped Vireo and Golden-cheeked Warbler and over 25% of its almost 220,000 acres is managed for the recovery of these two species. One of the management techniques employed is Brown-headed Cowbird control. The cowbird once followed the bison, eating the seeds the bison uncovered and laying eggs in the nests of other birds, which would raise the cowbird chicks after the bison and the cowbirds moved on. The effect of this parasitism was local and did not significantly impact the host species. The trouble began when stay-at-home cattle replaced the roving bison. The proliferation of lawns and lawnmowers has also increased cowbird habitat. Cowbird populations have spiraled upward while the populations of many of the host birds have gone in the opposite direction. Some species have coped better than others. The Golden-cheeked Warbler can sometimes successfully rear a cowbird chick and one of its own, but this still reduces the number of warbler young. The smaller vireo is unable to tend both the cowbird chick and its own young, so the larger, often earlier-born cowbird chick is the one who survives. Fort Hood has taken the lead in humane cowbird control and its methods are being copied in other areas. In 1987, there were only 85 pairs of Black-capped Vireo on Fort Hood. Today, the conservative estimate is that there are at least 3,000 Black-capped Vireo pairs along with several thousand Golden-cheeked Warblers. These birds make up the largest breeding populations of both species under single land ownership and include 16-18% of the known vireo population. The importance of Fort Hood's conservation policies to the continued existence of these two species is apparent.

While the habitat of the Golden-cheeked Warbler is the dense forest of mature Ashe juniper and mixed hardwood on the steep slopes and canyon walls, the **Black-capped Vireo** prefers a mid-success ional, shrubby oak-juniper habitat on the mesa tops.

Disturbance in the form of fire or clearing is critical to maintain this open, low-growing habitat. Periodic prescribed burns and mechanical clearing are the

methods used. A major fire on Fort Hood in 1996, which was accidentally started by artillery, created much good vireo habitat. While the vireos are wintering in Mexico, tanks lumbering through the area on training exercises even help to maintain the habitat by knocking down growth. This "pruning" results in lower and more luxuriant growth. Surprising to us is the ability of the warblers and vireos to adapt to the noise and activity levels on parts of the installation as evidenced by successful nesting right next to some of the busiest areas.

The **Painted Bunting** is another species that has profited from its association with Fort Hood. Gil Eckrich told us that when he first started surveying **Painted Bunting** populations on Fort Hood, he was lucky to find five in a day. Now Gil was able to promise us that we would see more **Painted Buntings** than we had ever seen before in one place and did he ever deliver on that promise! This was a life bird for Barbara Kiser and, as Barbara's husband Don pointed out, unlike many life bird sightings where you get one brief glimpse and the bird is gone, Barbara saw her life bird over and over and over throughout the day, in the trees, in the bushes, and flying across the road. In fact, it was the most abundant bird seen on the trip.

Although it required most of the day for everyone in our party to get really satisfying looks at our target species, Black-capped Vireo and Golden-cheeked Warbler, it was well worth it to see these beautiful little birds. The habitat on Fort Hood is quite diverse and we must have driven or tramped through samplings of all of it as our trip list indicates. Some of the other birds sighted included Greater Roadrunner, Wild Turkey, Eastern Kingbird, Western Kingbird, Olive-sided Scissor-tailed Flycatcher, Flycatcher, **Eastern** Bluebird, White-eyed Vireo, Ruby-crowned Kinglet, Blue-gray Gnatcatcher, Blue Grosbeak, Indigo Bunting, Black-chinned Hummingbird, Common Raven, and Mississippi Kite. A male Lazuli Bunting was sighted on top of one of the mesas. A male Vermilion Flycatcher, one of a pair of nesting birds, was a life bird for Amanda Carroll and a reminder of a winter friend for those of us who have frequented Shreveport's C. Bickham Dickson Park the past few years. Happily, since our visit, Vermilion Flycatcher chicks have been reported. A wetlands area known as "The Willows" held Green Heron, Great Blue Heron, Great Egret, Spotted Sandpiper, Blue-winged Teal, Yellow-billed Cuckoo, and Summer Tanager. Here Brian Wilson pointed out a Common Nighthawk asleep on a fat tree branch.

Myriad wildflowers were in bloom and we kept Gil and Rich busy identifying them for us. Yellow flax (*Linum rigidum*), sensitive briar (*Schrankia uncinata*), wine cups (*Callirhoe digitata*), Indian Blanket (*Gaillardia pulchella*), and, of course, Texas bluebonnet (*Lupinus texensis*) jostled for space.

In 1997 Fort Hood received The Nature Conservancy's President's Conservation Achievement Award. The award is given in recognition of "exceptional support by individuals and organizations working in partnership with the Conservancy to protect biodiversity". I believe those of us who participated in this trip would say it was well deserved. Other BSG members and guests who made the trip were Jerry Bertrand, Pat Seagar, Mike Baranski, Elaine Wilson, Jeff Trahan, and Louis and Loretta Soulé.

#### **BSG Science Fair Award**

This code of ethics gives guidelines every birder should abide by. The code states everyone who enjoys birds and birding must always respect wildlife, its environment, and the rights of others. In any conflict of interest between birds and birders, the welfare of the birds and their environment comes first. According to the code birders should: promote the welfare of birds and their environment, avoid stressing birds or exposing them to danger, respect the law and the rights of others, ensure that feeders, nest structures, and other artificial bird environments are safe, respect the interests, rights, and skills of fellow birders, and freely share their knowledge and experience.

Dates and localities of observations are summarized under the observer's initials. Sightings are arranged by species.
